during the Session met at York on Monday
the third day of November, being the first
day of Michaelmas Term in the third
year of the Society, and in the year of Our
Lord one thousand eight hundred and even-
ty three, and adjourned on Thursday the
thirteenth of the same month. - - -

Michaelmas Term,

In the third year of the Society
and in the year of our Lord

Monday 3^d Nov^r 1823.

At Six of the clock the Prothonotary bearing the Roll came down to the Chamber and took his seat at the end of the Table uncovered.

The Roll was then called until Six members appeared and took their seats.

The Prothonotary then rose and declared the Chamber to be duly organized.

Mr Richardson then rose and proposed

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that Mr. Richard C. Richardson be chosen Bencher, in which he was seconded by Mr. Radenhurst.

The ballots being distributed the question was put by the Prothonotary and upon opening the ballot box there appeared for the question, Nine; against it, four.

The question was accordingly carried in the affirmative by a majority of five.

And Mr. Bencher Elect was led to the Chair by Messieurs Richardson and Radenhurst

The Bencher Elect left the Chair.

At Seven of the Clock the writ calling Mr. Bencher elect to the Bench having issued Mr. Bencher took the Chair.

Mr. Richardson then proposed that Mr. Thomas M. Radenhurst be chosen Vice Bencher in which he was seconded by Mr. King.

The ballots being distributed the question was put, and upon opening the ballot box there appeared for the question, eight; against it, five.

The question was accordingly carried in the affirmative by a majority of three.

Mr. Bencher informed the Chamber that he had received the message from the Com

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mittee of Direction, which, with the permission
of the Chamber, he would read. —

Mr. Bencher then read the message as follows,

"Baldwin
Protector,

The Committee of Direction in o-
pening to the Chamber the State of the
Society at the Commencement of this Year
cannot help taking the first opportunity of con-
gratulating the Chamber on the important
change which has lately taken place in the
Constitution of the Society; a change which
from the balance of power which it had in-
troduced has placed this valuable Insti-
tution upon a foundation too firm to
be shaken by any of the dangers by which
it has hitherto been threatened. — The Le-
gislative, the Executive and the Judicial
powers, being now placed in different bo-
dies, act both as a check upon and as a sup-
port to each other, and it only requires
firmness and temper on the part of each,
to preserve the union of the whole. The
Committee is happy in being able to assure
the Chamber of the continued approba-
tion of the Gentlemen of the Bar, and of
their entire approval of the late change.

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in the system of debating.

With regard to the promotion of those objects which are the ends of the Institution, the Committee of Direction can assure the Chamber that the Bank has proceeded with as little interruption during the last Term as was to be expected from the absence of so many Members on the Circuits, and that the Committee are of opinion that the Government would have proceeded with equal success had not the general attention of the members been so much taken up with the business of the other Chamber.

From the total want of a regular supply for the last Term, it was found absolutely necessary to issue warrants on the Treasury to a considerable amount without the sanction of an Ordinance. The Committee of Direction will transmit a statement of the warrants which have been issued under these circumstances together with the accounts of the Treasury at as early a period of the Term as possible, and your Chamber will find that the most rigid economy has been observed in the appropriation of the money thus issued, and that as small a sum as possible has been drawn for the ordinary

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The Committee of Direction is unable to afford the Chamber any hope of the Students' Society of Kingston being re-established; the number of Gentlemen in that town who would join in support of such an institution is so small that the revival of that Society cannot at all events be expected for some time. Nor does there appear at present any prospect of similar Institutions being established in other parts of the Province. The Chamber may however be assured that the Committee of Direction will ever be ready to use the utmost power with which the Society have entrusted them, to promote so desirable an object.

The Committee of Direction having
thus laid open to your Chamber a brief
Statement of the State of the Society, would
beg leave earnestly to recommend a care-
ful and scrupulous attention to the prin-
ciples of the Constitution, and further to
assure your Chamber that the Com-
mittee of Direction will always be found
eager to pursue any measure which may
tend to the advantage or honour of the So-
ciety. — — — — — Robt Baldwin

receives with pleasure the assurance that
a statement of the warrants for the money
which has been issued under these circum-
stances together with the accounts of the
Treasury will be transmitted at as early a pe-
riod of the Term as possible, that the most
rigid economy had been observed in the ap-
portionment of the money thus drawn and
that as small a sum as possible has been
drawn for the ordinary expences of the Term.

That the Chamber is sorry to hear that
the Committee of Direction is unable to af-
ford any hope of the Students Society of

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Kingston being reestablished, and that
the number of Gentlemen in that town
who would join in support of such an In-
stitution is so small that the revival of that
Society cannot at all events be expected for
some time, and that no hope can at
present be entertained of similar insti-
tutions being established in other parts
of the Province. That the Chamber
however feels convinced that the ut-
most power with which the Society has
entrusted the Committee of Direction will
be exerted in the promotion of so desirable
an object. And that the Chamber receives
with satisfaction the recommendations
of the Committee of Direction to a care-
ful and scrupulous attention to the princi-
ples of the Constitution, and the assurance
that the Committee of Direction will al-
ways be found eager to provide any mea-
sure which may tend to the advantage
