I received your letters of the fourth Nov.^r
& 1. Jan^r last in consequence of which I
sent you most of the Articles you required
which were shipped on board the Nancy Cap.ⁿ
Davidson & I hope you have by this time
received them

I wrote to you by the April & May Packets & having
settled your accounts & dunned James for two
years Rent whom I had forgot & also
Alexander I paid £140 to shield for Melbard
being the whole of your Ballance
that it might immediately go to
increase your 4 p^{ts} which were then

at 60 - But have never been able to
get an Answer from Williard since.
I understand he is a Captain of Horse
as for me I am only a flagal man
(which however shows my merit) under
the Noble Cap.ⁿ Grant - we are out every
Morning from 6 to 8 & make a tolerable
appearance, we mustered 104 a few days ago
But all fear of an Invasion is subsided
as Buonaparte sailed from Toulon
the 26th May & never passed the Gt
of Gibraltar, so that his object must
be either Constantinople or Egypt - it is
generally believed that he is going to
the latter place to establish a colony
& to transport his army over the

Then us of Suez to embark them on the Red
Sea & proceed to join Tippoo on the Malabar
Coast. —

A most Dreadful Insurrection broke
out in the Counties of Kildare Carlow
& Wexford the 24th of May. many Towns
were attacked by the Insurgents and
Wexford was taken. They have ^{been} attacked
in various places by the Regulars
Militia & Yeomanry (all of whom
have behaved very well) & defeated
every where with Terrible Slaughter
a Large Body of the Guards were
immediately sent to Waterford & several
Regiments of English Militia having

offered their services were allowed by
