ATTORNEY GENERAL OF THE PROVINCE OF QUEBEC

from 1766 to 1769.

JURIST - MATHEMATICIAN - LINGUIST - HISTORIAN

PUBLICIST.

"THE VETERAN OF SCIENCE".

BORN in London 15 December 1731.

DIED in his fine villa at Râgate, Surry, Eng-

land, 19 May 1824, in the 93rd year of

his age.

Born in London 15th December 1731
Baron Maseres held the now long extinct office
(19 May 1824)
of Cursitor Baron from 1773 till his death - a length of
tenure said to be without parallel in the law. His assoc-
iation with Canada dates from an earlier period, from 1766
to 1769, when he was Attorney-General of Quebec. This office
he filled with so much dignity and zeal that on his return to
England he was requested by the Protestant settlers of Quebec
to act as their agent at home. While in Quebec he took keen
interest in Canadian questions and several of his memorandum
on legal and constitutional affairs are printed in the official
documents relating to constitutional history published in 1907
at Ottawa as part of the Canadian Archives. But, although

APPOINTED May 31 1777.


SERVED till about 1786.

Quebec.


WAS BORN March 1754.

Graduate of Oxford.

Sailed for this Country with Gen. Simcoe in
1792.

In 1801 resigned and retired on pension to
England.

DIED in "Albany House" 17 February 1824 in
London in affluent circumstances.



HON. JUDGE ISAAC OGDEN.
OF MONTREAL AND QUEBEC.

BORN in New Jersey, January 1740, but as a Loyalist left the Country and went to England, where in 1785 he was appointed Judge of the Admiralty Court, Quebec; was then about 45 years of age. He was later appointed by Lord Dorchester a Judge of the Court of Kings Bench District of Montreal, to which place he removed, and in which position he continued till 1818, when, through ill health, he resigned and returned to England for treatment, but a gradual failing brought about his death in London on the 1st February 1824 at the age of 85.


APPOINTED ^{*cf Quebec*} 13 October 1802.

cil Quebec.



CHIEF JUSTICE JONATHAN SEWELL.

Of the Province of Quebec.

APPOINTED in 1808. BORN in Cambridge, Mass., in the year 1766. WAS a U.E. Loyalist, retiring to England, was educated there. Recrossed Atlantic to St. John, N.B., in 1785. Was first Law Student in New Brunswick. IN 1789 removed to Quebec and in that year was admitted to the Bar. Was Solicitor General in 1793. Attorney General in 1795. A member of the Provincial Parliament. He continued as Chief Justice till 1838. He died in Quebec 12 November 1839 in the 73rd year of his age.

CHIEF JUSTICE JAMES REID.

OF MONTREAL.

ADMITTED TO BAR IN 1794. Raised to Bench in May 1807. Created Chief Justice in 1823. Resigned on account of advancing age in 1838. While on a visit to England declined honour of Knighthood. His widow erected wing of General Hospital, known as "Reid Wing", to his memory. He was married in Montreal 11 February 1808 to Miss McGillivray. BORN in Scotland in 1769 in the Village of New Deer. DIED at Montreal 19 January 1848 in the 79th year of his age.

STEPHEN SEWELL, K.C.

FIRST BATONNIER OF THE MONTREAL BAR.

SOLICITOR GENERAL OF THE PROVINCE OF QUEBEC,

but lost office through some misunderstanding with, the then, Governor Sir George Prevost. Was connected with almost every public movement.

Was a warden of Christ Church Montreal in 1802.

Brother to Chief Justice Jonathan Sewell.

DIED of Cholera in Montreal in 1832. In 1826

was of firm of Sewell & Griffin - Incorporation of Montreal Bar 1849. BORN 8 June 1770 at Cam-

bridge, Mass. As a N.E. Loyalist, early left U.S.

for England, where he was educated. Returned to

America where he went to reside in St. John, N.B.,

in 1787. Left there for Quebec or Montreal in

May 1791. Admitted to Bar of N.B., 3 May 1791

before he was 21. His first case as Junior

Counsel October or November 1792.

CHIEF JUSTICE JAMES STUART.

Born at Fort Hunter, N.Y., 2nd March 1780.

WENT to College in Windsor, N.S.

IN 1794 Law Student with Mr Reid, Montreal.

IN 1798 was with Jonathan Sewell, with whom he completed his studies.

CALLED to Bar 28th March 1801.

IN 1805 Solicitor General of Lower Canada and removed to Montreal.

IN 1808 represented Montreal in Quebec Legislature, and so continued till 1817.

IN 1827 Member of Executive Council. Returned to Quebec.

IN 1838 appointed Chief Justice in succession to Sewell.

DIED at Quebec 14 July 1853.

CHARLES R. OGDEN.

ATTORNEY GENERAL FOR THE DISTRICT OF MONTREAL
during the troubles of 1837-1838.

An inveterate practical Joker. BORN in Three
Rivers February 1791. Educated under Mr
Skakil.

Called to the Bar in 1812 - Commenced practise
at Three Rivers, then returned to Montreal.

Received Silk Gown in 1818. Much interested
in the general politics of that day. DIED in
February 1866 in the 75th year of his age.

Hon. J. Haliburton -
"Sam Slick" -

Was born in Windsor N.S. in 1796 - He died
at his residence "Gordon House", Isleworth
England in July 1865. Educated at Kings College,
N.S. Admitted to the Bar in 1820. A member
of the House of Assembly. In 1829 was appointed
Chief Justice Court of Common Pleas - In
1840 Judge of the Supreme Court. Resigned in
1842. and went to England to reside, where in
1859 he was elected a member of Parliament.
In 1858 received D.C.L. from Oxford - In 1865
declined reelection on account of ill health.
and shortly afterwards died - aged 68 -
He commenced his literary work in 1835 -
His most popular works are "Sam Slick, the
Clock Maker" - "Rubbles of Canada" - "Letters to
Lord Durham" &c -

Abn Denis Benj^r Viger -
Member of Legislative Council - of
Lower Canada. Went twice to England - to
protest against English Government's
Colonial Policy towards Canada in 1828. & 1831.
Born 19 August 1774 - Attended College at Montreal
when 22 was elected to Parliament. In 1800
represented Montreal City - and 1827 set in Assembly
for County of Kent. Was early admitted to the
Bar - Was in 1838 incarcerated for 18 months
for seditious sentiments - Afterwards reelected
to Parliament in 1841 till 1845 - when through
absence & illness. seat forfeited. Died
in his 87 year of age in Montreal -
One of largest & generous ever seen



Hon Louis Joseph Papineau

Born in Montreal October 17 89.
Educated at the Seminary of
Lubec - Stearns College at the
age of 17, he entered on the study
of Law and was called to the Bar
in 1811 - or 1812; Went early into
Politics. Elected a member of Legislature
in 1809 for County of Kent (Chambly) After
representing this for 2 years - he was for
so consecutive years member for the
West Division or Ward of Montreal. Took
part in War of 1812 - In 1807 elected Speaker
of Assembly as a salary of £1000 - In 1820
appointed executive Councillor - visited England
to plead against Canadian grievances. Agitation
went on from bad to worse then the Rebellion of
1837-38. Afterward his flight to United States -
where after 2 years residence, he left for Paris
then Home after 8 years residence there - In 1854
retired from public life. Fond of Book & flowers -
Died at his Country seat Monto Bello - at 85
on Saturday 23 Sept 1871 -
