



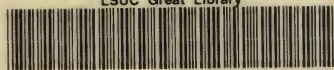
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MEETING OF CONVOCATION.

ARTICLED CLERKS.

Percentage of fees.

At the last meeting the Committee considered the practice of students serving under Articles being paid a percentage of the fees from business which they bring in to their Solicitors' office, and recommended that action be taken by the Chairman and Mr. Arnup to deprecate this practice and call it to the attention of the profession.

The sub-committee has drawn a notice which has been forwarded to the Editor for publication in the next number of the Weekly Notes calling attention to the practice and stating that it is not in keeping with the proper concept of the training of students; that in some circumstances it may constitute a breach of the Solicitors Act and that the practice should not be permitted and infringements will be regarded in future as a disciplinary matter.

Your Committee approves the action of the Sub-Committee.

DISCIPLINE COMMITTEE.

Re: Chester Cameron Macdonald.

Mr. Sedgwick presented the Report:

The Committee reported that after due inquiry it found the Solicitor guilty of professional misconduct and conduct unbecoming a barrister and solicitor in that he was convicted of stealing certain sums of money. The Committee recommended that he be struck off the rolls of the Society.

Moved by Mr. Sedgwick, seconded by Mr. Arnup, that the Report be adopted.

The Solicitor did not attend, nor was he represented by counsel.

The motion was carried.

1. The Report of the Discipline Committee in the matter of CHESTER CAMERON MACDONALD, Barrister, a member of this Society and a solicitor of the Supreme Court of Ontario, was adopted.
2. It was resolved that upon the facts ascertained and appearing by the said Report and the evidence and other papers referred to and submitted to Convocation therewith, Convocation finds the said CHESTER CAMERON MACDONALD guilty of professional misconduct, and of conduct unbecoming a barrister and solicitor in respect of the charges dealt with by the said Report.
3. THAT the said CHESTER CAMERON MACDONALD be disbarred.
4. THAT the said CHESTER CAMERON MACDONALD is unworthy to practise as a solicitor.

Re: Samuel Alden German.

Mr. Arnup, the Vice-Chairman, presented the report of the Discipline Committee:

The Committee reported that after due inquiry it found that the solicitor was guilty of professional misconduct and of conduct unbecoming a barrister and solicitor in that he converted to his own use a sum of money belonging to a client. The Committee recommended that he be struck off the rolls of the Society.

Moved by Mr. Arnup, seconded by Mr. Sedgwick, that the Report be adopted.

The solicitor attended and addressed Convocation.

The motion was carried.

1. The Report of the Discipline Committee in the matter of SAMUEL ALDEN GERMAN, Barrister, a member of this Society and a Solicitor of the Supreme Court of Ontario, was adopted.
2. It was resolved that upon the facts ascertained and appearing by the said Report and the evidence and other papers referred to and submitted to Convocation therewith, Convocation finds the said SAMUEL ALDEN GERMAN guilty of professional misconduct and of conduct unbecoming a barrister and solicitor in respect of the charges dealt with by the said Report.
3. THAT the said SAMUEL ALDEN GERMAN be disbarred.
4. THAT the said SAMUEL ALDEN GERMAN is unworthy to practise as a Solicitor.

Re: Remington White.

Mr. Sedgwick presented the Report:

The Committee reported after due inquiry it found the solicitor guilty of professional misconduct and conduct unbecoming a barrister and solicitor on the basis of judicial criticism arising out of an action tried recently at Whitby, Ontario; and in that he failed to account for certain sums of money to the person or persons entitled thereto; refused or

neglected to reply to numerous letters from the Law Society of Upper Canada with reference to complaints against his professional conduct; and had failed to keep books and accounts in connection with his practice, as required by the Rules Respecting Accounts of the Law Society of Upper Canada.

The Committee recommended that he be struck off the rolls of the Society.

Moved by Mr. Sedgwick, seconded by Mr. Arnup, that the report be adopted.

The solicitor attended and addressed Convocation.

Mr. Arnup read a letter of November 16-17, 1955 from the solicitor.

Moved in amendment and seconded that the Report of the Discipline Committee be amended by substituting for the recommendation that the solicitor be struck off the rolls of the Society, the recommendation that he be suspended from practice as a barrister and solicitor for the period of one year.

The amendment was carried.

The motion as amended was carried.

1. The Report of the Discipline Committee, as amended, in the matter of REMINGTON WHITE, Barrister, a member of this Society and a Solicitor of the Supreme Court of Ontario, was adopted.
2. It was resolved that upon the facts ascertained and appearing by the said Report and the evidence and other papers referred to and submitted to Convocation therewith, Convocation finds the said REMINGTON WHITE guilty of professional misconduct, and of conduct unbecoming a barrister and solicitor in respect of the charges dealt with by the said Report.
3. THAT the said REMINGTON WHITE be suspended from practice as a barrister and solicitor for the period of one year from the 17th day of November 1955.

Convocation adjourned at 1.30 p.m.

Convocation resumed at 2.30 p.m., a quorum being present.

Re: Euston Douglas Bell.

Mr. Arnup presented the Report:

The Committee reported that after due inquiry it found that the solicitor was guilty of professional misconduct and of conduct unbecoming a barrister and solicitor in that he refused or neglected to reply to letters from the Law Society of Upper Canada with reference to two complaints against his professional conduct. The Committee recommended that he be suspended from practice as a barrister and solicitor for a period of six months.

Moved by Mr. Arnup, seconded by Mr. Sedgwick, that the Report be adopted.

The solicitor did not attend, nor was he represented by counsel.

The motion was carried.

1. The Report of the Discipline Committee in the matter of EUSTON DOUGLAS BELL, Barrister, a member of this Society and a Solicitor of the Supreme Court of Ontario, was adopted.
2. It was resolved that upon the facts ascertained and appearing by the said Report and the evidence and other papers referred to and submitted to Convocation therewith, Convocation finds the said EUSTON DOUGLAS BELL guilty of professional misconduct, and of conduct unbecoming a barrister and solicitor in respect of the charges dealt with by the said report.
3. THAT the said EUSTON DOUGLAS BELL be suspended from practice as a barrister and solicitor for the period of six months from the 17th day of November 1955.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON CONTINUING EDUCATION
OF THE BAR, 1956.

Mr. Gregory, the Chairman, reminded Convocation that in a Report dated October 19, 1955, and adopted by Convocation, the Committee had recommended that two week-ends of lectures be given on—

(1) Rights of Creditors

(2) Estates Planning—Wills, Trusts and Taxation on Friday and Saturday, March 16th and 17th, and March 23rd and 24th.

Mr. Gregory reported that after further consideration the Special Committee recommended that the subject of Municipal Law be substituted for that of Estates Planning.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON COURT HOUSE ACCOMMODATION, ONTARIO.

Mr. Parkinson referred to the Report of the Special Committee presented to and received by Convocation on October 20, 1955. At the conclusion of the Report it was stated that the Special Committee would co-operate with the Attorney-General and his assistants in the settlement of some sort of agenda for the guidance of whatever investigating body the Attorney-General may deem desirable to set up.

Mr. Parkinson presented to Convocation the proposed terms of reference as approved by the Special Committee, and the Special Committee of Judges, for submission to the Attorney-General forthwith.

THE REPORT WAS RECEIVED.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON INSPECTION OR SEIZURE OF SOLICITORS' FILES.

Mr. Arnup presented the Report of the Special Committee:

During the month of July 1955 a solicitor called the Deputy Secretary on the long distance telephone, and stated that a representative of the Department of National Revenue was at that moment in his office for the purpose of examining his books of account. The official had requested to examine the clients' ledger, and the solicitor stated he was of the opinion

that information relating to his clients' affairs might be privileged, and he wished to know what was the view of the Law Society in the matter.

On July 21, 1955 another solicitor wrote the Society with reference to a similar incident, and again asked the opinion of the Law Society.

The correspondence was before Convocation on September 15th, and it was ordered that the matter be referred to a special committee to be appointed by the Treasurer. The Treasurer appointed a special committee composed of Messrs. Arnup, Wilson, R. F. and Robinette.

Following the meeting of Convocation the Secretary sent a memorandum to each member of the Special Committee informing him of the action of Convocation, and enclosing copies of three Reports on the same subject of a Special Committee of the Canadian Bar Association as presented respectively to the Annual Meeting 1954, the Mid-Winter Meeting of Council 1955, and the Annual Meeting 1955.

On consideration of the material before it, your Special Committee is of the opinion that The Law Society of Upper Canada should not take any action on its own in view of the active pursuit of the matter by the Special Committee of the Canadian Bar Association.

Your Special Committee also recommends that any material before it be made available to the Special Committee of the Canadian Bar Association.

THE REPORT WAS ADOPTED.

INCOME TAX, RETAINER FEES.

Mr. Parkinson presented the Report of the Special Committee:

The Treasurer referred some recent correspondence of Mr. Keith Laird, Q.C. of Windsor with reference to Income Tax—Retainer Fees, to Mr. R. F. Wilson, Q.C. and Mr. H. F. Parkinson, Q.C. The correspondence indicates that a solicitor, receiving “retainer fees” which were deposited in the

Trust Account during the taxation year, is about to be assessed under Section 85B of The Income Tax Act. Mr. Laird asks information as to the rules of the Society and whether the Society is interested in participating in proceedings in respect of such assessment.

Paragraphs 2, 3 and 4 of the Law Society Rules Respecting Accounts deal with the deposit of clients' money into the Trust Account and the manner in which such money shall be handled and withdrawn from the Trust Account.

Paragraph 5(e) provides that those paragraphs do not apply to money paid to a solicitor "expressly on account of costs". It would seem that these words are open to the interpretation that both costs earned and costs which may be earned in the future are covered by the exception. I am told that some of the younger members of the profession understand that the word "costs" in the exception means costs in the nature of cash disbursements to be incurred.

Mr. Laird's correspondence indicates that the local Income Tax Authority proposes to assess "retainer fees" received by his client but retained in the Trust Account during the taxation year. Section 85B of The Income Tax Act reads in part:

"... every amount received in the year in the course of a business

- (i) that is on account of services not rendered or goods not delivered before the end of the year or that, for any other reason may be regarded as not having been earned in the year or a previous year

shall be included."

It is quite arguable that the word "business" as used in the section does not include the professional occupation of a solicitor—also that the section does not apply to a deposit on account of costs, where the solicitor is not bound to render the services or where the services might never be rendered and the deposit be returnable in whole or in part. These matters will probably be raised by Mr. Laird. Whether or not the Law Society should interest itself in the pending proceedings is a matter for Convocation.

Before proceeding further, Mr. Laird should be asked for the facts surrounding the payment of the "retainer fees"

involved. Such fees may very easily be for services rendered or contracted to be rendered during the taxation year.

The correspondence is returned with this report.

Moved by Mr. Parkinson, seconded by Mr. Sedgwick, that the Report be received, and that the Special Committee be discharged.

Carried.

Moved by Mr. Parkinson, second by Mr. Sedgwick, that the Rules Respecting Accounts, paragraph 5(e), be referred to the Special Committee on Revision of Rules for consideration with reference to this matter.

CANADIAN REPORTS FOR STUDENTS' LIBRARY

It is proposed that the large room at the south-west corner of Osgoode Hall be utilized as a students' reading-room until additional library accommodation is provided for students. Sets of English and Canadian reports will be needed in this south-west room and, later, in such additional space. Your Committee recommends that the cost of completing a set of the Law Reports which the library now has in reserve, be ascertained, that the volumes needed to complete a set of Canadian reports be purchased, and that volumes now in reserve which are in bad condition, be repaired. Your Committee further recommends that these purchases and repairing costs be on Phillips Stewart Library account and that the books be turned over to that Library.

On December 9, 1955, on instructions of the Chairman, the Secretary increased this insurance to \$500,000 inclusive, covering any claims arising out of bodily injury or property damage.

Approved.

WAR MEMORIAL

Since the installation of the memorial there has been continuing trouble with the bronze letters on the granite base, and at the present time five are missing.

Mr. F. H. Marani, Architect, has considered several possible solutions, and now suggests incising the letters in the granite at a cost of \$251.00. There would be a V-shaped cut to which gold leaf would be applied. Mr. Marani says that it would last indefinitely, and is architecturally correct.

Your Committee recommends that the suggestion of Mr. F. H. Marani be approved.

UNAUTHORIZED PRACTICE COMMITTEE—Mr. Walsh.

Your Committee met on the 19th January 1956, the following members being present: Messrs. Walsh (Chairman), Brooks, Clement, Creighton, Evans, Gregory, Hamilton, Jamieson, MacTavish, Raney, Seymour, Ward and Willmott.

TITLE GUARANTEE COMPANIES.

On November 17, 1955 your Committee reported that several members of the profession had brought to its attention

rumours to the effect that applications for incorporation and for licences to do business had been made by such companies. Your Committee promptly investigated the matter, both at Toronto and Ottawa, and in its November report recommended that Mr. D. K. MacTavish, Q.C. be requested to inform the Minister of Finance and the Superintendent of Insurance, Ottawa, that the Law Society of Upper Canada strongly opposes the granting of such licences to do business.

On instructions of the Chairman, Mr. MacTavish was retained as counsel in this matter, and instructed to place before the Minister and the Superintendent of Insurance the views of the Committee. Mr. MacTavish reported from time to time, and reported further to your Committee on this date.

As the original information came from members of the Middlesex Bar Association, the Secretary wrote to Mr. M. J. Grant, Q.C., President of that Association, informing him of the action taken and of the recommendation of the Committee.

Your Committee recommends that Mr. MacTavish be instructed to keep in touch with the Minister and the Superintendent, and continue to state the Society's views.

REALTY TITLE INSURANCE COMPANY LIMITED

On November 28, 1955 the Secretary was informed that a draft application for incorporation of the above company had been filed. On December 5th the Secretary informed Mr. R. J. Cudney, Q.C., Deputy Provincial Secretary, of the action taken by and the recommendation of your Committee.

Your Committee recommends that the Chairman and Secretary interview the Attorney-General, Mr. R. B. Whitehead, Q.C., Superintendent of Insurance, Ontario, and Mr. R. J. Cudney, Q.C., and inform them of the views of the Law Society.

Complaints with reference to the unauthorized practice of this Company have been before your Committee for several months, and Mr. C. H. Walker, Q.C., solicitor for the Committee, has investigated the matter in the Counties of Oxford, Perth and Waterloo. As a result of this investigation Mr. Walker was instructed to write the Inspector of Legal Offices

with certain recommendations with reference to one of the officers of the company, and making representations against any renewal of his Commission for taking affidavits.

On December 28, 1955 the Secretary of the Perth Law Association wrote the Secretary setting out the following resolution passed at the Annual Meeting on December 19, 1955:

“That a letter be sent to Earl Smith, Q.C., Secretary of the Law Society, stating that at the moment there is no evidence, but we felt that the investigation is worthwhile and has had a salutary effect. If any specific instances come to the attention of any member, it is to be reported to the President of this Association and he in turn will report it.”

In his letter of January 13th Mr. Walker states in part:

“In view of the foregoing, and particularly the expression of opinion by the Perth County Bar Association, I would recommend for the consideration of the Committee that the matter be closed.”

Your Committee recommends that the matter stand for further information from the County Law Associations of Oxford, Perth and Waterloo.

THE REPORT WAS ADOPTED.

Mr. Haines suggested that if charters and licences are granted to title guaranty companies, the Committee give consideration to the formation of such a company by the legal profession.

The Committee considered several matters of policy, particularly with reference to the administration of the Ontario Legal Aid Plan in York County, and report may be made at a later date.

PUBLIC RELATIONS COMMITTEE—Mr. Jamieson.

Your Committee met on Wednesday, 18th January 1956, at 4 p.m. The following were present: Mr. Jamieson (in the chair) The Treasurer, and Mr. Cassels.

PUBLIC LEGAL FORUMS

On the 20th October 1955 Convocation approved your Committee's recommendation that the advisability of holding Public Legal Forums in co-operation with the Toronto Daily Star be further investigated.

The matter has now been thoroughly investigated by the Chairman and Vice-Chairman. It is their opinion that such forums would be a benefit to the public and the profession.

Your Committee recommends that the holding of public legal forums in conjunction with the Toronto Daily Star be approved and that the Chairman and Vice-Chairman be authorized to work out and complete the details.

LEGAL AID BOOKLET

The attention of your Committee was called to the fact that it is necessary from time to time to publish the Legal Aid Regulations and instructions to members of the profession giving their services in connection with the legal aid program. It was suggested to your Committee that a booklet setting out the part that the Law Society had played and is playing in the legal aid program and the relevant regulations and instructions to counsel would be of assistance in the legal aid plan and would be a public relations asset to the Society. A draft of the proposed booklet was submitted to the Committee and the Committee was advised that the actual content would be referred to the Legal Aid Committee before it was published.

Your Committee approved of the proposed publication and authorized the Chairman and Vice-Chairman in conjunction with the Legal Aid Committee to work out and approve of the content of the booklet and to decide upon the number of copies required and arrange for the printing.

THE REPORT WAS ADOPTED.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON LAW SCHOOL—

The Treasurer.

Your Committee met on Friday, January 6, 1956, in Convocation Room. The following were present: The Treasurer (in the Chair), Messrs. Arnup, Beaton, Jamieson, McLaughlin, Walker and Wilson, R. F., being all members of the Committee. Also present were the Secretary, the Deputy Secretary and Mr. A. S. Mathers, the architect.

The Treasurer described briefly Mr. Mathers' progress report of 3rd January, 1956, and Mr. Mathers told the meeting that soil tests had been started on the site of the new building, that orders had been placed for steel and stone and these materials would, therefore, be available as needed and that the specifications and drawings had progressed to a point permitting tenders to be called for on March 1st.

The Treasurer read the correspondence that had passed between himself and Dr. Mackintosh, President and Vice-Chancellor of Queen's University, who was acting as spokes-

man for the universities. The universities had met among themselves and their conclusions were set out in Dr. Mackintosh's letter to the Treasurer of December 15, 1955, in which Dr. Mackintosh proposed another meeting with your Special Committee.

Your Committee agreed that a further meeting with the universities should be held at the earliest convenient date.

On December 19th last the Treasurer wrote to each member of the full-time teaching staff to request a memorandum from each on the problems before the Committee, namely, the general question of legal education in Ontario and the improvements that might be made to the teaching of law at Osgoode Hall. The Secretary was instructed to have these memoranda copied and distributed to all members of your Committee as they were received.

The Treasurer referred to certain letters that had been received after his letter of November, 1955, accompanying the fees notice. It was felt by your Committee that sufficient interest had been shown by the profession to merit a brief statement by the Treasurer on the nature of the meetings with the university representatives in his report to the mid-winter meeting of the Canadian Bar Association that will occur in Toronto on February 3rd and 4th next.

The discussion of the future of legal education in Ontario with the universities has somewhat expanded the scope of your Committee's deliberations and your Committee, therefore, recommends that the name of your Committee be changed to the "Special Committee on Law School".

Mr. J. J. Robinette has been added as a member of the Special Committee.

Your Committee met on Wednesday, 18th January, 1956, in Convocation Room. The following were present: The Treasurer (in the Chair), Messrs. Arnup, Beaton, Jamieson, McLaughlin, Robinette and Walker. Also present were the Secretary and the Deputy Secretary.

The Treasurer referred to a letter of 12th January, 1956, from the Secretary of the County of Carleton Law Association regarding the addition to the law school and suggesting that a member of the Society attend a meeting of the Association.

Your Committee is arranging to have a Bencher attend in accordance with this suggestion.

At the conclusion of the meeting your Committee was joined by the members of the full-time teaching staff for a general discussion of the questions arising out of the Treasurer's letter of December 19th.

SPECIAL LECTURES 1955

The total number registered for the special course of lectures on Evidence was 360. Of this number, 151 or 41% were from outside the Toronto Metropolitan area.

The special luncheons held on both Saturdays were again a very successful part of the course.

Arrangements were made with Richard DeBoo Limited for the printing of the lectures, and copies have now been distributed to all those registered for the course, to the special lecturers, members of the Special Committee, the Great Library, and County Law Associations. Presentation copies for the lecturers and members of the Special Committee were specially bound at no extra cost.

As for the past several years, Mr. DeBoo sent to the Secretary, without charge, sufficient copies to present one to each of the other Canadian Law Societies, and the Law Society of England, and certain selected law libraries. Mr. DeBoo has again been good enough to make arrangements to supply copies to students at the Law School at a special rate provided the copy is purchased for the use of the student himself.

SPECIAL LECTURES 1956

During the special lectures of 1955 those in attendance were asked to indicate their preference of subjects for future

Dr. Mackintosh, Principal of Queen's University, had written to the Treasurer to suggest that March 17th would be a more convenient date for the next meeting of your Committee with the university representatives than March 10th which your Committee had suggested. The Treasurer presented a reply to Dr. Mackintosh's letter accepting this suggestion and it was approved by your Committee.

Your Committee met again on Wednesday, the 15th of February, 1956, at 5:30 p.m. in Convocation Room. The following were present: The Treasurer, (in the chair) and Messrs. Arnup, Beaton, Jamieson, Walker and Wilson, R. F.

Mr. Mathers reported on the progress of the plans. Specifications will be placed with the contractors on the 1st of March and tenders will be called on March 27th. The Treasurer read to your Committee four letters that had been received in reply to his letter to the profession of 30th January, 1956. Mr. MacTavish had attended a meeting of the County of Carleton Law Association in accordance with the Association's request to have a Bencher attend a meet-

ing at which the addition to the Law School would be discussed. A letter had been received from the Secretary of the Association setting out a resolution which had been passed at that meeting, suggesting delay in the erection of the addition to the Law School building and the decentralization of academic instruction in law.

Your Committee was of the opinion that the facts as set out in the Treasurer's letters to the profession of November last and 30th January last made it abundantly clear that the addition to the Law School could not be delayed. As to exploring the other matters referred to in the resolution, your Committee was of the opinion that everything that could be done with respect to such matters was now being done by your Committee in the course of its own deliberations as well as in the discussions with the universities referred to in the Treasurer's letters to the profession.

The meeting then turned its attention to the general question of legal education and considered memoranda submitted by the full-time teaching staff.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON LIBRARY

ACCOMMODATION—Mr. Shaver

Your Committee has met several times, and has inspected the rooms in the south-west wing of Osgoode Hall, the use and control of which, by Order-in-Council No. 2401, 1955, were transferred to the Society. This Committee has considered proposals by the Chief Librarian as to how these rooms should be used and reports by Mr. A. Heeney as to what work should be done and furniture and book-cases supplied to fit them for use, with estimates of the cost.

Your Committee recommends:

1. that the rooms marked on the plan annexed to the said Order-in-Council as numbers 118 and 120, being the offices formerly occupied by the Official Guardian, be used to house the books known as the Riddell Canadian Library, that 60 feet of new metal bookstacks be placed against the walls of

these rooms and that a new work table and 3 chairs be purchased for room 118;

2. that the large room at the south-west corner of Osgoode Hall, marked on the said plan as numbers 113 and 114, be used temporarily as a students' reading room, that 6 additional lighting units be installed there, that 120 lineal feet of new metal bookstacks be placed on the walls and that a new desk and chair and 7 study tables and 36 chairs be purchased for this room;

3. that the small room across the corridor from room 118, marked on the said plan as number 119, be used as a work room for the library staff, where the library dictaphone, copying machine and microlex reader may be kept and that 2 new tables and 4 chairs be purchased for use there;

4. that the room to the north of room 119, marked on the said plan as number "121 vault", be used for storing library stationery and supplies;

5. that the rooms marked on the said plan as numbers 108 and 109, formerly the offices of the Registrar of the Supreme Court of Ontario, be temporarily used as student group rooms, and that in and for these rooms

- (a) a new linoleum floor be laid,
- (b) 33 lineal feet of metal bookstacks be placed against the walls,
- (c) the wash-basin in room 109 be removed,
- (b) minor repairs be made to hardware, doors and frames, and
- (e) 2 tables and 34 chairs be purchased.

Mr. Heeney's estimate of the cost of all this work, and of the furniture and bookstacks referred to herein, is as follows:

Your Committee has been exploring the advisability of replacing the present stairway in the south-west wing of Osgoode Hall with a fireproof stairway and has directed that a report on this matter be made by Mr. Heeney to the Library Committee.

Your Committee recommends that it be now discharged.

As the amount of contributions in money actually paid and the value of books actually given from local sources exceed the sum of \$500, your Committee recommends that an initial grant of \$500, the maximum amount payable under Rule 60, be paid to this Association.

ONTARIO LEGAL AID PLAN, 1955

Attached hereto as part of this report is the report of the Provincial Director for the year 1955. Your Committee approves and adopts the report and refers it to Convocation for its information.

TO THE LEGAL AID COMMITTEE

The Provincial Director begs leave to report:

In 1955 43 of the 44 county law associations were organized in some form. Two were organized in a very informal manner and kept no records. These associations state however that all applicants for legal aid in these counties were taken care of by individual solicitors. Directors of Nipissing, Parry Sound and Renfrew failed to report on the year's work. In those counties where the organization is informal or where no records are kept the solicitors who provide the legal aid pay the disbursements involved and make no claim on the legal aid fund. The totals which appear later in this report do not therefore include credit for considerable legal aid work done during the year.

Legal Aid Clinics were held in 12 counties—in 6 regularly and in 6 as required by applications for aid. Six other counties were prepared but clinics were not necessary, appli-

cations being otherwise handled. The following counties held clinics at regular stated times as follows:

Carleton	23
Essex	52
Ontario	14
Stormont	12
Wentworth	33
York	46

A total of 198 clinics were held throughout the province during 1955. The other 25 counties, while organized, held no clinics. Some of these are well, if simply organized, and legal aid may be obtained in proper cases by applying to the County Director, any member of the profession, or the County Judge, Magistrates, or court officials. In several counties all applications are considered by the Director, Local Director, or a member of the Advisory Committee. In Peterborough one member of the profession is appointed to administer the Plan each month, and this seems to have worked satisfactorily for the past year.

In one county of those reporting no applications for legal aid were received. In five counties there were no applications in civil matters and in three counties none in criminal.

In nineteen counties all members of the profession were available for legal aid work. In York County there were 102 lawyers available for clinic work and for panel work 146 individuals and 20 firms for civil cases and 110 individuals for criminal.

In Wentworth County members of the profession are available as needed.

In other counties and districts the number of lawyers available for this work is impressive, and there appears to be adequate assistance to administer the plan. One County Director concludes his report by saying,

“All of the above indicates that the plan is working very well in this county and that no deserving person suffered hardship through lack of funds to retain a solicitor or counsel at his or her trial.”

It is interesting to note that in one county the lawyers have undertaken to provide free transportation for applicants requiring legal aid and when it is necessary for them to travel from one town to another within the county.

In the year 1955 with incomplete figures as indicated above there were 3836 applications for legal aid (1954 - 3602), 2646 in civil matters (1954 - 2416) and 1190 in criminal matters (1954 - 1186). Of this total 2844 were in York County (1954 - 2472). In the 43 counties 1832 applicants were given legal aid or advice in civil matters (1954 - 1677), 1404 in York County (1954 - 1257). These figures include advice given or other disposition at the clinics or on the applicant's first interview. Of the total in York County 152 were referred to conducting solicitors.

As in the past civil matters fall into the following categories generally:

General Solicitor's work	40%
Domestic relations including divorce . .	35%
Litigation	15%
Landlord and tenant	10%

In the same counties 965 applicants charged with criminal offences were given legal aid (1954 - 979), 587 in York County (1954 - 482). Of these charges 7 were for murder and 179 for other serious charges.

Legal aid in criminal matters has encountered some serious problems during the past two years, one of the most serious being the question of whether or not aid should be given to repeaters. Two county law associations suggested that legal aid in criminal cases be discontinued. This view was not general, however, and the Legal Aid Committee during 1955 reviewed the whole administration of the plan with the assistance of some of the directors of the counties where a large proportion of the work is done. After serious consideration the Committee recommended that legal aid in criminal cases be continued with an amendment to the regulations as follows:

"Legal Aid shall not include the following matters: . . .

"7(a) Criminal matters where the accused has previously been convicted of an offence punishable with imprisonment, unless as to indictable offences punishable with imprisonment, the County Director is of the opinion that special circumstances warrant the granting of legal aid."

As Provincial Director once again I should like to express my appreciation for the assistance given in the administra-

tion of the plan by the Chairman and members of the Legal Aid Committee, by county and local directors, members of the local advisory committees, and by the members of the profession generally, and a special word of thanks to J. Douglas Conover, County Director for York, and his able staff of assistants for their services in handling approximately two-thirds of the legal aid work in the province.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON LAWYER - MEMBERS OF MUNICIPAL BODIES, 1956—Mr. Sedgwick.

1. At the meeting of Convocation on February 16, 1956, attention was called to recent press notices on a resolution passed by Toronto City Council referring to the subject matter of this report. It was resolved that the matter be referred to a Special Committee and the Treasurer appointed Messrs. Arnup, Sedgwick and Haines to act herein.

2. Your Committee waited on the Attorney General and expressed the views of Convocation and he requested that these views should be put in writing to assist him if the matter comes up in the form of legislation.

3. Your Committee instructed the Secretary to write the following letter to the Attorney General:

“Honourable A. Kelso Roberts, Q.C.,
Attorney General,
Parliament Buildings,
Toronto, Ontario

“My dear Mr. Attorney:

“At its meeting on February 16th the attention of Convocation was drawn to a resolution passed by the Council of the City of Toronto on February 13th last, which reads:

“That the Government of Ontario be requested to enact the necessary legislation to make it clear that a lawyer who is a member of Metropolitan Council or of any municipal council shall not be entitled to accept a fee for acting for any person in a matter in which the council of which he is a member may act by resolution or by-law.’

“Convocation felt that this matter is one of legal ethics and that professional ethics can seldom be either prescribed or enforced by legislation. After some discussion a special Committee consisting of Messrs. Sedgwick, Haines and Arnup was appointed to see you and to place before you the views of Convocation. I am informed that you were kind enough to see the Committee and that you asked that their representations should be placed before you in writing, and thus on the instructions of the Committee I am sending this letter.

“That it is wrong for a member of this Society to serve, or to attempt to serve, two conflicting interests is plain and a lawyer who is a member of a Municipal Council is guilty of serious misconduct if he undertakes to act for a client in any matter which is to come before the body of which he is a member and as to which he must decide. It could well be however, that a lawyer-member of council could have dealings with the Municipality in which his duty to his client and his duty to the corporation would not be in any conflict, and the safe course, in the view of the Convocation, is to state the general rule and then judge every case on its own facts.

“A notice to the profession dealing with the matter will be published in the Weekly Notes in the near future, and the Discipline Committee will take action on any breach of the rule coming to its knowledge.

“It is believed that in this way the public will be better protected than by general legislation such as that proposed, which no one in particular would be charged with enforcing.

Memorial to the late Onie Brown, Q.C.

At its January meeting the Committee considered the proposal of Mrs. C. M. Muskat, Barrister, to make a yearly donation of \$100 for five years to establish some form of memorial to the late Onie Brown, Q.C. with whom she practised for many years. She asked assistance of the Law Society in the manner of the disposition of the proposed gift and the Committee recommended the establishment of a bursary to be

known as the Onie Brown Bursary to be awarded on the recommendation of the Special Committee on Bursaries.

TITLE GUARANTY COMPANIES

Lawyers Title Insurance Corporation

Since September, 1955 this matter has been under consideration by your Committee and in November it was informed that the corporation had applied to the Superintendent of Insurance, Ottawa, for registration. At that time your Committee recommended that its counsel be requested to inform the Minister of Finance and the Superintendent of Insurance, Ottawa, that the Law Society of Upper Canada strongly opposes the granting of the licence referred to; pointing out that the granting of such licence is not now provided for under the relevant Act and regulations and should not be added thereto; and that the service provided by such companies is not needed in Ontario, particularly in view of the provisions of the Land Titles Act. Since that time counsel has continued to press this view before the Minister of Finance and the Superintendent of Insurance, Ottawa.

At the meeting of your Committee on April 19th, the Chairman read a news item from the Globe and Mail of April 12th, 1956 stating that the Government had decided to open a new national insurance field in Canada and that an order-in-council to provide for title insurance was made public in the Canada Gazette of April 11th.

Your Committee again records its approval of the action taken by the Committee and Convocation in November last.

Realty Title Insurance Company Limited—Ontario

In November 1955 the Secretary was informed that an application for the incorporation of this company had been filed. On December 5, 1955 he informed Mr. R. J. Cudney, Q.C. Deputy Provincial Secretary, of the action taken by and the recommendation of, your Committee as approved by Convocation.

Your Committee has been informed that other applications by title insurance companies for registration and licences to do business in Ontario will probably be presented in the near future.

Your Committee recommends that the Chairman and Secretary confer with The Honourable the Attorney General and with Mr. R. B. Whitehead, Q.C., Superintendent of Insurance, Ontario, and Mr. R. J. Cudney, Q.C., and state again the views of the Society in opposition to this form of insurance in Ontario.

Following the presentation of the Report of your Committee of January 19th, 1956, Mr. E. L. Haines, Q.C. suggested that if charters and licences are granted to title guaranty companies, the Committee give consideration to the formation of such a company by members of the legal profession. Your Committee recommends that this matter stand for further consideration.

PUBLIC RELATIONS COMMITTEE

At the request of the Chairman, Mr. Arnup presented the Report:

Your Committee met on Wednesday 18 April 1956 at 4:00 p.m. in Convocation Room. There were present Mr. Arnup (in the Chair) and Messrs. Cassels, Gregory and McGillivray.

Public Legal Forums

The third and last forum of the series was held on Thursday, March 15, 1956, in Convocation Hall. About 400 people attended. The discussion closed with a brief speech on traffic safety by the Honourable the Attorney-General.

Since the last forum the tape recordings of each of the three forums have been edited and divided into parts of one-half hour each. The Daily Star has made these tapes available without charge to local radio stations throughout Ontario. Twenty-three radio stations have to date indicated their intention to broadcast the programmes and they have already been partly heard over two Toronto stations, CKFH and CKEY.

Shortly after the Star had distributed the recordings one of the County Law Associations wrote to say that the radio station in their area had approached the Association with a view to the latter's sponsoring these programmes. The question of the propriety of newspaper announcements or similar publicity was also raised.

On the instructions of the Vice-Chairman a reply was sent to the effect that co-operation with the radio station along the lines suggested would appear to be quite appropriate. With respect to sponsoring the programmes the Association was informed that the Star had provided the recordings free of

charge and that the Law Society did not expect to incur any expense arising out of broadcasting.

Since it was felt that other Law Associations would be similarly approached, a letter was sent to each Law Association in Ontario in which the advice previously given was repeated and in which a description of the nature and purpose of the forums was enclosed. A number of replies have been received from the secretaries of these Associations indicating their interest and thanks.

Approved.

Educational Lectures

At its last meeting the Committee considered a suggestion that an approach be made to the Toronto Board of Education with a view to instituting a course of public lectures on law for presentation to teachers in training or in the adult education programme. Similar courses have been initiated in Lincoln County and in New York City.

The Committee decided that this was a matter more properly dealt with by the local Law Associations and recommended that a letter containing the suggestion be sent to the County of York Law Association.

By letter dated 22nd March, 1956, this matter was placed before H. V. Hearst, Q.C., secretary of the York County Law Association. A reply dated 6 April, 1956 has been received from R. T. Payton, chairman of the Public Relations Committee of that Association, indicating that while the Association would be prepared to supply lecturers for any course that might be arranged it did not wish to initiate arrangements for the suggested programme.

Your Committee recommends that this matter stand to be explored further by the Vice-Chairman and the Deputy Secretary.

C.B.C. Television

Mr. Arnup reported orally on the arrangements that have been made for a television programme.

THE REPORT WAS ADOPTED.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON LAW SCHOOL

The Treasurer presented the Report:

For the purpose of continuing the discussion of the future

of legal education in Ontario initiated by your Committee last April, your Committee again entertained the heads of Ontario universities and colleges at dinner at Osgoode Hall on Saturday, 17th March, 1956. There were present from your Committee the Treasurer and Messrs. Jamieson, Robinette, Walker and Wilson, R. F. Guests were Dr. Mackintosh (Queen's), Dr. Smith (Toronto), Father Bannim (St. Patrick's College), Dr. Armstrong (McMaster), Dr. Corry (Queen's), Father Normandin (Ottawa), Dr. Gibson (Carleton College), Dr. Hall (Western), Father Lebel (Assumption).

After dinner the discussion was resumed. The Treasurer referred to the progress that had been made with the addition to Osgoode Hall Law School, and to the consideration your Committee had given to the matters raised at the first meeting with the university heads. All these discussions had been conducted in the light of one obvious necessity. Since the universities themselves had indicated that they would not wish to accommodate more than 700 law students in all, it would always be necessary to provide a complete law course at Osgoode Hall for those students who do not study law at a university.

The meeting then discussed the possibility of establishing pre-law courses in the universities, of integrating such courses with those at Osgoode Hall, of shortening the time between senior matriculation and call to the Bar, and of admitting students to Osgoode Hall after two years of university study at the honour level. The discussion continued to about 11 p.m. when the meeting adjourned with the suggestion that both groups might consider the points that had been raised and meet again.

Your Committee met again, for the purpose of opening tenders for the addition, on 27th March, 1956, at 4:30 p.m. Present were the Treasurer (in the chair) and Messrs. Arnup, Beaton, Jamieson, Walker and Wilson, R. F. Messrs. Mathers and Haldenby were in attendance and presented 9 sealed tenders, which were then opened and considered. The lowest tender, that of Hughes Construction Co. Ltd., in the amount of \$1,027,400. was accepted, subject to investigation of certain details by the architects.

Your Committee adjourned and were joined for dinner by

the Dean and other members of the full-time teaching staff, after which your Committee and the staff resumed the discussion of legal education that had been begun in a similar meeting with the staff in January last.

Messrs. Mathers and Haldenby having reported their investigation satisfactory, the contract between the Society and the construction company was executed on 29th March.

On 7th April, 1956, your Committee convened on the site of the new building for the turning of the first sod. From your Committee were the Treasurer and Messrs. Arnup, Beaton and Wilson, R. F. and the Secretary and Deputy Secretary; and guests were the Dean, the architects, Messrs. Mathers, Haldenby and Brown; the contractor, Mr. Hughes; the contractor's superintendent, Mr. Woodhouse, and the Society's superintendent, Mr. Glen. Mr. Hughes presented a specially engraved spade to the Treasurer who turned the first sod with it and dedicated the ground to the teaching and study of law. Immediately after the ceremony your Committee met and approved for payment the architects' first account.

Your Committee met again on the 18th April. Present were the Treasurer (in the chair) and Messrs. Arnup, Beaton, Walker and Wilson, R. F.

Mr. Brown of Mathers & Haldenby was present and reported on progress. Your Committee discussed a number of points relating to the construction and authorized Mr. Brown to take the necessary steps to deal with them.

After dinner your Committee met further to discuss legal education, in particular certain suggestions put forward by Dean Armstrong of McMaster.

The report was adopted.

The Treasurer produced the spade used in the sod-turning ceremony and asked that it be kept in the possession of the Society, and it was so ordered.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON CONSULTATION FEE - 1956

Mr. Parkinson, the Chairman, reported progress and stated that the Committee would probably report to Convocation in May next.

ETHICS—PROFESSIONAL ADVERTISING

In a Report to Convocation on June 16th, 1955 the Discipline Committee after considerable investigation recommended that a Notice to the Profession with reference to this subject be published in O.W.N. The Committee also recommended that if Mr. Thomas G. Lund, Secretary of the Law Society, England, graciously grants permission, his lecture of 1950 on professional conduct and etiquette be printed and distributed to members of the Profession.

Mr. Lund agreed to the republishing of the lecture on the understanding that there will be included a suitable acknowledgment that it is published with the authority of the Law Society, England.

In view of certain discussions in Convocation in June, 1955 upon public relations and the expense involved in sending out printed matter, the Vice-Chairman on June 24, 1955 instructed the Secretary to place this matter again before the Committee. At its first meeting in the Autumn, October 14, 1955 the Discipline Committee again recommended publication.

Delays due to various causes ensued and it was discovered that Mr. Lund gave a further lecture in 1954 and on con-

sideration the Committee recommended that part of this lecture be also printed.

Your Committee recommends that 7,500 copies be printed for this Society together with the copies requested by the Law Societies of Manitoba and Saskatchewan.

TITLE GUARANTY COMPANIES

Lawyers Title Insurance Corporation

At the meeting of the Committee on April 19th the Chairman read a clipping from The Globe and Mail stating that an Order-in-Council had been made public in the Canada Gazette and intimating that some action had been taken in this matter. The news item was not very specific and the Secretary learned from Mr. R. B. Whitehead, Q.C., Superintendent of Insurance, Ontario, that he had no notification of any official action. In reply to an inquiry from the Secretary Mr. D. K. MacTavish, Q.C., counsel for the Law Society in this matter, wrote the Secretary on May 4th as follows:

“RE: *Title Guarantee Companies—Lawyers’*

Title Insurance Corporation

“I acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 1st instant herein.

“The item in The Globe and Mail to which you refer was not quite correct and by setting out as I shall hereunder the sequence of events that have occurred to date, it will appear not only why The Globe and Mail statement was incorrect but also why Mr. Whitehead has not yet heard from Ottawa.

“When last Fall, the Lawyers’ Title Insurance Corporation sought registration and Mr. MacGregor recommended that it should be permitted to do business in Canada, it became necessary to define ‘title insurance’. Mr. MacGregor recommended a definition of title insurance last October and submitted it to the Minister. After considerable delay caused to some extent by the representations we made this definition did not get approval by Cabinet until this Spring.

“The definition being approved, the next step that had to be taken was to get Treasury Board to set a deposit limit for British or Foreign companies in respect of this type of insurance and this has now been done by Treasury Board Order and the deposit has been fixed at \$200,000. Now that all the formalities have been cleared away, I believe the Lawyers’ Title Insurance Corporation will make its deposit and obtain a licence for this type of insurance.

When that is done, Mr. Whitehead will automatically receive a copy of the documents."

The definition as it appears in P.C. 1956-449, 22nd March, 1956 is as follows:

"'Title insurance' means insurance against loss or damage caused by defect in the title to real property, or by the existence of liens, encumbrances or servitudes upon real property, or by other matters affecting the title to real property or the right to the use and enjoyment thereof, or by defect in the execution of mortgages, hypothecs or deeds of trust."

Your Committee is of the opinion that the Law Society of Upper Canada in addition to its previous objections and representations which it still presses should also object to the use of the word "Lawyers" in the name of this insurance company; that while the use of this name may be quite proper in the United States of America in view of the history of the corporation, its use in Canada is not proper and might be misleading to the public; and that Mr. D. K. MacTavish, Q.C. be requested to take this objection up with the Superintendent of Insurance at Ottawa and other relevant officials.

Realty Title Insurance Company Limited—Ontario

On April 19th your Committee recommended that the Chairman and Secretary confer with the Attorney-General. On April 24th the Attorney-General, Mr. R. B. Whitehead, Q.C. and Mr. R. J. Cudney, Q.C. met with the Chairman and Secretary to discuss this matter. On May 8th the Secretary wrote the Attorney-General expressing the views of the Law Society of Upper Canada in opposition to the granting of charters or licences to such companies and setting forth the reasons therefor as follows:

"... that the opposition of the Law Society to the licensing of these companies was based mainly on two considerations:

"*First.* That there appears to be no real need for this type of insurance service in Ontario, and

"*Second.* That for those who wish protection further than that afforded by the present practice under The Registry Act, the provisions of The Land Titles Act are available."

Receipt of the letter has been acknowledged and the matter stands for further consideration by the proper Government officials.

TITLE GUARANTY COMPANIES

Lawyers' Title Insurance Corporation

At the meeting of Convocation on May 17th, 1956 your Committee reported that it was of the opinion that the Law Society of Upper Canada in addition to its previous objections and representations which it still presses, should also object to the use of the word "Lawyers'" in the name of this insurance company, pointing out that while the use of this name may be quite proper in the United States of America in view of the history of the corporation, its use in Canada is not proper and might be misleading to the public; and that Mr.

D. K. MacTavish, Q.C. be requested to take this objection up with the Superintendent of Insurance at Ottawa and other relevant officials.

On June 18th, 1956 Mr. MacTavish wrote the Secretary enclosing copy of a letter of June 15th, 1956 from K. R. MacGregor, Superintendent of Insurance, Ottawa, in which he states in part,

“Although our constant desire is to avoid any possibility of confusion by reason of a company’s name, I do not think that we could properly have refused to recommend registration on the grounds that the inclusion of the word ‘Lawyers’ is on public grounds objectionable, especially having regard for the precedence and practice both in Canada and in other countries.”

The whole question of title guaranty companies was further discussed at considerable length.

Your Committee recommends that the Law Society of Upper Canada continue to press its objections to the granting of charters and licences to such insurance companies; and that consideration of the incorporation of such a company by members of the legal profession be explored by a Committee to be appointed by the Treasurer.

Ontario Title Company Limited

Your Committee considered a letter of June 4th from Mr. R. J. Cudney, Q.C. Deputy Provincial Secretary, in which he states that his Department is in receipt of an application for incorporation under the above name. The application is for incorporation of an insurance agent rather than for an underwriter and Mr. Cudney is informed that it is proposed that the above company will in fact be an agent for Lawyers’ Title Insurance Corporation.

Your Committee recommends that no action be taken but that the Law Society should confine its objection to the original application.

Re Abstract Company

Your Committee considered a letter of June 8th from Mr. R. J. Cudney, Q.C. enclosing a copy of a letter with reference to the proposed incorporation of a company for

the purpose of preparing abstracts of title. It is proposed that the object clause will read as follows:

"To prepare, sell and lease abstracts of title registered in Registry Offices in the Province of Ontario."

Your Committee recommends that no action be taken.

CANADIAN BUREAU OF COLLECTIONS

On March 15th the Committee had before it a letter from Edward J. McCormick, Q.C. of Calgary, Alberta. Mr. McCormick enclosed a letter from the Canadian Bureau of Collections to a debtor in Alberta and signed "Canadian Bureau of Collections, J. T. Jones, Legal Department." The matter was referred to Mr. C. H. Walker, Q.C. for an opinion on the use of the words "Legal Department". Your Committee today considered Mr. Walker's opinion which reads in part as follows:

"In my opinion the use of the words 'Legal Department' by Canadian Bureau of Collections is not an offence under Section 6 of the Solicitors' Act.

"I regret being obliged to reach this conclusion as I feel that the words are objectionable in the sense that it may induce the reasonable belief that the 'Legal Department' is conducted by Solicitors . . .

"I would recommend, for the consideration of the Committee, that no charge be laid against the Canadian Bureau of Collections, but that representations be made to the Superintendent of Insurance requesting him to insist that the use of the words 'Legal Department' be discontinued by all Collection Agencies."

Your Committee recommends adoption of Mr. Walker's suggestion that representations be made to the Superintendent of Insurance requesting him to insist that the use of the words "Legal Department" be discontinued by all Collection Agencies.

Conover, County Director for the County of York, in his annual report for 1955 to the County of York Law Association, recommended consideration of an amendment to Regulation 3 (b) to the effect that the amount of earnings permitted to an applicant be increased to \$1200.00 in the case of a single person, and \$1800.00 in the case of a married person, with an additional amount of \$200 for each dependent.

This matter was referred to the Secretary to take up with the Minister of Public Welfare, and in a letter of March 12, 1956 the Minister approves the amount suggested by Mr. Conover.

Your Committee recommend that the proposed increase be approved, and that the Regulations be so amended.

LEGAL AID FUND

Pursuant to a recommendation of your Committee, the Chairman and Secretary conferred with the Attorney-General and Deputy Attorney-General on October 16, 1956. The Chairman pointed out that the costs of administering the Plan were increasing, and there was the possibility of some paid assistance being needed in York and some other counties. The Attorney-General agreed to give sympathetic consideration to increasing the annual grant to the Legal Aid Fund from \$3,000.00 to \$5,000.00, to take effect in the Province's fiscal year 1957-58.

LEGAL AID—CRIMINAL CASES

In an interview on October 16, 1956 the Chairman reminded the Attorney-General that his Department at the present time supplies to counsel without fee a copy of the evidence on the preliminary hearing in certain serious criminal cases. In other criminal cases the legal aid counsel may peruse the copy of the Crown Attorney, but this does not work out in practice. The Chairman requested the Attorney-General to give consideration to supplying a free copy of the evidence on preliminary hearings in all criminal cases which go to higher courts under the Legal Aid Plan. The Attorney-General agreed, on being supplied with certain information, to give the request sympathetic consideration.

SPECIAL LECTURES 1956

The total number registered for the special course of lectures on BANKRUPTCY AND MUNICIPAL LAW was 370. Of this number 163 or approximately 44% were from outside the Toronto metropolitan area.

The special luncheons held on both Saturdays were very successful and popular functions.

Arrangements were made with Richard DeBoo Limited for the printing of the lectures, and copies in two volumes have now been distributed to all those registered for the course. Specially bound volumes will be presented to the special lecturers and members of the Special Committee.

Richard DeBoo Limited supplied the copies for which the Law Society must pay, and for the Great Library, at \$1.35 per volume or \$2.70 for the set. Copies are also supplied to the County Law Associations and to law students at the Osgoode Hall Law School at special prices. The general sale price is \$7.50 per volume or \$12.50 per set.

As for the past several years Mr. DeBoo sent to the Secretary without charge sufficient copies to present a set to each of the other Canadian Law Societies, the Law Society of England, and certain selected law libraries.

SPECIAL LECTURES 1957

In discussing subjects for the Special Lectures 1956, the Special Committee gave careful consideration to a course on Estates Planning. This subject was allowed to stand in view of the possibility of certain Dominion legislation which might affect taxation. The matter is again before the Committee for consideration, and a preliminary draft of the proposed course is submitted, together with the names of some lecturers. The course is planned for 16 hours, with 5 hours on each Friday, and 3 hours each Saturday morning.

Your Committee recommends that a special course of lectures on Estates Planning be held on two week-ends, March 22nd-23rd, and 29th-30th, and that buffet luncheons be held

on each Saturday for those members of the profession registered; that the registration be limited to 370; and that the registration fee be \$15.00.

Mr. Sedgwick, Chairman, presented the Report of the Discipline Committee:

The Committee reported that after due inquiry it found the solicitors were guilty of professional misconduct and of conduct unbecoming a barrister and solicitor in that they had permitted certain real estate agents or other unauthorized persons to share in legal fees charged by them in connection with certain real estate transactions.

In view of certain extenuating circumstances, the Committee recommended that they be reprimanded in Convocation.

Moved by Mr. Sedgwick, seconded by Mr. R. F. Wilson, that the Report be adopted.

The solicitors attended and were asked if they had any representations to make with reference to the Report of the Discipline Committee, and they replied that they had not.

The solicitors then retired.

The Report was adopted.

The solicitors appeared again before Convocation and were reprimanded by the Treasurer.

UNAUTHORIZED PRACTICE COMMITTEE—Mr. Walsh

Your Committee met on the 16th November, 1956, the following members being present: Messrs. Walsh, Chairman, Creighton, (Vice-Chairman), Ball, Bell, Braid, Evans, Gregory, Haines, Levinter, MacLaren, MacTavish, Raney, Seaman, Seymour and Willmott.

CANADIAN BUREAU OF COLLECTIONS

In June the Committee considered a report from Mr. C. H. Walker, Q.C. on the use of the words "Legal Department". The Committee recommended adoption of Mr. Walker's suggestion that representations be made to the Superintendent of Insurance requesting him to insist that the use of the words "Legal Department" be discontinued by all collection agencies. On July 24th the Secretary wrote to Mr. R. B. Whitehead, Q.C., Superintendent of Insurance, to this effect.

At the meeting on October 19th the Secretary was instructed to write Mr. Whitehead again. Mr. Whitehead's reply of October 30th reads in part as follows:

"I still feel that this Department must approach this question as indicated in the second and third paragraphs of my letter to you of March 1st last."

The paragraphs referred to are as follows:

"As Mr. Simone, the Registrar of Collection Agencies indicted to you when he called on you on February 29th, efforts have been made from time to time to discourage collection agencies from using the phrase "Legal Department" in signing their letters. We have not insisted that they cease the practice simply because we doubt that we would be justified in doing so.

Some of the large agencies have been using that phrase for many years and actually have some of their staff designated as the legal department for the express purpose of processing accounts for Division Court action and the agency often appears in Division Court as an agent for the creditor. It is further argued that the phrase is used to suggest legal or court action, which action is not necessarily restricted to lawyers. It has also been suggested that some retail businesses in addition to collection agen-

cies use that phrase notwithstanding the absence of a lawyer on their staffs."

Your Committee recommends that this matter be referred to a sub-committee composed of Messrs. Haines and Levinter, for consideration, discussion with the Superintendent of Insurance, and report back.

AMALGAMATED COLLECTION AGENCIES

On November 1st a firm of solicitors of Toronto wrote the Secretary enclosing a collection letter from Amalgamated Collection Agencies to Mr. _____. The letter is signed:

"per '_____'

Amalgamated Collection Agencies
(Legal Division)"

Your Committee recommends that this matter be referred to the subcommittee referred to above.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE APPOINTED TO PREPARE A MEMORIAL TO THE LATE T. J. CARLEY, Q.C.

Mr. Willmott presented the Report of the Special Committee appointed to prepare a Memorial to the late Thomas John Carley, Q.C., and it was ordered that it be recorded in the Minutes of Convocation and a copy sent to Mrs. Carley:

MEMORIAL TO THE LATE THOMAS JOHN CARLEY, Q.C.

Thomas John Carley, a Bencher of the Law Society of Upper Canada, died at Peterborough, Ontario, on the 12th day of October, 1956.

Born at Woodville in Victoria County on August 3rd, 1896, he was a son of Alexander Carley and Catherine A. Hall. Mr. Carley received his education in the Public and High Schools at Fenelon Falls and graduated with honours in Political Science from the University of Toronto in 1917. He was admitted as a student-at-law on June 1st, 1917. Mr. Carley was called to the Bar with honours and was sworn in as a Solicitor of the Supreme Court of Ontario on June 17th, 1920. He practised for a short time in Toronto and Norwood and for eleven years in Fenelon Falls. He took an active part in public affairs and rapidly became an outstanding member of the legal profession in Central Ontario. In 1933 Mr. Carley entered into partnership with his uncle, the late Robert Richard Hall, K.C., Ex.-M.P., the latter for many years a distinguished member of the Bar of Peterborough County.

Mr. Carley carried on a very extensive practice in Peterborough and the Midland District and at the time of his death was the senior partner in the firm of Carley, Standish, Carlke & Carley. His only son, Robert Hamilton Carley, was called to the Bar in 1951, and became a member of his father's firm.

Mr. Carley filled many public offices and positions of trust in the City of Peterborough, being at various times Chairman of the Board of Education, President of the Rotary Club, Vice-Chairman of the Peterborough Civic Hospital and elder of St. Paul's Presbyterian Church, Past Master of Corinthian Lodge A.F. & A.M., and a 32 degree man in the Scottish Rite

and Presiding Officer for both Scottish Rite Lodges in Peterborough.

Mr. Carley attained eminence in the practice of law, and was appointed a King's Counsel in 1934. He appeared as counsel in many civil and criminal cases in the trial Courts and in the Court of Appeal, and appeared as counsel for the defence in two murder trials which terminated in a verdict of "Not Guilty" in both cases. He was popular with his fellow practitioners, the members of the Bar at Peterborough County voting for him to a man when he was elected as a Bencher in April, 1956.

An editorial tribute in The Peterborough Examiner bespeaks the esteem and respect in which Mr. Carley was held—

"He was a man of striking charm of manner, witty and agreeable in conversation, and courteous in demeanour. Although he was friendly toward everyone he was not a man with whom anyone would take liberties, nor did he bestow his intimacy lightly. He was an aggressive advocate, and to see him at work in the court-room was to be reminded of the great tradition of Irish pleaders in the nineteenth century, for he was eloquent, forceful and compelling. There was never any doubt that he had undertaken a case with the full intention of winning it; he was in all things, and in the best sense, strongly partisan. But he had also a strong sense of "court-room etiquette, and though he was a hard fighter he was a fair one."

He was married in 1924 to Grace Hamilton Sangster, Bainsville, Glengarry County, who survives him. Also surviving are a daughter, Mrs. Robert McRae, a son Robert Hamilton Carley, a sister Miss Alice B. Carley, and a brother Joseph H. R. Carley, to all of whom the Benchers of the Law Society of Upper Canada extend their sincere sympathy.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON TITLE GUARANTEE COMPANIES

Mr. Creighton, Chairman, presented the Report of the Special Committee:

On September 20th, 1956, the Unauthorized Practice Committee reported in part as follows:

"Title Guarantee Companies

Lawyers Title Insurance Corporation

"After further consideration your Committee approves and confirms the recommendation in the Report of June 21, 1956. that the Law Society continue to press its objections to the granting of charters and licenses to such insurance companies; and further recommends that if such charters and licenses are granted, consideration of the incorporation of such a company by members of the legal profession be explored by a committee to be appointed by the Treasurer following the adoption of this Report."

The Treasurer appointed the following Special Committee on Title Guarantee Companies: Messrs. Creighton (Chairman), Bell, Gregory, Haines and Levinter.

An examination of the statutory position with respect to Title Guarantee Insurance in this Province and in Canada discloses that a foreign insurance company is required to apply for and obtain a certificate of registry under the Dominion Statute the Foreign Insurance Companies Act, and to conform to the regulations in effect under the provisions of the Statute. The application of the Lawyers Title Insurance Corporation which raised the present issue before Convocation was made to the Department of Insurance, Ottawa, some time ago and on Thursday, March 2nd, 1956, some months before this Committee was set up, an Order in Council was passed under the Canadian and British Insurance Companies Act and the Foreign Insurance Companies Act adding a new classification of insurance under the heading Title Insurance as follows:

"23a. 'Title Insurance' means insurance against loss or damage caused by defect in the title to real property or by the existence of liens, encumbrances or servitudes upon real property, or by other matters affecting the title to real property or the right to the use and enjoyment thereof, or by defect in the execution of mortgages, hypothecs or deeds of trust."

This amendment to the regulations appears to have been considered desirable in order to deal with the application of the Company for a certificate of registry, and this application has now been granted and the Company has been licensed, and claims to have deposited securities to the amount of \$200,000.00 to conform to the requirements of the Department.

In Ontario the business of title insurance is already contemplated by the Provincial Statute. The definition of Guarantee Insurance in the Interpretation Section includes Title Insurance, and there are some other sections of the Act which refer to Title Insurance. The effect of the present Statute is that all companies now licensed in Ontario to do Guarantee Insurance are, in fact, licensed to do Title Insurance, and in order to conduct a title insurance business need only to commence writing policies. Prior to 1934 the classifications of Title Insurance and Guarantee Insurance were separated in the Act, but in that year they were merged under one definition, so that any company licensed as a Guarantee Insurance Company is entitled to write both types of insurance. Title Insurance therefore appears to be fully authorized and established by law although in practice it is not being written, and as far as your Committee can find, no company now doing business in Ontario has offered Title Insurance to the public, we presume because there has been no demand for it.

Your Committee met on October 19th when it heard representations at length from the solicitor, the Canadian representative, and the chief agent for Canada of the Lawyers Title Insurance Corporation. The Committee was reminded that the Corporation had already been granted a Dominion licence and that the Dominion regulations had been amended to re-define classes of insurance, including Title Insurance, and that the Ontario Act already provided for Title Insurance. The Company representatives explained the proposed method of operation of the Title Insurance business in Ontario, and asserted that their Company had been induced to come to Canada because of some indication of the demand for such insurance, particularly from corporations investing United States capital in Canada.

In view of these circumstances the Committee was early forced to conclude that there were no logical grounds upon which to seek to outlaw Title Insurance in Canada, a step which would require either radical amendments to the Statute Law, both Dominion and Provincial, or at the very least the arbitrary exercise of a departmental discretion in refusing licences, which action could be justified only on the ground that the lawyers of the Province were opposed to the Title Insurance business, which is hardly sufficient. We therefore considered whether some steps could not be taken to regulate the business of Title Insurance so as to avoid abuses and excesses in the nature of unauthorized practice of law. The representatives of the Company were invited to state their attitude to the suggestion that Title Insurance policies be issued only upon the certificates of title of duly qualified practising solicitors, and they expressed themselves as ready to accept and welcome such form of regulation. The Committee authorized a sub-committee to interview the Superintendent of Insurance, Mr. R. B. Whitehead, Q.C., and if possible, the Attorney-General, on the subject.

The Chairman, Mr. Haines, and the secretary met informally with the Superintendent of Insurance on October 31st, and were informed that the proposed regulation was feasible and might be desirable.

On November 7th, the Chairman, Mr. Haines and the Secretary met by appointment with the Attorney-General, the Deputy Attorney-General, the Superintendent of Insurance and the Master of Titles, Toronto. The Attorney-General and the Superintendent of Insurance both stated that the principle of the proposed regulation was acceptable to them. It was pointed out that, as the Lawyers Title Insurance Corporation had already been granted a Dominion Licence, and that the condition was acceptable to it, and that there were many companies in Ontario entitled to write title guarantee insurance under the definition of Guarantee Insurance, there was no good reason for further delay in granting it an Ontario licence, subject to the condition set out below. After full discussion of related matters the following recommendations were found to meet with the approval of the Attorney General

and the officials of his Department, and appropriate draft wording was drawn up and agreed upon.

1. That provisionally and until the Insurance Act is amended as recommended below and pursuant to section 24(4) of the Act, the Superintendent of Insurance, in granting any licence to an insurer for Title Insurance, be directed to attach thereto a limitation and condition to the following effect:

Provided however

That no policy of Title Insurance shall be issued unless the insurer has first obtained a concurrent certificate of title of the property to be insured from a solicitor then entitled to practise in the Province of Ontario, and who is not at that time in the employ of the insurer, either directly or indirectly.

2. That the Ontario Insurance Act be amended:

(a) By striking out from section 1, paragraph 26, — Guarantee Insurance — the definition of Title Insurance, and by adding paragraph 26A defining Title Insurance in the same terms.

(b) By amending Section 86 so as to empower the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council to make regulations for licences being issued subject to limitations and conditions, by adding thereto Section 86(3) bb

providing for the limitations and conditions subject to which any licence to an insurer may be issued.

3. That if the Insurance Act is so amended, a new regulation be passed in the form of the limitation to the licence to the Lawyers Title Insurance Corporation.

As your Committee understands the effect of these proposed amendments to the Statute and regulations on licences issued between now and the time when the proposed amendment will take effect following the next session of the Legislature, the direction of the Attorney-General will be sufficient to require the proposed limitation and condition to be attached to each such licence. If the Statute and regulations are amended as proposed, the limitation will be imposed not by the direction of the Attorney-General, but under the authority of the regulation.

Your Committee has been assured that these arrangements for the imposition provisionally of the proposed limitation and

condition on all policies hereinafter issued will be at once put into force, and that the amendment of the Statute and regulations will be recommended.

By these means the Committee is of the opinion that the most serious danger of abuses likely to arise out of the business of Title Insurance has been removed, and it is understood that the licence has been, or is being issued to the Lawyers Title Insurance Corporation accordingly.

The effect of re-defining the description of Title Insurance in the Ontario Act will be that many companies now incidentally authorized to issue Title Insurance will lose that right unless in renewals of their licences they specifically apply for a licence in this field of insurance.

Your Committee has given some consideration to the question of incorporating a Title Insurance Company by members of the legal profession of Ontario and has had before it for consideration some valuable information and literature with reference to such companies in the States of Florida and Ohio. Your Committee is not yet ready to make any recommendation with respect to this proposal.

Moved by Mr. Creighton, seconded by Mr. Bell, that the Report be adopted and that the action taken by the Special Committee be approved and confirmed. *Carried.*

SPECIAL COMMITTEE, REMEMBRANCE DAY SERVICE

At the request of the Treasurer, Mr. Jamieson in the absence of Mr. Cassels, presented the Report of the Special Committee;

At the meeting of Convocation on October 19, 1956 the Treasurer read a letter from the Honourable Mr. Justice Gibson with reference to a proposed memorial service to be held on Armistice Day at the Law Society's Second World War Memorial. It was ordered that the matter be referred, with power to act, to a special committee to be appointed by the Treasurer. The Treasurer appointed a Special Committee on Remembrance Day Service consisting of Messrs. Hamilton Cassels, Q.C., and G. A. McGillivray, Q.C.

Your Committee, with the advice and assistance of the Treasurer, the Honourable Mr. Justice Laidlaw, Acting Chief

Justice of Ontario, and of the Honourable Mr. Justice Gibson, arranged a simple and dignified order of service to be held on Friday, November 9th, at 10:45 a.m.

Shortly before that time the Treasurer and Benchers met in the Benchers' Library and proceeded to the First World War Memorial where the Treasurer placed a wreath.

The Honourable Mr. Justice Laidlaw and Judges of the Supreme Court of Ontario, and the Treasurer and Benchers then proceeded to take up their positions on the west and east side respectively of the Second World War Memorial on the ground floor.

The Treasurer announced that in the First World War 113 members of the Law Society of Upper Canada, lawyers and students-at-law, gave their lives, and in the Second World War, 50 members of the Society, lawyers and students-at-law, gave their lives. He stated that members of the Bench and Bar, and of the families of those who gave their lives were gathered at that time in remembrance and honour of them.

Mr. H. W. A. Foster, Q.C., read the Roll of Honour of the First War, and Mr. G. A. McGillivray, Q.C., of the Second World War.

The Treasurer then placed a wreath before the Second World War memorial; a bugler from the 28th Highlanders sounded the Last Post; there was a two minute silence; the bugler sounded Reveille; and the Honourable Mr. Justice Laidlaw brought the service to a close with the Lord's Prayer.

The Remembrance Day Service received a very fine tribute in the Globe and Mail, with a front page photograph of the Treasurer placing the wreath before the memorial, and an article by Miss Lotta Dempsey.

Your Committee recommends that the petition be refused.

STATUS OF STUDENTS WHO HAVE DISCONTINUED

A number of applicants for transfer to the Bar of Ontario from some other Bar have recently requested that the \$101.00 admission fees that they paid when they were students of this Law School be credited towards the total transfer fee of \$311.00 or \$561.00. These candidates are students who have either failed in the Law School and completed a law

course elsewhere or have discontinued for some other reason. They did not receive a refund of their admission fee and they would still therefore appear to be members of the Society.

The suggestion has been made that the status of such persons be clarified and that if necessary authority be conferred to remove the names of such persons from the Society's rolls upon their failure or upon their leaving the Law School.

Your Committee is of opinion that no credit should be given for the \$101 fee on transfer and that action should be taken to remove from the Rolls the names of students who have failed or discontinued.

SCHOLARSHIP OR PRIZE OFFERED BY GEORGE M. MILLER, Q.C.

The Chairman referred to the Committee the generous offer of Mr. Miller of a sum of \$3500.00 to endow an annual prize of \$100.00, and requested instructions.

We reported progress of the work on November 14th 1956 and on Jan. 15th, 1957. Since the former date the erection of the steel stairs has been completed. The stone work has been set up to the third floor level and the brick work on the West wall has been laid up to the second level. Concrete floors have been completed on the first and second floor levels and the third floor will be completed on the 15th of February. The concrete floor on the basements is approximately 50% complete.

The Contractor has started building internal masonry partitions. They are complete on the first floor in the Lecturers Rooms # 118 to 126 along the East side. Erection of partitions has started in the basement.

The roughing-in for the kitchen equipment has been commenced by the plumber. The electrician is laying conduits in both the basements and the first floor.

The General Contractor has reported that he is two weeks behind schedule due to two weeks of very cold weather, during which time it was not possible to set up masonry. He has assured us that he will make up this loss of time as soon as the weather improves enough to set masonry without interruption. We see no reason to prevent his accomplishing his aim.

The Contractor has been unable to rent any steam unit heaters and has therefore relied upon oil burning salamanders for the temporary heat in the building. It has been found unnecessary to make any large expenditure on the rental of tarpaulins to enclose the building.

We consider that the Contractor has made every effort, and has succeeded, in carrying out the construction as expeditiously as possible, and if he proceeds without any further serious interruptions, which may be due to weather or strikes, that there is no reason why he should not complete the building by the time scheduled.

ONTARIO LEGAL AID PLAN, 1956

Attached hereto as part of this Report is the Report of the Provincial Director for the year 1956.

Your Committee approves and adopts the Report, and refers it to Convocation for its information.

TO THE LEGAL AID COMMITTEE

The Provincial Director begs leave to present his fifth Report.

For the year 1956 I am pleased to be able to report that all forty-four of the Counties and Districts which have local Law Associations, have filed returns on legal aid. 41 of the Counties were organized in some form, and the 3 without formal organization state that all applications for legal aid were dealt with by individual solicitors. In a few counties where the administration is informal, or where no records are kept, the solicitors giving legal aid often pay the disbursements themselves and make no claim on the Legal Aid Fund. The figures which appear later in this Report do not, therefore, include credit for considerable legal aid work done in 1956.

Legal Aid clinics were held in 9 counties, in 5 regularly and in 4 as required by applications for aid. Four other counties were prepared but clinics were not necessary, applications being otherwise dealt with.

A total of 171 throughout the Province in 1956.

The other 35 counties dealt with applications for legal aid in various ways, by applying to the County Director or any member of the profession, or to County Court Judges, Magistrates or court officials. In two counties, one member of the profession is appointed to take care of all legal aid work, clinic and panel, for one month, and this plan has worked satisfactorily.

It is interesting to note as a trend that there is a decrease in the number of counties holding clinics to receive applications for legal aid, in the number of clinics held, and in the number of solicitors required for this branch of the work. As legal aid becomes more an accepted service by the legal profession to the public, there is less need for clinics and applications for aid are made direct to the members of the Bar and Bench, court officials and welfare agencies.

It is also worthy of note that the changes in legal education in Ontario, as recently announced by the Law Society of Upper Canada, may have in the opinion of one County Director, an effect on the administration of legal aid, in his area at least. The County Director for Frontenac says, in part:

“

In view of the probability of the law school here at Queen's it is conceivable that Legal Aid might come into a more important role in this area I could visualise much good coming from Clinics and while no clients appeared when we did set these up originally, I think they could be put on an operational basis here.

The members of the local Bar are quite co-operative.”

In 2 counties no applications for legal aid were received; in 3 counties no applications in civil matters; and in 1 county none in criminal matters.

In 17 counties all members of the profession were available for legal aid work. In other counties the number of lawyers available for this work is impressive, but there must be the wholehearted support of the profession if the Plan is to continue to work satisfactorily.

With incomplete figures as indicated above, the following

are the relevant figures with reference to legal aid in Ontario in 1956:

Of the above totals, there were in York County 1877 applications for legal aid in civil cases, and aid was given in 1305; in criminal cases, 711 applications were received and aid was given in 587.

In criminal matters, aid was given in connection with 9 charges for murder, and 129 other serious charges.

During 1956, with the approval of the Minister of Welfare, the regulations with reference to eligibility were amended to extend legal aid to a greater number by increasing the amounts which may be earned by persons applying for legal aid. The amount of earnings permitted to an applicant was increased to \$1200 from \$900 in the case of a single person; and to \$1800 from \$1200 in the case of a married person, with an additional amount of \$200 for each dependent.

The success of the Legal Aid Plan is due to the guidance and counsel of the Chairman and members of the Legal Aid Committee, and of the local Advisory Committees, and to the great amount of work done by County and local Directors and the members of the profession generally. Special thanks must be extended to J. Douglas Conover, County Director for York, and his able assistants for their services in handling approximately two-thirds of the legal aid work in the Province.

PUBLIC RELATIONS COMMITTEE—Mr. Gregory

Your Committee met on Thursday, 14th March 1957, at 3 p.m. in Convocation Room, the following members being present: W. P. Gregory (Chairman), G. A. McGillivray (Vice-Chairman) and Messrs. Arnup, Ball and Jamieson.

1. *DOCUMENTARY FILM*

The Chairman read a letter dated February 20, 1957, from Crawley Films Limited with an estimate of the cost of a twenty-minute film of the type this Company was proposing.

Your Committee recommends that in view of the expense that would be involved, no further action be taken on the proposal.

2. *LAWYER REFERRAL PLAN*

At its September meeting the Committee considered this plan which had been put into operation last summer by the Vancouver Bar Association. At that time the Committee decided to defer further consideration to this meeting.

Information has been received from Mr. Hugo Ray, who was Chairman of the committee responsible for the introduction of this plan and from Mr. Arthur Cowan who is Vice-President for British Columbia of the Canadian Bar Association. No official report on the plan had yet been made

and it appeared that it was still too early to decide on the success of the plan in British Columbia.

In view of this information your Committee recommends that no further action be taken on this proposal at this time.

3. *PUBLIC LEGAL FORUMS*

All three forums in the present series have now been held and the Deputy Secretary submits a report which is Appendix "A" to this report.

4. *SPEAKERS AND LECTURERS*

The Deputy Secretary brought to the Committee's attention the frequent requests made to the Secretary to obtain a Speaker from the profession for a Club, Society, or other gathering. The requests fall into two groups:

1.—for a member of the profession to speak on a general topic, and

2.—for a lecturer on a legal topic
Where the Secretary was able to arrange for such a speaker, it was customary for a letter to be sent by the Chairman thanking the speaker for his assistance in furthering the good public relations of the Society.

Recent examples of where the Society had been able to assist other organizations in this way were the provision of such speakers for the Toronto Real Estate Board, the Oakville-Trafalgar Chamber of Commerce, and the North York Civil Defence Auxiliary Police Force.

It is estimated that about 500 people attended the first Forum.

For the second Forum the pattern established last year was repeated; this was the most popular discussion in the series when both Convocation Hall and its gallery and the large lower lecture room were filled, and it is estimated that over 1,000 people attended.

For the third Forum an audience of between 600 and 700 people attended. Convocation Hall was packed and the overflow audience again used the lower lecture room.

Again this year tours were conducted through the whole of Osgoode Hall; through the Government side through the kind permission of the Government conveyed by the Attorney General. An improvement in the tours was noted as a result of the student guides being carefully selected and trained, and the public seemed to be greatly interested in being shown the points of interest in the Hall and having these explained to them.

So far none of the inaccuracies that occurred last year in the reporting have been noticed. The pattern of arrangements and reporting has been worked out a little more satisfactorily, and the only recommendation that I would make

is that the Forums be held in weeks other than Convocation weeks.

As before, the Forum discussions were recorded and will be distributed to radio stations throughout Ontario that wish to broadcast the tape recordings. These recordings were broadcast over twenty-eight radio stations in Ontario last year, and the Toronto Daily Star's representatives have informed us that there is a very active interest on the part of radio station managers in these tapes.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON LAW SCHOOL—

The Treasurer

Your Committee met at 4:45 p.m. on Thursday, the 14th March 1957, in Convocation Room, the following members being present: The Treasurer (Chairman) and Messrs. Arnup, Gregory, Jamieson, Parkinson, Robinette and R. F. Wilson.

At the commencement of the meeting, the members of your Committee, accompanied by Mr. H. F. Brown of Messrs. Mathers and Haldenby, visited the new building.

Upon your Committee's return to Convocation Room, Mr. Brown submitted a report on the general progress of the new building, which is Appendix "A" to this report.

Civic Square Parking Garage

At your Committee's request Mr. Brown had attended on the general manager of the Parking Authority for Toronto to discuss the effect on Osgoode Hall of the proposed garage under the Civic Square. Mr. Brown was satisfied that the garage would have no ill effect on Osgoode Hall. Your Committee gave instructions for a letter to be sent to the Parking Authority to ensure that there would be no interference with the present driveway leading from Chestnut Street.

Federal Grants

On February 28th last the Treasurer wrote to the Minister of Finance explaining the change that had occurred in legal education with the adoption of the Special Committee's report

of 14th February 1957, and applying specifically for grants in respect of fourth year students under the old plan. In his telegram of February 1st last the Minister had questioned the entitlement of grants regarding fourth year students.

The Treasurer read the Honourable Walter Harris's reply of 7th March 1957, in which the Minister agreed that, for this year, the Society was entitled to grants in respect of first, second and fourth year students. The letter of Mr. Harris is Appendix "B" hereto.

Amendment to the Law Society Act

The treasurer reported that on Wednesday, February 20th, he and Mr. Arnup attended on the Honourable the Attorney General of Ontario and presented to him a proposed amendment to section 40 of The Law Society Act, the effect of which would be to confer upon the Benchers the power to provide for the granting of and to grant degrees in law. While the Treasurer and Mr. Arnup were with him the Attorney General discussed the matter over the telephone with the Honourable W. J. Dunlop, Minister of Education. It appeared that the proposed amendment had the approval of both the Attorney General and the Minister and the Attorney General stated that he would bring it before Cabinet the following day. He indicated that he thought the amendment could be enacted at a reasonably early date during the present session of the Legislature.

Since then Bill #95, providing for the granting of degrees in law had received first and second reading and had been referred to the Legal Bills Committee.

Uniform Canadian Qualification for Admission and Call

Consideration of this proposal had been deferred from last month's meeting. In the meantime the Conference of Governing Bodies of the Legal Profession in Canada had resolved to take no action on this resolution. Your Committee therefore decided to take no action.

Riddell Canadian Library

At your Committee's request the Chief Librarian had investigated the possibility of moving this collection from the mezzanine of the Phillips-Stewart Library in order to provide more study space for the students. Mr. Johnston recommended that the collection be moved to the two rooms in the

west wing now occupied by Mr. Glen. Your Committee approved this recommendation.

Legal Education

After dinner your Committee discussed at length the new plan for legal education, the implementation of which had been referred to it by the Legal Education Committee.

Your Committee adjourned at 10:30 p.m.

Dear Mr. Carson:

I have read with considerable interest your letter of February 28th and the report on the proposed new plan for legal training in Ontario. I have also noted that legislation authorizing Osgoode to grant degrees is now before the Legislative Assembly.

You will recall my recent communication to you indicated that eligibility of Osgoode is no longer in question. The pending legislation will not have any effect on this eligibility or on the amount of the grant.

While students currently in the first and second year courses clearly come within our definition of a "Student" and those in their third year clearly do not, there is some doubt about those enrolled in their final year. Nevertheless, for the current year, I am prepared to accept your enrolment in the first, second and fourth years as the basis for calculating the amount of your grant. This ruling is for the current year, only. It is entirely without prejudice to any decision which the National Conference of Canadian Universities might make in the future.

I should appreciate your completing the enrolment forms and returning them to the Bureau of Statistics as soon as possible.

The treasurer referred to a letter dated March 5th, 1957 from Dr. Sidney E. Smith, President of the University of Toronto, to him. In that letter Dr. Smith said:

"I regard the document (Report of the Special Com-

mittee on Law School, February 14, 1957) as the most constructive, forward-looking and statesman-like declaration of policy with regard to legal education that has ever been issued in any part of Canada at any time. On behalf of the University of Toronto, I express our deep and abiding resolution to co-operate in every way possible with the Law Society of Upper Canada in implementing the terms of the Report and in fulfilling the hope of Convocation to advance legal education in Ontario. The step that has been taken by Convocation will redound to the benefit of the Bar, the Bench and the public, not only of this Province but throughout Canada.

"On occasion, in my official capacity, I have criticized the Law Society for some of its educational policies. The staff of the Faculty of Law, and the staff, Senate and Board of Governors of the University of Toronto are of one mind with respect to the past, and that is to forget it and to move forward under the enlightened leadership of the Law Society, in offering educational facilities for the recruitment and preparation of talented youth of sound character for a profession which is the guardian of our cherished and blood-bought freedoms."

The Treasurer referred to his reply to Dr. Smith dated March 7, 1957. In his letter the Treasurer said:

"I am deeply grateful to you, as I know the other members of our Special Committee and Convocation will be, for what you have said about our Report and for the unreserved assurances of co-operation on the part of the University of Toronto in implementing the terms of the Report.

"I take this opportunity of expressing to you my deep appreciation of the very great contribution you have made to making this Report possible. The cordial and earnest approach to the problems that was so evident in our meetings with you and the other university heads was not only exceedingly helpful to us but most stimulating.

"I feel that the Report heralds the commencement of a new and improved era in the field of legal education and we of the Law Society enter that era greatly heartened and encouraged by the outlook for the future so fittingly expressed in the last paragraph of your letter."

SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON CONTINUING EDUCATION OF THE BAR—Mr. Gregory

The Committee beg leave to report as follows:

Arrangements have now been completed for the special course of lectures on Estate Planning to be given on March 22nd, 23rd, 29th and 30th next. The course was completely subscribed by February 18th, and your Committee notes with satisfaction and some pride that it was sold out one month after the first announcement, and one month before the day of the first lecture. It is evident that the Law Society's policy of continuing education meets with the approval of the members of the profession.

As recommended by your Committee in its Report of January 18, 1957, twenty-five subscriptions were made available to The Institute of Chartered Accountants of Ontario and to the Life Underwriters Association. These have been allotted, and it was indicated by both Associations that many more tickets could have been sold. The Registrar of The Institute of Chartered Accountants in Ontario said in part:

"I am grateful for your letter of January 28th making the kind offer of twenty-five subscriptions by our members to attend your special lectures on Estate Planning. I can assure you that twenty-five members will attend."

In submitting his subscription, the Executive Vice-President of the Life Underwriters Association of Canada said:

"May I just once again express our sincere appreciation to the Law Society of Upper Canada for making these tickets available to us."

This year a rather unusual event has occurred in the registration of a member of the Bar of Saskatchewan. The applicant was admitted as a student of the graduate class of this Society in September 1940 and completed his First Year before going on active service. He asked permission to register as it would be in the interests of the Law Society of Saskatchewan if someone observed how such courses were conducted as they have not any similar continuing education of the Bar in that Province. The Secretary of the Law Society of Saskatchewan also asked that this applicant be registered as he had volunteered to assist in a course of special lectures in Saskatchewan. Under these circumstances your Committee was of the opinion that he should be allowed to register.

THE REPORT WAS ADOPTED.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE, "THE INCORPORATED FOUNDATION OF THE BAR OF ONTARIO"

Mr. Cassels, Chairman, presented a Report prepared before the announcement on March 1, 1957 of the organization of "The Foundation of the Bar of Ontario", a memorandum dated March 13, 1957 from Mr. S. E. Weir to Mr. W. P. Gregory; and a second Report of the Special Committee dated March 15, 1957.

The SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON "THE INCORPORATED FOUNDATION OF THE BAR OF ONTARIO" begs leave to report as follows:

Your Committee, consisting of Messrs. Arnup, Cassels, Gregory, H. C. Walker and R. F. Wilson, was appointed by the Treasurer pursuant to a resolution of Convocation passed on May 20th, 1954, to consider and report on a letter from the office of the Deputy Provincial Secretary, dated May 19, 1954, a copy of which is hereto attached.

Your Committee has met on numerous occasions and because of the legal points involved has from time to time consulted Mr. J. L. Stewart, Q.C.

Your Committee met on February 15, 1957, the following members being present: Messrs. Cassels(Chairman), the Treasurer, Gregory and R. F. Wilson.

In view of the eminent members of the Bar whose names appear in the petition your Committee has given this matter very careful consideration and begs to report as follows:

1. The Law Society Act provides that the Benchers may establish a fund to be called "The Law Benevolent Fund" for purposes substantially the same as those for which incorporation is sought. The provision is found in section 50 of the Act as amended by the Law Society Amendment Act, 1944, and reads as follows:

"50. The benchers may establish a fund for the benefit of barristers or solicitors, their widows, orphans or dependents to be called 'The Law Benevolent Fund', and may make all necessary rules and regulations for the management and investment of such fund, and the terms of subscription and appropriation thereof, and the conditions under which such barristers or solicitors, their widows,

orphans or dependants shall be entitled to share in such fund."

While the benchers have not as yet seen fit to establish a benevolent fund of this nature, it is significant that as recently as 1944 the Legislature saw fit at the request of The Law Society to authorise them to do so. It was obviously felt that the Law Society is the proper medium for administering a fund of this kind and in this view your Committee concurs. In our opinion such a fund, if established, should be a matter for the profession as a whole to support, and should not be carried on as a private venture. In coming to this conclusion your Committee has not overlooked the fact that there are organizations with objects in many respects similar to those contained in the petition, in Great Britain, but in our view the circumstances differ and so far as we are aware, there is not the same statutory provision for the establishment of a fund by the Law Society.

It may be that Convocation will not consider the time ripe for the establishment of a benevolent fund but your Committee is of the opinion that when the time comes such a fund could be administered by the Society in a manner more acceptable to the profession as a whole than by a private corporation. It may be that the project is one which should be financed by a small annual charge which could be added to Bar fees. In this connection your Committee feels that the bequest of the late Mr. J. Shirley Denison, Q.C. would greatly facilitate the establishment and operation of a benevolent fund. Subject to the life interest of Mr. Denison's sister, the Law Society is to receive the residue of his estate, amounting to a very substantial sum, probably more than \$150,000.00, which is to be applied for the purposes mentioned in the following clause of Mr. Denison's Will, namely:—

"My Trustee shall after my sister's death, pay to or deliver to the Law Society of Upper Canada the residue of my estate the same to be applied from time to time by the Treasurer and Benchers and both as to capital and income as they may see fit for the relief of impropertised or indigent members of the Law Society and of their wives widows and children including among such wives, widows and children those of any member of the Law Society who may have been disbarred or suspended."

While the residue of Mr. Denison's estate could not be absorbed in a benevolent fund it could be administered in conjunction with the fund, and would in effect constitute a substantial foundation for such a project.

Your Committee recommends that in the light of the above facts, the Law Society inform the Deputy Provincial Secretary that it is opposed to the application.

2. Whether or not Convocation decides to oppose the application, your Committee feels that the proposed name is objectionable as "The Incorporated Foundation of the Bar of Ontario" implies, in our opinion, that the corporation constitutes or represents the entire Bar of the Province. Your Committee is of the opinion that objection should be taken to the use of such a name.

3. From advice your Committee has received from Mr. J. L. Stewart, Q.C., it seems doubtful whether the proposed corporation would be considered as a charitable organization for taxation purposes. It may be that this difficulty could be overcome by altering the phraseology used to define certain of the objects and purposes of the corporation. In the event of Convocation deciding to establish a benevolent fund it may be that certain amendments would have to be made in the wording of section 50 of the Law Society Act, to ensure that contributions to the fund would be exempt from taxation.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

The SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON "THE INCORPORATED FOUNDATION OF THE BAR OF ONTARIO" begs leave to report as follows:

Your Committee met on the 15th day of March 1957, the following members being present: Messrs. Cassels(Chairman), Gregory and R. F. Wilson.

Since your Committee had drafted its report, word has been received from Mr. S. E. Weir, Q.C. that an Association known as "The Foundation of the Bar of Ontario" with objects similar to those for which incorporation was sought has been formed with Mr. Weir as its President and the profession is being circularized with a view to enrolling members at an annual fee of \$5.00. A copy of the circular which has been sent out is attached hereto.

The word "charter" is used in the circular and some recipients of the circular were in doubt as to whether the Association had been incorporated. From enquiries made at the Assistant Provincial Secretary's Office it appears that Letters Patent have not been issued and that they are awaiting word from the Law Society as to whether the Society has any objection to the granting of Letters Patent to a corporation to be known as "The Incorporated Foundation of the Bar of Ontario".

While your Committee has not had an opportunity of considering "The Memorandum of Association or Charter" of the new organization referred to in the circular it seems evident that it is substantially the same organization as that which had sought incorporation and that it has proceeded with the formation of the unincorporated Association to fore-

stall the possibility of an adverse reply being sent by the Law Society to the Deputy Provincial Secretary's letter.

Perhaps your Committee should point out that while Mr. Weir in his letter to the Chairman of the Committee complains about a reply not being sent quickly to the Deputy Provincial Secretary, the matter is not one which can be decided quickly. The question of establishing a benevolent fund has been considered by different committees of the Law Society over a period of many years and the 1944 amendment to the Law Society Act was obtained with a view to establishing such a fund within the Society.

A meeting of your Committee to consider its report to Convocation had been arranged for this morning and Mr. Weir had been asked to attend. Your Committee considers it unfortunate that Mr. Weir and his associates have seen fit to proceed with the formation of the Association and to circularize the profession before Convocation had reached a decision. Your Committee feels that in view of the situation created by the action taken by Mr. Weir and his associates it should report these developments to Convocation as it may be that Convocation will see fit to alter or rescind the terms of reference.

THE FOUNDATION OF THE BAR OF ONTARIO

March 1, 1957.

The Foundation of the Bar of Ontario, which has for its short title "The Bar Foundation", is appealing to every lawyer in Ontario to become a member.

The annual membership fee is only \$5.00. But with a good response, the total coming into the foundation will enable the Foundation to do much for the legal profession in Ontario.

The Memorandum of Association or Charter contains the object:

"to afford assistance by way of gift, loan of otherwise including payment of or contributions to funeral expenses in such necessitous and deserving cases as the Directors may approve to persons in or associated with the practice of law and the wives, widows and children and other dependent relatives of such persons."

Other objects are to cultivate the science of jurisprudence, promote reforms in the law and facilitate the administration

of justice and these are believed to qualify the Foundation as a charitable institution for exemption from income tax and succession duties. As time goes on it is hoped that substantial capital funds may be built up from gifts encouraged by tax exemption.

In the near future the Foundation will explore the possibility of obtaining life and sickness and disability insurance for the members of the Foundation at a saving.

We all know that financial distress occurs in our profession. Family sickness and other emergencies require extra cash which often cannot be borrowed through the usual channels. Lawyers die with children at University or Law School who must abandon their education unless help is forthcoming. The Foundation can make loans in these cases. Some of the loans may not be paid back but that is of small importance, considering the good done. Indeed the Foundation can pay or contribute to funeral expenses, assist needy widows of lawyers and make other gifts where they are indicated. Its scope for usefulness is tremendous.

In order to have full coverage of the Province, there will be 30 directors of whom not more than 12 may be principally resident in Toronto. From these it is proposed to form an executive committee chosen for ready availability. There is a provision for setting up Local Committees to uncover those needing assistance. The Headquarters will be established in Toronto as the best central point but for the time being the work of the Foundation will be done from the office of the President at London, free of expense to the Foundation. The charter stipulates that the service of directors is honorary and that no pecuniary payment shall be made to any of them except for personal expenses. All assistance given is to be confidential so that there shall be a minimum of embarrassment for those visited with misfortune.

Because of this confidential element and because membership is entirely voluntary and the administration of the funds is discretionary, and because the proposed work is important in itself, it is essential that an entirely separate and distinct organization undertake the proposed work. There are successful precedents for it. In England, The Barristers Benevolent Association was founded in 1873 and from a recent An-

nual Report appears to have nearly 2,000 members. The Solicitors Benevolent Association was founded in England in 1858. The Law Association at London, England, was founded in 1817. Both these institutions have grown to great importance. In Dublin, The Solicitors Benevolent Association is operating successfully. The Montreal Bar has had a similar organization for about 20 years. The lawyers of Montreal are enthusiastic about its work.

Much time has been spent in investigations for this meritorious endeavour. Many leading members of our Bar have given of their time through several years and those named below are already parties to the charter and are among the first Directors of the Foundation.

There is now a threat of more difficult times. The Foundation should get underway. It is urged that you complete the enclosed application and return it with your membership fee. When the charter is printed, each member will receive a copy.

Mr. D. L. McCarthy, Q.C., former Treasurer of the Law Society and Nestor of our profession, is the Patron of the Foundation.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON BILL NO. 97—An Act to amend The Charities Accounting Act.—Mr. Cassels.

Following the introduction of this Bill in the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Ontario on February 21, 1957, the Treasurer received calls from several members of the profession who expressed themselves as being seriously concerned with some of the provisions of this Bill. On February 25th the Treasurer therefore appointed a Special Committee composed of Messrs. Hamilton Cassels, Q.C., Chairman, and David J. Walker, Q.C., to make representations to the Government as to the effect of the proposed Bill.

Your Committee discussed this matter with Mr. J. D. Arnup, Q.C. and Mr. J. T. Gow, Q.C. as well as representatives of a number of charitable institutions which would be affected by the proposed Act. Mr. Arnup and Mr. Gow had recently been engaged in court proceedings in the Ella R. Firth Estate involving questions relating to the powers and duties of the Public Trustee and the proposed legislation would alter the status of the Public Trustee as interpreted by the Court of Appeal in the Firth case.

Your Committee came to the conclusion that Sections 4 and 5 of Bill No. 97 would be prejudicial to the interests of charitable organizations and the legal profession, and they obtained on appointment to make representations to the Attorney-General on Monday, March 4th last. At that time they attended on the Attorney-General and Mr. Arnup was kind enough to attend with them as it was felt desirable to have him present in view of his intimate knowledge of this matter as a result of acting in the Firth Estate.

It was submitted to the Attorney-General that the enactment of the proposed sections 4 and 5 of Bill 97 would be

highly undesirable. When the preliminary submissions had been made the Attorney-General invited the Public Trustee, Mr. Snider of his office, and Mr. Magone to come in and the discussion was continued. All those present expressed their views and the Attorney-General indicated at the conclusion of the interview that he would discuss the matter further with the Public Trustee.

Since the interview with the Attorney-General word has been received from Mr. Magone that Sections 4 and 5 of Bill 97 were deleted when the Bill was discussed in the Committee of the Whole. It is unlikely that the sections in question will be reinserted or any similar provisions inserted prior to the Bill receiving its final reading. However, Mr. Magone has given his assurance that he will endeavour to see that if there is any change in the decision of the committee of the Whole, your committee will be given an opportunity of making further representations before the Bill receives its final reading.

ADMISSION AS STUDENTS-AT-LAW

- (1) he has been engaged in active practice in the province from which he is transferring for a continuous period of three years immediately next preceding his application, and
- (2) he satisfies all other requirements that may be prescribed from time to time by the Legal Education Committee.

APPENDIX "A"

All rules relating to admission to the Law Society here-

after as a student-at-law are hereby suspended and all applications for admission to the Osgoode Hall Law School shall comply with the following academic requirements.—

A candidate for admission to the first year of the course at the Osgoode Hall Law School leading to the degree of Bachelor of Laws (LL.B.) may be accepted who, on application

- (1) presents proof that he has following junior matriculation successfully completed in full-time attendance *three* years of an approved course in an approved Canadian university subject, in this classification, to each application being approved by the faculty of the Osgoode Hall Law School;
- (2) presents proof that he has following senior matriculation
 - (a) successfully completed in full-time attendance *two* years of an approved course of four years or more in an approved Canadian university; or
 - (b) successfully completed in full-time attendance *two* years of an approved course of *three* years in an approved Canadian university subject, in this classification, to each application being approved by the faculty of the Osgoode Hall Law School;
- or (3) presents proof that he has following senior matriculation successfully completed in full-time attendance *three* years of an approved course in an approved Canadian university;
- or (4) presents proof that he is
 - (a) a graduate in an approved course in the faculty of arts, medicine, engineering or applied science of any Canadian university having power to grant a degree in that faculty; or
 - (b) a graduate in any faculty of any other university or college having power to grant a degree in that faculty, provided that the Legal Education Committee on recommendation of the faculty of the Osgoode Hall Law School approves such degree.

and all other requirements that may be prescribed from time to time by the Legal Education Committee or by the Osgoode Hall Law School Admissions Committee.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON BILL NO. 97—An Act to amend The Charities Accounting Act.

Mr. Cassels, Chairman, presented the Report:

Following the introduction of this Bill in the Legislative Assembly and after receiving calls from several members of the profession who expressed themselves as being seriously concerned with some of the provisions of the Bill, the Treasurer on February 25, 1957 appointed a Special Committee composed of Messrs. Hamilton Cassels, Q.C. (Chairman), and David J. Walker, Q.C. to make representations to the Government as to the effect of the proposed Bill.

Your Committee, after discussion with interested members of the Society, and accompanied by Mr. J. D. Arnup, Q.C., made representations to the Attorney-General and opposed strongly the enactment of the proposed sections 4 and 5 of Bill No. 97.

Following the interview with the Attorney-General your Committee was informed that the original sections 4 and 5 of Bill No. 97 had been deleted, and that if further changes were made with reference to these matters, your Committee would be given an opportunity of making further representations.

A later reprinting of the Bill contained alternative clauses 4 and 5 which, in the opinion of your Committee, were equal-

ly objectionable, and again representations were made to the Attorney-General in writing and in a personal interview.

Your Committee is pleased to report that the Bill has now passed without any of the clauses on which representations were made, and will come into effect as Chapter 10, Statutes of Ontario 1957.

It was resolved that the matters in the Report be referred to the Special Committee on Title Guarantee Companies, the Unauthorized Practice Committee, and the Discipline Committee respectively. Copies of the Reports and the resolution were sent to all Benchers with a note that they would be considered at the meeting of Convocation on April 12, 1957.

Your Committee considered Part I of the Report of the Special Committee of the Carleton Law Association, and gave particular attention to paragraphs 11, 12 and 13 which refer to the unauthorized use of the words "solicitor" or "lawyer" by any individual or corporation.

PUBLIC RELATIONS COMMITTEE—Mr. Gregory

1. GRADUATION BOOKLET

The booklet had now been printed and was presented to your Committee and approved for distribution to the persons who had been called and admitted at Osgoode Hall in 1956. On your Committee's instructions the booklet next year is to contain the names of the full-time and part-time staff teaching at Osgoode Hall Law School.

2. LEGAL AID HANDBOOK

Last year your Committee had approved in principle the

distribution of a handbook to members of the Bar participating in the Ontario Legal Aid Plan, particularly clinic lawyers and conducting counsel. It had been suggested that the handbook contain in addition a short history of the Legal Aid Plan and an account of its operation in a form which would be attractive to the general public.

A redraft of the original handbook was presented to and considered by your Committee. SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON TITLE GUARANTEE
 COMPANIES—Mr. Creighton

Your Committee in its Report dated November 16, 1956 stated that after full discussion of the related matters, certain recommendations were found to meet with the approval of the Attorney-General and the officials of his Department, and appropriate draft wording was drawn up and agreed upon.

One of the recommendations was —

"2. That the Ontario Insurance Act be amended:

(a) By striking out from section 1, paragraph 26—Guarantee Insurance — the definition of Title Insurance, and by adding paragraph 26A defining Title Insurance in the same terms.

(b) By amending Section 86 so as to empower the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council to make regulations for licences being issued subject to limitations and conditions, by adding thereto Section 86(3) bb

providing for the limitations and conditions subject to which any licence to an insurer may be issued."

In its Report of February 13, 1957 your Committee reported to Convocation that the Honourable the Attorney-General had introduced Bill No. 74, An Act to Amend The Insurance Act, which contained the two recommendations referred to above.

Bill No. 74, as amended by the Committee on Legal Bills, but containing the two recommendations referred to above, was passed by the Legislature and, as Chapter 51, Statutes of Ontario 1957 comes into effect sixty days after prorogation, that is June 2, 1957. The Regulations pursuant to the amendments may then be drawn, approved by Order-in-Council, and published in the Ontario Gazette.

Your Committee recommends that the Notice to the Profession with reference to Title Insurance and the action of your Committee, as already recommended, be published in the Ontario Weekly Notes immediately after the publication of the amended Regulations.

At the meeting of Convocation on March 15th, 1957, following the presentation of the Unauthorized Practice Committee's Report, Mr. Creighton referred to a letter of March 13, 1957 from Mr. R. A. Bell to the Secretary, and copies of the enclosed Reports of a Special Committee of the County of Carleton Law Association and certain Resolutions of the Association dealing with title insurance companies and other matters. It was resolved that the matters in the Report be referred to the Special Committee on Title Guarantee Companies, the Unauthorized Practice Committee, and the Discipline Committee respectively. Copies of the Reports and the Resolution were sent to all Benchers with a note that they would be considered at the meeting of Convocation on April 12, 1957.

Your Committee met on March 29, 1957, the following members being present: Messrs. Creighton (Chairman), Gregory and Levinter.

The Chairman read a letter from Mr. E. L. Haines of March 28, 1957 expressing his views.

The Reports and Resolution of the County of Carleton Law Association were considered in detail.

The Resolution of the County of Carleton Law Association reads in part as follows:

"2. That Part I of the said report (Title Insurance Companies) be presented to the Premier and Attorney-General of Ontario and to the Law Society of Upper Canada with the following recommendations of this Association:

- (a) That regulations be made by the Lieutenant-Governor in Council under the Insurance Act imposing limitations and conditions on the licences of all companies with respect to title insurance to the following effect:

- (i) that title insurance may be underwritten only and may not directly or indirectly be solicited by the insurer from the public;

- (ii) that an application for title insurance may be entertained by the insurer only if received from a solicitor then entitled to practise in the Province of Ontario on behalf of a client of such solicitor.
- (iii) that no policy of title insurance shall be issued unless the insurer has first obtained a concurrent certificate of title of the property to be insured from a solicitor then entitled to practise in the Province of Ontario, and who is not at that time in the employ of the insurer, either directly or indirectly, or (subject to clause (iv) hereof) retained by such insurer for the purpose of giving such certificate;
- (iv) that any expense incurred by the insured in obtaining a further or better certificate of title beyond that obtained from the applicant's solicitor shall be borne by the insurer and not by the applicant and that save as aforesaid the insurer shall not assume or pay the fees of any solicitor entitled to practise in the Province of Ontario for his services in certifying to the title of any property."

Your Committee recommends that no action be taken on paragraph 2(a) (i), (ii), (iii) and (iv).

Paragraph 2(b) of the Carleton Resolution reads as follows:

- "(b) That an amendment be sought to the Solicitors Act for the purpose of prohibiting any person who is not admitted and enrolled and duly qualified to act as a solicitor from applying to himself the words "solicitor" or "Lawyer" alone or in combination with any other word or words and prohibiting any corporation from using either of such words as a part of its corporate name."

Your Committee recommends to Convocation that consideration be given to this recommendation.

Paragraph 3 of the Carleton Resolution reads as follows:

- "3. That the Law Society of Upper Canada be requested

to circulate to all County Law Associations the report to be received by it from its Special Committee on Title Guarantee Companies with respect to the incorporation of a Title Insurance Company by members of the legal profession of Ontario and to request the comments of all such Associations on such report before taking action thereon."

Your Committee in its Report dated November 16, 1956 and adopted by Convocation on that date, stated that it had given some consideration to the question of incorporating a title insurance company by members of the legal profession of Ontario, and had had before it for consideration some valuable information and literature with reference to such companies in the States of Florida and Ohio. Your Committee reported that it was not yet ready to make any recommendation with respect to this proposal.

Having further considered the question of the Society undertaking the incorporation of a title insurance company, your Committee is of the opinion that it would be improper for the Society itself to undertake the organization and ownership of a title insurance company or even be directly instrumental in organizing one. It is the opinion of your Committee that as Convocation is the governing body of the legal profession in Ontario, it is no part of its function to engage in any form of commercial business, and that in doing so Convocation would launch the profession into competition with commercial companies on a basis that would lead to criticism and difficulty. Your Committee believes that this will be the opinion of the great majority of the members of the profession.

With reference to paragraph 3 of the Carleton Resolution, your Committee does not propose to make any such report, and recommends that no action be taken herein. Your Committee, however, sees no objection to the incorporation of a title insurance company by any group of members of the profession.

The matters referred to in the Report had been referred by Convocation to the Special Committee on Title Guarantee Companies, the Unauthorized Practice Committee, and the Discipline Committee respectively.

ORDERED that no further action be taken by Convocation except on the reports of the Committees referred to above.

The Special Committee on Title Guarantee Companies, in its Report adopted by Convocation on April 12th, recommended that consideration be given to that part of the

County of Carleton Law Association recommendation referring to the use of the words "Solicitor" or "Lawyer".

ORDERED that no action be taken on this recommendation as the Unauthorized Practice Committee in its Report also adopted on April 12th, recommended that this same matter be referred for consideration and report to a sub-committee consisting of Messrs. Bell, Creighton, Haines, MacTavish and Sleinin.

LEGAL EDUCATION COMMITTEE—Mr. Jamieson.

Your Committee met on Thursday, 16th May 1957, the following members being present: D. Park Jamieson (Chairman), J. D. Arnup (Vice-Chairman), the Treasurer, and Messrs. Braid, Chitty, Evans, Foster, Gregory, McGillivray, Parkinson, Seaman and Sleinin.

EXAMINING BOARD

At its meeting of January last the Committee recommended the appointment of an Examining Board composed of the Dean, Vice-Dean and a practising barrister and solicitor (to be appointed by the Chairman and Vice-Chairman).

The Dean submits a memorandum. The Chairman reports.

Your Committee recommends that the appointment of Mr. R. J. Roberts, Barrister, as the practising member be approved.

MILLER PRIZE FOR NORTHERN ONTARIO

At its meeting of January last the Committee recommended that the generous offer of Mr. George M. Miller, Q.C. to endow an annual prize of \$100.00 for a student from Northern Ontario be accepted and referred the working out of the details to a Sub-Committee consisting of the Dean and the Chairman and Vice-Chairman.

The Chairman has had further correspondence with Mr. Miller resulting in Mr. Miller's letter of May 3, 1957, enclosing a cheque in the amount of \$3,000.00 to endow a prize to be awarded on the following terms:

"George M. Miller Prize"

A prize of \$100.00 established by George M. Miller, Q.C. of Sudbury, may be awarded each year to the student in the final year who was born in, or who has

resided or whose parents have resided in Northern Ontario during the three years next before the final examination, who, among those eligible, attained the highest mark in the final year examinations.

Northern Ontario is defined for the purposes of this prize as that part of Ontario lying north and west of a line drawn from the Town of Mattawa to the Town of Parry Sound including those Towns.

If for any reason the prize is not awarded in any year, a second George M. Miller Prize may be awarded the next or any succeeding year."

Your Committee recommends that a letter be sent thanking Mr. Miller, and that the \$3,000 received be referred to the Finance Committee for investment.

LAW SCHOOL—PRIZES

Ladies Auxiliary to the Legal Profession of Hamilton

The Dean submits a memorandum regarding the offer of the ladies Auxiliary to make an award of \$100.00 to a student entering his second year law who is from Hamilton and who attended McMaster University. The offer is to make the award yearly until further notice.

The offer has been approved by the Faculty.

The terms of the award, if accepted, would be as follows:

"The Ladies Auxiliary of the Legal Profession of Hamilton provides an annual sum of \$100.00 which may be awarded to the student whose home is, or within the last two years has been, in Hamilton and who attended McMaster University, who attained the highest standing in his First Year at Osgoode Hall Law School and who is entering the Second Year of the Osgoode Hall Law School Course."

Your Committee recommends that the award be approved with an expression of thanks to the Ladies Auxiliary and that a Sub-Committee consisting of Messrs. Gregory, Braid and Parkinson confer with the Dean on the settlement of the exact terms of the award.

CHANGE OF NAME

Louis Hymie Tepper, a student of the 4th year requests that his name be changed to Louis Henry Tepper on the rolls and records of the Society in accordance with the order made by his Honour Samuel Factor, Judge of the County

TAX DEFERRED PENSION PLANS FOR SELF-EMPLOYED

Since the Budget Speech referred to tax deferment on retirement plans for self-employed, the Secretary has received letters from several Canadian life underwriters, from insurance companies and trust companies.

counts of the Law Society of Upper Canada. The Committee recommended that he be struck off the Rolls of the Society.

It was resolved that upon the facts ascertained and appearing by the said Report and the evidence and other papers referred to and submitted to Convocation therewith, Convocation finds the said CARL JOSEPH HERMAN guilty of professional misconduct and of conduct unbecoming a barrister and solicitor in respect of the charges dealt with by the said Report.

REPORTING CONTRACT

On March 13, 1957 your Committee considered a proposal by Cartwright & Sons Limited, publishers of the Ontario

Reports and Ontario Weekly Notes, to lower the price of printing in consideration of their being given a six year extension of the present contract.

The matter was referred to a sub-committee consisting of Messrs. Levinter (Chairman), Parkinson and Walker to investigate the proposal and examine its implications in relation to the terms of the present contract, and to report back.

The sub-committee reported on April 1, 1957, recommending that the proposal be accepted.

Your Committee recommended that the report of the sub-committee be approved and adopted, subject to the extension of the contract to December 31, 1965 instead of December 31, 1967; and subject to the settlement of a new contract satisfactory to Mr. C. H. Walker, Q.C. for the Society.

The Report was adopted by Convocation on May 17, 1957.

Your Committee recommends that the new contract as drawn by Mr. C. H. Walker, Q.C., pursuant to the above Report, be approved and executed.

LIBRARY COMMITTEE — Mr. Common

UNAUTHORIZED PRACTICE COMMITTEE—Mr. Walsh

Your Committee met on the 21st day of June 1957, the following members being present: Messrs. Walsh (Chairman), Creighton (Vice-Chairman), Ball, Bell, Braid, Clement, Evans, Haines, Levinter, Raney, Seaman, Seymour, Slein, Weir and Willmott.

AUTOMOBILE CLUBS — *Legal Benefits*

This matter was referred to a sub-committee composed of Messrs. Weir (Chairman), Haines and Levinter, and the Report of the sub-committee was before your Committee on this date. The Report concludes, in part, as follows:

“Your Committee is therefore of the view that these organizations are encroaching on the practice of law It is recommended that this question be referred to the legal advisor for the Standing Committee.

Your sub-committee is also of the opinion that solicitors acting for these organization are assisting these organizations to unlawfully ‘sell’ legal services. It is therefore considered advisable to refer this question to the Discipline Committee who might if they felt so advised, notify the profession that it is improper to act under general or even special retainers from any of these organizations or similar organizations.”

Your Committee recommends that the Report of the Sub-Committee be referred to Mr. C. H. Walker, Q.C. for consideration and report; and that he be requested to reconsider the previous opinions of Mr. J. L. (now Mr. Justice) McLennan and himself; and to consider the material submitted by the sub-committee and to consider if action may be taken against these Automobile Clubs.

Your Committee also recommends that a copy of the Report of the sub-committee be referred to the Discipline Committee.

THE REPORT WAS ADOPTED.

COUNTY LIBRARIES COMMITTEE

At the request of the Vice-Chairman, Mr. Evans presented the Report.

PUBLIC RELATIONS COMMITTEE — Mr. Gregory

To the Benchers of The Law Society of Upper Canada

Your Committee met on Thursday, the 20th June 1957 at 3:30 p.m. in Convocation Room. There were present: Mr. Gregory (Chairman), the Treasurer and Messrs. Ball, Jamieson and Weir.

Film — "The Medical Witness"

An American moving picture designed to illustrate the desirability of co-operation between counsel and medical witnesses for the purpose of effective presentation in court of medical evidence was being made available for showing in Ontario. The suggestion was now made that the Committee might arrange for an explanatory memorandum to be sent with the film and for a local trial counsel to introduce it to audiences in Ontario.

Your Committee approves the principle of co-operation with the Company distributing this film, in the ways suggested.

THE REPORT WAS ADOPTED.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON LAW SCHOOL— The Treasurer

Furniture

Your Committee met immediately after last Convocation and on two further occasions in the lower classroom to examine and consider samples of lecture room and cafeteria furniture, and to give instructions to the architects with regard to these.

Your Committee met again at 5:15 p.m. on Thursday the 20th instant in Convocation Room. There were present the Treasurer (Chairman) and Messrs. Gregory, Jamieson, Parkinson and R. F. Wilson.

At the invitation of your Committee Mr. A. S. Mathers, the architect, attended the meeting and presented layouts, specifications, prices and samples of the furniture recommended for all the rooms in the new building. Having discussed this matter in detail your Committee authorized the necessary expenditure for furnishing the addition, and deferred authorization of certain further expenditures pending receipt of further information.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON COURT HOUSE ACCOMMODATION, ONTARIO—Mr. Creighton

At the meeting of Convocation on January 21st, 1954, it was resolved that the Treasurer appoint a special committee to consider the question of court house accommodation throughout the Province, and report back. The Treasurer appointed the following Special Committee on Court House Accommodation, Ontario: Messrs. Common, Creighton, McGillivray, Parkinson, Sedgwick, Weir and R. F. Wilson.

Mr. Parkinson was elected Chairman, and Mr. R. F. Wilson, Vice-Chairman.

In May 1956 they were succeeded at their own request by Mr. Creighton and Mr. McGillivray, respectively.

Your Committee met on several occasions and considered at length the general policy governing court houses across the entire Province, including the arrangements for the administration of court houses in the northern districts. The Chairman and Vice-Chairman of your Committee met with the then Attorney-General, the Honourable Dana Porter, and

were invited by him to submit a resolution defining the position of the Society. Your Committee at one time considered a draft resolution which suggested that the administration of justice would be better served if the Province owned, maintained and operated the court houses in the Counties. This resolution did not meet with unanimous support as some members of the Committee took the view that the problem was a very complex one involving the fiscal relationship of the Province to the Counties in the various phases of administration of justice. It was also considered that the problem involved certain difficulties arising out of the ownership and management of the court houses by the County Councils and the location in the court houses of the local county administrative offices. A Committee of the Judges of the Supreme Court of Ontario, having been named by the Chief Justice, met with the members of your Committee and some of its members expressed the same concern about the difficulties involved in the relationship to the Counties.

In its report to Convocation on October 20th, 1955, your Committee said in part:

“It is conceded that the Court House situation in the Districts is, generally speaking, superior to the situation in the Counties. It was pointed out, however, that in the Districts the Province has started from scratch—and is not involved in any local or fiscal problems with the municipalities concerned.

There was a very full discussion concerning the way in which the problems of the Counties’ interest in and responsibility in respect of the physical accommodations of the Court Houses are complicated by the exceedingly involved fiscal system surrounding the administration of justice and the use of the buildings in varying degrees for other County purposes.

It seemed apparent to the meeting that no general policy in respect of Court Houses should be decided upon until a survey of the physical aspects of the Court Houses and all the implications of the fiscal system in each individual County has been made.”

The Honourable Kelso Roberts having in the meantime been appointed Attorney-General, was invited to meet with the members of the Judges’ and Bencher’s Committee, and

in September, 1955, such a meeting was held which was well attended, and included in addition to the Attorney-General, the Deputy Attorney-General and Mr. H. H. Donald, Q.C. As a result of this meeting the Attorney-General said he would consider the creation of an investigating body to report on the matter, including a report on the physical condition of the individual court houses and the local problems involved throughout the various counties, and your Committee was invited to submit a draft of the terms of reference of such a body.

In November, 1955 the proposed terms of reference having been approved by your Committee and the Committee of Judges, were submitted to Convocation and were adopted and forwarded to the Attorney-General, who acknowledged our communication, stating that the matter was continuing to receive study in his office. Early in 1956 the Attorney-General made a public announcement that a review was being made by the Government of the administration of justice in Ontario, including the operation of local offices and court houses. This step seems to have been due substantially to the representation by the Judges' and Benchers' Committees, although in some measure it seems also have been due to the Canadian Bar Association, which had considered a resolution for the appointment of a Royal Commission on the same subject and had had some discussion in its council with the Attorney-General.

The Attorney-General's Committee was set up and included the following members of Convocation: Messrs. Arnup, Common, Jamieson and McGillivray. Mr. H. F. Parkinson was invited to attend the meetings of the Committee, and later Mr. T. K. Creighton, as Chairman of this Committee, was asked by the Attorney-General to become a member of this Committee and acted as such through the balance of its deliberations.

This Committee met in four sessions in the Attorney-General's office and dealt with a wide range of subjects. It received a report prepared by the Attorney General's staff on the condition of courthouse accommodation through the Province, and gave some consideration to the problem of methods required to improve this accommodation. While the proceedings of the Committee were confidential it is con-

sidered permissible to say that some indication was given that the problem of court house accommodation was receiving serious and favourable consideration by the proper officials of the Government. The proceedings of the Law Society's Committee were allowed to stand without further action pending what it was hoped would be some specific action by the Government.

We are obliged to report, however, that at the final meeting of the Committee it became apparent that the government's decision was to make certain additional grants to municipalities which, in effect, would approximate their cost payable by the counties of the administration of justice, leaving the administration to be carried on as before with this assistance from the Province. This change is effected by the amendment made this year to The Municipal Unconditional Grants Act 1953, by adding to the schedule the following:

Part I

To assist each municipality in Ontario, the taxpayers of which contribute through municipal taxes toward the cost of the administration of justice in a county, by way of unconditional grant:

\$1.00 per capita

In view of this the Government appears to feel that the responsibility for the condition of court houses continues to be that of the county municipalities, and that these municipalities now receiving additional government assistance are in a financial position which should permit them to assume these responsibilities without undue burden.

Because of this changed attitude of the Government, the Committee feels that there is no purpose to be served by making further representations at this time.

The conclusion of the Committee therefore is that if the problem is to be advanced it will now be done on the level of the local county administration, and the local law associations should be encouraged to make representations to the county councils in accordance with the specific needs of their respective local situations.

Your Committee therefore recommends that it be discharged.

Moved by Mr. Creighton, seconded by Mr. Sedgwick, that the Report be adopted.

Moved in amendment by Mr. Jamieson, seconded by Mr. Arnup, that the whole matter of Court House Accommodation, Ontario, be referred back to the Special Committee for further consideration.

The amendment was unanimously carried.

The motion as amended was carried.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON CONTINUING EDUCATION OF THE BAR — Mr. Gregory

Your Committee met on the 21st June, 1957, the following members being present: Messrs. Gregory (Chairman), Haines (Vice-Chairman) and Jamieson. Mr. Bell was present by request.

SPECIAL LECTURES 1957

The total number registered for the special course of lectures on Estate Planning was 372. This number included 25 representatives each of the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Ontario and the Canadian Life Underwriters Association. Of the 322 members of the profession registered, 113 or approximately 35% were from outside the Toronto Metropolitan Area.

Buffet luncheons which have become a regular part of the course, were held on each Saturday.

Arrangements were made with Richard DeBoo Limited for the printing of the lectures, and copies have now been distributed to all those registered for the course.

Copies are also supplied to the County Law Associations and to law students at the Osgoode Hall Law School at special prices. The general sale price is \$12.50 per volume.

SPECIAL LECTURES 1958

During the 1957 lectures, copies of a questionnaire were distributed to those in attendance, with a request that subjects for a future course be indicated. 32 replies were received with the following main choices:

In view of the demand for these volumes from the Refresher Course of 1945 on, Richard DeBoo is considering re-editing and re-printing these lectures in loose leaf form.

Your Committee approves of the publication of a Cumulative Index as suggested by Richard DeBoo Limited; and recommends that the proposal for re-editing and re-printing the Special Lectures from 1945 on, stand for further information.

STANDING COMMITTEE

About two years ago your Committee recommended the discharge of the Special Committee, and the appointment of a Standing Committee on Continuing Education of the Bar. The recommendation was referred to the Special Committee on Revision of Rules, and no action has been taken.

Your Committee again recommends that the Special Committee be discharged, and that a Standing Committee on Continuing Education be appointed; and that the necessary rules be amended.

LEGAL AID CLINIC — TORONTO — *Social Workers*

In June 1957 and on previous occasions R. H. Sankey, Q.C., an active clinic worker, suggested consideration of having a trained social worker present and available for consultation at all clinics. With the approval of the Chairman the Provincial Director has been in correspondence with The Toronto Welfare Council and the Social Planning Council of Metropolitan Toronto. On September 12th the Secretary of the Family and Child Welfare Division wrote the Provincial Director, in part, as follows:

“Miss Philpott requested me to reply to your letter of September 10th, as the Family & Child Welfare Division has been working on possible arrangements for volunteer social workers to serve at the Legal Aid Clinic.

We are pleased to report that we anticipate having eight or nine social workers available in the event that the Legal Aid Committee approves the proposed plan. The volunteers are largely from the Family Agencies, including the Public Welfare Department.

We will await further action until we know the decision of the Committee. If it is favourable, we can then work

out a schedule for the social workers in co-operation with you.”

Your Committee approves of these arrangements, and wishes to express its sincere thanks and appreciation to the Welfare Council of Metropolitan Toronto and the Social Planning Council and the workers involved for their ready assistance and co-operation.

THE REPORT WAS ADOPTED.

ADMISSIONS COMMITTEE — Mr. Jamieson.

Your Committee's first meeting was held on Thursday, the 19th September 1957 at 2 p.m. in the Discipline Committee Room. There were present Messrs. Arnup, Creighton, Jamieson, Robinette and Wilson, R. F. On Motion made and seconded, Mr. Jamieson was appointed Chairman and Mr. Arnup, Vice-Chairman.

1. REPEAL OF S. 11 (1) (a) of *Solicitors Act*.

Your Committee met at 8:30 p.m., Monday, 9th September, 1957, in Convocation Room. There were present the Treasurer (in the Chair) and Messrs. Arnup, Gregory, Jamieson, Robinette and R. F. Wilson. At your Committee's request, Messrs. Mathers, Haldenby and Brown attended the meeting.

3. CHESTNUT STREET SIDEWALK

During the summer word has been received that plans for the new civic square showed a reduction of the width of the sidewalk and boulevard on the west side of Chestnut Street from 20 to 12 feet. The Society's architects recommended a width of at least 50 feet. Mr. Robinette and Mr. Wilson were appointed a Special Sub-Committee to take this question up immediately with the appropriate civic authorities.

Your Committee met again on Wednesday, September 18th, at 5:30 p.m. in Convocation Room. There were present, the Treasurer (in the Chair) and Messrs. Arnup, Gregory, Jamieson, Parkinson, Robinette and R. F. Wilson. Mr. Mathers and Mr. Brown were present by invitation.

CHESTNUT STREET

SPECIAL REFERENCE ON A TAXATION PROBLEM

In July 1957 Messrs. Robinson, McCallum & McKerracher, Barristers and Solicitors of Hamilton, Ontario, wrote the

Secretary with reference to a demand from the Taxation Division of the Department of National Revenue to render reports on payments to or on behalf of clients outside Canada, and to pay a non-resident tax of 15% on the interest portion of such payment. The solicitors stated they were reluctant to do so because they feared a breach by them of their clients' privilege, and they asked the advice of the Law Society.

The matter was referred by the Treasurer to Messrs. J. J. Robinette and R. F. Wilson for consideration and report to September Convocation.

Mr. Robinette reported orally that he and Mr. R. F. Wilson had carefully considered the provisions of The Income Tax Act, and they doubt if in the circumstances referred to there is any such duty to clients. The Act prescribes a procedure whereby a lawyer who claims that there is a solicitor-client privilege in relation to demands made by the income tax authorities, may have the question summarily disposed of by a judge. Mr. Robinette stated that he and Mr. Wilson were of the opinion that the problem was not an ethical one but a legal one, and if the solicitors are in doubt they should seek the advice of counsel.

Moved by Mr. Robinette, seconded by Mr. R. F. Wilson, that Convocation take no further action in the matter.

Carried.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

DISCIPLINE COMMITTEE — *Ethics* — *Solicitors' Tariffs*

Mr. Sedgwick, the Chairman, reminded Convocation that the Discipline Committee report in this matter, as revised, was approved by the Discipline Committee on June 7, 1957, and was presented to Convocation on June 21st. It was directed that consideration of the Report stand to the September meeting of Convocation, and that a copy of the Report be sent to all Benchers and to all County and District Law Associations. This was done, and two replies only had been received, one from L. M. Ball, Q.C., and one from the Secretary of the Hamilton Law Association expressing unanimous approval of the Trustees of the Association.

A letter was also received from the Honourable Mr. Justice Stewart.

At a meeting on October 4, 1957 the Discipline Committee again considered the Report, and the correspondence subsequent to June 21, 1957, and recommended that the Report in its present form be again presented to Convocation.

The Chairman read the three letters referred to above, and reminded Convocation that the Report had been read on June 21st and a copy sent to all Benchers. Further reading of the Report was dispensed with.

Moved by Mr. Sedgwick, seconded by R. F. Wilson, that the Report be adopted.

Moved in amendment by Mr. Ball, seconded by Mr. MacLaren, that the following paragraph be added to the Report:

"It is recognized that where a County Law Association has established a tariff of fees, such Law Association may cancel the membership of any solicitor who consistently violates it."

The amendment was carried.

The Report as amended was adopted.

The DISCIPLINE COMMITTEE begs leave to report as follows:

RE ETHICS — SOLICITORS TARIFFS

At the meeting of Convocation on June 21, 1956 Mr. Sedgwick read the correspondence arising from a panel discussion on Ethics at the Mid-Winter Meeting of the Ontario Section of the Canadian Bar Association. The Panel had discussed, in part, the subject of Conveyancing Tariffs, and the remarks of some members of the panel were questioned. It was resolved that the subject of Conveyancing Tariffs as presently established by some County and District Law Associations, be referred back to the Discipline Committee for consideration and report.

Convocation asked the Discipline Committee to consider and report on the question of the adherence by solicitors to established tariffs of fees, with particular reference to two matters:

1. Is it proper for a solicitor to enter into an agreement establishing minimum tariffs; and
2. Where a solicitor has signed such an agreement and breaks it, is it professional misconduct?

Rule 2 of the English Solicitors Practice Rules 1936 reads in part:

“A solicitor shall not hold himself out or allow himself to be held out directly or indirectly and whether or not by name as being prepared to do professional business in contentious matters at less than the scale fixed by Rules of Court *and in non-contentious matters, at less than the scale of charge (if any) prevailing in the district in which the solicitor practices.*”

Of this rule the Council of the Law Society has said:

“A solicitor does not, in the Council’s view, ‘hold himself out’ within the meaning of those words in the rule, to a bona fide client of his in respect of that client’s own business, so that if he agrees with a client to do that client’s work at a special fee and the circumstances justify it there is no infringement of the rule.”

On November 13, 1956 the Honourable A. Kelso Roberts, Q.C., Attorney-General of Ontario, wrote the Secretary enclosing copy of a letter of October 25, 1956 from J. F. C.

Whalley, Q.C., to the Honourable Leslie M. Frost, Q.C., Prime Minister, with reference to solicitors' tariffs, and suggesting consideration of appropriate legislation.

At the meeting of Convocation on March 15, 1957, following the presentation of the Unauthorized Practice Committee Report, Mr. Creighton referred to a letter of March 13, 1957 from R. A. Bell, Q.C. to the Secretary, and copies of the enclosed Reports of a Special Committee of the County of Carleton Law Association and certain resolutions of the Association dealing with Title Insurance Companies and other matters, including "Enforcement of County Solicitors Tariffs". It was resolved, in part, that the last subject be referred to the Discipline Committee.

Your Committee met on April 5, 1957, the following members being present: Messrs. Sedgwick, Chairman, F. R. Wilson, Vice-Chairman, Arnup, Common, Martin, McGillivray and P. D. Wilson. Your Committee met again on June 7th when the above members were present, and also Messrs. Creighton and Seymour. Your Committee considered —

- (1) A report drafted by the Chairman, the Vice-Chairman and Mr. Arnup with reference to the subject, "Ethics — Solicitors' Tariffs" as referred to your Committee by Convocation in June 1956;
- (2) The correspondence from the Honourable the Attorney-General and J. F. C. Whalley, Q.C.
- (3) The correspondence from the County of Carleton Law Association.

Your Committee present at the meetings on April 5th and June 7th, 1957 unanimously agreed on the following statement of policy, and recommends it to Convocation :

- (1) That it is ethical for County Law Associations to establish a tariff of fees;
- (2) That an inflexible tariff which does not in itself allow for deviation in proper cases, should be discouraged;
- (3) That the Discipline Committee is not prepared to recommend enactment of any rule providing that a mere breach of a tariff is in itself a disciplinary offence;
- (4) That holding himself out or allowing himself to be held out as prepared to do professional business at fees less than the appropriate scale prevailing in the area in

which he practises, is unprofessional conduct on the part of a solicitor;

- (5) That this matter is not at the present time one for legislative action;
- (6) That it is not practicable for the Discipline Committee in the first instance to investigate alleged breaches of the principle set out in paragraph (4), but that such breaches should first be investigated by the local association, which in its discretion could make a report to the Discipline Committee setting out the facts ascertained by the Association.
- (7) It is recognized that where a County Law Association has established a tariff of fees, such Law Association may cancel the membership of any solicitor who consistently violates it.

The position of the west entrance ramps to the underground garage had been settled for some time, but the question whether a roadway should be maintained to the west thereof remained unsettled. If no such roadway was to be provided, access to the Society's east vehicular gate would be cut off, but from the east wall of Osgoode Hall to the west side of the entrance ramps, some 38 feet, would be greensward. Whether the roadway or the greensward was provided appeared to depend, at least partly, on the Society's view. The Society's insurance brokers had stated that the closing of the east gate would have no effect on the insurance rates.

Your Committee recommends that the City be informed that the Society would prefer the greensward to the road way and would be reluctantly willing, if necessary, to give up access to the east vehicular gate, for this purpose.

OFFICIAL OPENING

Your Committee recommends that an official opening and reception in connection with it be held in Osgoode Hall, to be arranged by your Committee.

Moved by Mr. Arnup, seconded by Mr. Robinette, that the Report be adopted.

Carried.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON FINANCES—Mr. Gregory

Your Committee met on the 16th day of October 1957, the following members being present: Messrs. Gregory (Chairman), the Treasurer, Arnup, Robinette, and R. F. Wilson.

LAW SCHOOL—RENTAL

In its Report dated June 20, 1957 your Committee recommended that the Law Society retain the National Trust Company Limited to give an opinion on the proper rental to be charged by the Law Society for the premises and equipment used by the Law School; and in particular do this for the year ending June 30, 1957 so that a proper rental may be charged for that year instead of the token rental previously charged.

The National Trust Company Limited was so instructed, and presented a Report dated June 21, 1957 setting out in detail the yearly rental to be charged for those portions of the Law Society's buildings used by the Law School. Pursuant to a recommendation in the Report, Mr. Bowley of Frank Waddington was retained to make an appraisal of the furniture and equipment in those portions of the Law Society's buildings used by the Law School. Mr. Bowley reported on October 15, 1957.

Your Committee recommends approval of the yearly rentals as reported by the National Trust Company Limited and Mr. Bowley of Frank Waddington, and has recommended to the Society's auditors the proportion of these yearly rentals which shall be charged to the Law School.

Your Committee recommends that it be discharged.

THE REPORT WAS ADOPTED.

REMEMBRANCE DAY SERVICE

The Treasurer reminded Convocation that in October 1956 consideration had been given to a letter from the Honourable Mr. Justice Gibson with reference to a proposed Remembrance Day Service to be held on Armistice Day at the Law Society's Second War Memorial. The matter had been referred to a Special Committee composed of Messrs. Cassels and McGillivray, and a simple and dignified order of service had been arranged for Friday, November 9th, 1956 at 10:45 a.m.

Ordered that a similar service be held this year, and that the matter be referred again to Messrs. Cassels and McGillivray.

CORRESPONDENCE

The Treasurer read a letter of October 8, 1957 from the Honourable J. C. McRuer, Chief Justice of the High Court, with reference to the use of Osgoode Hall Court Rooms.

Ordered that the matter be referred, with power to act, to a Special Committee to be appointed by the Treasurer.

The Treasurer appointed a Special Committee on Osgoode Hall Court Rooms consisting of Messrs. Arnup, Robinette and R. P. Wilson.

The Treasurer read a Petition for Reinstatement by *Ralph Vrooman Mark*.

Ordered that the matter be referred to the Discipline Committee for consideration and report.

NOTICE OF MOTION

Mr. Arnup gave notice that at the next meeting of Convocation he would move that Rule 22 be repealed.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE, THE INCORPORATED FOUNDATION
OF THE BAR OF ONTARIO

Mr. Cassels, Chairman, presented the Report of the Special Committee:

At the meeting of Convocation on May 20, 1954 the Treasurer read a letter of May 19, 1954 from the office of the Deputy Provincial Secretary with reference to the application for incorporation of "The Incorporated Foundation of the Bar of Ontario", asking if the Law Society had any objection to the granting of the incorporation. It was resolved that the matter be referred to a special committee to be appointed by the Treasurer, and that a copy of the letter be sent to each Bench. The Treasurer appointed the following special committee herein: Messrs. Arnup, Cassels, Gregory, H. C. Walker and R. F. Wilson.

Your Committee first met on June 2, 1954 when Mr.

Cassels was elected Chairman, and Mr. J. L. Stewart, Q.C. was retained to advise the Committee on the many legal matters involved.

Your Committee has met on numerous occasions since that date, and on most occasions Mr. Stewart was present. In view of the many eminent members of the Bar whose names appear in the petition, your Committee has given the matter most careful consideration.

On March 15, 1957 Mr. Cassels, Chairman, presented a report prepared before the announcement on March 1, 1957 of the organization of "The Foundation of the Bar of Ontario"; a memorandum dated March 13, 1957 from Mr. S. E. Weir to Mr. W. P. Gregory; and a second Report of the Special Committee dated March 15, 1957.

The first Report referred to the provision in the Law Society Act for the establishment of "The Law Benevolent Fund", and expressed the opinion that such a fund, if established, should be a matter for the profession as a whole to support, and should not be carried on as a private venture.

The Committee recommended that the Law Society inform the Deputy Provincial Secretary that it is opposed to the application now before him, and that objection be taken to the proposed name.

The second Report did not alter the opinion and recommendation set out above.

It was ordered that consideration of the Reports stand to a meeting when Mr. Weir was present.

On May 17, 1957 Mr. Cassels again read the two Reports which were presented to Convocation in March, and a letter of May 3, 1957 from Mr. Weir, and it was ordered that the matter be referred back to the Special Committee for consultation with Mr. Weir on all matters arising out of the two Reports and Mr. Weir's letter.

Since that date the matter has been further considered by your Committee in consultation with Mr. Weir, the Deputy Provincial Secretary, and Mr. J. L. Stewart, Q.C., counsel to your Committee. During the discussion it was suggested that consideration might be given to the name, "The Law Foundation".

Your Committee met on November 15, 1957, the follow-

ing members being present: Messrs. Cassels, Chairman, Arnup and R. F. Wilson.

Mr. Weir was present by request.

Your Committee is of the opinion that a corporation of the kind proposed is not one for organization and supervision by the Law Society, and your Committee now sees no reason why the organizers of the proposed plan should not proceed with the incorporation if they so decide.

Your Committee, in consultation with Mr. Weir, have approved of the name, "The Incorporated Law Foundation".

Your Committee recommends

1. That the Secretary be instructed to inform the Deputy Provincial Secretary that the Society has no objection to the incorporation proposed under the name, "The Incorporated Law Foundation".
2. That the Special Committee be discharged.

THE REPORT WAS ADOPTED.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE — REMEMBRANCE DAY SERVICES

Mr. Cassels, Chairman, reported orally and reminded Convocation that at its October meeting Convocation ordered that a service similar to that of last year be held, and that the matter be referred again to Messrs. Cassels and McGilivray. He stated that a simple and dignified order of service had been held on Thursday, November 7th, at 10:45 a.m. at the First World War Memorial in the Great Library, and was well attended by members of the profession and public.

LEGAL EDUCATION COMMITTEE—Mr. Jamieson.

Your Committee met on Thursday, 14th November 1957, the following members being present: D. Park Jamieson (Chairman), J. D. Arnup (Vice-Chairman) and Messrs. Evans, Gregory, McLaughlin, Parkinson, Robinette and Weir.

1. LAW SCHOOL — *Lecturer in Municipal Law*

At its September meeting the Committee accepted Mr. Joy's resignation and referred the appointment of a new lecturer to the Chairman and Vice-Chairman. The Chairman and Vice-Chairman have appointed Mr. W. R. Callow, Barrister of the City Solicitor's office of the City of Toronto. Mr. Callow has accepted the appointment.

2. BURSARIES — *Report of Committee*

By letter dated November 8, 1957, Mr. Bernard Weinberg, Q.C. of Toronto, encloses his cheque in the Society's favour in the amount of \$500 to be placed in the Samuel and Rebecca Weinberg Bursary Fund which was established as a result of Mr. Weinberg's gift of \$1,000 in January, 1954. Since that time three Bursaries of \$200 each have been awarded up to the end of 1956.

Your Committee recommends that Mr. Weinberg's generous gift be acknowledged with thanks.

5. CALENDAR

It has been suggested that the Law School calendar be

expanded, and contain photographs, particularly of the addition.

Your Committee recommends that the faculty be authorized to prepare and submit a draft calendar of the type suggested, with an estimate of cost.

FINANCE COMMITTEE—Mr. Robinette.

Your Committee met on the 13th November, 1957, the following members being present: Messrs. Robinette (Chairman), R. F. Wilson (Vice-Chairman), Foster, Gregory and Levinter.

REMOVAL FROM THE ROLLS AND RECORDS—*United States Citizen*

John Ernest Moffatt Hancock was called to the Bar and admitted as a solicitor on September 16, 1937. "He has not practised for many years", and became a citizen of the United States on September 24, 1957. He asked that his name be removed from the rolls and records of this Society at his own request.

Your Committee therefore recommends that as John Ernest Moffatt Hancock is no longer a British subject and a Canadian citizen, his name be removed from the rolls and records of the Society at his own request, and that proper notice be given to this effect.

DISCIPLINE COMMITTEE

RE: CHESTER JOHN SARICH

Mr. Sedgwick, Chairman, presented the Report of the Discipline Committee:

The Committee reported that after due inquiry it found the solicitor was guilty of professional misconduct and of conduct unbecoming a barrister and solicitor in that he improperly used or misappropriated trust funds belonging to clients. The Committee recommended that he be struck off the rolls of the Society.

Moved by Mr. Sedgwick, seconded by Mr. R. F. Wilson, that the Report be adopted.

The solicitor did not attend, nor was he represented by counsel.

The motion was carried.

The Report of the Discipline Committee in the matter of CHESTER JOHN SARICH, Barrister, a member of this Society and a Solicitor of the Supreme Court of Ontario, was adopted.

It was resolved that upon the facts ascertained and appearing by the said Report and the evidence and other papers referred to and submitted to Convocation therewith, Convocation finds the said CHESTER JOHN SARICH guilty of professional misconduct and of conduct unbecoming a Barrister and Solicitor in respect of the charges dealt with by the said Report.

THAT the said CHESTER JOHN SARICH be disbarred.

THAT the said CHESTER JOHN SARICH is unworthy to practice as a Solicitor.

Moved by Mr. Sedgwick, seconded by Mr. R. F. Wilson, that Mr. W. J. Beaton, Q.C. be appointed to the Discipline Committee.

Carried.

LIBRARY COMMITTEE—Mr. Common.

Your Committee authorized payment of the accounts submitted and the purchase of certain books for the library.

UNAUTHORIZED PRACTICE COMMITTEE—

Your Committee met on the 15th day of November 1957, the following members being present: Mr. Walsh (Chairman), Mr. Creighton (Vice-Chairman), and Messrs. Ball,

Brooks, Clement, Evans, Levinter, MacLaren, Raney, Slein, Weir and Willmott.

Re: John Joseph Sullivan, Hamilton

It was brought to the attention of the Unauthorized Practice Committee that John Joseph Sullivan of Hamilton, Ontario, who was disbarred and struck off the Rolls on the 19th day of April, 1956, was still using a letterhead on which he was described as "Barrister and Solicitor", and that he was so listed in the telephone directory for the City of Hamilton.

After due enquiry by counsel for the Committee, and consideration of his report, it was directed that proceedings be taken, and a charge was laid against Mr. Sullivan for holding himself out as, or representing himself to be a solicitor. The trial was heard before Magistrate Hopkins at Hamilton on October 21st and November 4th, 1957. At the conclusion of argument, the Magistrate found Mr. Sullivan guilty, and suspended sentence.

Your Committee recommends that a notice to the above effect be printed in the Ontario Weekly Notes.

Notaries Public, Conveyances, Etc.

Your Committee had before it correspondence with reference to four incidents which might indicate unauthorized practice.

Your Committee recommends that they be referred to Mr. C. H. Walker, Q.C. for consideration and report.

THE REPORT WAS ADOPTED.

COUNTY LIBRARIES COMMITTEE—Mr. Clement.

Your Committee met on the 15th day of November 1957, the following members being present: Mr. Clement (Vice-Chairman), and Messrs. Ball, Brooks, Creighton, Evans, MacLaren, Raney, Slein, Weir and Willmott.

Annual Grant

Your Committee reports that the Waterloo County Law Association, having failed to file its annual returns within

three months from the 15th day of January 1957, has now filed its annual returns for the year 1956 and otherwise complied with the rules adopted from time to time relating to county law libraries and recommends that a grant be made to this association of \$1969.33.

Rule 58(3) (d)

Section 3, sub-section (d) of Rule 58, the rule providing for the establishment of county law libraries, reads as follows:

“(3) It shall be provided by the Constitution of the Association that

(d) The prescribed annual and other fees shall not exceed for those members of the profession who do not keep offices in the county town or in the town in which the library is kept, one-half of the amount fixed for those who do keep offices in such county town or town.”

Your Committee recommends that this sub-section be repealed.

CONTINUING EDUCATION COMMITTEE—Mr. Gregory.

Your Committee met on the 14th day of November 1957, the following members being present: Messrs. Gregory (Chairman), Haines (Vice-Chairman) and Mr. Jamieson. Mr. Arnup was present by request.

Special Lectures 1958

Your Committee in its report of October 17th recommended that special courses of lectures be held on two week-ends, March 7th and 8th, and March 14th and 15th, 1958. This

is confirmed, but the subjects of the two courses have been changed to — ASSESSMENT OF DAMAGES FOR PERSONAL INJURIES, and EXPROPRIATION AND COMPENSATION.

Mr. Haines and Mr. Arnup respectively submitted an outline of the two courses and some of the suggested lecturers.

Your Committee recommends approval, and detailed information will be given to the profession at a later date.

Your Committee recommends that buffet luncheons be held on each Saturday for those members of the profession registered, and that the registration fee be \$15.00.

Your Committee authorizes the Secretary to make a brief announcement in the Ontario Weekly Notes forthwith.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON LAW SCHOOL—

The Treasurer

Your Committee met on Thursday, November 14th, at 5:00 p.m. in Convocation Room. There were present: The Treasurer (Chairman) and Messrs. Arnup, Gregory, Jamieson, Parkinson, Robinette and R. F. Wilson. Mr. H. F. Brown of Mathers & Haldenby, Architects, was present by invitation.

Your Committee considered and gave instructions to the architects on a number of matters relating to the construction of the addition to the law school and alterations to existing buildings made necessary by the new construction.

CIVIC SQUARE

Mr. Robinette submitted a letter he had received from the

City Traffic Engineer, containing the latter's firm opinion that a vehicular right-of-way should be maintained between the ramps at the entrance to the underground garage, and the east side of Osgoode Hall, and stating that this had been approved in principle by the Committee on Traffic and Legislation. This opinion was contrary to that expressed by the other civic officials Mr. Robinette had approached. In view of this apparent disagreement and the necessity of maintaining an adequate boulevard on the east side of Osgoode Hall, Mr. Robinette had written again to the officials concerned, and your Committee recommends that Mr. Robinette speak again to the General Manager of the Parking Authority and, if necessary, to the members of the Board of Control.

Moved by Mr. Jamieson, seconded by Mr. Robinette, that the Report be adopted.

Carried.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE, OSGOODE HALL COURT ROOMS—Mr. Arnup

1. On October 8th, 1957, the Chief Justice of the High Court wrote to the Treasurer as follows:

"For some years the Government of Ontario, with the concurrence of the Law Society of Upper Canada, has permitted the Toronto Non-Jury Court to sit at Osgoode Hall. This has enabled us to have three Judges assigned for Non-Jury Courts in Toronto.

I am advised that some additional accommodation has now been provided at the City Hall by removal of the Division Court from the City Hall to the Registry Office Building and equipping another small court room. These rooms are known as Court Rooms Nos. 7 and 9. Neither room provides proper accommodation for a sitting of the High Court of Justice for Ontario. In fact, there is no other County Town in Ontario where the Judges of the Supreme Court are asked to sit in rooms of the character that are being provided in the City of Toronto. Court

Room No. 9 has no retiring room for the Judge and it would necessarily follow that whenever the Judge wished to see counsel to discuss any matter he would have to go to a room on another floor which now provides accommodation for two Supreme Court Judges.

Court Room No. 7 has a retiring room but Judge Forsyth is anxious to have this for the use of County Judges who may come in from the outside counties to assist in the work in Toronto.

If the Judges may continue to use a court room at Osgoode Hall indefinitely I would be prepared to accede to Judge Forsyth's request for the use of Court Room No. 7 while the Supreme Court Judges might use Court Room No. 9 for those weeks when accommodation is not available at Osgoode Hall, or when sufficient Judges are available to provide for four sittings of the Toronto Non-Jury Court.

My reason for writing to you is to know the views of the Law Society of Upper Canada about the continued use of a room at Osgoode Hall for sittings of the Toronto Non-Jury Court, provided that the Province of Ontario concurs. It would appear that we cannot expect a new Court House before at least five or six years."

2. At the meeting of Convocation on October 18th, 1957, it was resolved that the matter be referred to a Special Committee to be appointed by the Treasurer, and on that day the Treasurer appointed Messrs. Arnup, Robinette and R. F. Wilson.

3. Your Committee has attended upon the Chief Justice of the High Court, and has discussed this matter with him at some length.

4. Your Committee recommends that Convocation authorize the Treasurer to write to the Chief Justice of the High Court in the terms of the letter attached.

My dear Chief Justice:

Your letter of October 8th addressed to me as Treasurer was read at Convocation on October 18th, and Messrs. Arnup, Robinette and R. F. Wilson were appointed a Committee to deal with the matter. That Committee reported to Convocation on November 15th.

I am instructed by Convocation to advise you that it is the desire of The Law Society that the use of any courts at Osgoode Hall for trial court purposes should be discontinued as soon as possible, but at the same time it is recognized that in view of the present deplorable state of court room accommodation in the City of Toronto, the administration of justice in this city would be prejudiced if the use of one court at Osgoode Hall for trial purposes was brought to an end at the present time.

Accordingly, while desiring to reiterate that it does not regard the present arrangement as a happy one in view of the fact that Osgoode Hall was not designed and is not suitable for trial court purposes, the Society does not think it would be proper to terminate the arrangement immediately.

In its report of November 15, 1957 this Committee recommended that a notice as suggested be published in the main foreign language papers, and that the notice be drafted by Mr. Levinter and the Secretary and submitted to your Com-

mittee. Following a motion to adopt the Report, it was moved in amendment that this part of the Report be referred back for further consideration.

After further consideration your Committee recommends that no action be taken herein.

In consideration of the co-operation of the members of the above institutions, your Committee recommends that a total

of twenty-five members from the two institutions be permitted to register for the course if they so desire, at the regular registration fee.

ADMISSIONS COMMITTEE—Mr. Jamieson

Your Committee met on Saturday, the 7th day of December 1957, at 9:30 a.m., and again on Thursday, the 9th day of January 1958, at 4:00 p.m., and again on Friday, the 17th day of January 1958 at 10:00 a.m. There were present at all meetings: D. Park Jamieson (Chairman), and Messrs. Arnup, Creighton and Robinette. Mr. Wilson was present at the last meeting when this report was finally considered and approved by the Committee.

The purpose of the meetings was to give special consideration to persons affected by the adoption of the new Admission Rules and Regulations approved by the Society in June, 1957, and to consider all matters arising out of the same.

The new Rules and Regulations had been published in the Ontario Weekly Notes for October 4, 1957, and were accompanied by a Notice to the effect that applications for special consideration arising by reason of the adoption of such new Rules and Regulations would be considered by your Committee provided they were received before the 30th day of November 1957. A copy of such Notice is attached to this report.

Copies of the new Rules and Regulations together with the Notice referred to above had been sent to all Secretaries of Law Societies in Canada, to the Deans of all Law Schools in Canada, to the Secretaries of the Law and Bar Societies in the United Kingdom and to representatives of Ontario and of Canada in the United Kingdom so that as wide publicity as possible would be given to the same.

A considerable number of applications for special consideration were received. Your Committee directed the Secretary to prepare a report based on the Society's records showing all the persons who might be affected by the changes in

the Rules who had not made special application and had such report before it. Your Committee then considered all applications received and the position of all persons set out in the report of the Secretary.

Your Committee gave individual consideration to each case and tried as far as possible to lay down general principles under which all cases could be dealt with and the cases were considered and recommendations made under the categories and headings set out in this report.

Your Committee has attempted to ascertain and include in this report all persons who are considered to be entitled to any special relief and recommend that this report be approved as final and conclusive with respect thereto. [The different categories — with recommendation were then set out.]

OPENING OF THE BAR ADMISSION COURSE

As the Regulations now stand the Bar Admission Course is to commence on the first day of June 1959. The Committee considered whether the commencement of this Course could be so advanced to June 1st, 1958 and consulted the Vice-Dean. It was pointed out that an earlier starting date for the Course would be of assistance in dealing with some applications for special consideration, and would also give the Faculty the advantage of commencing the Course with the smaller enrolment eligible to enter it in the first and second years.

Your Committee recommends that the Bar Admission Course commence in June 1958, and that persons graduating from the Faculties of Law of the University of Toronto and Dalhousie University in 1958 be permitted to enter the Bar Admission Course in June 1958, and that persons graduating from such Faculties in 1959 be permitted to enter the Bar Admission Course in June 1959, and that the Deans of such Faculties be so advised.

FEEES

The fees for admission payable by applicants in the various categories have not yet been set nor has any fee been set for the examination held by the Examining Board.

Your Committee recommends that, subject to the approval of the Finance Committee, such fees be fixed as follows:

Admission to the Bar Admission Course as a student-at-law or to the Society generally . .	\$101.00

The LIBRARY COMMITTEE begs leave to report as follows:

Your Committee met on the 19th February 1958, the following members being present: Mr. Foster (Vice-Chairman), Messrs. Chitty, Haines, Robinette and P. D. Wilson, and dealt with routine matters.

THE REPORT WAS ADOPTED.

UNAUTHORIZED PRACTICE COMMITTEE—Mr. Walsh.

Your Committee met on the 21st February 1958, the following members being present: Messrs. Walsh (Chairman), Creighton (Vice-Chairman), Ball, Bell, Braid, Clement, Evans, Haines, MacLaren, MacTavish, Raney, Seaman, Seymour, Slein and Willmott.

COLLECTION AGENCIES—"LEGAL DEPARTMENT"

The attention of your Committee was drawn to the fact that many collection agencies write collection letters which are signed — "John Doe, Legal Department", or similar descriptions. The matter was referred to counsel, and on his recommendation representations were made to the Superintendent of Insurance requesting him to insist that the use of the words "Legal Department" be discontinued by all collection agencies. The matter was also referred to a sub-committee consisting of Messrs. Haines and Levinter. It was recommended that the sub-committee consult with the Attorney-General, and that strong representations be made against the use of the term "Legal Department", as its use reflects on the legal profession, as the collection agencies may do things, such as advertise, that lawyers cannot do.

Your committee today received the report of the sub-committee as follows:

A sub-committee composed of Mr. Levinter and myself, as Chairman, was instructed to confer with Mr. R. B. Whitehead, Q.C., Superintendent of Insurance, with a view to preventing the use by Collection Agencies of the words "Legal Department" or similar words on collection letters or other documents mailed to debtors. Each of us has spoken to Mr. Whitehead on several occasions and on the 11th February a meeting was arranged with Mr. Whitehead and Mr. V. J. Simone, Registrar of Collection Agencies, when various form letters of collection agencies were examined and the viewpoint of the Unauthorized Practice Committee was outlined. The results of that meeting can best be described in a letter dated February 11th, 1958, from Mr. Levinter to me:

"Dear Mr. Haines:

Re: Unauthorized Practice

I had an interview today with Mr. R. B. Whitehead, Superintendent of Insurance, and with Mr. V. G. Simone, the Registrar of Collection Agencies.

I discussed with them generally the ethics which should

guide the firms operating as Collection Agencies and particularly, dealt with the use by them of the words "Legal Department" or similar words and also the use of documents which are colorable imitations of forms used by the Division Court and other forms such as used by Creditors Adjustment Bureau and Frontenac Credit Liquidators which would seem to indicate that the Final Notice was being given by the Division Court. I was assured that the form question was well in hand and a stop had been put to the use of them. From time to time notices and forms of this character are brought to the attention of the Registrar and if objectionable, he restricts the use of the same. He indicated to me that the use of them at present is almost extinct.

I was also assured that we need not concern ourselves any more about the use of the words "Legal Department" and that steps will be taken to stop this practice.

On the whole I felt that we were and will be receiving the full co-operation of the Department."

Subsequently Mr. V. J. Simone sent to the Secretary a copy of notice which will go forward to all Collection Agencies on the 1st March 1958, as follows:

"DEPARTMENT OF INSURANCE

SPECIAL NOTICE TO ALL COLLECTION AGENCIES

Complaints have been received by this Department from the Law Society of Upper Canada against collection agencies using the words "Legal Department" or similar words on collection letters mailed to debtors. The Department believes such complaints to be well founded as it clearly leads the debtor to believe that such letters have been sent by a lawyer. All collection agencies therefore are henceforth prohibited from signing the words "Legal Department" or similar words on collection letters mailed to debtors unless such letters are signed by a lawyer who is employed on a full time basis.

Collection agencies are also prohibited from sending collection letters to debtors on a lawyer's stationery. No

objection of course can be taken where the agency retains a lawyer who prepares, signs and dispatches the letter to the debtor.

'R. B. Whitehead'
Superintendent of Insurance."

So that the profession may be aware of this ruling your sub-committee suggests consideration be given to its publication in the Ontario Weekly Notes.

One of the offending collection agencies was the Kinrae Enterprises Limited, and copy of letter sent to them under date of the 17th February by V. J. Simone is attached. In October the Frontenac Credit Liquidators who have been using the term "Legal Department" on their forms voluntarily undertook to withdraw the use of these words when it was brought to their attention by the Secretary.

Dear Sirs:

I am enclosing a copy of a special notice that will go out to all collection agencies as of March 1st, 1958.

Please note the contents of the last paragraph which prohibits the sending of collection letters to debtors on a lawyer's stationery. This should be of particular interest to you, since I understand that your agency is using the stationery of a lawyer by the name of — who apparently continues to hold himself out as a lawyer when in fact he has not taken out a certificate to practise for many years.

"In any case with the issuance of our special notice in this matter, any collection agency found violating the prohibitions will definitely be placing its collection agency licence in jeopardy. I cannot stress this latter point too much because the practices which brought about these prohibitions are a form of misrepresentation and in order to bring them to a halt, it appears that it will be necessary for the Department to take more decisive action henceforth.

PUBLIC RELATIONS COMMITTEE—Mr. Gregory.

Your Committee met on Thursday, the 20th instant, at 3:30 p.m. in Convocation Room. There were present: Mr. Chitty (in the Chair), and Messrs. Arnup, Ball, Gregory, Haines and Jamieson.

1. LEX MAGAZINE

At its meeting of the 20th September last Convocation had referred to your Committee a letter written to the Treasurer by the publishers of Lex Magazine. The letter had said that, with the official approval of the organizations concerned, the names of the Canadian Bar Association, Ontario Section, and the Federation of County Law Associations of Ontario were shown on the masthead with an indication that they were cooperating with the Magazine. The publishers now desired to have the official approval of the Law Society to the addition of the Society's name to the masthead for the same purpose.

Your Committee recommends to Convocation that the publishers of Lex be advised that no semi-official status could be given to a publication not published by the Law Society.

2. PUBLIC LEGAL FORUMS

The question of holding a further series of Forums was before your Committee. Attendance at the second series, held last spring, was estimated at 2,100 which was significantly higher than the attendance at the first series, held in 1956. They had received a considerable amount of favourable publicity in the Toronto newspapers, and the tape recordings made of the discussions had by now been played over twenty-four Radio Stations in Ontario. Both the Toronto Star and the advertising agency in charge of distribution of the tape recordings for The Star were of the view that these Forums were well received and were well worth continuing.

Your Committee recommends that a further series of Forums be held this spring and that the arrangement be referred to a Committee to be appointed by the Chairman, with power to act.

ADMISSIONS COMMITTEE—Mr. Jamieson.

Your Committee met on Thursday, 20th February 1958 at 4:00 p.m., the following members being present: D. Park Jamieson (Chairman) and Messrs. Arnup and Robinette.

Your committee considered applications for transfer from other jurisdictions and made recommendations thereon.

FEES

Effect of Uniform Standards

In its last report your Committee had recommended, subject to the approval of the Finance Committee, certain fees to be charged to persons transferring to practice in Ontario from elsewhere. The question had arisen whether the fee of \$250.00 which the Society had charged under the provisions of the Uniform Standards since the adoption of those standards by the Society in 1953 was to be continued. This fee had been charged only to persons who were transferring to Ontario after three years practice in another province. Your Committee approved the Chairman's letter of the 20th instant and the recommendation therein contained that this fee be no longer charged since the Uniform Standards were no longer in effect *per se* in Ontario but that the fee payable for examination before the Examining Board be made \$100.00 instead of the \$35.00 recommended in your Committee's report of 17th January 1958. In the result,

SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON LAW SCHOOL

In the absence of the Treasurer, Mr. Arnup presented the Report.

On the evening of Friday, January 17th 1958, a Reception was held to mark the opening of the new law school building. The opening ceremonies were held in the lower classroom of the new building at 9 p.m. The Treasurer addressed the members and declared the building open. Mr. A. S. Mathers, B.A.Sc., R.C.A., F.R.A.I.C., F.R.S.A., the architect, made a brief address and the Reverend C. A. Lawson, B.A., B.D., D.D. read the prayer of dedication.

The guests were received by the Treasurer and Mrs. Carson and the members of the Special Committee and their wives in the new Students' Library. Supper was served in the new Students' Cafeteria. Orchestras were placed in the Students' Library and in the Cafeteria. It is estimated that about 1200 persons attended and were conducted about the new building by about 30 young Barristers of the class of 1957.

THE REPORT WAS ADOPTED.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE, INDUSTRIAL DISPUTES
AND INVESTIGATIONS ACT—Mr. Cassels.

On 22nd November 1957 the Executive Director of The Association of Professional Engineers of the Province of Ontario wrote to the Secretary enclosing copy of a letter of November 4, 1957 from the Secretary-Treasurer of The Canadian Council of Professional Engineers to The Honourable Michael Starr, Minister of Labour, Ottawa. Both letters referred to the receipt by the Minister of recommendations as to possible changes in the Act. In particular the letter from The Canadian Council of Professional Engineers pointed out that its constituent associations, representing all the registered professional engineers in Canada, were unanimous in requesting that there be no change in Section 2(1) of the Act insofar as it affects the professions: that is, that the present wording be not changed. The relevant wording is:

“‘employee’ means a person employed to do skilled or unskilled manual, clerical or technical work, but does not include

- (ii) a member of the medical, dental, architectural, engineering or legal profession qualified to practise under the laws of a Province and employed in that capacity.”

The Treasurer referred the matter to a Special Committee composed of Messrs. Cassels, Martin and McGillivray. As the letters referred also to the Canadian Bar Association, copies were sent to the Secretary-Treasurer of that association and were referred to the Executive Committee.

Your Committee met on 9th December and considered the correspondence and further information from the Professional Engineers. Mr. Martin was requested to take the matter up with Mr. Arthur Maloney, Q.C., M.P., Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister of Labour, and the Secretary was requested to enquire from the other relevant professional associations as to what action they had taken or proposed to take.

Your Committee was informed that the Royal Architectural Institute, the Canadian Medical Association and the Canadian Dental Association had written to the Minister of Labour supporting the views of the Professional Engineers, and opposing a change in Section 2(1) insofar as it affects the professions. Your Committee was also informed by the Department of Labour, under date of January 20, 1958, that the Minister had not received representations to date proposing amendments to the Act which would bring within the scope of the Act any of the groups of professional employees who are now excluded therefrom.

Your Committee therefore recommends that no further action be taken in the matter, except to inform the relevant professional associations of the information received: and that your Committee be discharged.

THE REPORT WAS ADOPTED.

CORRESPONDENCE

The Chairman read a letter from Mr. Vernon W. Armstrong, Q.C., Vice-President for Ontario of the Canadian Bar Association, thanking the Treasurer and Benchers for the reception and luncheon given on 8th February.

ORDERED that the letter be received and filed.

LAW SOCIETY ACT, SECTION 5—EX OFFICIO BENCHERS

Mr. Sedgwick referred to informal discussions of certain proposed amendments to The Law Society Act with reference to Ex Officio Benchers, and in particular to recent discussions between Messrs. Arnup, Jamieson, Robinette and Sedgwick. Draft amendments have been considered, and it was decided to place the matter before Convocation at this meeting. Following a general discussion it was—

Moved by Mr. Sedgwick, seconded by Mr. Jamieson

THAT the Legislative Assembly of Ontario be requested to amend The Law Society Act as follows:

That subsections 5 and 6 of Section 5 be repealed,

That a new Section 5A be enacted in the following form:

5A. 1. Every judge of the Supreme Court of Canada, the Exchequer Court of Canada, and of the Supreme Court of Ontario who was at the time of his appointment a Bencher of the Society, shall ex officio be benchers of the Society and shall continue to be benchers upon their retirement as judges.

2. The amendments made shall not be deemed to affect the right of any person who is a Bencher at the time of the coming into force of this Section, to be a Bencher.

Moved in amendment by Mr. R. F. Wilson, seconded by Mr. Seymour.

That the proposed Section 5A, 1. be amended to read as follows:

5A. 1. Every judge of the Supreme Court of Canada, the Exchequer Court of Canada, the Supreme Court of Ontario and of the County Courts of Ontario

who was at the time of his appointment a Bencher of the Society, shall ex officio be benchers of the Society and shall continue to be benchers upon their retirement as judges.

Moved in amendment to the amendment by Mr. Walsh, seconded by Mr. Beaton,

That consideration of this matter stand to the next meeting of Convocation.

The amendment to the amendment was lost.

The amendment was carried.

In response to the request of the graduating class a dinner has been arranged for Friday evening at 6:30 and 299 acceptances have been received. Of this number 240 are students of the graduating year, 31 are Benchers and 28 other guests.

GRANT OF CECIL W. ROBINSON GIFT

The Dean submits a memorandum regarding the grant to

a second year student in need of financial assistance of the honorarium returned by Mr. Robinson for such a purpose.

Your Committee recommends that the Dean's recommendation be approved.

SERVICE UNDER ARTICLES—

CREDIT FOR SERVICES WITH ARMED FORCES

Pursuant to a ruling of the Committee in May 1951, students have been granted up to three months credit against the required twenty-four month period for service in legal or non-legal capacities with the armed forces provided they obtained leave of absence from their principals and filed a certificate from their Commanding Officers.

The question of what credit is to be given to students in the Bar Admission Course is raised.

Your Committee recommends that no credit for such service be given in the Bar Admission Course.

LAW SCHOOL BURSARY

A letter date 14th March 1958 from Morley L. Torgov, Barrister, of Toronto, offers a bursary to the Society for the use of the Law School of \$75.00 per year. This sum represents the net return on a figure of \$2000.00 collected by friends of the late Sydney Stupp, Barrister, who graduated from Osgoode Hall Law School in 1954 and who lost his life in an automobile accident some fifteen months ago. The detailed terms upon which the offer is made are set out in Mr. Torgov's letter which is before the Committee.

Your Committee recommends that the offer of the bursary be accepted, and that the bursary be designated the "Sydney Stupp Memorial Bursary" to be awarded annually to a student entering Second Year in the Osgoode Hall Law School, having due regard to financial need, and academic standing in the First Year.

ADVANCE STANDING IN LL.B. COURSE

The question of granting advanced standing in the LL.B. course in favour of graduates of law faculties that have not been approved by the Society for purposes of the Bar Admission Course has been under consideration for some time by the Admissions Committee. In a memorandum dated 20 March, 1958, the Vice Dean recommends:

6. That in granting advanced standing in the Osgoode Hall Law School the school require:

- (i) That the applicant must have fulfilled the admission requirements of the Osgoode Hall Law School; and
- (ii) That we require an absolute minimum of one year full-time attendance at the Law School together with the requirement that all applicants for advanced standing make up any courses in which they are deficient, having in mind the course requirements prescribed by the Law Society on a basis for the approval of a law faculty.

Your Committee recommends that this recommendation be approved.

RE COMPENSATION FUND

Mr. Sedgwick, Chairman, presented the Report of the Discipline Committee:

IN THE MATTER OF The Law Society Act;
AND IN THE MATTER OF the Compensation

9. On 15th November 1957 Mr. Sarich was disbarred.

10. Prior to the hearing before the Discipline Committee Mr. Sarich had made an assignment in bankruptcy. Mr. Lithgow of Pollock, Lyttle & Company, had been appointed Trustee. In his letter of 19th December 1957 to the Society Mr. Lithgow stated that "the assets only realized enough to pay the costs of administering the debtor's estate, and consequently there were no dividends paid to the creditors". Mr. Lithgow obtained his discharge as Trustee on 4th December 1957. An application by Mr. Sarich for discharge was refused by Mr. Justice Smily on 2nd October 1957.

11. Mr. Sarich, on 3rd March 1958, personally attended at the Society's offices and went over the claims that had

ONTARIO LEGAL AID PLAN 1957

SOCIAL PLANNING COUNCIL OF METROPOLITAN TORONTO

For some months a welfare worker has attended each meeting of the Legal Aid Clinic in Toronto. Miss Florence L. Philpott, Executive Director of the Social Council writes in part as follows:

" . . . The Nomination Committee of the Social Planning Council recommends to the Board, immediately following the Annual Meeting, a list of Advisory Members to the Board chosen because of the positions that they hold in the community. These Advisory Members include representatives from Public Welfare Departments, Public Health Departments, University Departments and other planning associations. Because of our interest in Legal Aid Plan and our co-operative programme of this past year, the Nominating Committee felt that we should have a representative from your group as an Advisory Member to our Board."

Your Committee recommends that Mr. J. Douglas Conover be appointed a representative of The Law Society of Upper Canada as an advisory member to the Board of the Social Planning Council.

TO THE LEGAL AID COMMITTEE

The Provincial Director begs leave to present his sixth Report.

The numerical details which follow reveal only a portion of the true story of legal aid in Ontario. Behind the cold statistics are hundreds of families who have turned to the lawyers of Ontario for advice and counsel in time of trouble.

It is now apparent that the Bar of Ontario has recognized and has met a very real need for legal assistance, and has provided an answer which is of substantial public benefit. This has been accomplished by the unselfish devotion of the volunteer lawyers in the Legal Aid Plan, and the generous financial assistance of the Government of Ontario. Particular commendation must be given to the younger members of the Bar, without whose interest and effort no legal aid could ever hope to work.

All but three of the Counties and Districts were organized in some form, but even the three without formal organization state that all applications for legal aid were dealt with by individual solicitors, although no records were kept. The figures which appear later in this Report do not, therefore, include credit for considerable legal aid work done in 1957.

Legal aid clinics were held in nine counties—in five regularly and in four as required by applications for aid. Several other counties were prepared but clinics were not necessary, applications being otherwise dealt with.

A total of 179 throughout the Province in 1957.

The other 35 counties dealt with applications for legal aid in various ways. Legal aid has become an accepted service by the legal profession to the public, and there is less need for clinics, and applications are made direct to members of the Bar and Bench, court officials and welfare agencies.

In 2 counties, no applications for legal aid were received, and in 3 other counties no applications in civil matters.

In 19 counties all members of the profession were available for legal aid work. In other counties the number of

lawyers available for this work is impressive, but there must be the wholehearted support of the profession, and particularly of the younger members, if the Plan is to continue to work satisfactorily.

With incomplete figures as indicated above, the following are the relevant figures with reference to legal aid in Ontario in 1957:

Of the above totals, there were in York County 1865 applications for legal aid in civil matter, and aid was given in 1272; in criminal cases 656 applications were received, and aid was given in 528. The figures for legal aid in civil cases include those cases where advice only is given at the legal aid clinic or on other application.

In criminal matters aid was given in connection with 13 charges of murder, and 132 other serious charges.

Once again I wish to extend my thanks for the guidance and counsel of the Chairman and members of the Legal Aid Committee.

On behalf of the Committee and personally I wish also to thank the Local Advisory Committee, the Local Directors, and members of the profession generally for their great contribution to the success of the Legal Aid Plan.

As always, particular thanks must be extended to J. Douglas Conover, County Director for York, and his able staff and assistants for their services in handling approximately two-thirds of the legal aid work in the Province.

LAW SCHOOL ADDITION

Mr. Brown reported on a number of matters relating to the new addition which were still outstanding. These included the heating and ventilation systems, and the public address system, which were not yet functioning satisfactorily. Your Committee gave Mr. Brown instructions with regard to these matters. Another major matter was the arrangement for future servicing of the escalators and elevator. At the request of the Chairman, Mr. Arnup had examined two types of contract submitted by the manufacturers. BAR ADMISSION COURSE

Applications are beginning to come in for admission to the Course. Rule 41 reads as follows:

“41. The course consists of:

- (a) service under articles of clerkship for 15 months beginning on the first day of June; and thereafter
- (b) practical training at Osgoode Hall, including lectures and tutorial groups, for a period of 6 months beginning on the day after Labour Day.”

1. It now appears that students desiring to register for the Course will not have received their degrees by the 1st June in any year. To meet this situation conditional registration, subject to confirmation upon the degree being conferred, is suggested.

Your Committee recommends that registration date of June 1st be maintained but that, where necessary, registra-

tion be made conditional upon proof of the awarding of the LL.B. degree being filed by September 30th in the same year.

Direct Transfers from Quebec

4A. An applicant who at the time of application is engaged in active practice in Quebec as a barrister and has been so engaged for a continuous period of three years or more immediately preceding application may upon the recommendation of the Admissions Committee be:

- (1) admitted to the Society as a student-at-law of the Bar Admission Course upon fulfilling all other requirements and:
 - (a) presenting a certificate of good standing from the appropriate governing body showing that he is presently a member in good standing therein and that no charge is pending against him in respect of alleged conduct for which he could be disbarred or suspended from the practice of law. If there has been previous disciplinary action which resulted in the applicant having been disbarred or suspended from practice, the certificate shall so state and if any other disciplinary action has previously been taken against the ap-

plicant particulars of the same shall be given in the certificate;

- (b) presenting proof that he was in active practice for a continuous period of at least three years immediately preceding his application; and

(2) called to the Bar and admitted as a solicitor upon:

- (a) presenting a certificate of completion of the Bar Admission Course;
- (b) paying the prescribed fees;
- (c) fulfilling all other requirements.

2. THAT these amendments be effective forthwith.

Your Committee recommends that Mr. Donald Sim be appointed to supervise the conduct of oral examinations of students entering their Fourth Year of the old course, that he be given the usual honorarium therefor and that the examiners appointed to carry out the examinations be paid at the same rate as in the preceding year.

SUPPLEMENTAL EXAMINATION RESULTS — *August 1958*

The record of the returns of the examiners of the Supplemental Examinations, August 1958, for all years is submitted herewith.

First Year

There were 105 students who wrote these examinations and of that number 93 passed clear and have completed the work of the First Year and will proceed into Second Year of the LL.B. course in September, 1958. There were 6 students who failed in one subject and 6 students who failed in two subjects. The Faculty has considered each of the failures and on the basis of their academic record and medical evidence 5 students have been granted permission to repeat their First Year and 7 students have been asked to withdraw from the School.

Second Year

There were 75 students who wrote these examinations and of that number 72 passed clear and have completed the work of the Second Year and will proceed into the Third Year under articles. There were 3 who failed to attain pass standing in one subject. These students have been granted permission to carry the subject in their Third Year out and to write at the Supplemental Examinations in August, 1959.

Third Year

There were 4 students who were carrying subjects from their Second Year and who wrote these subjects at the Second Year supplementals in August 1958. These students have passed clear and completed the work of their Second Year and are now proceeding in the Fourth Year of the course.

Fourth Year

There were 38 students who wrote the supplemental examinations of the Fourth Year in August 1958, and of that number 35 passed clear and have completed their academic requirements entitling them to graduation from the Law School and Call to the Bar. There were 3 students who failed to attain pass standing but the Faculty in view of their academic record decided that they should be granted the subject.

Report received.

SPECIAL STUDENTS

Robert C. Taylor, Esq., Deputy Magistrate, Magistrate's Court, City Hall, has requested permission to attend lectures on Criminal Law and Procedure in the Annual Session 1958-59 at the Law School. The Faculty recommends that permission

be granted and that Magistrate R. C. Taylor be enrolled as a special student and be required to pay the fee of \$50.

Approved.

FEE PAYABLE ON FILING SPECIAL PETITIONS

The regulation requiring the payment of a fee of \$5.00 on the filing of a special petition to the Benchers of the Law Society in terms has no application to those students of the LL.B. course in the Osgoode Hall Law School who are not members of the Society. The question has arisen whether or not the LL.B. students of the Osgoode Hall Law School should be required to pay any fee on filing a petition and, if so, in what amount.

The Faculty has considered this matter and is very anxious that no student should be precluded from placing a petition before the Faculty merely because of the fee involved. There has been difficulty from time to time in establishing whether a fee is chargeable and we do receive a number of informal petitions, chiefly in connection with the writing of examinations and the results, and to date have dealt with them even though the fee has not been paid.

The Faculty recommends that students should be allowed to petition to the Faculty formally or informally without a fee.

Your Committee met on Friday, the 4th July 1958, the following members being present: Messrs. Sedgwick (Chairman), Creighton, Rigney, Seymour and Slemmin.

Re: Carl Joseph Herman

On instructions of the Committee Messrs. Welch, Hinton & Welch, Chartered Accountants, investigated the books and accounts of Mr. Herman and reported on 13th February 1957. The report showed amounts owing of approximately \$118,000, and indicated that there were four possible sources of recovery.

On 22nd January 1957 Mr. Herman was arrested and charged with theft. Later other charges were laid, and he was convicted and sentenced.

On 21st June 1957 Mr. Herman was disbarred.

On 28th August 1957 a Petition in Bankruptcy was filed against Mr. Herman, and on 12th September a Receiving Order in Bankruptcy was made by the Registrar.

On 2nd December 1957 the Secretary received a letter and report from M. H. Hahn, the Trustee, reporting in part that he had no funds with which to carry on the pending litigation or other possible means of recovery.

On 20th March 1958 the Trustee presented a confidential report listing three types of claims:

- (1) Claims based on a client-solicitor relationship.
- (2) Claims based on a business relationship with the debtor.
- (3) Other claims.

The claims set out below appear to be of the first class, although all the names do not appear on the Trustee's list.—

W. A. Bloxom — Claim for proceeds of sale of property paid to Herman and misappropriated \$514.44

G. A. Crofts — Claim for money paid to Herman to complete purchase of a lot, and for fees and disbursements (\$200.)
Misappropriated \$2,200.00

Ann Erenberg — Claim for money collected by Herman for

which receipts were given — misappropriated. Claim filed March 14/58\$106.30

Tillie Fine — Claim for money paid to Herman to pay rent and mortgage payment — misappropriated. Judgment recovered against Herman\$270.00

Raymond Lepofsky — Claim for the balance of \$7,000. paid to Herman to be advanced on a mortgage. Lepofsky received \$6,234.15 and the balance was misappropriated\$765.85

E. A. Murray — Claim for the balance of money paid to Herman to complete purchase of equipment; deal not completed, and Herman gave N.S.F. cheque\$2,500.00

Paul Piper — Claim for money paid to Herman to complete a purchase. Deal not closed. Money misappropriated. Judgment obtained and execution issued.\$1,000.00

A. Radziunaitis — Claim for the balance of money (\$3504.) paid to Herman to discharge a mortgage. Herman made three small payments, but did not discharge the mortgage. Judgment obtained (\$3744.90 and costs) and execution issued\$3,279.00

Oscar and Dorothy Rogers — Claim for balance of money paid to Herman in connection with two real estate deals, and misappropriated. Judgment obtained — recovery of \$1393.77 made\$5,935.00

Dinah Shorser — claim for money paid to Herman in settlement of a claim against A. Persin, and misappropriated \$150.00

Theodore Vaskevitch — Claim for money paid to Herman in settlement of a claim against Joe Fuger, and misappropriated\$152.00

Mary T. and Arthur G. Wallington — Claim for money paid to Herman to discharge a mortgage, and misappropriated. N.S.F. cheque\$867.44

Carl B. Warder — Claim for money paid to Herman to invest in mortgages, for which Warder received nothing \$8,000.

The claim arises from the payment in 1950 to Hilts of his fees and disbursements in connection with the purchase of premises in Toronto. Disbursements included two items — Registration of Deed, \$3.50; Land Transfer Tax, \$20.00. The loss was not discovered until April 1957 when another solicitor investigated title.

The claim was not filed within six months of the knowledge of the loss.

Your Committee recommends that payment out of the Compensation Fund be granted.

Although final figures are not available from other law faculties, present information is that enrollment in the First Year this year is down approximately 20% from that of last year. This may be due to the fact that the downward trend in the national economic position generally over the past year has made it increasingly difficult for students to procure summer employment as remunerative as in former years, and also may reflect the inability on the part of their parents to finance their further education. The Dean is informed that enrollment in the faculties of the other professions is down as well, notably Engineering. *Noted.*

VISITING PROFESSORS

The Faculty from time to time has discussed the problem of recruitment of full-time teaching staff and, more particularly, in recent months has given some thought to appointments to fill the two posts authorized on the full-time teaching staff of the Law School. Recruitment is clearly not easy, whether of newly qualified persons or of persons of mature teaching experience and proven scholarship. It has seemed to the Faculty that at the present stage of the development of the Law School the establishment of a Visiting Professorship would be extremely valuable.

PENSION PLANS FOR MEMBERS OF THE LEGAL PROFESSION

For several years a special committee of this Society on Pension Plan for Members of the Profession, has worked with representatives of other professional and business groups, and on at least two occasions has retained counsel and made representations to the Minister of Finance.

Since the Budget Speech in 1957 referred to tax deterrent on retirement plans for self-employed, the Secretary has received letters from several Canadian life underwriters, from insurance companies and trust companies.

The correspondence was before the Committee on 10th April 1957 and it was directed that further consideration stand until the attitude of the local Associations is determined. The Secretary wrote to the Carleton, Essex, Hamilton, Middlesex and York Associations, and had replies from all.

On 17th May 1957 the Finance Committee recommended that the matters be referred for consideration and report to a sub-committee (Finance) on Pension Plans consisting of Messrs. D. J. Walker (Chairman), Isadore Levinter and J. J. Robinette.

The Sub-Committee now submits its report as follows:

Your Sub-Committee, carrying out your instructions, has held several meetings to consider the merits of a Pension Plan sponsored by the Law Society. Your Sub-Committee has interviewed representatives of Trust Companies and Insurance Companies and has considered several Pension Savings Plans approved by the Department of National Revenue, the operation and advantages of which have been gone into in detail.

Your Sub-Committee respectfully recommends to the Finance Committee that the Law Society should not establish a Group Pension Plan at the present time. Your Sub-Committee has ascertained that the saving available through group plans, as compared with individual plans, appears to be insignificant. Part of the apparent saving would result from eliminating the services of salesmen and from administration duties assumed by the Law Society. Such duties would greatly increase the work of the Law Society, so that the so-called saving would be more

apparent than real. On the other hand, to set up a separate company to perform the administration duties presents many complications.

Since enrolment in a Pension Plan is an individual problem involving many personal factors, it was not considered helpful to adopt a plan that must inevitably restrict the choices available. It was also realized that lawyers are a critical and able group of people and in such matters are apt to prefer to make their own arrangements.

STUDENT LOAN FUND

Your Committee recommends that, subject to the approval of the Finance Committee, a fund of \$5,000.00 be set up to provide for loans to students not covered by Provincial Student-Aid Loans, and that new regulations providing for the administration of the fund be drafted by the Dean.

REPORT OF THE LAW SCHOOL ADMISSIONS COMMITTEE, 1958-59

The total number of applications this year was 292, as compared with 339 in 1957-58, with a corresponding drop in the registrations from 247 to 204.

The number of students admitted without degrees in 1957-58 represented 26% of the class, and in 1958-59, 17% of the class.

There was an increase in the percentage of applications refused from slightly more than 9% in 1957-58 to slightly under 12% in 1958-59. The number of withdrawals after applications had been approved numbered 60 in 1957-58 and 54 in 1958-59.

Your Committee approved of a panel of lectures, and recommended that the detailed arrangements be referred to the Chairman, Mr. G. A. Martin, and the Secretary.

Your Committee recommends that the lectures be held on March 13th and 14th, 20th and 21st, 1959; that the registration fee be \$15.00; that the usual buffet luncheons be given on both Saturdays; and that a short announcement to the profession be given in the Ontario Weekly Notes forthwith.

LECTURES TO LOCAL LAW ASSOCIATIONS

In its Report of September 18, 1958 your Committee recommended that consideration of setting up a programme of lectures on special subjects to County Law Associations on request, be referred for further consideration and report to the Chairman, the Vice-Chairman, and the Secretary.

Your Committee has considered the recommendations of the Chairman, the Vice-Chairman and Secretary, and recommends the following subjects for this programme:

1. Bankruptcy

2. Ethics — to be given on a panel basis with not less than two members sitting, and preferably three.
3. Annexation — Expropriation.
4. Collection of Debts.
5. Trial of a Criminal Case.
6. Criminal Appeals.
7. Estate Planning — 3 lectures.
8. Management and Labour — 2 lectures.
9. Preparation and Settlement of a Damage Action.
10. Organization Problems of Small Business — 2 lectures.
11. Income Tax — 2 lectures.
12. Civil Appeals.

Your Committee recommends that for each subject given to a local Association a registration fee of \$2.00 per person be charged, with a minimum registration of 25 persons required, the fee to be collected by the local Law Association and paid to the Law Society.

Your Committee recommends that the expenses of the lectures be paid.

Your Committee recommends that announcement of this programme be given to the profession in the Ontario Weekly Notes as soon as possible.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE APPOINTED TO PREPARE A MEMORIAL TO THE LATE JOHN ROY MARSHALL, Q.C.

Mr. McCulloch presented the Report of the Special Committee appointed to prepare a Memorial to the late John Roy Marshall, Q.C., and it was ordered that it be recorded in the Minutes of Convocation and a copy sent to Mrs. Marshall:

MEMORIAL TO THE LATE JOHN ROY MARSHALL

John Roy Marshall, a life Bencher of the Law Society of Upper Canada, died 3rd August 1958 at Hamilton.

Born on a farm, at the Village of Palermo, near Milton, Ontario, October 17th, 1880, the son of John Marshall and Alberta Book, the deceased attended grade schools there and Harbord Collegiate Institute, Toronto. In 1902 he graduated from University College, University of Toronto, with the degree

of Bachelor of Arts and in 1905, after graduation from Osgoode Hall, was called to the Bar of Ontario.

For a brief period, Mr. Marshall practised law in Milton. In 1907, he joined the law firm of General Mewburn at Hamilton and for over half a century the firm included the names Mewburn and Marshall, and from time to time, included others — Ambrose, Burbidge, Evans. The practice now is carried on by the son and son-in-law of Mr. Marshall, John Marshall Jr. and John Reesor.

The firm acquired an enviable reputation among the profession and the public for skill and integrity in the practice of law and was literally Liberal Conservative in that Mr. Marshall's prominent position and energetic activities in the Liberal party were equalled by General Mewburn's in the Conservative Party.

Mr. Marshall was a Presbyterian, an Elder and member of the Board of Management of Central Presbyterian Church, Hamilton, and enthusiastic in the work of Church Extension. He was a 32nd degree member of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite and over the years enjoyed taking an active part in the dramatic presentation of the degrees. He found time and energy to enjoy golf at the Hamilton Golf and Country Club, Ancaster until very recent years and reminds us of the few who "force their heart and nerve and sinew to serve our turn" at a time in life when most men are seeking to preserve them.

In 1933, he was appointed King's Counsel and a member of this Bench. He was elected at four successive quinquennial elections commencing 1936. In the intervening years he was Vice-Chairman and Chairman of the County Libraries Committee, Trustee of the Hamilton Law Association, and President of the latter body in 1953. In the Canadian Bar Association he was Vice-President in 1938 for Ontario.

Those of us who had the privilege of knowing him well, will include him among that circle of "precious friends hid in death's dateless night for whom we drown an eye unsued to flow — when to the Sessions of Sweet Silent Thoughts, we summon up remembrance of things past."

To his widow, formerly Lilian Secord, his daughter, Mrs. John Reesor, and son, John Marshall, the Benchers of the Law Society extend their sincere sympathy.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE, HOSPITAL SERVICES COMMISSION

Mr. Haines, for the Special Committee composed of himself and Mr. David J. Walker, informed Convocation that as a result of further discussions with the Hospital Services Commission and its counsel, an amendment has been proposed by counsel to Regulation 50 (Third Party liability), subsection (5). The old section read as follows:

“50 (5) If no action has been commenced by an insured person for the recovery of damages arising out of injury or disability within sixty days of the last act or omission which caused or contributed to the injury or disability, the Commission

(a) upon the service of notice on the insured person, may commence an action in his name”

The proposed amendment reads as follows:

“50 (5) If no action has been commenced by an insured person for the recovery of damages arising out of injury or disability within eleven month of the last act or omission which caused or contributed to the injury or disability, or before thirty days before the expiration of the limitation period for the action, whichever occurs first, the Commission

(a) etc.”

The Report was received, and the Special Committee was requested to continue its discussions with the Commission and its counsel.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON TARIFFS

Ordered that Mr. J. L. Braid, Q.C., be appointed a member of this Committee to fill the vacancy caused by the appointment of Mr. Justice Walsh to the Supreme Court of Ontario.

COURT HOUSE, TORONTO

The Treasurer informed Convocation that the Attorney-General had set up a “Committee of Bench and Bar with Respect to the new Metropolitan Toronto Court House”, and that Mr. C. F. H. Carson, Q.C., had agreed to act as Chairman, and it was requested that two members be appointed to the Com-

mittee to represent the Benchers of The Law Society of Upper Canada.

It was ordered that Mr. H. F. Parkinson, Q.C. and Mr. R. F. Wilson, Q.C., be appointed the representatives of the Society on this Committee.

NATIONAL CONFERENCE ON THE
CONTINUING EDUCATION OF THE BAR OF THE
AMERICAN LAW INSTITUTE — AMERICAN BAR ASSOCIATION

On the 16th - 19th December 1958 the American Bar Association and the American Law Institute held a conference on Continuing Education at Arden House, New York. One hundred and ten members of the profession were invited, among them Presidents of State Bar Associations, several law school deans, and those who had done special work in Continuing Education. The Chairman of your Committee was invited as a representative of the Canadian Bar Association and The Law Society of Upper Canada.

He reported to your Committee that there is great interest among American lawyers in both the under-graduate and continuing education in Ontario. It was pointed out that the vast majority of American law schools give little or no practical training whatsoever, leaving it to the student to learn the skills of his profession in practice. Only a few States have a well-organized programme of continuing education for the practitioner. In the opinion of many members attending the Conference, Ontario is far in the forefront in giving practical training to the student and lawyer. The Ontario systems might well form the model for American programmes.

D. Arnup, Q.C., and an opinion of C. H. Walker, Q.C.

The dangers inherent in the practice are so manifest that this Committee must warn all members of the profession that to permit their services to be used in such a transaction on any regular basis may be regarded as professional misconduct.

SUB-COMMITTEE ON USE OF THE WORDS "SOLICITOR" AND "LAWYER"

By Report dated January 9, 1959, the Sub-Committee reported as follows:

TO THE BENCHERS OF THE LAW SOCIETY OF UPPER CANADA IN CONVOCATION ASSEMBLED:

The SUB-COMMITTEE (UNAUTHORIZED PRACTICE) ON THE USE OF THE WORDS "SOLICITOR" OR "LAWYER" begs leave to report:

In March 1957 the County of Carleton Law Association made representations to The Law Society of Upper Canada with reference to Title Guarantee Companies and certain other matters. A Sub-Committee of the Association reported in part as follows:

"It appears from the minutes of Convocation that the Law Society took exception to the word "Lawyers" appearing in the name of Lawyers Title Insurance Corporation but that the Law Society's objections were overruled . . . we consider that the name is sufficiently ambiguous to suggest that the company engages in the practice of law or is sponsored or controlled by a Law Society or a group of practising solicitors, and is therefore objectionable.

Statutory protection is afforded to other professional men against misuse of their professional names: see, for example, The Medical Act, R.S.O. 1950, ch. 228, Sec. 51; The Dentistry Act, R.S.O. Ch. 92, Sec. 23; The Architects Act, R.S.O. 1950, Ch. 71, Sec. 8 as amended in 1953.

We recommend that an amendment should be sought to

the Solicitors Act prohibiting the unauthorized use of the words "solicitor" and "lawyer" by an individual or corporation."

The Association at a meeting called to consider the report of the Sub-Committee made certain recommendations including the following:

"That an amendment be sought to the Solicitors Act for the purpose of prohibiting any person who is not admitted and enrolled and duly qualified to act as a solicitor from applying to himself the words "solicitor" or "lawyer" alone or in combination with any other word or words and prohibiting any corporation from using either of such words as a part of its corporate name."

This part of the representations of the County of Carleton Law Association was referred to the Unauthorized Practice Committee, and in April 1957 was referred to a sub-committee composed of Messrs. Bell, Creighton, Haines, MacTavish and Slein. Mr. Haines was appointed Chairman.

The Sub-Committee had before it the relevant sections of the other Ontario Professional Acts, and letters from the Secretaries of the Governing Bodies in the other Provinces. It would appear that in no Province is there legislation specifically prohibiting the use of the words "solicitor" and "lawyer", although there are restrictive sections in the relevant professional acts.

The Sub-Committee met again on November 21, 1958, the following members being present: Messrs. Haines (Chairman), Creighton, MacTavish and Slein. After considering the material before it, the Sub-Committee recommends to the Unauthorized Practice Committee that no further action should be taken in this matter unless and until there is a general revision of The Solicitors Act.

FINANCE AND CREDIT COMPANIES — "*Legal Department*"

Following the successful action of the Committee with reference to Collection Agencies "*Legal Department*", several let-

ters were received with reference to Finance and Credit Companies. After correspondence with the Superintendent of Insurance at Ottawa, the Secretary wrote to the Federated Council of Sales Finance Companies and the Canadian Consumer Loan Association. The former, in a letter of December 3, 1958, said in part:

"I was instructed to send a copy of your letter to all members carrying on business in the Province of Ontario, and to advise the members that in the opinion of the Council, this practice if followed by any of them, should be discontinued forthwith. Please be advised that I have now done so."

The latter, in a letter of December 11, 1958, said in part:

"The directors unanimously agreed that this practice is improper and although there is no evidence to indicate that any member of the Association is guilty of the offence, the attached general bulletin has been sent to every member company to acquaint them with the substance of your complaint." (Copy of the bulletin was attached).

Your Committee notes with approval the action taken in this matter, and wishes to record its appreciation of the assistance and cooperation of the two Associations quoted above.

W. A. MARTIN, *Notary Public, United Counties of Prescott & Russell*

On November 21, 1958 your Committee considered the correspondence with the Prescott & Russell Law Association, which seemed to indicate that Mr. Martin had held himself out as or represented himself to be a solicitor in connection with an application for probate. Your Committee recommended that the appropriate charges be laid, and that the matter be referred to Mr. C. H. Walker, Q.C., counsel for the Committee.

On February 3, 1959 Mr. Walker reported that at the hearing before Magistrate Lalonde at L'Orignal on the 26th January 1959, W. A. Martin was found guilty of holding himself out as or representing himself to be a solicitor. In accordance with the consent of the Law Society, the Magistrate suspended sentence for one year. Mr. Martin paid the court costs amounting to \$15.50.

Your Committee recommends to the Finance Committee that, effective January 1, 1960, the said sub-section (4) be amended by substituting the symbol

and figures "\$600." for the symbol and figures "\$400." wherever the latter appear in the sub-section.

PUBLIC RELATIONS COMMITTEE—Mr. Walker.

Your Committee met on Thursday, the 19th day of February, 1959 at 3:00 p.m., the following members being present: Mr. H. F. McCulloch (in the Chair) and Messrs. Arnup, Ball, Haines and Jamieson.

PUBLIC LEGAL FORMS

The Vice-Chairman reported to the Committee that the Public Legal Forum on the topic "Are you Paying Too Much Income Tax?" held on the evening of Tuesday, February 3rd, was received warmly by an audience of some 250. This attendance figure fell below the Panel's expectations, due to weather conditions. About 100 letters have been received addressed to the Panel, and all have been answered in writing.

The second Public Legal Forum on the topic "Who Is Liable: Liability For Your Home, Your Children and Your Guests" was held on Tuesday, February 17th and was received with great enthusiasm by an audience which this time filled the lower class room of the new law school building.

The Chairman moved the Committee's thanks to the Moderators and members of the Panels for completing the onerous job of preparation and presentation of these Panel discussions which form an important part of the public relations of the profession as a whole, not only with respect to those who attended in person but throughout the year to countless thousands who hear the Forums re-broadcast from the tape recordings which were made during the actual conduct of the Panels.

The tape recordings of the Public Legal Forums are available to County Law Associations who can arrange through their local radio broadcasting organization for the Forums to be re-broadcast. The Deputy Secretary reported to the Committee that considerable use had been made of this service and indeed that requests are still being received to make available the panel discussions of 1956 and the succeeding years. One request has so far been made to obtain the recordings of this year's panel discussions.

THE REPORT WAS ADOPTED.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON CONFERENCE REPORT ON LEGAL ETHICS

Mr. Creighton, Chairman, presented the Report of the Special Committee:

At the meeting of Convocation on April 18th last the Treasurer read a letter from the Conference of Governing Bodies of the Legal Profession in Canada enclosing a copy of the Minutes of the Mid-Winter Meeting of the Executive held on March 2, 1958, and a notice of the 29th Annual Meeting at Toronto on Tuesday, September 9th, 1958.

The Treasurer also read the Report of a Special Committee of the Conference on Legal Ethics.

It was resolved that the Report of the Special Committee on Legal Ethics be referred to a special committee to be appointed by the Treasurer, with the request that the special committee consider a suggestion that an advisory committee be set up to advise members of the profession in Ontario on legal ethics.

The Treasurer appointed a Special Committee composed of Messrs. Arnup, Creighton, Sedgwick and R. F. Wilson.

Your Special Committee met on January 16, 1959, the following members being present: Messrs. Arnup, Creighton, Sedgwick and R. F. Wilson.

Mr. Creighton was elected Chairman.

Your Committee recommends the appointment of a STANDING COMMITTEE ON PROFESSIONAL CONDUCT of five members, consisting of the Chairman and Vice-Chairman of the Discipline Committee, the Chairman of the Legal Education Committee, and two other members appointed by the Treasurer; provided that at all times three members of such Standing Committee shall also be members of the Discipline Committee; and that Rules 27 and 28 be amended accordingly.

THE REPORT WAS ADOPTED.

AMENDMENT OF RULES

Moved by Mr. Creighton, seconded by Mr. Sedgwick, that Rule 27(1) be amended by adding thereto the words and figures: "12. Professional Conduct".

That Rule 28(1) be amended to read as follows:

"28(1) The Standing Committees shall each consist of not less than fourteen members, except the Public Relations Committee, the Legal Aid Committee, the Continuing Education Committee, the Admissions Committee, and the Professional

Conduct Committee, which shall consist of not less than five members."

Carried.

The Treasurer appointed the following *Committee on Professional Conduct*: Messrs. Arnup, Creighton, Sedgwick, Sheard and R. F. Wilson.

PRESENTATION

The Treasurer reported that Mr. Albert J. Wilson, Barrister, had presented to the Law Society a group of copper and steel engravings of lawyers and judges, once the property of the late Albert Britnell.

It was ordered that the presentation be gratefully accepted, and that the Treasurer write to Mr. Wilson.

CORRESPONDENCE

The Treasurer read the following correspondence:

Letter from Hugh T. Lemon, Planning Secretary, Board of Trade of Metropolitan Toronto, enclosing copy of a letter from the Board of the Council of the Corporation of Metropolitan Toronto, recommending that appropriate action be taken to restore the advisory services for matters pertaining to the development along University Avenue, including the removal, storage and re-locating of the South African memorial.

Ordered that the Society write to the Council of the Corporation of Metropolitan Toronto, supporting the action taken by the Board of Trade of Metropolitan Toronto.

The Committee reported that after due inquiry it found the solicitor was guilty of professional misconduct and of conduct unbecoming a barrister and solicitor in that he failed to keep books and accounts in connection with his practice as required by the Rules Respecting Accounts of the Law Society of Upper Canada, and failed to keep in his clients' trust account at all times a sum sufficient to satisfy all indebtedness to clients for trust funds for which he was liable to account, and appropriated to his own use and failed to account for a sum of money received by him as solicitor for an estate of a deceased person.

Moved by Mr. Creighton, seconded by Mr. Seymour, that the Report be adopted.

The solicitor did not attend nor was he represented by counsel.
 The motion was carried.

1. ORDERED that the Report of the Discipline Committee in the matter of KENNETH EARL CUNNINGHAM, Barrister, a member of this Society and a Solicitor of the Supreme Court of Ontario, be adopted.
2. THAT upon the facts ascertained and appearing by the said Report and the evidence and other papers referred to and submitted to Convocation therewith, Convocation finds the said KENNETH EARL CUNNINGHAM guilty of professional misconduct, and of conduct unbecoming a Barrister and Solicitor in respect of the charges dealt with by the said Report.

TO THE LEGAL AID COMMITTEE

The Provincial Director begs leave to present his seventh Report.

The information set out below shows only part of the real picture of legal aid in Ontario. Behind the figures are the hundreds of citizens who have turned to the Bar of this Province for aid and advice in time of trouble. With comparatively few exceptions, the lawyers of Ontario have recognized the very real need for legal assistance, and have provided it. The continued success — or even existence — of the Plan depends on the generous and able contribution of the volunteer lawyers who have administered it. Special thanks must be given to the younger members of the Bar without whose efforts the Plan could not operate. As ever, the Law Society is grateful for the

generous financial assistance of the Government of Ontario and the continued interest of the Attorney-General.

It is with regret that I report that two counties — Norfolk and Renfrew — have failed to report on the year's work although the County Director in each case was requested to do so in three letters and one telegram. One county and two districts have no formal organization but it is stated all applications for legal aid were dealt with by individual solicitors, although no records were kept. The figures which appear later in this report do not, therefore, include credit for considerable legal aid work done in 1958 in these five areas.

Legal Aid Clinics were held in eleven counties — in four regularly and in seven as required. The following counties held clinics during the year:

throughout the Province.

Last year I reported that Legal Aid had become an accepted service by the legal profession to the public, and there was less need for clinics. 1958, however, shows an increase in the number of counties holding clinics — 11 as against 9 in 1957 — and an increase in the number of clinics held — 200 as against 179 in 1957. The totals set out later show an increase in the number of applications for aid, and an increase in the number of cases where aid and advice were given. This increase was a common experience of legal aid organizations throughout Canada and the United States, and is generally attributed to the recession and unemployment.

In the counties and districts where no clinics are held, ap-

plications for legal aid are dealt with in various ways that appear to be adequate and meet the local situations.

In two counties no applications for legal aid were received, and in one other county no applications in civil matters.

In twenty-two counties all members of the profession were available for legal aid work. In other counties the number of lawyers who take part is impressive; but there must be the continued and wholehearted support of the profession, and particularly of the younger members.

With incomplete information as indicated above, the following figures indicate the legal aid work in Ontario in 1958:

Of the above totals, there were in York County 2142 applications for legal aid in civil matters, and aid was given in 1407 cases; in criminal cases 708 applications were received, and aid was given in 555 cases.

In criminal matters, aid was given to 15 persons accused of murder, and to 172 charged with other serious offences.

Once again I wish to extend my thanks for the guidance and counsel of the Chairmen and members of the Legal Aid Committee.

On behalf of the Committee and personally I wish also to thank the Local Advisory Committees, the Local Directors, and members of the profession generally for their great contribution to the success of the Legal Aid Plan.

As always, particular thanks must be extended to J. Douglas Conover, County Director for York, and his able staff and assistants for their services in handling approximately two-thirds of the legal aid work in the Province.

WEST WING STAIRWAY

For many years the Library Committee has had under consideration the use of the west wing stairway at Osgoode Hall as additional library accommodation.

By Order-in-Council dated 13th October 1955, permission was granted by the Government to the Law Society of Upper Canada to occupy certain rooms in the basement, ground floor, the second floor stairway and all of the third floor or attic at Osgoode Hall.

The existing stairway is open at all floors and a fire on any one floor could rapidly spread from the basement to the attic. A real fire hazard exists in this area.

By removing the existing wooden stairway and replacing it with a fireproof one in another location and with structural alterations involving the extension of the second floor levels where the old stairway is now situated, would not only reduce the fire hazard but space will eventually be available in the west wing for stacks with a capacity of 80,000 volumes.

The Law Society's architect, Mr. Arthur Heeney, Jr., was

consulted regarding the installation of a fire-proof stairway and the necessary alterations in the west wing area where the stairway is located.

The Chairman of the Library Committee was authorized to consult with the Ontario Government with a view of having the Government agree to the alterations and installation.

The Library Committee requested an inspection of the west wing area in question by the Fire Marshal's Department and as a result of this inspection certain recommendations were made which if implemented, will increase the estimated cost of the alterations and installation.

The Committee recommends that this work be proceeded with according to the above arrangement, subject to final approval by the Minister of Public Works and Finance Committee.

PAYMENT OF TUITION FEES BY INSTALMENTS

The Committee recommends that fees may be payable by instalments; the first instalment to be \$200, the second instalment \$145 payable upon the opening of the spring term. Students who have not paid the second instalment by 15th January to be refused admission to lectures.

ADMISSION AS SPECIAL STUDENTS

The Chairman stated that the privilege of being allowed to enter Osgoode Hall Law School as a special student with per-

mission to take certain courses should be only rarely conferred and under special circumstances. The Chairman's statement received the approval of the Committee.

SUPPLEMENTAL EXAMINATION RESULTS — AUGUST, 1959

The record of the returns of the examiners of the Supplemental Examinations, August 1959, for all years is submitted herewith.

First Year

There were 81 students who wrote these examinations and of that number 51 passed clear and have completed the work of the First Year and will proceed into the Second Year of the LL.B. course in September 1959. There were 14 students who failed in one subject, 13 students who failed in the two subjects and 3 students who failed in three subjects. The Faculty has considered each of the failures and on the basis of their academic record and medical and other evidence 1 student has been allowed the one subject which he failed, 5 students have been granted permission to repeat their First Year, and 24 students have been asked to withdraw from the School.

The Committee decided to ask the Dean for a report on the policy of the Faculty with respect to students who failed only one subject on the supplemental examinations in the First Year.

Second Year

There were 60 students who wrote these examinations and of that number 56 passed clear and have completed the work of their Second Year and will proceed into the Third Year of the LL.B. course in September 1959. There were 2 students who failed in one subject, 1 student failed in two subjects and 1 student failed in three subjects. The Faculty has considered each of the failures and on the basis of their academic record and medical and other evidence 2 students were allowed one subject and have been granted permission to enter the Third Year of the LL.B. course and the remaining 2 students have been asked to withdraw from the School.

Third Year

There were 3 students who were carrying subjects from their Second Year and who wrote these subjects on the Second Year supplementals in August 1959. These students have

passed clear and completed their work of the Second Year and are now proceeding into the Fourth Year of the old four year course.

Fourth Year

There were 36 students who wrote the supplemental examinations of the Fourth Year in August 1959, and of that number 31 have passed clear and have completed their academic requirements entitling them to graduation from the Law School and call to the Bar. There were 5 students who failed to attain pass standing but on the basis of their academic record and medical and other evidence 3 students have been allowed one subject and will be entitled to graduate from the Law School and be called to the Bar and 2 students who failed in three subjects have been allowed to repeat their year.

DISCIPLINE COMMITTEE

RE: CHARLES HERBERT McGRATH.

The Committee reported that after due inquiry it found the solicitor was guilty of professional misconduct and conduct unbecoming a barrister and solicitor in that he failed to keep books and accounts in connection with his practice as required by the Rules Respecting Accounts of the Law Society of Upper Canada; failed to keep in his clients' trust account at all times a sum sufficient to satisfy all indebtedness to clients for trust funds for which he was liable to account; appropriated to his own use a sum of money received by him from a client as his solicitor; and refused or neglected to reply to letters from the Law Society of Upper Canada with reference to complaints against his professional conduct.

The solicitor did not attend nor was he represented by counsel.

It was resolved that upon the facts ascertained and appearing by the said Report and the evidence and other papers referred to and submitted to Convocation therewith, Convocation finds the said CHARLES HERBERT McGRATH guilty of professional misconduct, and of conduct unbecoming a Barrister and Solicitor in respect of the charges dealt with by the said Report.

THAT the said CHARLES HERBERT McGRATH be disbarred.

THAT the said CHARLES HERBERT McGRATH is unworthy to practice as a Solicitor.

RE: HOMER WINSTON AITCHESON.

The Committee reported that after due inquiry it found the solicitor was guilty of professional misconduct and conduct unbecoming a barrister and solicitor in that he failed to keep in his clients' trust account or accounts at all times a sum sufficient to satisfy all indebtedness to clients for trust funds for which he was liable to account; converted to his own use a sum of money the property of a client; and converted to his own use a sum of money held by him for an Estate in his hands.

Moved by Mr. Creighton, seconded by Mr. Levinter, that the Report be adopted.

The solicitor did not attend nor was he represented by counsel.

The Report of the Discipline Committee in the matter of HOMER WINSTON AITCHESON, Barrister, a member of this Society and a Solicitor of the Supreme Court of Ontario, was adopted.

It was resolved that upon the facts ascertained and appearing in the said Report and the evidence and other papers referred to and submitted to Convocation therewith, Convocation finds the said HOMER WINSTON AITCHESON guilty of professional misconduct, and of conduct unbecoming a Barrister and Solicitor in respect of the charges dealt with by the said Report.

THAT the said HOMER WINSTON AITCHESON be disbarred.

THAT the said HOMER WINSTON AITCHESON is unworthy to practice as a solicitor.

Call — (Name, Telephone No.)
(Name) Real Estate”

The Committee recommends that this correspondence be referred to the Professional Conduct Committee.

The SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON COMPENSATION FUND begs leave to make the following Report:

At the meeting of Convocation on 19th June 1959, at the request of the Treasurer, Mr. Arnup presented the Report of the Discipline Committee, with reference to an application for payment out.

Mr. Arnup addressed Convocation on the Compensation Fund generally, and on some of the problems that had risen before the Discipline Committee. LADIES AUXILIARY TO THE LEGAL PROFESSION OF HAMILTON PRIZE

The Ladies Auxiliary to the Legal Profession of Hamilton Prize is an annual sum which may be awarded to the student whose home is, or within the past two years has been, in Hamilton, and who attended McMaster University, who attained the highest standing in his First Year at the Osgoode Hall Law School, and who is entering the Second Year of the Osgoode Hall Law School Course.

The recommendation of the Dean that the prize be awarded to Milton Joseph Lewis is before the Committee. *Approved.*

STUDENTS IN THE LL.B. COURSE WORKING IN LAW OFFICES

The Faculty of the Law School is concerned with the practice of some students in the LL.B. course, particularly those in the final year, accepting part-time employment in law offices. It is difficult to determine the extent of this practice but the Faculty has some cause for believing it to be widespread.

Tangible evidence was afforded recently by one student applying for leave to take such employment during the school term and also by an advertisement which appeared in the 2nd October 1959, issue of the Ontario Weekly Notes reading: "Third Year law student required".

This matter was discussed fully at a meeting of Faculty on Monday, 28th September 1959, and after having again confirmed the wisdom of the rule which precludes these students from taking outside employment during school hours in term, the following action was taken:

1. The Dean appointed a Special Committee of the Faculty to study and report on the question of necessary financial assistance to students over and above that now provided by the Law School on its own behalf or through governmental agencies; and
2. A resolution was passed requesting that the Dean approach the Chairman of the Legal Education Committee with a view to having a notice inserted in the Ontario Weekly Notes to the effect that students are precluded from taking outside employment during school hours in

term and that practitioners be asked to co-operate to the end that this rule may be obeyed.

Your Committee recommends that the attention of the profession be again drawn to the recommendation of the Committee adopted by Convocation on 20th September 1956, and published in Ontario Weekly Notes 19th October 1956, No. 35, by re-publishing the same in the Ontario Weekly Notes.

REGISTRATION IN LAW FACULTIES

The Dean submits a memorandum showing the total registrations in all years at Osgoode Hall Law School to be 880 as of 9th October 1958, and 765 as of 3rd October 1959. *Noted.*

THE BUTTERWORTH PRIZE

The Dean submits a memorandum stating that Butterworth & Co. (Canada) Limited, through Mr. M. I. Mail, General Manager for Canada, has been pleased to offer a set of Butterworth's Ontario Digest as an annual prize to be awarded to the student in the graduating year of the LL.B. course who, in the opinion of the Faculty, has been outstanding in (a) academic work; (b) participation in students' extracurricular activities, and (c) who intends to engage in the practice of law. The prize would be awarded in the academic session 1959-60 and subsequent years. A similar prize has been awarded at the Faculty of Law, University of Toronto, for some years. The Dean recommends that the generous offer be accepted with suitable acknowledgment and that the details be left to be worked out between the Dean and the representative of Butterworth & Co. *Approved.*

FIRST YEAR SUPPLEMENTAL EXAMINATION

RESULTS — AUGUST, 1959

At its meeting on 5th October 1959, the Faculty adopted a re-statement of its policy in the following terms:

"Where a student fails to attain pass standing in one or more subjects at the First Year supplemental examinations and consequently has not successfully completed the work of the year, he will not be allowed to repeat the year unless there are exceptional circumstances made known to the Faculty on satisfactory evidence, such as illness, financial circumstances, etc., which it would appear may have had a direct bearing on his performance at the examinations.

"In addition there may be an extremely limited number of

cases where a student's performance in all subjects but one would appear to be satisfactory and would warrant affording him a second chance to complete the year." *Received.*
