## ROYAL COMMISSION ON EDUCATION.

At the meeting in October the Committee recommended that the section of the Sub-committee herein and the Brief prepared by it be approved and that a copy of the Brief be attached to the report of the Committee and entered in the Minutes of Convocation. The Treasurer reports that on October 25th he attended before the Royal Commission, presented the Brief, and answered some enquiries from members of the Committee.

*Approved.*

## EXAMINATIONS—First Year.

At the meeting in October the Dean submitted a letter dated October 11th with reference to providing some assistance to the Lecturers in reading and grading of examination papers. The Committee recommended that the matter be referred with power to act to a Sub-committee consisting of Messrs. Cassels (vice-chairman), Chitty and Wilson. The Sub-committee recommends that the Lecturer in each subject in the first year be authorized to employ a member of the Bar of his own choosing to assist him,

the Lecturer continuing to be responsible for reporting on the results of the examination as a whole; and further recommends that as far as possible ex-servicemen be employed for this work.

Your Committee notes the action taken by the Sub-committee and recommends that it be approved.

#### ORAL EXAMINATIONS—First and Third Years.

Consideration of the arrangements for and the date of these examinations is before the Committee.

Your Committee recommends that this matter be referred to the Chairman and Vice-chairman with power to make all necessary arrangements including the appointment of enough examiners to complete the examinations in the First year in the usual way within one week.

#### SERVICE UNDER ARTICLES.

At the meeting in October a letter from the County of York Law Association, dated October 10th, with reference to the difficulty experienced by some students in receiving training, and offering the assistance of the Association, was before the Committee. It was recommended that the Secretary write the County of York Law Association thanking it for its interest in the legal education of students and for its offer of assistance; and that the Dean obtain a list of those students in the Law School who had not yet been placed in a Toronto office and that a special meeting of the Committee be called when the information had been obtained.

As a result of the Dean's announcement to the three years in the Law School a list showed that there were 33 in the first year, 10 in the second, and 1 in the third. Since the list was prepared 4 students have been placed and others are being assisted. Under these circumstances the Chairman decided that it was not necessary to call a special meeting and recommended that the Secretary and his staff continue in their efforts to assist the remaining students.

As a result of an interview and some correspondence between the Treasurer and the Attorney-General, it is hoped that several more students will be placed with the legal staff of government

departments at the Parliament Buildings. This correspondence is before the Committee.

A group of young Toronto solicitors, organized by Mr. F. R. Hume, have volunteered their services in assisting students of the First year in office training. 150 students of the First year asked for such assistance and they meet each Monday night in groups of 25 for discussions on office practice and training.

Your Committee recommends that the above arrangements be approved and that the Secretary inform the County of York Law Association of what is being done in this matter and write a letter of appreciation and thanks to Mr. Hume and his associates.

ADMISSION.

*Rule 86A(1) (c)—Graduates.*

A letter dated October 13th, 1945, from E. Stanley Ryerson, M.D., C.M., Director, School of Physical and Health Education, University of Toronto, requests consideration of the inclusion in the regulations for admission as a student of the graduate class, a graduate of that School. A letter from Dr. Sidney E. Smith, President, University of Toronto, and a memorandum from the Dean are before the Committee.

Your Committee recommends that the request be refused.

*Rule 86B(2)—Matriculants.*

The form of certificate issued by the University of Toronto for the first year in the Faculty of Arts in a special session for ex-service personnel, April to August (inclusive) 1945, was before the Committee at its October meeting. It was recommended that the Secretary obtain further information on the granting of such certificates. The Registrar of the University of Toronto informs the Secretary that the special course referred to was arranged to meet requests of ex-servicemen who were returned to Canada or discharged too late for regular courses. In the time available, April to August inclusive, it was decided that the students probably could not take the five subjects usually required and took only four. The Registrar states that most of the students who took the special course are proceeding to a degree, many of them



in honour courses. Whether or not these students will be required before graduation to write off the fifth first year subject depends on the circumstances in each case. If a student had the full admission requirements, 9 Upper School papers and at least 8 months' service with the armed forces, he will not be required to write off the fifth subject. Another special course in first year Arts may be given depending on the demand and obtaining the required extra staff and accommodation, but if the special course is given again it will consist of five subjects as ordinarily required. If the student obtains 60 per cent. on each of these five subjects he is eligible as of right under Rule 86B(2). In a special case the committee has already accepted a certificate granted in the special session April to August inclusive, 1945.

Your Committee notes the above information and recommends that no further action be taken.

#### CASE BOOKS.

##### *Torts—Property I. (Personal Chattels).*

A letter dated November 5th, 1945, from the Dean on this matter is before the Committee. The Dean has ordered 300 copies of Torts and 400 copies of Property I. Of the 300 volumes of Torts, 100 will be divided between Dalhousie University and the University of British Columbia.

Your Committee recommends that the action of the Dean herein be approved.

##### *Property II. (Land Law).*

A letter dated November 5th, 1945, from Mr. Bora Laskin with reference to this matter is before the Committee for consideration. A recommendation from the Dean is included in his letter of the same date.

On the request of the Dean, your Committee recommends that the Society purchase 300 copies of the 2 volume printed case-book on Property by Aigler, Bigelow & Powell, published by the West Publishing Company, to be sold to the students at cost for use in lectures to the First year.

## OSGOODE HALL LEGAL AND LITERARY SOCIETY.

The Society asks for an annual grant and an initial payment of \$300. With the approval of the Chairman and Vice-chairman of this Committee and of the Chairman of the Finance Committee, the initial payment has been made. The Society has presented a statement of its receipts and expenditures for the year ending August 31st, 1945, and the statement has been audited and found correct by Mr. A. E. Bennett of the Secretary's staff.

Your Committee recommends an annual grant with an initial payment of \$300, further payments to be made on the approval of the Vice-chairman of this Committee.

## POST-DISCHARGE RE-ESTABLISHMENT ORDER.

The Secretary submits correspondence between the Superintendent of Educational Training, Department of Veterans Affairs, and himself, with reference to the extra grant of \$150 for each ex-serviceman attending a University under the above order.

Your Committee recommends that this matter be referred to the Vice-chairman with power to act.

## SPECIAL PETITIONS.

Special petition by the following student was considered:

Gabriel Gilles Aubry asks that his name be changed on the Rolls and records of the Society to the above, from Gabriel Aubry as it now appears. He submits a certificate of baptism certifying that he was baptized under the name of Joseph Gabriel Gilles Aubry.

Your Committee recommends that the request be granted.

*Rhodes Scholar (Rule 135).*

*John McCreary Coyne*, an honour graduate of the University of Manitoba, was selected as Canadian Rhodes Scholar from Manitoba in 1940, but the scholarship was placed in suspension for the duration of the war. He asks that on compliance with the provisions of Rule 135 he be allowed to be Called to the Bar of Ontario and admitted as a solicitor of the Supreme Court of Ontario on the terms applicable to Rhodes Scholars from Ontario. He presents a certificate of graduation, a certified transcript of

his standing at the University of Manitoba, and evidence of his selection as a Rhodes Scholar. He enlisted with the R.C.A.F. in August 1942, serving overseas from February 1944 to August 1945, and was awarded the D.F.C. in March 1945. He was discharged on October 2nd, 1945, with the rank of Flying Officer.

Your Committee recommends that the request be refused.

#### ADMISSION.

*Dr. Charles F. Galway*, asks if he may be admitted as a student of the Graduate class on his degree in Medicine from Queen's University in 1934.

Your Committee recommends that the request be refused.

*Donald R. Morand*, Barrister and Solicitor of Windsor, asks if a student may be admitted in the graduate class with the degree of Bachelor of Commerce from the University of Western Ontario.

Your Committee recommends that the Secretary inform Mr. Morand that the degree is not accepted under Rule 86A.

#### LAW SCHOOL STAFF.

##### *Part-time Lecturers.*

A letter from the Dean is before the Committee recommending that upon the return from overseas of Mr. K. G. Morden (who has been on leave of absence without salary and who is expected to return later this month) the Dean be authorized to arrange with him to take the subject of Evidence in the spring term of 1946.

Your Committee recommends that the re-appointment of Mr. Morden be approved.

Moved by Mr. Cassels, seconded by Mr. White, that the report be adopted.

Moved in amendment by Mr. Mason, seconded by Mr. Shaver that the recommendations with reference to the acceptance of a degree from the School of Physical and Health Education, University of Toronto, a degree in Medicine from Queen's University and a degree of Bachelor of Commerce from University of Western Ontario, and with reference to the special petition of J. M. Coyne, a Rhodes Scholar from the Province of Manitoba, be not



now adopted and that they be referred to a committee consisting of the Treasurer, the Chairman of Standing Committees together with the vice-chairman of the Legal Education Committee, to consider these matters and all relevant rules and report to Convocation at its next meeting.

*The amendment was carried.*

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#### FINANCE COMMITTEE—MR. WHITE.

MONTHLY STATEMENTS—September and October 1945.

The usual monthly statements were presented.

ANNUAL FINANCIAL STATEMENT 1944-45.

The annual Financial Statement for the year ending 31st August 1945 as certified by the auditors, Messrs. Clarkson, Gordon, Dilworth & Nash, is submitted herewith for approval for publication pursuant to the rules.

ESTIMATES 1945-46.

An estimate of the probable receipts and expenditures for the year 1945-46 is submitted herewith and is recommended for approval.

NINTH VICTORY LOAN.

At the meeting of the Committee on October 16th this matter was referred with power to act, to a sub-committee consisting of the Chairman, the Treasurer and Messrs. McLaughlin and Shaver, the sub-committee reports that the Society has placed an application for \$50,000 of this loan. The sub-committee further recommends the sale of Second Victory Loan and Second War Loan bonds to pay for the Ninth Victory Loan bonds.

Your Committee recommends that the action of the sub-committee be approved.

PORTRAITS.

At the conclusion of the meeting of Convocation on October 18th, 1945, it was suggested that some action be taken in the

near future with reference to the painting of the portraits of the Treasurer and the Dean, and that the matter be placed on the agenda of the Finance Committee for this meeting.

Your Committee recommends that this matter be referred to the Chairman with power to act.

#### LAWYERS CLUB.

The Lawyers Club have asked permission to hold their dinner meetings in Convocation Hall for the current year.

Your Committee recommends that the request be granted.

#### FEDERATION OF COUNTY AND DISTRICT LAW ASSOCIATIONS.

The Federation asks permission to hold its annual dinner and meeting in the Law Society's building on Friday December 14, 1945.

Your Committee recommends that the request be granted.

#### SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON WARTIME EDUCATIONAL SERVICES.

##### *Refresher Course.*

The Special Committee is recommending to Convocation, subject to the approval of this Committee, that the Society purchase 226 copies of the printed lectures, for distribution without charge to those ex-servicemen who took the First Refresher Course, to the lecturers, to members of the Special Committee, and 3 copies for the Great Library; and the purchase by the Society of 500 or more copies for distribution on application and without charge to other graduate members of the Society who have been on active service or engaged in special war services. These expenditures, together with other incidental charges, such as reporting and mimeographing, and including the cost of the dinner to members taking the course, will amount to about \$11,000.

Your Committee recommends that the proposals of the Special Committee be approved.

#### COMMITTEE ON UNAUTHORIZED PRACTICE—Mr. Walsh.

*G. M. James* (Belleville).

In May 1945, Mr. J. L. McLennan was retained to take proceedings under The Solicitors Act, and the trial of Mr. James on

the charge of holding himself out as or representing himself to be a solicitor, was held before Magistrate R. B. Baxter in Belleville on Friday, October 5, 1945, and judgment was reserved. On November 9, 1945, Mr. McLennan attended in Belleville when judgment was delivered and the charge was dismissed. Mr. McLennan reported in full, and recommended that an appeal be taken.

Your Committee recommends that Mr. McLennan be instructed to appeal from the judgment of the Magistrate.

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#### COUNTY LIBRARIES COMMITTEE—Mr. Marshall.

Your Committee reports specially that the Lincoln County Law Association, having failed to file its Annual Returns within three months from the 15th day of January, 1945, has now filed its Annual Returns for the year 1945 and otherwise complied with the Rules adopted from time to time relating to County Law Libraries, and recommends that a grant be made to it of the amount to which it would have been entitled, if its returns had been filed within the time limited under Rule 62, namely \$575.00.

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#### WARTIME EDUCATIONAL SERVICES.

Mr. Beaton presented the report of the Special Committee.

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#### REFRESHER COURSE.

At the September meeting of Convocation, the Committee recommended that the course of lectures should commence on the 1st of October 1945, and continue for four weeks, and a proposed timetable was appended to that report. The Committee is pleased to report that the lectures were held in accordance with the timetable and were well attended, the number registered being something over two hundred.

The Committee feels that the success of the lectures was due to the enthusiastic co-operation received from the Lecturers, and records its grateful appreciation of the work they have done, and suggests that the thanks of Convocation be here recorded, and that the Treasurer be requested to convey those thanks by letter to each of these Lecturers.

As a fitting conclusion to the Refresher Course, the Treasurer and Benchers gave a dinner, on the evening of October 24th last, to the members of the Refresher Course, the Lecturers and the Editors of our Armed Forces Letter.

RE: PRINTING LECTURES.

Convocation will remember that at the meeting held on October 18th, 1945, the Committee submitted for consideration



a proposal made by Richard DeBoo Limited, as set forth in two letters, dated October 12th and October 18th, 1945.

The proposal was that the Committee purchase 225 copies of the lectures, for distribution, without charge, to those attending the first Refresher Course and to the Lecturers and others, and copies for the Great Library. At the same meeting of Convocation, the Committee was instructed and directed to enter into a contract with Richard DeBoo Limited. It was also suggested by many of the members of Convocation that copies of the lectures be made available, free, to any member of the Society who had been on active service or who had been engaged in special war services.

The Committee has, in accordance with the instructions received from Convocation, entered into an arrangement with Richard DeBoo Limited for the purchase of 225 copies of the lectures, for distribution to those who attended the First Refresher Course and to the Lecturers and others, and copies for the Great Library.

The Committee also recommends the purchase of 500 additional copies, to be made available to all the graduate members of the Society who have been on active service or have been engaged in special war services, other than those registered in the first Refresher Course, copies to be supplied on application to the Secretary, and without charge.

It is recommended that an announcement to the above effect be made through the Ontario Weekly Notes, the Armed Forces Letter, and otherwise as the Committee may decide.

It is to be noted, in connection with the arrangement made with Richard DeBoo Limited, that the publishers are at liberty to sell copies of the lectures to the profession at large, at \$17.50 each.

The Committee further recommends that copies of the lectures, specially bound in leather and with a special page in the front for suitable presentation and signature by the Treasurer, be ordered for all 16 Lecturers.

RE: COPYRIGHT.

The Committee recommends that the copyright in these lectures be retained in the name of the Law Society.

## RE: ESTIMATES.

There has been considerable expense in connection with the Refresher Course, the reporting of the lectures and the printing, and the Committee desires that Convocation should have full information in regard to these expenses. The Committee points out, however, that, except for the printing of the Armed Forces Letter, which it is proposed should be continued until the demobilization of the European-Canadian Army, there will be no other expense in connection with the activities of this Committee, and it is also thought that, with the publication of the lectures, and delivery free of charge to all members of the Society as mentioned above, there will be no necessity for a further Refresher Course.

The Committee recommended for the above purposes the expenditure of approximately \$11,000.00 as already approved by the Finance Committee in its report above.

THE REPORT WAS ADOPTED.

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## OFFICE SPACE FOR EX-SERVICEMEN.

Mr. Beaton referred to the suggestion made by some members taking the Refresher Course that the Society, through this Committee, might be able to make some arrangements for priority for ex-servicemen in obtaining offices in the space given up, or to be given up by Government services. Mr. Beaton stated that in accordance with the recommendation of his committee he had written The Honourable J. L. Ilsley in this connection and that the Minister had replied at some length pointing out that the suggestion was not practicable.

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## MEMORIAL TO THE LATE THOMAS GRAVES MEREDITH.

Mr. McKay presented the report of the Special Committee appointed to prepare a Memorial to the late Thomas Graves Meredith, K.C., and it was ordered that it be recorded on the Minutes of Convocation and a copy sent to the family of the late Mr. Meredith.

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Convocation records with regret the death of the late Thomas Graves Meredith, K.C., on October 18, 1945.

Thomas Graves Meredith was the sixth son of the late John Cook Meredith, whose family were originally Welsh but went to Ireland about 1600, and his wife Sarah Peglar, a native of England. John Cook Meredith came to Canada about 1832 and settled near London, Ontario and subsequently became Deputy Collector of Customs at Port Stanley and later Clerk of the Division Court at Middlesex, which position he held until his death, being a victim of the Victoria disaster on the River Thames.

Thomas Graves Meredith was educated at the old Helmuth Boys' College at London and at the Tassie School at Galt from which he matriculated to Toronto University but did not go on to a degree but entered the office of Messrs. Scatcherd & Meredith as a law student. The late Sir William Ralph Meredith was then a member of this firm. Mr. T. G. Meredith was called to the Bar of this Province as a barrister and solicitor in the Easter Term 1878 and entered the firm of Messrs. Scatcherd & Meredith. When his brother Sir William Ralph Meredith left London in 1895 he was made City Solicitor for London which position he held until his death. He practised also in partnership with Robert Grant Fisher under the firm name of Meredith & Fisher until Mr. Fisher was appointed a Judge of the Supreme Court of Ontario. He was also associated in partnership with George E. Taylor, now Mr. Justice Taylor of Moose Jaw, Saskatchewan and the late Mr. David McDonald who was afterwards Chief Justice of the Court of Appeal of British Columbia and at the time of his death he was associated in partnership with Mr. H. R. Davidson the firm being Meredith & Davidson.

A staunch Conservative, he declined the nomination to contest the Federal riding in London and also declined to accept a Judgeship. Throughout his life he was a member of St. Paul's Anglican Cathedral of London.

He was appointed one of His Majesty's Counsel in 1902 and was elected a Bencher of this Society on April 15th, 1920 to succeed the late Mr. A. H. MacDonald, K.C. and was re-elected at the Quinquennial elections of 1921, 1926, 1931, becoming a life Bencher in 1936. He was also a Trustee of the Middlesex Bar Association for a quarter of a century, being president from 1907 to 1909.

He was for several years an outstanding Counsel of the London Bar being solicitor for the Bank of Montreal and specialized in Municipal Law.

He was associated with the founding of the London and Western Trust Company in 1896, and was associated for many years with the Huron & Erie Mortgage Corporation and Canada Trust Company becoming president and chairman of the Board, but resigned as president in 1943 owing to declining health but continued as chairman of the Board of both until his death.

In 1882 he married Jessie Carling, daughter of the late Sir John Carling, who predeceased him several years ago and leaves two sons surviving him, Messrs. Stanley and Redmond Meredith, both of London.

He was the last surviving member of an illustrious family, his brother Sir William Ralph Meredith being Chief Justice of Ontario after having served as Conservative Provincial leader; another brother John C. Meredith became Manager of the Merchants Bank; Edmund Meredith was a noted criminal lawyer in London; Honourable Richard M. Meredith became Chief Justice of the Common Pleas Division of the Supreme Court of Ontario; H. Vincent Meredith became president of the Bank of Montreal and Charles Meredith was a prominent financier.

The sympathy of the Benchers is extended to his surviving family.

## LAW SCHOOL STAFF.

*Part-time Lecturer.*

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WALLACE NESBITT TRUST.

The Committee appointed under the Trust Deed submits for the approval of Convocation the following proposal with reference to the establishment of a second essay competition to be called the WALLACE NESBITT BARRISTERS' ESSAY COMPETITION.

## WALLACE NESBITT TRUST.

The Wallace Nesbitt Trust Declaration was accepted by Convocation on April 18, 1929. The Declaration provides that the income of the fund is to be expended as determined by the Treasurer of the Law Society, the Chairman of the Legal Education Committee and the Dean of the Law School, subject to the

approval of Convocation. For a number of years prize essay competitions were held pursuant to annual approval by Convocation, but on October 21st, 1937, Convocation approved of regulations governing an annual competition, and since that time a competition has been held each year without further approval of Convocation, the results being merely reported each year for the information of Convocation.

The annual competition above mentioned is open to students of the second and third years, and for the present we do not suggest any change in the regulations governing that competition. It may be called for convenience the WALLACE NESBITT STUDENTS' ESSAY COMPETITION.

We now propose for the approval of Convocation the institution of a second competition to be called the WALLACE NESBITT BARRISTERS' ESSAY COMPETITION, to be open to graduates of the Osgoode Hall Law School within the first two years after their call to the bar. We recommend that this competition be held annually and we submit herewith the proposed regulations.

#### REGULATIONS GOVERNING BARRISTERS' ESSAY COMPETITION.

1. Any member of the bar of Ontario who is a graduate of the Osgoode Hall Law School may submit an essay in the competition within two years of his or her call to the bar.

2. Every essay submitted shall be typewritten in triplicate, double spaced, on paper 11 inches by 8½ inches, on one side only of the paper and with a margin on the left-hand side of at least one inch and a half, and shall be delivered to the Secretary of the Law Society on or before the 1st day of October. The copies furnished shall thereupon become the property of the Law Society.

3. Every essay shall be signed by the author and shall be accompanied by a certificate signed by the author as follows:



"I hereby certify (1) that the essay entitled—submitted by me in the Prize Essay Competition of the Wallace Nesbitt Trust is my own work; (2) that it has not appeared in any printed publication; and (3) that it has not been submitted as an essay in any previous competition at Osgoode Hall or elsewhere or as a thesis for a degree in any University."

4. An essay may be upon any legal subject selected by the author, provided that on or before the 2nd day of July he gives notice in writing to the Secretary of the Law Society of the subject upon which he intends to write and that the subject is approved by the Dean of the Law School.

5. It is suggested that normally an essay should contain from 3,000 to 5,000 words.

6. Due care must be taken in respect to grammar, spelling and punctuation in every essay submitted, and carelessness in any of these particulars may be made the ground for rejecting an essay submitted.

7. In determining the relative merits of the essays submitted regard shall be had to form and literary quality as well as to such qualities as originality, learning and research.

8. The examiners shall be the committee nominated in the trust declaration, namely, the Treasurer of the Law Society, the Chairman of the Legal Education Committee, and the Dean of the Law School, or such persons as they may appoint as examiners, and all questions of controversy that may arise shall be decided by the committee or by the examiners appointed by them.

9. The examiners shall be the sole judges of the merits of the essays submitted, and they may in their discretion award prizes for any of the essays, not exceeding three, which they shall consider to be of sufficient merit. The prizes shall be \$150, \$75 and \$40 respectively, provided that if in the opinion of the examiners two or more essays are of equal merit, the amount of the prizes may be apportioned accordingly. The examiners may in their discretion increase the amount of any prize if they consider any essay to be of exceptional merit.



10. The examiners may reject all or any of the essays submitted as unworthy of a prize if in their opinion the essay or essays rejected is or are not of sufficient merit to justify the awarding of a prize. The examiners may also refuse to award the first and second prizes, or either one of them if in their opinion there are no essays submitted that in their opinion merit such prize or prizes.

Your Committee recommends that a copy of the plan be sent to each member of the Committee and that a special meeting be held at the call of the Chairman.

## PRESENTATION—Portrait.

Miss Gladys Clarkson Jones and Mrs. Newbold Jones, granddaughters of the late Chief Justice Jones have offered to present to the Society a portrait by Berthon of the late Chief Justice.

Your Committee recommends that Convocation gratefully accept the portrait and that a suitable letter of acknowledgment be sent.

## OSGOODE HALL LEGAL AND LITERARY SOCIETY.

The Society asks permission to hold a Students' Dance in Convocation Hall on Friday, March 8th, 1946. A letter from the President was before your Committee.

Your Committee recommends that the request of the Society be granted and that the Secretary make arrangements for adequate protection from fire.

## CASES JUDICIALLY NOTICED.

Your Committee approved of negotiations which are being carried on with the publishers of the Canadian Abridgment, leading to the publication of a consolidated list of Cases Judicially Noticed in Canadian Courts, together with annual supplements, and authorized the Chairman of the Library Committee, the Treasurer and the Chief Librarian to take such action in the premises as they may consider advisable.

## PURCHASE OF BOOKS.

For the first six months of the fiscal year the Library Committee has purchased books to the value of about \$1,800.00 for the Great Library, and about \$1,175.00 for the Phillips Stewart Library. This is a very large increase of purchases for the Phillips Stewart Library, and a decrease of purchases for the Great Library. This condition has been the result of a large increase of texts, legal periodicals and other books, recommended by the lecturers in the Law School. On the whole, while the purchases are greater than last year for the same period, the Library Committee appears to be well within its budget.

## THE CATALOGUE.

Now that the library staff has been augmented, the Chief Librarian hopes that it will be possible to make greater progress toward the completion of the catalogue which has been partially done.

(Canada) Ltd., requesting permission to use all or any of the headnotes in Ontario Law Reports, Ontario Reports and Ontario Weekly Notes, in compiling a proposed DIGEST OF ONTARIO CASE LAW, 1901-1945. Your Committee recommends that the request be granted, subject to a reservation making it clear that the Society's copyright in the headnotes is retained, and that the permission is not to be construed as an assignment of that copyright, or as prejudicing or affecting it in any way, and that the permission is not assignable and is revocable by the Society at any time.

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## UNAUTHORIZED PRACTICE—MR. WALSH.

G. M. JAMES (Belleville).

In May 1945 Mr. J. L. McLennan, Barrister, Toronto, was retained to take proceedings under The Solicitors Act, and the trial of Mr. James on the charge of holding himself out as or representing himself to be a solicitor was held before the Magistrate in Belleville on October 5, 1945, and judgment was reserved. On November 9, 1945, Mr. McLennan attended in Belleville when judgment was delivered and the charge was dismissed. Your Committee recommended that Mr. McLennan be instructed to appeal from the judgment of the Magistrate. The appeal was heard before His Honour Judge Madden on Tuesday, February 12, 1946, at Belleville, when judgment was reserved. On February 19, 1946 the appeal was allowed and

reasons for judgment given. Your Committee recommends that the reasons for judgment be published in the Ontario Weekly Notes forthwith.

#### RE UNAUTHORIZED PRACTICE, OXFORD COUNTY.

Your Committee has instructed Mr. J. L. McLennan, K.C., to investigate this matter thoroughly, and to report on the advisability of a prosecution.

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The Minutes of the meeting of Convocation of 21st February 1946 were read and confirmed.

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Pursuant to Rule 21, the Treasurer announced that the Special Committee on Legislation 1945-46 had an important report to present and with the consent of Convocation IT WAS ORDERED that the report be presented forthwith.

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## SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON LEGISLATION 1945-46.

Mr. Walsh presented the report of the Special Committee.

Since September 1945 the Committee on Unauthorized Practice has had before it copies of the legislation dealing with the legal profession of Alberta, Saskatchewan, Manitoba, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, England and New Zealand, together with copies of letters from the Secretaries of the other provincial societies reporting on the operation of the Acts in their respective provinces. The Chairman and Mr. Chitty interviewed the Attorney-General and discussed with him the advisability of legislation for the protection of the public and the legal profession in Ontario. The Committee recommended that the Treasurer and Chairman appoint a special committee to deal with this matter, and Convocation adopted this recommendation. A special Committee on Legislation 1945-46 was appointed by the Treasurer and Chairman consisting of the following: Mr. Denison (Treasurer) and Messrs. Chitty, Hays, Mason, Marshall, Parkinson and Walsh. Following the appointment of the Committee, the Treasurer and Mr. Walsh had a further interview with the Attorney-General and discussed with him the following draft bills:

An Act respecting Conveyancers

An Act respecting Commissioners for taking Affidavits and  
Notaries Public

An Act to amend The Solicitors Act.

On March 16, 1946 your Committee met, with Messrs. Bowlby, Cassels and Wilson also present, and the three bills were discussed and certain amendments recommended.

Your Committee approves in principle of the three bills, with the amendments proposed by the Committee, and recommends approval by Convocation.

Your Committee recommends, subject to the approval of Convocation, that the Attorney-General be requested to introduce the three bills in the Legislature forthwith.

Moved by Mr. Walsh, seconded by Mr. Wilson that the report be adopted, and the recommendations therein approved.

On a show of hands THE MOTION WAS LOST.

With the unanimous approval of those present, The Treasurer expressed to Messrs. Walsh and Chitty the thanks of Convocation for the care with which they had studied and explained the various features of this proposed legislation.

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## UNAUTHORIZED PRACTICE COMMITTEE—MR. WALSH.

## ESTATE INFORMATION SERVICE and A.P. COWLEY.

The Attorney-General's Department and several Toronto solicitors brought to the attention of your Committee certain work done in the Surrogate Court of the County of York by this Service, and in October 1945 your Committee recommended that proceedings under the Solicitors' Act be taken forthwith. Mr. J. L. McLennan, K.C. and Mr. G. A. Martin, K.C. were retained to act in this matter. After some investigation two charges were laid against A. P. Cowley,—(1) that he was practising or for gain or reward acting as a solicitor, and (2) that he was holding himself out or representing himself to be a solicitor.

After service of the summons, and of subpoenas on witnesses, Mr. Cowley communicated with the Chairman of your Committee and subsequently wrote a letter dated March 18th enclosing an undertaking, (1) that he would not at any time hereafter either directly or indirectly, or for or on behalf of any persons, prepare, fill in or engross any papers or swear any affidavits in connection with the estates of deceased persons, or file any such papers in any surrogate court or any succession duty or income tax offices; (2) that he would forthwith cease from and would not hereafter either directly or indirectly engage in advising any person with respect to succession duty or income tax; (3) that he would forthwith cease doing and would not hereafter do any work usually done by a solicitor; (4) that he would forthwith cease advertising or representing to any person that he can or will do any such work or business set out in paragraphs (1), (2) and (3) above; (5) that he would forthwith cease carrying on business under the name of Estates Information Service, and would not use any name inconsistent with the undertaking; (6) that he would forthwith change all letterheads, and advise the representatives of the estates referred to in a list annexed to the undertaking that he was withdrawing from the business of providing an estates information service; (7) that he would agree to permit The Law Society of Upper Canada or its authorized representative from time to time and at reasonable intervals and without notice, to inspect his records for the purpose of ascertaining if this undertaking is being carried out.

The letter of March 18th from Mr. Cowley to the Chairman, and the signed undertaking, together with a report from Mr. J. L. McLennan, K.C., were before your Committee on March 21st.

Your Committee recommends that the undertaking be accepted, and that the charges be withdrawn.

THE REPORT WAS ADOPTED.

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#### SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON ADMISSIONS.

Mr. Mason presented the report of the Special Committee

Following the presentation of the report of the Legal Education Committee to Convocation on November 15, 1945, and a



motion to adopt the Report, it was moved in amendment, seconded, and carried:

“That the recommendations with reference to the acceptance of a degree from the School of Physical and Health Education, University of Toronto, a degree in Medicine from Queen’s University, and a degree of Bachelor of Commerce, University of Western Ontario, and with reference to the special petition of J. M. Coyne, a Rhodes Scholar from the Province of Manitoba, be not now adopted, and that they be referred to a Committee consisting of the Treasurer, the Chairman of all Standing Committees, together with the Vice-Chairman of the Legal Education Committee, to consider these matters and all relevant rules, and report to Convocation at its next meeting.”

Your Committee, after careful consideration and consultation with prominent educationalists, recommended that Rule 86A be amended, and that the other matters referred to above be dealt with individually.

Your Committee now recommends that Rule 86A(1) be repealed, and that the following be substituted therefor:

“86A. Subject to Rule 88 any British Subject (hereinafter called the applicant) may be admitted as a student-at-law of the GRADUATE CLASS, who

- (1) presents proof that he is
  - (a) a graduate in the faculty of Arts, Law, Medicine, Engineering or Applied Science of any university in the Province of Ontario having power to grant a degree in that faculty,
  - (b) a graduate in any faculty of any university or college in any province of Canada, in the United Kingdom, or in any British dominion or colony having power to grant a degree in that faculty, provided that Convocation on the recommendation of the Legal Education Committee signifies by its approval of that faculty that it considers that graduation therein affords sufficient evidence of the learning and ability of an applicant for admission as a student-at-law of the GRADUATE CLASS.”

In pursuance of the amendment it will be necessary for the Secretary to have a list of approved faculties under clause (b). On the recommendation of the Dean your Committee approves of the following faculties as affording sufficient qualifications to a graduate therein for admission to the Law Society as a student-at-law of the Graduate Class:

- The faculty of arts or law of the University of Alberta;
- The faculty of arts or law of the University of British Columbia;
- The faculty of arts or law of the University of Manitoba;
- The faculty of arts or law of the University of New Brunswick;
- The faculty of arts or law of Dalhousie University;
- The faculty of arts or law of the University of Saskatchewan;
- The faculty of forestry of the University of Toronto;
- Complete course in the Royal Military College, Kingston;
- The faculty of arts, law, medicine, engineering, commerce or science of McGill University;
- The faculty of arts or law of the University of Montreal;
- The faculty of arts or law of Laval University.

JOHN MCCREARY COYNE, an honour graduate of the University of Manitoba, was selected as Canadian Rhodes Scholar for Manitoba in 1940 but the scholarship was placed in suspension for the duration of the war. He asks that on compliance with the provisions of Rule 135 he be allowed to be Called to the Bar of Ontario and admitted as a solicitor of the Supreme Court of Ontario on the terms applicable to Rhodes Scholars from Ontario. He presents a certificate of graduation, a certified transcript of his standing at the University of Manitoba, and evidence of his selection as a Rhodes Scholar. He enlisted with the Royal Canadian Air Force in August 1942, serving overseas from February 1944 to August 1945, and was awarded a D.F.C. in March 1945. He was discharged on October 2, 1945 with the rank of Flying Officer. On November 13, 1945 the Legal Education Committee recommended that the request be refused.

Your Committee recommends that, in consideration of the petitioner's substantial residence in Ontario, his war services, and his status as a Rhodes Scholar, and pursuant to section 43(a) of The Law Society Act, he be Called to the Bar of On-

tario and admitted as a solicitor of the Supreme Court of Ontario on the same terms as a Rhodes Scholar from Ontario.

RE ADMISSION UNDER RULE 86A(1) (b).

BACHELOR OF PHYSICAL AND HEALTH EDUCATION,  
UNIVERSITY OF TORONTO.

A letter dated October 13, 1945 from E. Stanley Ryerson, M.C., C.M., Director, School of Physical and Health Education, University of Toronto, requests consideration of the inclusion in the rule for admission as a student of the Graduate Class, a graduate of that School. A letter from Dr. Sidney E. Smith, President, University of Toronto, and a memorandum from the Dean were submitted. On November 13, 1945 the Legal Education Committee recommended that the request be refused.

Your Committee recommends that this School be not approved under the new Rule 86A(1) (b).

BACHELOR OF MEDICINE, QUEEN'S UNIVERSITY.

Dr. Charles F. Galway asks if he may be admitted as a student of the Graduate Class on his degree in medicine from Queen's University in 1934. On November 13, 1945 the Legal Education Committee recommended that the request be refused.

Your Committee recommended that this degree be accepted, and it is now included in the new Rule 86A(1) (a).

BACHELOR OF COMMERCE, ST. PATRICK'S COLLEGE, OTTAWA.

O. F. HOWE, K.C., Ottawa, asks if this degree is acceptable under Rule 86A. In October 1945 the Legal Education Committee recommended that no change be made in the rule as it then existed, and Mr. Howe was so informed.

Your Committee recommends that this degree be not accepted under the new Rule 86A(1) (b).

BACHELOR OF SCIENCE IN AGRICULTURE, MCGILL UNIVERSITY.

DAVID G. SCOTT asks if he may be admitted on this degree. Your Committee recommends that this degree be not accepted under the new Rule 86A(1) (b).

BACHELOR OF SCIENCE IN AGRICULTURE, ONTARIO COLLEGE OF  
AGRICULTURE, UNIVERSITY OF TORONTO.

A. M. PORTER, B.S.A., Registrar of the Ontario College of Agriculture, asks if this degree may be accepted under Rule 86A. Your Committee recommends that this degree be not accepted under the new Rule 86A(1) (b).

THE REPORT WAS ADOPTED.

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AMENDMENT TO RULES.

Moved by Mr. Mason, seconded by Mr. Shaver, that Rule 22 be suspended; that Rule 86A(1) be repealed and that the following new rule 86A(1) be substituted therefor:

86A(1) presents proof that he is

(a) a graduate in the faculty of arts, law, medicine, engineering or applied science of any university in the province of Ontario having power to grant a degree in that faculty,

(b) a graduate in any faculty of any university or college in any province of Canada, in the United Kingdom, or in any British dominion or colony having power to grant a degree in that faculty, provided that Convocation on the recommendation of the Legal Education Committee signifies by its approval of that faculty that it considers that graduation therein affords sufficient evidence of the learning and ability of an applicant for admission as a student-at-law of the Graduate Class.

## ORAL EXAMINATIONS 1946—FIRST YEAR.

## RE SPECIAL LECTURES.

Jonkheer J.W.M. Snouck Hurgronje, Esq., Minister of the Netherlands, has notified the Secretary that Professor Dr. Paul Scholten, Professor of Civil Law and Philosophy of Law of the University of Amsterdam, plans to visit the United States and Canada, arriving in New York around May 1, 1946. He asks whether the Law Society of Upper Canada would not be willing to organize one or perhaps two lectures for Dr. Scholten.

Your Committee refers this letter to Convocation for consideration and directions.

SPECIAL ARRANGEMENTS—Ex-Service Personnel.

*re Summer Tuition.*

On February 19th the Dean submitted a memorandum with reference to providing summer tuition for ex-service personnel who entered the Law School in January 1946.

The Committee recommended that the Vice-Chairman be authorized to make the necessary arrangements with Mr. C. L. Dubin for the First year, and with other recent graduates for the Second and Third years, and report back to the Committee.

*re Supplemental Examinations.*

The Committee further recommended that the Vice-Chairman confer with the Dean and Mr. Dubin, and report back to the Committee as to possible arrangements for summer tuition for ex-service personnel who have to write supplemental examinations in September.

The Vice-Chairman and the Dean reported progress in these matters and that they are working on plans to have recent graduates give tuition during the summer of 1946 in one or more subjects both for those students who entered in January 1946 and for those who have supplemental examinations in September 1946. They reported that they estimate the cost on this basis at about \$4,000.00.

Your Committee recommends that those students who have not been on active service be allowed to attend any of the courses in their respective years on payment of a fee of \$25.00.

Your Committee recommends that the Vice-Chairman and the Dean be authorized to complete the necessary arrangements and to report fully to your Committee at the May meeting.

SPECIAL ARRANGEMENTS—Ex-Service Personnel.

The question of allowing ex-service personnel to enter any of the years in January 1947 and subsequent years, was before your Committee for consideration.



Your Committee recommends that the matter stand for further consideration at the June meeting of your Committee when further information as to the return of Canadian Forces will be available.

LAW SCHOOL CURRICULUM—Municipal Law.

On February 19th 1946, the Dean recommended to your Committee that a lecturer be appointed, to give a course of 12 lectures on Municipal Law to the Third year beginning with the session 1946-47 and that no examination be held in this subject. The Committee approved of the recommendation of the Dean and authorized the Vice-Chairman to consult with Mr. F. A. A. Campbell, K.C., corporation counsel of the City of Toronto with reference to the appointment of a lecturer.

The Vice-Chairman reports that Mr. Campbell regrets that he cannot accept the appointment but that he highly recommends Mr. John Johnston, Assistant City Solicitor, for the appointment.

Your Committee recommends that the Dean be authorized to interview Mr. Johnston.

# ORDER

UPON THE APPLICATION of the Appellant on the 12th day of February, 1946, by way of appeal from an Order of Acquittal dated the 9th day of November, 1945, made by R. B. Baxter, Esquire, a Magistrate in and for the Province of Ontario, sitting at the City of Belleville, dismissing the charge laid by the Appellant that the Respondent in the month of January, 1945, at the City of Belleville in the County of Hastings unlawfully did hold himself out as or represent himself to be a solicitor, contrary to the provisions of the Solicitors' Act, R.S.O. (1937) ch. 223 and amendments thereto, and upon hearing the evidence adduced on behalf of the Appellant and the Respondent in the presence of Counsel for the Appellant, and upon hearing what was alleged by

Counsel aforesaid and by the Respondent, and Judgment being reserved until this day,

1. IT IS ORDERED that the appeal be and the same is hereby allowed, and the said Order of Acquittal dated the 9th day of November, 1945, be and the same is hereby reversed.

2. AND IT IS FURTHER ORDERED AND ADJUDGED that the Respondent in the month of January, 1945, at the City of Belleville in the County of Hastings unlawfully did hold himself out as or represent himself to be a solicitor contrary to the provisions of the Solicitors' Act, R.S.O. (1937) ch. 223 and amendments thereto.

3. AND IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that the Respondent be released upon suspended sentence to be called upon to appear and receive sentence for the said offence within six months if in such time he fails to keep the peace and be of good behaviour.

4. AND IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that the Respondent do pay to the Clerk of the County Court of the County of Hastings the sum of \$25.00 to be paid forthwith to the Appellant.

RE LEGISLATION, ONTARIO, 1946.

The Chairman reports that at the recent session of the Legislature Bill No. 122, An Act to Amend the Barristers Act, was duly passed and will come into effect on June 4th next. The Act provides as follows:

1. Section 6 of The Barristers Act is repealed and the following substituted therefor:
  6. The disbarment of a barrister who holds an appointment as one of His Majesty's Counsel Learned in the

Law shall have the effect of revoking such appointment.

Your Committee notes with satisfaction the passing of this Bill, and the Secretary was requested to write the Honourable the Attorney-General thanking him for his assistance and for his interest in the protection of the public and the profession.

THE REPORT WAS ADOPTED.

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## COUNTY LIBRARIES COMMITTEE—MR. MARSHALL.

### ANNUAL GRANTS.

Your Committee reports to the Finance Committee that the following county law associations have filed their annual returns for the year 1945 in accordance with Rules 62 and 63 and have complied in all other respects with the requirements of the Rules adopted from time to time by Convocation in relation to county libraries, and recommends and orders, if approved by the Finance Committee, that grants be made to such associations as follows:

All associations have filed their annual returns for 1945 except Parry Sound.

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### INSPECTION OF LIBRARIES.

Your Committee recommends that the Chief Librarian make an inspection of and report upon all the county libraries, as required by Rule 65, except that in the cases of Kenora, Rainy River, and Thunder Bay associations, he may obtain any information he may require from the county court judges in the respective counties or from other sources.

THE REPORT WAS ADOPTED.

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## SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON WARTIME EDUCATIONAL SERVICES.

Mr. Beaton presented the report of the Special Committee.



## KHAKI COLLEGE.

At the meeting of the Legal Education Committee on October 16th, 1945, Mr. Cassels, the Vice-Chairman, raised the question of the provision for a course in law through Khaki College for students still overseas in England and in the Army of Occupation. A memorandum of the Department of National Defence, dated October 4th, 1945, with reference to Khaki College was before the Committee. The Legal Education Committee recommended that this matter be referred to this Committee for consideration and report.

The matter was before your Committee on October 17th, 1945, and, in view of the fact that the Second, Third and Fifth Canadian Divisions were expected to return to Canada before the end of 1945, the Committee recommended that no action in the matter be taken at this time, but requested the Secretary to write to Brigadier G. E. Beament, Barrister, the President of Khaki College, to enquire in what way this Society might be of assistance to students and graduate lawyers in continuing their studies, pending their return to Canada.

On November 1st, 1945, the Secretary wrote Brigadier Beament to this effect, and he received a reply on November 9th, 1945. The gist of this letter may be expressed in the following sentence: "In my view, in the light of the prospects of the repatriation program, the facilities at present available are adequate to the demand." Brigadier Beament did suggest for the consideration of the Committee the possibility of a plan for providing suitable texts, law reports and legal journals for appropriate personnel who were unable, by reason of the demands of their military duties, to enjoy such facilities, or otherwise have access to suitable legal libraries. At the suggestion of the Treasurer, the Secretary wrote Brigadier Beament on January 25th, 1946, that with reference to the supplying of text books and law reports this might be a difficult matter to take up in a general way, but that the Secretary might adopt the policy pursued in regard to prisoners of war, and send individuals legal literature which might answer their particular needs, and pointing out that the question appeared to be one which could only be settled by direct correspondence between the student applicant and the Society. No such application has been received from any member



of the Armed Forces attending Khaki College, and the Committee recommends that no further action be taken.

#### ARMED FORCES LETTER.

At the meeting of Convocation on January 17th, 1946, the Treasurer read letters from J. W. Shea, Assistant Manager of the Mutual Life, Hamilton, Ontario, and from W. M. Vickers, suggesting that a letter similar to the Armed Forces Letter be made a permanent publication of the Society. It was ordered that these letters be referred to this Committee for consideration.

The Committee has considered this request, and has taken the opinion of Mr. Alan B. Harvey and Mr. Arthur A. Macdonald, the Editors of the Armed Forces Letter. They both are of the view that the letter be not continued as a permanent publication of the Society, and gave as their reasons therefor:

1. One purpose of the letter was to discuss items of news concerning the profession with those overseas, and this might be termed the "gossipy" feature of the letter. They can see no reason for continuing this.

2. The other purpose was to discuss some of the leading cases. The discussion was more or less of an elementary nature, and they feel that the letter, having served its purpose, should now be discontinued.

3. They also point out that the cost of printing the letter every month and sending it to every member of the Society would be about \$130.00 per month and, in the opinion of the Committee, the Editors could not be expected to continue this service in peacetime without any remuneration.

The Committee agrees with the views above expressed and recommends that the publication of the Armed Forces Letter be discontinued with the June issue, which will be Volume No. 36.

The Committee expresses its appreciation of the services gratuitously rendered by Mr. Harvey and Mr. Macdonald since the publication of Volume No. 1, on April 15th, 1943. The formal thanks of Convocation has already been tendered, and the Committee further recommends that a suitable gift or remembrance be given to the Editors, and the form of the gift or remembrance

be referred to the Treasurer and the Chairman of this Committee with power to act.

#### PLACEMENT SERVICE.

The Committee has from time to time reported to Convocation the work which has been done by the Secretary in assisting ex-servicemen in returning to the practice of law, and the Committee reports that through this service—

- 23 ex-servicemen have been directly placed in positions,
- 12 have been placed through contracts furnished by the Secretary's Office,
- 50 ex-servicemen have now advised that they are located, who had filed applications for assistance,
- 38 of whom had been interviewed and given such information as was available.

There are now 54 applications for assistance on file, of which 33 have been interviewed. There are now on file 19 applications for assistance from legal firms, most of which are of long standing, and 10 applications from Trust Companies, Government and Business Institutions. There have been 4 or 5 practices listed for sale, and the Secretary has been advised of 17 openings for new practices, some of which have been filled through suggestions made by the Secretary.

The Committee acknowledges the assistance which it has received from the Secretary and his Staff, and recommends that any further activity in respect of this service be carried on by the Secretary.

#### REFRESHER COURSE PRINTED LECTURES.

A large number of letters of appreciation and thanks for the printed lectures have been received from members of the Society who have been on active service. These letters are filed as appendices to this report.

#### DISCHARGE OF COMMITTEE.

This Committee came into existence as the result of a motion proposed on the 17th of December, 1942, by J. C. McRuer, K.C., now Chief Justice of the High Court Division of the Supreme

Court of Ontario, and the motion was prompted by a letter written to the then Treasurer, Mr. D. L. McCarthy, K.C., by the present Chief Justice of Ontario. Chief Justice Robertson, in his letter, pointed out that it had been his observation that many of the members of the Society who had been on active service for three or four years during the last war were out of touch with the world of law, and never did catch up after they returned to practice, and the learned Chief Justice had some suggestions of a practical nature. Mr. McCarthy was authorized or directed by Convocation to appoint a small Committee to study the problem generally, and to report back to Convocation.

The Treasurer appointed Mr. McRuer, Willes Chitty, Gordon Shaver and the Chairman of this Committee. The then Chairman of the Legal Education Committee, Mr. J. Shirley Denison, now the Treasurer, was shortly afterwards added to the Committee, as were Percy D. Wilson, Hamilton Cassels and Major R. D. Evans, a little later.

The Committee here records its thanks for the many valuable suggestions made by the Secretary and for the enthusiastic support which it has received from Convocation in respect of the various activities it has, with the authority of Convocation, undertaken. These consisted chiefly of:

1. The assistance to prisoners of war, by the sending of law books, case books and examination papers.
2. The Osgoode Hall Armed Forces Letter.
3. The Refresher Course and the printing of the lectures.
4. The placement service.

The tasks of the Committee have now been concluded, and the Committee, therefore, recommends to Convocation that, from and after the presentation of this report, this Committee be discharged.

#### THE REPORT WAS ADOPTED.

The Treasurer referred to the outstanding success achieved by Mr. Beaton and the members of this Committee and expressed to him and to them the sincere thanks of Convocation.

#### SPECIAL COMMITTEE RE WAR MEMORIAL.

The Treasurer presented the report of the Special Committee.

At the meeting of Convocation on March 21st the Treasurer appointed a Special Committee to consider the question of a war memorial to those whose names appear on the Roll of Honour and to those who served in the armed forces in the recent war. The Special Committee consists of the Treasurer, and Messrs. Beaton, Bowlby, Cassels, McLaughlin and White.

Your Committee met on April 5, 1946, and Mr. J. S. Denison, K.C. (the Treasurer) was elected Chairman and Mr. Peter White, K.C., Vice-Chairman.

Your Committee approves in principle of a war memorial, and recommends to Convocation that a war memorial project in some form be proceeded with.

Your Committee has considered the following suggestions:—

(a) To those who died in service (ornamental)—

- (1) A new entrance to the Great Library in the form of wrought iron gates with plaques on either side containing the names of those members who appear on the Roll of Honour;
- (2) A series of battle pictures to be framed and hung in the Society's building.
- (3) The erection of a statue or monument in the Society's grounds south of the roadway.

(b) To the memory of all those who served in the armed forces (utilitarian)—

The building of a gymnasium, assembly hall or swimming pool for the use of law students and graduates.

Your Committee recommends to Convocation that it be given authority to circularize the profession for ideas as to the form the war memorial might take; and to make reasonable preliminary expenditures in investigating and in the preparation of such plans or drawings as may be required.

ON MOTION OF MR. McLAUGHLIN THE REPORT WAS ADOPTED.

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#### SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON LEGISLATION 1941.

Mr. Walsh reported orally on the following Bills which were introduced at the recent Session of the Ontario Legislature:



BILL NO. 61—An Act to Amend the Surrogate Courts Act.

This includes the amendment to Section 65 which was recommended by the Society last year.

BILL NO. 122—An Act to Amend the Barristers Act.

This provides for the cancellation of the commission as King's Counsel of a Barrister who has been struck off the rolls.

BILL NO. 140—An Act to Amend the Judicature Act.

This provides for the appointment of two more Judges to the High Court Division, Supreme Court of Ontario.

Mr. Walsh reported that all three Bills had been passed and that Bills Nos. 61 and 122 will come into effect on June 4th. Bill No. 140 came into effect on proclamation.

*Re Summer Tuition.*

*Re Supplemental Examinations.*

At the meeting in April the Committee recommended that the Vice-chairman and the Dean be authorized to complete the necessary arrangements and report fully at this meeting.

The Dean recommends that with reference to the 12 subjects of the autumn term in all three years, tutors be employed to give lectures during the summer. The Dean recommends the appointment of—Mr. Charles Dubin, Mr. Paul Hess, Mr. E. N. Johnson, Mr. J. S. Midanik, Mr. R. M. Sedgewick, Mr. W. B. Williston and Mr. John Yaremko to lecture on the subjects as set out in his letter of May 13th, at a total cost of \$2,800.

The Dean further recommends that with reference to the subjects of the Easter term in all 3 years advisers be appointed to consult with those students who have to write supplemental examinations. The Dean estimates the sum of \$1,200 should be sufficient to cover payments to these advisers.

Your Committee recommends that the action taken by the Vice-chairman and the Dean be approved and that the recommendations of the Dean be approved and adopted.

## CASE-BOOKS—Mimeographing.

Under the plan proposed by the Dean and approved by this Committee and the Finance Committee, the Dean now reports on arrangements made to date.

Miss Joyce McLennan has been engaged as stenographer and mimeographer commencing on the 13th May.

Your Committee recommends that the action taken by the Dean and the recommendations made by him, including the employment of a stenographer and the necessary repairs to the basement room, be approved and adopted.

#### DEPARTMENT OF VETERANS AFFAIRS.

A letter from the acting District Supervisor of Training, Toronto, reports on departmental plans for assistance to veterans in training as students-at-law.

Your Committee notes this information with interest and recommends that it be brought to the attention of student veterans.

It was resolved THAT upon the facts ascertained and appearing by the said Report and the evidence and other papers referred to and submitted to Convocation therewith, Convocation finds the said KEITH IAN MCLEAN guilty of professional misconduct, and of conduct unbecoming a Barrister and Solicitor in respect of the charges dealt with by the said Report.

That the said KEITH IAN MCLEAN be disbarred.

THAT the said KEITH IAN MCLEAN is unworthy to practice as a Solicitor.

# LIBRARY COMMITTEE—MR. SHAVER.

## AMERICAN ASSOCIATION OF LAW LIBRARIES.

Your Committee recommends that the Chief Librarian attend the annual meeting of this Association, to be held at St. Louis on June 24th, 25th and 26th next.

## CLOSING OF LIBRARY.

Your Committee recommends that the Great Library remain open in the evenings and on Saturday afternoons until and including the afternoon of June 15th, 1946.

## MISS BROAD.

Miss Broad, Librarian of the Phillips Stewart Library, has asked that she be permitted to take the summer course in Law Library Administration which is to be given at Columbia University from July 6th to August 16th, 1946. Your Committee recommends, in view of her work in the main Library and her desire to be more useful there, that she take this course and that her expenses be paid.

## BOOK-CASES.

Your Committee recommends that three full-sized and three smaller book-cases of the best grade of white oak obtainable, be purchased through Mr. Heeney, subject to the approval of the Finance Committee.

## CASES JUDICIALLY NOTICED.

He suggests improvement in lighting the portraits and in the installation of a curtain on the back of each portrait to help in its preservation. Mr. H. O. McCurry, Director of the National Gallery of Canada, has kindly offered to place the Gallery's facilities at Mr. Harbour's disposal for the work on the five portraits which need laboratory treatment.

Your Committee recommends that the Secretary write Mr. H. O. McCurry, Director of the National Gallery of Canada, thanking him on behalf of Convocation and the Committee for his courtesy in providing the Gallery's facilities, and further recommends that Mr. Harbour's suggestions be referred to the Treasurer, Mr. H. J. McLaughlin, vice-chairman, and Messrs. Shaver and Walsh, with power to act.

#### REFRESHER COURSE PRINTED LECTURES.

In February 1946 the Legal Education Committee recommended that a set of the Refresher Course printed lectures be given without charge to each ex-serviceman and woman in attendance at the Law School. Following their distribution certain students who were members of the Society before they went on active service and other servicemen who have been

admitted recently and will begin their Law School course in September 1946, have asked if they are entitled to a set of the printed lectures. The matter was before the Legal Education Committee on May 14th and the Committee recommended that the whole matter be referred to Messrs. Cassels and Beaton with power to act. Richard De Boo Limited informed the Secretary that he had approximately 500 sets of the lectures of which 175 were bound. Messrs. Cassels and Beaton recommended, subject to the approval of the Finance Committee, that all available sets be purchased and distributed without charge to ex-servicemen and women who are now or may become students-at-law. With the approval of the Treasurer and the Vice-Chairman of the Finance Committee, the Secretary has ordered all the remaining sets from Richard De Boo Limited.

Your Committee approves of the action taken in this matter.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON MILITARY EDUCATION,  
OSGOODE HALL C.O.T.C. REGIMENTAL FUNDS.

In a Report dated May 10, 1946, the Special Committee on Military Education recommended as follows:

*"Re Osgoode Hall Contingent, C.O.T.C.*

*"Command Pay.*

The Committee recommends that the Command Pay be used for the purpose of having a portrait painted of Colonel Foster to be hung in the Law School; the portrait to be painted in uniform; Colonel Foster to choose the artist.

*Regimental Funds.*

The Committee also recommends that the balance of the regimental funds, after providing for the portrait, be paid to the Benchers of the Law Society in trust; the income to be used in perpetuity for a prize or prizes to be known as C.O. T.C. Osgoode Hall World War Memorial Prize and to be awarded annually at the Law School on terms to be settled by this Committee, in which preference shall be given to ex-service personnel or their children so far as practicable."

Lt.-Colonel H. W. A. Foster, Officer Commanding the Osgoode Hall Contingent, C.O.T.C., suggests (1) that Convocation or a Special Committee draft a trust agreement with reference to the regimental funds, and (2) that the Law Society protect



him in the event that the Department of National Defence refuses to ratify the payments for the portrait and the trust fund.

Your Committee recommends that the painting of the portrait of Lt.-Colonel Foster be proceeded with at once, and that otherwise the matter be referred back to the Special Committee on Military Education to have drafted a trust agreement and to take up further with the Department of National Defence the question of the disposal of Regimental funds.

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## SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON LEGISLATION, 1945-46.

Mr. Walsh presented the report of the Special Committee on Legislation, 1945-46.

### THE BANKRUPTCY ACT.

Your Committee met on June 13, 1946, to discuss Bill A-5 of the Senate of Canada, an Act Respecting Bankruptcy, which

received its first reading in the Senate on May 10, 1946, having been introduced by the Honourable Senator Robertson.

Your Committee wishes to bring to the attention of Convocation the fact that copies of this Bill have only recently been available, and that there are important changes both in principle and administration in the proposed Bill, in particular the transfer of wide powers, many of a judicial nature, from the Courts to the Superintendent in Bankruptcy.

Your Committee recommends that representations be made on behalf of the Society that further consideration of the Bill by the Senate or a Select Committee thereof, be deferred to the next regular session so that the legal profession in this and the other provinces may have an opportunity to study the Bill in detail.

Your Committee further recommends that counsel be appointed on behalf of the Society to make the representations to the Senate or its Select Committee.

THE REPORT WAS ADOPTED.

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### SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON PATENT AGENTS.

Mr. Seymour presented the report of the Special Committee on Patent Agents.

RE: PATENT ATTORNEYS.

The problem of the use of the terms "Patent Attorney", "Patent Solicitor", "Counsellor in Patent and Trade Mark Litigation" and "Patent Counsel", by persons not members of the profession, first came before Convocation in 1938 when the attention of Convocation was drawn to the matter.

A special committee, composed of G. W. Mason, K.C., and M. A. Seymour, K.C., conferred with H. G. Fox, K.C., then the President of the Patent Institute of Canada who is also a member of the Law Society of Upper Canada, and a resolution was submitted to Convocation and passed on the 16th day of February, 1939, as follows:

"That Convocation disapproves of the use by patent agents, who are not barristers or solicitors, of the designation 'Patent Counsel', 'Patent Attorney' and 'Patent Solicitor' and that the Secretary communicate with the Law Societies

of other Provinces and the Canadian Bar Association suggesting that they consider similar resolutions.”

Attention of Convocation is drawn to the memorandum on this matter dated March 14th, 1941.

The subject was taken up with the other Law Societies and, while the suggestion of some arrangement with the Patent Institute by which the use of the objectionable designations would be eliminated met with general support, there was no real unanimity.

In 1942 the Patent Institute of Canada at its annual meeting passed the following resolution:

“Resolved that the Institute co-operate with the Law Societies of the various Provinces and the Canadian Bar Association for the purpose of preventing or regulating the use of the designations ‘Patent Solicitor’, ‘Patent Attorney’ and ‘Patent Counsel’ and for preventing unqualified persons from practice before the Patent Office, this purpose to be achieved by suitable amendment to the Patent Act and/or rules or by such other means as may be expedient.”

Further development of the matter appears, then, to have ceased partly owing to the fact that Mr. Fox ceased to be President of the Patent Institute and partly because of the war and our involvement in more pressing matters.

The subject was revived by a letter, dated April 23rd, 1945, from Mr. Christopher Robinson, the President of the Patent Institute of Canada, addressed to Mr. Mason, a copy of which letter is attached hereto.

The recommendations of the Institute are as follows:

1. No alteration to be made in the Register as it now stands.
2. All applicants for registration after a given date to be entered on the Register only after passing an examination on the preparation and prosecution of patent applications, this examination to be set by a Board, consisting of representatives from the public service familiar with patent matters and representatives from the profession.
3. All persons now on the Register, whether members of the Board or not, to be entitled to continue to call themselves “Patent Attorneys”.



4. All persons whether members of the Board or not, entered on the Register under the new rules to be permitted only to call themselves "Patent Agents" in connection with their practice before the Patent Office.

5. An annual fee of \$10.00 for the maintenance of one's name on the Register, payment of this fee to entitle the payee to receive the Canadian Patent Office Record for \$5.00 instead of the regular \$10.00.

Your Committee, being strongly in favour of the elimination of the objectionable designations but recognizing some merit in the claim of the members of the Patent Institute of Canada that the designation "Patent Attorney" has obtained, from long use, a definite standing and having regard to the desirability, over the long term, of eliminating all the objectionable designations, recommends that the proposals of the Patent Institute of Canada be approved and that the Secretary be instructed to take up the matter with the Law Societies of other Provinces and with the Canadian Bar Association, again, with a view to obtaining unanimity or such general support that representations could be made by the Canadian Bar Association and the Patent Institute of Canada to the Under Secretary of State for amendment of the rules in accordance with the proposals.

At its meeting on 15th January 1946, the Vice-chairman brought to the attention of the Committee the fact that a member of the Department of Justice, Ottawa, had been requested to give a series of special lectures to students at McGill University on proceedings against the Crown, and asked if arrangements should be made for similar lectures to students at Osgoode Hall. The Committee recommended that no action be taken at that time but that the matter should be further considered in September 1946.

Your Committee recommends that in view of the exceptional conditions in the Law School at this time, no action be taken.

Your Committee recommends that the Society be paid a grant of \$1,200, with an initial payment of \$300; other payments to be made on approval of the Vice-chairman of this Committee.

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DEAN'S REPORT.

Mr. Cassels presented the report of the Dean of the Law School, as follows:

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE DEAN OF THE LAW SCHOOL.

17th September 1946.

1. I beg leave to submit my twenty-third annual report as Dean of the Osgoode Hall Law School, namely, for the Law School session of 1945-46.

*Registration of Students.*

2. The number of students registered and in attendance at the Law School during the period of seven years from 1939-40 to 1945-46, was as follows:

3. The foregoing table shows the continued decline in the number of students during the war years, a slight increase in 1944-45 (partly explained by the beginning of the return of students from active service), and the extraordinary increase in 1945-46, the students being for the most part ex-servicemen. One result was that as none of the existing class-rooms was adequate for the accommodation of the first year class, the lectures to that class had to be given in Convocation Hall. The members of the teaching staff did their best to adapt their

teaching to conditions which were not entirely satisfactory, as compared with smaller classes in the ordinary class-rooms, regular seating arrangements and greater opportunity for individual discussion with students during lectures.

4. In addition, many special problems presented themselves in connection with the large number of ex-service men applying for admission to the first years and others resuming in the second and third years their courses interrupted by war service. These problems were considered and dealt with by the Legal Education Committee and other committees, and many special concessions were made to ex-service men. These matters are outside of the scope of the present report.

5. In the forthcoming session of 1946-1947 the difficulty of providing adequate accommodation for lectures will be aggravated by the fact that there will be extraordinarily large classes in both the first year and the second year. In the circumstances it has been decided to give the first year lectures in Convocation Hall, and to take advantage of a temporary arrangement available through the kind co-operation of Dr. Bryce and the governing body of the Metropolitan Church, under which the second year lectures will be given in the Metropolitan Church House.

6. The question of converting the two ground floor class-rooms into one room, is under consideration. If the report of the building experts is favourable, and if the necessary building material, including steel, is available, the completion of this work as soon as possible would be very desirable, as it would enable lectures to be given in Osgoode Hall to the second year class. In any event, as it is probable that in the session of 1947-48 there will be three extraordinarily large classes, a large classroom on the ground floor will continue to be an urgent need.

8. The leave of absence of Messrs. Morden and Edge has been terminated. Mr. Morden was happily able to return from active service in time to give in 1945-1946 a course on Evidence, instead of his former course on Equity now given by Mr. Willis. Mr. Edge resigned as lecturer on Bills and Notes. His resignation was regretfully accepted, and his course will continue to be given by Mr. Willis, it being contemplated that the course will ultimately become a course of somewhat wider scope on Commercial Documents. A course on Labour Law was given by Mr. Laskin for the first time in 1945-1946. As regards Municipal Law, it was decided that a short course, without examination, should be provided, and Mr. Johnston, of the City's Legal Department, has consented to give the course. This will complete the process of adding to the curriculum four new courses (Administrative Law, Taxation, Labour Law and Municipal Law) as recommended in my annual report of September, 1944.

9. I recommend the re-appointment for one year from May 31, 1946, of Messrs. Foster, Morden, Macdonald, Thomson, Martin, Guest and Wilson (Bookkeeping and Accounting). Mr. Charles L. Dubin has already been appointed for the same period as lecturer on Bankruptcy in place of Mr. Spence, whose resignation was accepted with regret.

*Examinations for Matriculant Students.*

10. In accordance with Rule 86D examinations on prescribed books were held in the spring of 1946 for students of the Matriculant Class who were not in attendance at the law school during the session of 1945-1946, and I recommend that



similar examinations be held in 1947 and following years, as follows:

(1) In the first year of a student's five years of service under articles in which he is not attending the law school, an examination on Adams, Constitutional History of England.

(2) In the second year of a student's five years of service under articles in which he is not attending the law school, an examination on Clokie, Canadian Government and Politics.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

##### SUPERANNUATION FUND.

This matter has been under consideration for some months and your Committee has duly considered a proposed plan as presented by experts from a trust company and an insurance company. Your Committee considers that this plan, together with others which have been placed before the Committee, is too complicated for the requirements of the Society. Your



Committee recommends to Convocation for approval in principle of a simple scheme under which employees of the Society will contribute annually 5 per cent. of their salaries and the Law Society will contribute an equal amount; the fund so set up together with a capital contribution from the Society to be placed under the control of a trustee, and the other details of the scheme to be worked out at a later date and presented to Convocation for approval.

LAW SCHOOL—*Special Arrangements for Second Year Classroom.*

Owing to the large numbers of students in the First and Second Years and the difficulty of arranging lectures at suitable hours in the Law School, the Legal Education Committee has asked the Metropolitan Church for the use of the main dining room in the Metropolitan Church House. The request has been granted and the necessary arrangements have been made for classes to begin in the Church House on Wednesday, the 18th instant. Financial arrangements by way of indemnity or other remuneration will be discussed at a later date. Your Committee recommends approval of the arrangements made.

RE LIBRARY STAFF.

At the meeting of Convocation in June last the Library Committee reported that a sub-committee consisting of the Chairman and the Treasurer had been appointed to select and engage an assistant librarian.

Pursuant to the above authority the Treasurer and the Chairman have appointed Miss Elizabeth Anderson to the Library Staff.

The Library Committee at its meeting on the 17th instant recommended that Miss Georgina Broad be appointed second Assistant Librarian to occupy Miss Baker's office.

RE LUNCHEON ROOM.

Miss Margaret Lennox presents a statement of operations for the period September 1, 1945 to August 31, 1946.

CHARGE FOR ANNUAL STATUTES, 1947—*Dominion and Ontario.*

The amount to be charged for the 1947 Statutes is before the Committee. The charge for the last several years has been \$5.50. The price to the Society of the Dominion Statutes is

\$5.00 less 25 per cent., and for the Ontario Statutes \$2.00 less 20 per cent. Your Committee recommends that the charge for the Dominion and Ontario Statutes for 1947 be approved at \$5.50.

#### WOMEN STUDENTS' COMMON ROOM.

The women students have requested the installation of twenty-four metal lockers on the third floor corridor outside the Common Room, and the purchase of four desks and additional chairs for the Common Room. Your Committee recommends that this matter be referred to the Chairman and Vice-Chairman with power to act.

## FEDERATION OF LAW ASSOCIATION.

The Treasurer of the Federation of Law Associations has inquired whether the payment of fees by the County and District Law Associations of \$1.00 per member, to that Association "out of the funds of the County or District Law Associations will be authorized as a legitimate disbursement" by the Society. Rule 58 authorizes the establishing and maintaining of branch law libraries in any county town, and for the incorporation of local law associations on the conditions therein set forth. Rule 60 authorizes an annual grant of an amount, double the amount of the fees actually paid to an association by its members unless Convocation otherwise directs. Your committee considers that the Society's grants, being based on the annual fees paid by the members of the County and District Associations, disbursements for other than maintaining their libraries should be collected from their members in addition to and be kept separate from their usual annual fees on which the grants are based.

## KENT COUNTY ASSOCIATION.

The Chief Librarian reported on the application of the Kent Association to the County, for better library accommodation. Negotiations between the Association and the County are continuing.

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## LEGAL EDUCATION COMMITTEE—MR. CASSELS.

## OFFICE TRAINING FOR STUDENTS.

This matter, and particularly the problem of students who have failed to obtain Toronto offices, was before your Committee on September 25th and was referred to the Treasurer and Mr. Cassels to confer with Mr. Arthur Kelly, K.C., as to the possibility of giving lectures to students who have failed to obtain Toronto offices and others who may wish to take advantage of the plan. The matter was referred with power to act and to arrange for an honorarium to be paid to each lecturer; this payment to be subject to the approval of the Finance Committee. The Finance Committee has approved of the payment in principle, subject to details and an estimate of the cost to be furnished later by the Legal Education Committee.

Mr. Kelly in his report on Oral Examinations, dated March 18th, 1946, made certain recommendations in this connection. The Treasurer and Mr. Cassels interviewed Mr. Kelly and in view of certain suggestions the Committee considered the matter further at a meeting on October 7th. The Committee recommended that Mr. Cassels and Mr. Kelly address the First year students as to possible arrangements. As a result of this address, over 180 students have signified their intention to attend Practice Groups. Arrangements have now been made and 12

Practice Groups of approximately 15 students each will begin meetings starting October 16th, 1946. Mr. W. B. Williston has consented to act as Supervisor of the Group Instructors.

#### CLASS-ROOM ALTERATIONS.

The full-time staff of the Law School suggested that to meet the present situation, the Second and Third year class-rooms on the first floor of the Law School be made into one room to accommodate the present Second year. Mr. Heeney made some preliminary enquiries and reported by letter on September 21st that the alterations necessary could be carried out without undue delay or difficulty. The matter was considered by your Committee on September 25th and the Committee recommended that the plan be approved in principle and that Mr. Heeney be instructed to proceed forthwith, such recommendation to be subject to the approval of the Finance Committee. Mr. Heeney appeared before the Finance Committee and reported orally on several suggested plans. The Finance Committee recommended approval of Mr. Heeney's suggestion of removing the partition wall with the exception of 14 feet at the north end, and 3 feet at the south end, and that he be instructed to proceed forthwith with these alterations.

Your Committee approves of the recommendation of the Finance Committee.

#### DEPARTMENT OF VETERANS AFFAIRS.

##### *Extension of Training Allowances.*

Your Committee considered a letter from the Toronto office, Department of Veterans Affairs, with reference to the extension of training allowances by the Department of Veterans Affairs to veteran students whose entitlement will expire during the next academic year. The letter stated that if a veteran had demonstrated such scholarship in his or her course, that on the final examinations of the academic year next preceding the year in which the period of entitlement expires, he or she is in the top 25 per cent. of the class and has no conditions or has at least second class honour standing, the District Rehabilitation Board will bring such cases to the attention of the Registrar of the University or training institution. The letter enclosed a draft letter to be written by this Society to the Department if such policy is approved.



Your Committee approves in principle of the policy of the Department of Veterans Affairs with reference to the extension of training allowances, and recommends that the Secretary be authorized to write a letter as suggested by the Department, with the necessary amendments. In consideration of the fact that the Osgoode Hall Law School has only an honours class, and awards no second class honours, your Committee recommends that training allowances be extended to all veteran students who obtained either top quarter standing in the class, or obtained an average of 60 per cent. on all subjects of the year. In making the alternative recommendation, your Committee is of the opinion that an average of 60 per cent. on all the subjects of any year at the Law School is equivalent to at least second class honours in most universities and colleges. Your Committee has asked the Department of Veterans Affairs for its approval of this alternative recommendation, or a ruling on some other standard acceptable to the Department.

Your Committee recommends that the Secretary be authorized, without reference back to this Committee, to write the Department in individual cases that come within the approved conditions.

RE ADMISSION.

#### *Rule 86A—Graduates.*

A number of students who have completed all the requirements for their University degrees, will not have the degrees conferred until later this year or in the spring of 1947. Under the rule these students cannot be admitted until the degree is conferred and a certificate to that effect presented. As a matter of policy the Committee has allowed these students to attend the lectures of the First year but their admission dates from the conferring of the degree and the question of service under articles will be considered on completion of the Law School course. Under departmental regulations the Department of Veterans Affairs cannot grant these students a monthly allowance or pay their law school fees until the date of admission.

Colonel Wilson points out that under this plan it is necessary for candidates to train for at least two summers, each of 16 weeks and to take some 40 lectures during each of the two following winters. A third summer is necessary to qualify for an Active Force commission. Certain students nearing graduation from the University of Toronto and intending to go on to Osgoode Hall, have enquired whether they could do their second summer's training of 16 weeks while students-at-law.

Your Committee recommends that the request be approved and that Lt.-Col. Wilson be so notified.

Mr. Jones was in the employ of the Society from 1895 until his retirement on 31st December 1943. On his retirement he was granted an allowance payable for life.

Your Committee recommends that an expression of appreciation of the long and faithful services of Mr. Jones be recorded in the Minutes of Convocation, and that a cheque in the amount of his retiring allowance for the month of November be sent to Mrs. Jones.

#### THE REPORT WAS ADOPTED.

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#### DISCIPLINE COMMITTEE—LOUIS DAVIDSON.

Mr. Carson presented the report of the Discipline Committee.

Moved by Mr. Carson, seconded by Mr. McKay, that the Report be adopted. The solicitor appeared before Convocation and stated that he had nothing to say on the Report of the Discipline Committee. The Report was adopted.

The solicitor appeared again before Convocation, and was reprimanded by the Treasurer.



## OSGOODE HALL BUILDING.

Moved by Mr. Shaver, seconded by Mr. Mason, and carried, that a Committee of five Benchers be appointed by the Treasurer to work with the Honourable the Attorney General of Ontario in order to make a survey of the government's portion of Osgoode Hall and a study of the greatest use of the Hall to the profession in the future. The Treasurer appointed the following Special Committee on Osgoode Hall Building: Messrs. Beaton, Cassels, McLaughlin, Shaver and Walsh; Mr. Shaver to be Convener.

## CHAMPLAIN SOCIETY.

The Law Society has two sets of Champlain Society publications, one by virtue of its own membership and the other donated by the late Mr. Justice Riddell. The Champlain Society now wishes to acquire one of these sets in order to sell it to the new member who will take Mr. Justice Riddell's place. Your committee recommends that one set of Champlain Society Publications be sold to that Society at a price which seems reasonable to the Chairman.

## CANADIAN LIBRARY ASSOCIATION.

Your Committee recommends that the Law Society become an institutional member of the Canadian Library Association which has just been formed.

## STUDENT USE OF GREAT LIBRARY.

Your Committee recommends, in view of the present emergency that students be permitted to use the Great Library for purposes of study, and that such arrangements may be made from time to time as to such use, having regard to the convenience of barristers and the needs of students, as the Chief Librarian with the concurrence of the Chairman may consider advisable.

Your Committee further recommends that tables and chairs be set up in the gallery of the Phillips Stewart Library to be used by students for purposes of study and that it be open for such use at such times as the Chief Librarian may consider



advisable and that he be authorized to appoint one or more students to supervise this gallery.

#### NIGHT SESSIONS IN LIBRARY.

Your Committee recommends that the Chief Librarian be authorized to permit students to use the Periodical Room for purposes of study in the evenings and to appoint one or more students to supervise it if it seems to him advisable to do so.

#### DISPLAY STANDS.

In view of the fact that unbound parts of Reports and Periodicals have now to be shelved in several different places in the library, your committee recommends that two display stands be purchased to hold these parts to be installed at the west end of the Great Library at a cost of about \$175.00 each and that the design of the said display stands be approved by the Chairman and the Chief Librarian.

Several instances of unauthorized practice in Essex, York and Perth Counties have been brought to the attention of your Committee. Your Committee recommends that these matters stand for investigation and report by the local Law Associations or by Mr. McLennan.

## SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON LEGISLATION, 1945-6.

*Re Bankruptcy Act, Bill A-5, Senate of Canada, May 1946.*

Mr. Walsh, Chairman, reported orally on the action taken with reference to the above Bill, and informed Convocation that Mr. S. L. Springsteen, K.C. had attended before the Senate Committee and made representations on behalf of the Society. In view of the representations made by other institutions, as well as this Society, consideration of the Bill was deferred to the next Session. Mr. Walsh stated that it was unlikely that the Bill would be proceeded with at the next session of Parliament.

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## COUNTY LIBRARIES COMMITTEE—MR. MARSHALL.

## PARRY SOUND ASSOCIATION.

Your Committee reports specially that the Parry Sound Association, having failed to file its Annual Returns for the year 1944 within three months from the 15th day of January 1945 and those for the year 1945 within three months from the 15th day of January 1946, has now filed its Annual Returns for 1944 and 1945 and otherwise complied with the Rules adopted from time to time relating to county law libraries, and recommends that grants be made to it of the amounts to which it would have been entitled if its returns had been filed within the times limited under Rule 62, namely, \$40.00 for the year 1944 and \$40.00 for the year 1945.

## ADMISSION AS SOLICITOR IN SPECIAL CASES.

*Law Agents.*

A. C. Findlay, a Law Agent of Scotland, has written asking for information about admission as a solicitor in Ontario. Under the present rule 134 a Law Agent is not included. The question of the amendment of this rule to include all persons who are entitled to practice as solicitors in the courts of Scotland is before the Committee.

Your Committee recommends that Rule 134(d) be repealed and a new rule substituted therefor to include the admission of Law Agents of Scotland.

## RE LEGAL EDUCATION.

Colonel W. E. Phillips, C.M.G., D.S.O., M.C., Chairman of the Board of Governors of the University of Toronto, on December 16th 1946 wrote the Treasurer enclosing copy of a letter from the Honourable George A. ## ANNUAL FINANCIAL STATEMENT, 1945-1946.

The Annual Statement for the year ending 31st August 1946 as certified by the auditor, Messrs. Clarkson, Gordon & Company, was before the Committee on November 19th. The Committee recommended that consideration of this statement stand to the January meeting, and that the statement be referred to a sub-committee consisting of the Chairman and Vice-Chairman to consult with the auditors and discuss with them the setting up of a balance sheet with reserves in a somewhat different form, and report back.

Mr. McLaughlin, the Vice-Chairman, reported that the sub-committee met with Mr. G. A. Adamson, C.A., of Messrs. Clarkson, Gordon & Company, and discussed with him changes that might be made in the financial statements of the Society with a view to (a) treating admission fees as capital, and (b) preparing annual statements of assets and liabilities that would be all-inclusive, and would provide for depreciation in the same way as would be done if the Society were a profit-making organization; Mr. Adamson to discuss the matter with Mr. G. T. Clarkson and give the Society their written recommendations. In the meantime, having in mind that any changes decided upon should be fully considered, the sub-committee suggests that the approval of the Annual Statement of the Society's funds and

special and trust funds, as of the 31st of August 1946, be no longer delayed.

Your Committee recommends that the Annual Financial Statement, as submitted, be approved for presentation to Convocation and publication pursuant to the Rules.

#### SUPERANNUATION FUND.

This matter stands referred to a sub-committee consisting of the Treasurer and Messrs. White, McLaughlin and Cassels, at the call of the Vice-Chairman.

Mr. McLaughlin reported that the sub-committee appointed to study a superannuation or pension plan for the Society, had met on three occasions and had received proposals and quotations from four different life insurance companies, all of which were presented personally by representatives of the companies; and that the preparation and study of the plans, together with the necessity of asking for revisions in some cases in order to determine as nearly as possible which plan would best meet the requirements of the Society at the minimum of cost to both the Society and its employees, had made it impossible as yet to make a recommendation to the Finance Committee. He stated that the sub-committee hopes to be able to make such a recommendation to the February meeting of the Finance Committee.

Your Committee recommends that the matter stand for further report of the sub-committee.

#### CLASSROOM ALTERATIONS.

The alterations of the old Second and Third year Classrooms, making them into one room, have been completed and the Second Year began their lectures there on the 7th instant.

*Approved.*

#### ANNUAL FEES, OFFICERS OF THE ARMED FORCES.

Col. W. J. Lawson, Vice Judge Advocate General, has written with reference to fees payable by members of the Society who have volunteered for and have been accepted for service in the permanent military and air forces, and also officers who have been accepted for service in the interim forces. The officers of the first group are members of the active (permanent) army and are not presently on active service. The officers of the

second group are presently on active service, but the status of both groups may change in the near future.

The Vice-Chairman has considered the correspondence, and, subject to the approval of the Committee, suggests that barristers of the first group be treated as being on active service, and that no fees be collected from either group until all go off active service in 1947. He further recommends that as to whether or not both solicitor and barrister fees should be paid, each individual should decide that question on the basis of the work he is engaged on.

Your Committee recommends approval of the suggestions of the Vice-Chairman.

#### PORTRAITS—*Presentation.*

The Honourable L. E. Blackwell, Attorney-General of Ontario, has written the Secretary offering on behalf of the Government of Ontario to hand over to the Society a portrait of the late Chief Justice Armour by E. Wylie Greer. The portrait is presently in London, England, and was delivered to Canada House by Mr. Donald Armour, a grandson of the Chief Justice.

Your Committee recommends that the presentation of the portrait of the late Chief Justice Armour be gratefully accepted, and that the appreciation of Convocation be expressed to the Honourable the Attorney-General for his interest in arranging for the presentation.

#### *Restoration.*

Mr. George Harbour, recently of the staff of the National Gallery at Ottawa, has now completed the work of cleaning, conditioning and restoring two large portraits, the Honourable Robert A. Harrison and the Honourable Matthew C. Cameron, a small portrait of Sir John Boyd, and a half-size portrait of Sir George Burton, and the portraits of two Principals of the Law School, N. W. Noyles and William A. Reeve. On December 27th Mr. Harbour reported on this work, and makes certain further suggestions with reference to improved lighting of the portraits.

Your Committee recommends that this matter stand referred to the sub-committee already appointed.



## PLAN FOR HOSPITAL CARE.

Twenty-two members of the staff have recently applied for and been accepted under the Plan for Hospital Care sponsored by the Ontario Hospital Association. The Secretary asks authority to deduct the proper amounts each month from the employees' salary, and forward the amount by Society cheque to the Plan for Hospital Care.

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## UNAUTHORIZED PRACTICE COMMITTEE.

In the absence of the Chairman, Mr. Middlebro presented the report.

RE UNAUTHORIZED PRACTICE, ESSEX COUNTY—J. Brisebois & Son and George Sylvestre.

These matters have been before your Committee for some months for investigation, and report has been made by the Committee's special investigator and by the Essex Law Association. Your Committee recommends that charges be laid forthwith, the hearing to be adjourned until Mr. J. L. McLennan can take charge of the prosecution.

RE UNAUTHORIZED PRACTICE—General.

Several matters have been brought to the attention of your Committee which appeared to indicate that unauthorized persons were practising or holding themselves out as solicitors in the Counties of Essex, Perth, Durham and Northumberland and York. Investigations in each case have been made either by the Committee's special investigator, or by the local County Law Association.

In view of the information reported in each case, your Committee recommends that no further action be taken.

## SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON MILITARY EDUCATION.

At the request of the Treasurer the Secretary presented the report and read a covering letter dated 11th January 1947 to the Treasurer and Benchers from the Honourable Mr. Justice Hope, Chairman of the Special Committee.

## RE REGIMENTAL FUNDS—Assigned Pay.

On May 10, 1946 your Committee recommended that the balance of the regimental funds, after providing for the painting of the portrait of Lt. Colonel Foster, be paid to the Benchers of the Law Society in trust to provide a prize or prizes on certain terms. On May 16, 1946 the Report of your Committee was received by Convocation.

On June 18th the Finance Committee had before it the Report of the Special Committee, including the above recommendations. It had also before it a letter from Lt. Colonel Foster suggesting—(1) that Convocation or a special committee draft a trust agreement with reference to the regimental funds, and (2) that the Law Society protect him in the event that the Department of National Defence refuses to ratify the payments of the portrait from the trust fund.

The Finance Committee recommended that the painting of the portrait of Lt. Colonel Foster be proceeded with at once, and that otherwise the matter be referred back to the Special Committee on Military Education to have drafted a trust agreement, and to take up further with the Department of National Defence the question of the disposal of regimental funds. The Report of the Finance Committee was adopted.

On January 9, 1947 Colonel Foster wrote the Secretary as follows:

“Re Osgoode Hall C.O.T.C.

I have a letter from Headquarters, Central Command, at Oakville, Ontario, stating that effective January 14, 1947 the Osgoode Hall C.O.T.C. will be reduced to NIL strength pending disbandment.”

Your Committee met on January 11, 1947, and after full and careful consideration of the question of the disposition of the regimental funds (assigned pay) recommends:

(1) That the regimental funds, consisting of \$5,900.00 in Dominion of Canada bonds and \$7.27 in its current bank

account, be paid forthwith to the Benchers of the Law Society of Upper Canada, in trust, the income to be used for the establishment of a prize, bursary or scholarship to be known as the Osgoode Hall C.O.T.C. World War Memorial Prize; and that the Benchers of the Society have full authority to fix the terms on which the awards shall be made, and to alter them from time to time as conditions may warrant and in their absolute discretion;

(2) That as far as may be practicable, the awards be made to those members of the Society who served in an active theatre of war, or to their sons or daughters, and that within this class preference be given to those members of the Society or their sons or daughters who at the time of the awards are actively identified with any unit of the armed forces of Canada;

(3) That the Committee of Award, if possible, include the Commanding Officer of the Osgoode Hall C.O.T.C.; or a former officer or member of the Unit;

(4) That a short history of the Osgoode Hall Contingent, C.O.T.C. be prepared and placed in the archives of the Society; and that on each occasion when the award is conferred in Convocation or in public, a short outline of the record and achievements of the unit be read;

(5) That the Chairman of your Committee forthwith write Lt. Col. Foster authorizing him to pay to the Law Society the regimental funds as recommended herein.

(6) That the Law Society of Upper Canada undertake to protect or indemnify Lt. Col. Foster in the event that the Department of National Defence refuses to approve or accept the disposition of the funds as recommended herein, and that the Law Society be authorized to make any payment for such protection or indemnity out of the Regimental Funds paid to the Society hereunder.

Your Committee recommends that it be now discharged unless there is further service that it may render to Convocation.

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## BENCHERS EX OFFICIO.

At the meeting of Convocation on January 16th, 1947 it was resolved that the Honourable J. L. Ilsley, K.C., Minister of Justice and Attorney-General of Canada, and the Honourable Joseph Jean, K.C., Solicitor-General of Canada, be invited to attend Convocation at a date convenient to them for Call to the Bar of Ontario under section 4 of the Barristers Act. #### VETERANS UNIVERSITY LOANS REGULATIONS.

At its meeting on February 18th the Committee recommended that appropriate steps be taken to make these loans available to veteran students at the Law School who may be eligible. The Finance Committee had previously approved of the plan in principle and Convocation adopted both reports. Under the regulations, for each institution making such loans there shall be a Student-Veteran Loan Board whose membership shall be (a) the University Head or his representative, (b) the Dean of the Faculty, (c) the University Veteran Adviser, (d) the District Supervisor of Training, D.V.A. The appointment of a Loan Board for the Osgoode Hall Law School is before the Committee for consideration. Copies of a summary of the regulations as to applications for a loan and of the terms of repayment and also application forms are available at the Secretary's office.

Your Committee recommends the appointment of a Student-Veteran Loan Board consisting of Mr. Hamilton Cassels, K.C. (representative of the Treasurer), Dean J. D. Falconbridge, K.C., W. Earl Smith, K.C., Secretary, and A. R. Whitten, District Supervisor of Training, D.V.A., and that the Committee be authorized forthwith to make these loans available to eligible veteran students at the Law School.

RE DEPARTMENT OF VETERANS AFFAIRS.

#### *Extension of Training Allowances.*

In August 1946, the Department informed the Society that if a veteran had demonstrated such scholarship in his or her course that on the final examinations of the academic year next preceding the year in which the period of entitlement expires, he or she is in the top 25 per cent. of the class and had no conditions or had at least second class honour standing, the District Rehabilitation Board will bring such cases to the atten-

tion of the Registrar of the University or training institution. This matter was before the Committee on September 17th and 25th, 1946. The Committee approved in principle of the policy of the Department with reference to the extension of training allowances, and recommended that the Secretary be authorized, without referring back to the Committee, to write the Department in individual cases that come within the approved conditions.

In consideration of the fact that the Osgoode Hall Law School has only an Honours class and awards no second class honours, the Committee recommended that training allowances be extended to all veteran students who obtained either top quarter standing or obtained an average of 60 per cent. on all subjects of the year. In making the alternative recommendation the Committee was of the opinion that an average of 60 per cent. on all the subjects of any year in the Law School is equivalent to at least second class honours in most universities or colleges. Your Committee asked the Department for its approval of this alternative recommendation or a ruling on some other standard acceptable to the Department. The Department has been written on several occasions and the Vice-chairman and the Secretary have also conferred with departmental officials. On February 25th, the Toronto office informed the Secretary that the Superintendent of University training has decided against any revision of the regulations for law students at Osgoode Hall.

Your Committee notes the above information.

## INSURANCE.

*Library Books, Fine Arts Floater Policy*—This matter was referred to a sub-committee composed of the Chairman, the Vice-Chairman and Mr. Shaver (Convener). The sub-committee, after consultation with the Society's brokers, the Librarian and the Secretary, recommends:

THAT the Chief Librarian be authorized forthwith to retain Mr. R. M. Brown of the Carswell Company, Limited to make a flat rate valuation for insurance purposes of all legal books, and Mr. Roy Britnell to make a similar valuation of all other books, including the Riddell Library.



THAT the insurance on the Society's books be increased to \$2.50 per volume, or to such value as recommended by Mr. Brown and Mr. Britnell.

THAT the number of volumes insured be increased from 90,000 to 93,000.

THAT no further action be taken with reference to a fine arts floater policy, as such a policy is not necessary under the revised plan of insurance.

THAT on the placing of the above insurance, the Secretary write the Society's brokers informing them of the reasons for the increases in values, enclosing copies of the Reports of Mr. Brown and Mr. Britnell as approved by the Chief Librarian, and informing them of the reasons for the increases in values, enclosing copies of the Reports of Mr. Brown and Mr. Britnell as approved by the Chief Librarian, and informing the brokers that the Society considers that it has now fully complied with the 90 per cent. co-insurance clause; asking the brokers so to inform all the insuring companies, and requesting that they submit reasons if they do not consider that the Society has fully complied with the co-insurance clause.

Your Committee recommends that the report of the sub-committee be approved, and that its recommendations be carried out forthwith.

#### SUPERANNUATION FUND.

A specimen copy of the Master Contract, and a copy of the proposal for the policy in connection with the Group Pension Plan, were before your Committee for consideration on this date.

Of the eligible members of the staff, all but three have indicated their desire to join the Pension Plan, although one member will not join until the first anniversary date.

Your Committee recommends, subject to the approval of the Plan by the Income Tax Branch of the Department of Finance, that the Group Pension Plan, as submitted by the Standard Life Assurance Company, be approved and adopted, and that the officers of the Society be authorized to execute the necessary documents under the seal of the Society, and do all other acts necessary to put the Plan into operation forthwith.

#### CONFERENCE OF THE GOVERNING BODIES OF THE LEGAL PROFESSION IN CANADA.

At the Mid-Winter Meeting of the Executive of the Conference, the question of financing the Conference and its work was considered at some length. It was resolved that the Conference request for the year 1947 a grant of \$400.00 from the Canadian Bar Association, \$100.00 from the Law Society of Upper Canada, \$25.00 from the Law Society of Prince Edward Island, and \$50.00 from each of the other Provincial Societies and the Board of Notaries of Quebec.

Your Committee recommends that a grant of \$100.00 be made to the Conference for the year 1947.

## RE NOTARIES PUBLIC AND CONVEYANCERS—Temiskaming District.

A letter from R. A. Outhet, Solicitor, of Kirkland Lake, was before the Committee on the 20th instant, and the Secretary was instructed to send a copy of the letter to the Attorney-General, pointing out that the Committee is of the opinion that there would appear to be no necessity for two notaries public in Englehart, and requesting that he might take appropriate action. ## M E M O R I A L

to the late

JOSEPH MAX BULLEN, K.C.

The Benchers in Convocation assembled record with profound sorrow the death of Joseph Max Bullen, who died suddenly at his home Dunvegan Road, Toronto, on the 15th of February, 1947.

Mr. Bullen was born in the City of Toronto on November 26th, 1888, a son of George Bullen and Sarah Butler Bullen. He received his preparatory education at Gladstone Avenue Public School and Parkdale Collegiate, and entered Toronto University in September 1909, in the Political Science Course, and graduated with honours with the degree of Bachelor of Arts in June 1913. In 1916 he received the degree of Bachelor of Laws. During his undergraduate days, he exhibited those qualities of leadership which subsequently distinguished him in his practice of his profession, and in his last year at Toronto University he was manager of the Championship Hockey Team, and was elected President of his Graduating Class.

He was admitted as a student-at-law of the Graduate Class at Osgoode Hall on the 9th of July, 1913, and served under Articles with the late A. C. McMaster, K.C., a former member of Convocation, and was Called to the Bar, with honours, on the 18th of May, 1916, and was sworn in as a Solicitor of the Supreme Court of Ontario on the 20th of July, 1916.

After his graduation, Mr. Bullen continued with the firm of McMaster, Montgomery & Fleury, in Toronto, and appeared as Counsel in many trials, in the Court of Appeal, in the Supreme Court of Canada and in the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council, and he has enjoyed a high and enviable reputation as a Counsel.

He was created a King's Counsel in 1934, and was elected a Bencher of the Law Society of Upper Canada in May 1936, and was re-elected at the quinquennial elections in 1941 and 1946.

He was interested in athletic pursuits, and in his Collegiate days was Captain of the Parkdale Collegiate Rugby Team. He was a member of the Lakeview Golf Club for many years, and

President, and later, a member of the Lambton Golf Club. He took a keen interest in the Granite Club of Toronto, and was President of the Club for many years, and at the time of his death was immediate Past President.

Mr. Bullen was married in October 1916 to Gracia Aldys Winchester, a daughter of the late Judge Winchester, Senior Judge of the County Court of the County of York, and is survived by his widow and two daughters, Mrs. William Potter, of Ottawa, Ontario, and Mrs. Murray Winchester Gordon, of Toronto.

By his death, the profession lost a valued and esteemed character, and one who typified its best traditions. His character was vigorous and forceful but, with all, kindly and considerate of others.

Convocation desires to express its appreciation of the talents of Joseph Max Bullen, and to extend to the members of his family its most sincere sympathy.

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## RE SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON PROCEDURE ON OPENING OF COURTS.

Dr. Gallagher was much impressed with the suggestion and consulted the President of the Council, who stated that while the Council does not meet until April 30th, he felt sure that the Council would be very glad to cooperate if so desired by the Law Society. The matter was discussed in Convocation and the Committee was asked to obtain some further information and report back to Convocation in May.

The Report was received, and it was ordered that the matter stand to the May meeting of Convocation for further consideration.

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Moved by Mr. Beaton, seconded by Mr. Carson, and unanimously carried, that Mr. J. S. Denison, K.C., be continued as a member of the Special Committee on Legal Education, and of the Joint Committee on Legal Education.

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The Treasurer then occupied the chair, and expressed to Convocation his sincere appreciation of the honour conferred on him in his election as Treasurer.

## RECORD OF MEDAL AWARDS.

In March 1945 the Dean suggested that some permanent record be erected in the Society's building containing the names of all members of the Society who have been awarded, Gold, Silver, or Bronze Medals. The Committee approved of the suggestion in principle and referred the matter to the Dean and the Secretary for suggestions as to the form of the record and the probable cost.

From the Minutes of Convocation a list of the Medal winners has been prepared and the matter is again before the Committee for consideration.

Your Committee recommends that this matter be referred to the Vice-chairman to consult with Mr. F. H. Marani, F.R.A.I.C., A.R.C.A., as to the form the record might take.

RE TREASURERS.

It has been suggested that some permanent record be erected in the Society's buildings containing the names of all Treasurers of the Society since 1797.

Your Committee recommends that a permanent record of all Treasurers and Secretaries be erected in the Society's building and that the matter be referred to the Vice-chairman to confer with Mr. F. H. Marani, F.R.A.I.C., A.R.C.A., as to the form the record might take.

RE CLARA BRETT MARTIN MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP.

In 1926 the Women's Law Association gave the Society the sum of \$300 for the establishment of a scholarship to be known as The Clara Brett Martin Memorial Scholarship. The bond purchased at that time matured in 1946 and the proceeds were retained by the Society. The Women's Law Association has now presented the sum of \$788.84 for the purchase of a \$1,000 Ninth Victory Loan Bond, the interest of which will provide in full for the scholarship. With the approval of the Vice-Chairman of the Finance Committee, the Secretary has purchased the bond.

Your Committee recommends that the presentation of the Women's Law Association be gratefully accepted on the terms presently governing this Scholarship and that the appreciation of Convocation be expressed to the Association.

LECTURES 1947-1948.

In view of the probability of three large classes in the Law School for the coming year special arrangements for lecture-room accommodation must be made.

Your Committee recommends that if possible all lectures be delivered in Osgoode Hall and in the morning and that if necessary lectures be given on Saturday mornings.

## PORTRAITS.

The portrait of the late Chief Justice Armour, painted by Sir Wylie Grier and presented to the Society by the Ontario Government through the Honourable L. E. Blackwell, K.C., Attorney-General, has now arrived from England and has been insured for the sum of \$500 under the Fine Arts Floater Policy.

Your Committee recommends approval of the insurance of this portrait, and that the hanging of the portrait be referred to a sub-committee consisting of the Vice-Chairman and Messrs. Shaver and Walsh.

The following portraits have been restored by Mr. George Harbour in the laboratory of the National Gallery at Ottawa, and have been returned for re-hanging: Sir William Campbell, William Osgoode, John Elmsley, William Powell, group of five portraits by Berthon, similar group of five portraits by Berthon. A report on the restoration by Mr. Harbour is before the Committee.

Your Committee recommends that a copy of Mr. Harbour's report be sent to all members of the Committee.

## RE THE LAWYERS' CLUB.

Mr. D. J. Ongley, President of The Lawyers' Club, has written the Society with reference to the use of the old Phillips-Stewart Library as club rooms.

Your Committee recommends that The Lawyers' Club be given the opportunity of presenting their proposals to the Committee, and that the Vice-Chairman discuss the matter with the President of The Lawyers' Club.

## RE IRON FENCE.

At the meeting of the Committee on April 15th a report from the Art Wire and Iron Company was before the Committee. The Committee recommended that the matter be referred to a sub-committee to be appointed by the Vice-Chairman, to consider and report as to the best method of putting the fence in good condition and that the sub-committee be authorized to have any urgent or necessary repairs made forthwith.

At the meeting of Convocation on April 17th, in the absence of the Vice-Chairman, the Treasurer appointed a sub-committee consisting of Messrs. Beaton, Pickup and Wilson, to act until the Vice-Chairman returns. On the instructions of Mr. Beaton, the

Convener, the Secretary asked the Art Wire and Iron Company to make temporary repairs to the south-east corner of the fence which was unsafe. The temporary repairs have been made.

Your Committee recommends that this matter stand referred to the sub-committee consisting of Messrs. McLaughlin, Beaton, Pickup and Wilson, with power to act.

#### RE MEMBERSHIP IN THE CANADIAN BAR ASSOCIATION.

At the Annual Meeting of the Conference of Governing Bodies of the Legal Profession in Canada, held on Tuesday, August 27, 1946, three matters were discussed and were referred for consideration and report to the member Societies and the Board of Notaries of the Province of Quebec. These matters were before Convocation on April 17th, and the third matter was referred to the Finance Committee. The following is an extract from a letter of the Conference to Convocation:

##### *"3. Membership in the Canadian Bar Association.*

Mr. C. M. O'Brian, K.C., of Vancouver, informed the meeting that the British Columbia Society had been considering the advisability of including in the annual fee paid by its members an amount sufficient to enable the Society to have each member made a member of the Canadian Bar Association. He stated that the British Columbia Society would like to have the views of the other Societies on this matter. Mr. G. M. Forbes, K.C., of Regina, stated that the same question had been before the Saskatchewan Society at its last Annual Meeting when it was decided that the Society should make a contribution to the Canadian Bar Association rather than institute a scheme of compulsory membership.

It was resolved that the Secretary-Treasurer ask the Societies, who have not had this matter under consideration to deal with it in order that the British Columbia Society might be informed of their attitude in the matter."

Your Committee recommends that no action be taken, as it considers the matter one for action by individual members of the Bar.

RE ARREARS OF ANNUAL FEES—*Motion to Suspend.*

Moved by Mr. McLaughlin, Seconded by Mr. Seymour, that pursuant to the Law Society Act, as amended by the Law Society Amendment Act 1940, the following Barrister be and he is hereby suspended from practice for a period of one year from this date:

DISCIPLINE COMMITTEE—*Joseph Laurence Cohen.*

Mr. Carson stated that the Discipline Committee was prepared to present its report to Convocation, but he understood that Mr. A. A. Macdonald, K.C., counsel for the Solicitor, was present and would request an adjournment. Mr. Carson read a letter dated May 14, 1947, from Mr. Macdonald, and referred to certain parts of a long memorandum prepared by the Solicitor and enclosed with Mr. Macdonald's letter.

The solicitor did not attend, but was represented by his counsel, Mr. A. A. Macdonald, K.C., who addressed Convocation, requested an adjournment and stated his reasons therefor.

Moved and seconded that consideration of the report be adjourned to the June meeting of Convocation.

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LIBRARY COMMITTEE—MR. SHAVER.

BOOKS NEEDED BY THE BRITISH MUSEUM.

A list was received in September, 1946, from the Canadian Library Association, of Canadian books, many of which are law books, needed by the British Museum to replace copies lost during the Second World War. Of the books listed there are in our Library 246 volumes of old texts, digests and reports of

each of which we have more than one copy. The Librarian of the Inner Temple has indicated which of these books may be needed for the Inner Temple Library. Your Committee recommends that the Chief Librarian be authorized to send to the Canadian Library Association for the British Museum, copies of such books so listed as can, in his opinion, be spared, reserving copies of those that may be required for the Inner Temple library.

#### LIBRARY EXPENDITURES, 1946-1947.

Your Committee reports that its budget allowance for the current year for purchase, binding, stamping and repairing of books is \$7,000.00 as against \$6,000.00 for the year 1945-1946. To the end of April, 1947, expenditures on these items for the Great Library have amounted to \$4,535.82 as against \$3,129.61 expended during the same period in the previous year. Expenditures for the Phillips-Stewart Library for the same period in 1946-1947 have been \$1,949.77 as compared with \$1,452.37 in 1946, \$590.10 in 1945 and \$307.52 in 1944. Attendance in both the Great Library and the Phillips-Stewart Library has been much heavier than in previous years and Great Library books have been used much more by students than by members of the profession. In the month before examinations in each term, student use has been well over 90 per cent. of the total use of the Great Library. As a result, expenditures for book repairs will be much higher in the next few years than they have been in the past.

#### CATALOGUE.

The employment of a part time stenographer has made it possible for other members of the staff to devote more time to the re-cataloguing of the Library; it should be possible to complete the new catalogue within the next two years. In the meantime, lists have been made of the books in each of the library rooms, which can be used in case of fire.



UNAUTHORIZED PRACTICE COMMITTEE—MR. WALSH.  
RE UNAUTHORIZED PRACTICE, ESSEX COUNTY.

*J. Brisebois and Georges Sylvestre.*

These matters were brought to the attention of the Society by His Honour Judge Shaunnery of Windsor, and after investigation by Mr. J. L. McLennan, K.C., the Committee directed that proceedings be taken under The Solicitors Act. The charge laid against Joseph Brisebois was as follows:

“that Joseph Brisebois of the City of Windsor in the County of Essex at the City of Windsor, during the six months ending on the 23rd day of January, 1947, not being admitted and enrolled and duly qualified to act as a solicitor, did practise or for gain or reward act as a solicitor contrary to the provisions of the Solicitors Act, R.S.O. (1937), Ch. 223 and amendments thereto, in such case made and provided.”

The charges against Georges Sylvestre were as follows:

- (1) “that Georges Sylvestre of the Village of St. Joachim in the County of Essex at the City of Windsor during the six months ending on the 23rd day of January, 1947, not being admitted and enrolled and duly qualified to act as a solicitor, did practise or for gain or reward act as a solicitor contrary to the provisions of the Solicitors Act, R.S.O. (1937), Ch. 223 and amendments thereto, in such case made and provided.”
- (2) “that Georges Sylvestre of the Village of St. Joachim in the County of Essex at the City of Windsor on the 20th day of June, 1946, not being admitted and enrolled and duly qualified to act as a solicitor, did as a solicitor, commence and carry on a proceeding, to wit, did make application for Letters Probate of the Last Will and Testament of Alphonse Leboeuf in the Surrogate Court of the County of Essex, contrary to the provisions of the Solicitors Act, R.S.O. (1937), Ch. 223 and amendments thereto, in such case made and provided.”
- (3) a charge similar to (2), in connection with the estate of Lorenzo Potvin.
- (4) a charge similar to (2), in connection with the estate of Eli Deslippe (charge withdrawn on the hearing).



The charges were returnable in the first instance on February 12, 1947, at Windsor at which time both accused pleaded not guilty. The trial was adjourned from time to time and finally fixed peremptorily for May 7th before Magistrate McMillan. Both accused were represented by counsel, and each changed his plea from "Not guilty" to "Guilty".

Pursuant to instructions received from the Chairman of the Committee, and with the full concurrence of the members of the Special Committee of the Essex County Law Association, Mr. J. L. McLennan, K.C., counsel for the Law Society, suggested to the Magistrate that he might see fit to suspend sentence and bind the accused over to keep the peace for a period of two years, as provided in section 6 of the Summary Convictions Act. The Magistrate convicted the accused on all charges to which they had pleaded guilty, and released them on suspended sentence to be called on within a period of two years to receive sentence if in the meantime they fail to keep the peace and be of good behaviour, and bound each accused over in the sum of \$100 on each charge for such appearance and keeping of the peace and good behaviour. Costs of procuring the attendance of the executors and executrices of the estates involved, and of the Surrogate Court Clerk and other witnesses, were ordered to be paid by the accused.

The Magistrate in giving judgment stated that it was of particular importance in a community where the French-speaking population was large that the difference between Notaries Public under the Ontario Act and the Notary in Quebec be emphasized. He also stated that it was most improper of the accused to take advantage of this fact and to abuse the privilege granted under their commissions issued under the Notaries Act but that it did not fall within his power to take any action but that the convictions might well be brought to the attention of the proper authority.

The hearing and the conviction were reported and commented on in the Windsor press.

Mr. McLennan reported that in connection with the investigation and the collection of evidence at the trial and the location of witnesses, he received the greatest co-operation from the members of the local Bar, particularly S. L. Springsteen, K.C.,

the members of the Committee of the Essex County Law Association having to do with Unauthorized Practice, and E. C. Awrey, K.C., Crown Attorney.

Your Committee is of the opinion that in the interests of the public and the profession the Commissions appointing Joseph Brisebois and Georges Sylvestre notaries public should be revoked.

THE REPORT WAS ADOPTED.

Your Committee reports specially that the following Law Associations, having failed to file their Annual Returns within three months from the 15th day of January, 1947, have now filed their Annual Returns for the year 1946 and otherwise complied with the rules adopted from time to time relating to County Law Libraries, and recommends that grants be made to them of the amounts shown below, to which they would have been respectively entitled if their Returns had been filed within the time limited under Rule 62.

## MEETING OF CONVOCATION.

THURSDAY, 19TH JUNE 1947.

PRESENT: The Treasurer, the Rt. Honourable J. L. Ilsley, the Honourable Joseph Jean, and Messrs. Beaton, Bowlby, Brooks, Cassels, Cartwright, Chitty, Clement, Common, Conant, Davis, Evans, Geary, Jamieson, F. D. Kerr, W. G. Kerr, Marshall, Middlebro', McKay, McLaughlin, Parkinson, Pickup, Rigney, Robinette, Sedgwick, Seymour, Shaver, Springsteen, Walsh, Willmott, and Wilson. Dean Falconbridge was present for the Call to the Bar.

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On motion of Mr. Cassels, seconded by Mr. Shaver, it was ordered that the Report of the Legal Education Committee as to Third Year examination results, special petitions, presentation of medals, awarding of honours and Call to the Bar, be adopted, and that Convocation proceed to Convocation Hall to Call to the Bar and presentation of medals.

#### PRESENTATION OF MEDALS

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#### HONORARY BENCHER.

Moved by Mr. Willmott, seconded by Mr. McLaughlin, that the Right Honourable William Lyon Mackenzie King, P.C., C.M.G., M.A., LL.B., Ph.D., LL.D., Prime Minister of Canada, in consideration of his twenty years of service as Prime Minister, and of the long association with the Law Society and the Osgoode Hall Law School of his father, the late John King, K.C., M.A., be invited to become a member of the Bar of Ontario and an Honorary Bencher of this Society.

*Carried.*

Moved by Mr. Middlebro, seconded by Mr. Walsh, that Mr. King be invited to be Called to the Bar on Convocation Day in September 1947, or at a later date if that date proves inconvenient.

Moved in amendment by Mr. Cartwright, seconded by Mr. Pickup, that the time of Mr. King's Call to the Bar be referred to the Special Committee on the 150th Anniversary Celebration. The amendment was defeated.

The motion was carried.

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The Minutes of Meeting of Convocation of May 15th were read and confirmed.

## RE DEPARTMENT OF VETERANS AFFAIRS, SPECIAL GRANT.

Under the provisions of P.C. 1235, dated April 1, 1947, the Society does not appear to be entitled to the Special Grant of \$150.00 for each student veteran.

On the request of the Vice-Chairman, your Committee recommends that he be authorized to refund to the Department of Veterans Affairs the sum of \$40,425.00 paid on account of this Grant.

## DEFERRED MAINTENANCE.

In May 1945 and in January 1946 Mr. Heeney presented a memorandum outlining various matters of maintenance which had been deferred during the war and which needed action. In January 1946 the matter was referred to the Treasurer and Chairman with power to act, and in May 1946 it was reported to the Committee that certain work had been authorized, and the Committee approved. Since that date some of the work has been completed. Under the authority previously given by the Committee, Mr. Heeney recommends that certain other work be proceeded with forthwith.

Your Committee recommends that this matter be referred to the Treasurer and Vice-Chairman with power to act.

## PORTRAITS.

When the Finance Committee and Convocation originally adopted the report by Mr. George Harbour and directed that the work of restoration be proceeded with, it was also decided that as the portraits were restored they should be photographed for purposes of record. The negative and one copy of each photograph was to be kept in the Society's vault and one copy of the photograph in the safety deposit box. Seven of the portraits have already been photographed.



It was further suggested, although not adopted, that as the portraits were photographed, art students from the University of Toronto be employed to make colour notes so that the Society would have a photograph of each portrait together with notes describing the colours, background, etc.

Your Committee considered further information obtained from the Curator of the Toronto Art Gallery and from two professors, Department of Fine Arts, and one professor of the Photographic Service, University of Toronto, who recommended that the Society's portraits be photographed in colour, and colour film transparencies of each portrait obtained for purposes of record. The transparencies will be on film between glass, size  $3\frac{1}{4}'' \times 4\frac{1}{4}''$ , and will cost \$3.00 each if one copy of each portrait is made, and \$2.75 each if two copies are made. The total cost for one copy of each portrait would be approximately \$175.00.

Your Committee recommends that one film transparency of each of the Society's portraits be obtained and placed for safe keeping in a fire-proof vault.

#### IRON FENCE.

At the meeting of the Committee on April 15th a report from the Art Wire and Iron Company was considered. The Committee recommended that the matter be referred to a sub-committee to be appointed by the Vice-Chairman to consider and report as to the best method of putting the fence in good condition, and that the sub-committee be authorized to have any urgent or necessary repairs made forthwith.

At the meeting of Convocation on April 17th in the absence of the Vice-Chairman, the Treasurer appointed a sub-committee consisting of Messrs. Beaton, Pickup and Wilson to act until the Vice-Chairman returns. On the instructions of Mr. Beaton, the Convener, the Secretary asked Mr. Heeney to instruct the Art Wire and Iron Company to make temporary repairs to the south-east corner of the fence which was unsafe. These temporary repairs have been made.

On May 13th the Committee recommended that this matter stand referred to the sub-committee consisting of Messrs. McLaughlin, Beaton, Pickup and Wilson, with power to act. On May 20th the sub-committee recommended that the Society

accept the offer of the Art Wire and Iron Company dated April 10, 1947, on the understanding and agreement that the Company would proceed with the work to be done forthwith on the Chestnut Street frontage of the fence, and that the Society may terminate the work at any time; and that in the event of any such termination the fee for supervision and overhead, including profit as set out in the offer of April 10th, would be adjusted on a *pro rata* basis.

Your Committee recommends that the action of the sub-committee be approved.

#### RE LAWYERS' CLUB.

On May 8th 1947 Mr. D. J. Ongley, President of The Lawyers' Club, wrote the Society with reference to the use of the old Phillips-Stewart Library as club rooms. On May 13th the Committee recommended that the Lawyers' Club be given the opportunity of presenting their proposals to the Committee, and that the Vice-Chairman discuss the matter with the President of the Club. The Vice-Chairman reported on his interview with officers of the Lawyers' Club.

Your Committee recommends that this matter be referred for consideration and report to the Luncheon Room Committee, Mr. P. D. Wilson, Convener, with power to the Committee to add to its numbers.

Your Committee recommends that the Chairman and the Chief Librarian be empowered to appoint a Librarian for the Phillips-Stewart Library, in place of Miss Elizabeth Anderson, resigned.

RE UNAUTHORIZED PRACTICE, ESSEX COUNTY.

*J. Brisebois and Georges Sylvestre.*

At the May meeting of the Committee Mr. McLennan reported at length on the successful convictions of the above persons. The Committee recommended that a special note on the matter be published in the Ontario Weekly Notes, and that a copy of the report be sent to the Attorney-General. The Committee was of the opinion that the commissions appointing both persons Notaries Public should be revoked.

The reply of the Attorney-General requesting further representations was before your Committee on this date, and after careful consideration it was recommended that the Attorney-General be requested to give further consideration to the revocation of the appointments of the persons concerned as Notaries Public.

Certain confidential information came to the attention of the Chairman with reference to the recent activities of Joseph Graeme Hood, an unqualified person. On instructions of the Chairman the matter was again referred to Mr. J. L. McLennan, K.C. together with the previous file. Mr. McLennan's further report was before your Committee, together with information that since the date of the letter Mr. McLennan has made further investigation and has taken further action forthwith on an application for the committal of Joseph Graeme Hood pursuant to the original Order of the Honourable Mr. Justice Wells.



Your Committee recommends that the action taken to date be approved, and that Mr. McLennan be authorized to take further proceedings forthwith.

#### UNAUTHORIZED PRACTICE, KENT COUNTY.

The attention of your Committee was drawn to the practice of certain accountants in making applications for incorporation of companies and drawing wills and partnership agreements. The matter was referred to the Kent Law Association for full investigation and a report dated June 2nd was before your Committee, and Mr. W. G. Kerr, K.C. also reported orally.

Your Committee recommends that on the information to this date, no further action be taken.

#### RE UNAUTHORIZED PRACTICE—GENERAL.

Your Committee has made inquiries on certain matters which, on investigation, do not warrant further action. Certain other complaints of unauthorized practice are in the hands of Mr. McLennan or County Law Associations for further investigation.

THE REPORT WAS ADOPTED.

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#### COUNTY LIBRARIES COMMITTEE.

At the request of the Chairman, Mr. Middlebro' presented the report.

#### ANNUAL GRANT.

Your Committee reports to the Finance Committee that the Nipissing Law Association has filed its Annual Returns for the year 1946 in accordance with Rule 62 and has complied in all other respects with the requirements of the Rules adopted from time to time by Convocation in relation to County Libraries and recommends that a grant be made to it, of \$270.00.

#### ANNUAL SCHEDULE.

The Chief Librarian presented the 1947 Schedule of County Library information based on annual Returns for 1946.

## SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON PUBLIC RELATIONS.

Mr. Pickup presented the report of the Special Committee on Public Relations.

At the meeting of Convocation on May 15, 1947 two matters—Institutional Advertising and Vocational Guidance—were referred to a special committee to be appointed by the Treasurer. The Treasurer appointed a Special Committee on Public Relations composed of Mr. Pickup, Chairman, and Messrs. Beaton, Chitty and Shaver.

## INSTITUTIONAL ADVERTISING.

This matter was brought to the attention of Convocation by a letter from the Essex Law Association. On the instructions of Convocation the Secretary obtained certain information from the Law Society of Manitoba and the Board of Notaries of the Province of Quebec. These letters were before your Committee at a meeting on May 28th, together with a copy of the Advocate, March-April 1947, published by the Vancouver Bar Association and containing at pages 66-67 an article on Institutional Advertising as adopted by the Law Society of British Columbia, and also a copy of the Canadian Bar Review, March 1947, with an article at page 260, The Diary of Harold Lax by Samuel Freedman, K.C., Winnipeg.

After discussion of the material to date, your Committee adjourned for further information and consideration, to meet again at the call of the Chairman.

## VOCATIONAL GUIDANCE.

This matter was brought to the attention of Convocation by a letter from the Vocational Guidance Centre, O.C.E., University of Toronto, with a request for the preparation of a monograph on "Lawyer" for use in vocational guidance and for distribution on request. Convocation directed that a suitable member of the Bar of Ontario be retained to prepare a monograph on this subject for the purpose requested. Mr. A. A. Macdonald, K.C. was retained for this purpose, and his draft monograph was before your Committee at a meeting on May 28th.

Your Committee recommends approval and adoption of the monograph as prepared by Mr. Macdonald, subject to final revision and editing by Mr. Macdonald and approval by the Chairman.

Your Committee further recommends that additional copies of the monograph be obtained for distribution by the Law Society.

#### LAW SCHOOL STAFF.

##### *Full-time Lecturer.*

In February Mr. John Willis tendered his resignation to take effect June 30th 1947. The Committee recommended that the resignation be accepted with regret and that an advertisement for applications to fill the vacancy be published forthwith. In April no applications having been received, the Legal Education Committee recommended that the matter be referred to a Sub-committee consisting of the Vice-chairman (Mr. Cassels) and Messrs. Wilson and Chitty to act with the Dean and to consider and report to the May meeting of the Committee or to a special meeting if considered necessary. No report of the Sub-committee was made to the May meeting of the Legal Education Committee.

At the meeting of Convocation on May 15th, Mr. Cassels referred to the resignation of Mr. Willis and to the action taken in February 1947 by the Legal Education Committee and Convocation with reference to an appointment to fill the vacancy. He reported that some progress was being made and requested the view of Convocation. It was ordered that the Legal Education Committee be authorized, subject to the approval of the Finance Committee, to engage a full-time Lecturer to fill the vacancy.

The Sub-committee after investigation recommended to a joint meeting of the Legal Education and Finance Committee that MR. STANLEY E. EDWARDS, a member of the Alberta Bar presently doing post-graduate work at Harvard Law School, be appointed a full-time lecturer for a period of one year from July 1st 1947.

Mr. Edwards appeared before the Special Committee on Legal Education on May 27th and the Special Committee approved of the above recommendation.

Your Committee, with the approval of the Finance Committee approves and adopts the recommendation of the Sub-

committee and has appointed Mr. Stanley E. Edwards a full-time Lecturer on the terms set out above.

#### ORAL EXAMINATIONS.

##### *First and Third years.*

A report by Mr. Arthur Kelly, K.C. who acted as Supervisor at the recent examinations, was before your Committee on 13th May. The Committee recommended that the report be referred for consideration to the Special Committee on legal education. A copy of the report was sent to all members of the Legal Education and of the Special Committee.

##### *Preliminary Lectures.*

The report of the Oral Examiners for both 1946 and 1947 made specific recommendations with regard to some lectures to be given preliminary to the regular course. After consideration the Special Committee on Legal Education recommended to your Committee the approval in principle of such preliminary lectures to be given to First year students, the policy and the details of such lectures to be approved by your Committee.

Your Committee approves of the recommendations of the Special Committee and subject to the approval of Convocation that this matter be referred to the Chairman, the Dean and the Secretary with power to act.

#### PRACTICE GROUPS.

A report by Mr. Arthur Kelly, K.C. and Mr. Walter B. Williston who acted as supervisors of the Practice Groups for First year students, was before your Committee on the 15th May. The Committee recommended that the Practice Groups be continued for the academic year 1947-48 and that otherwise the report be referred for consideration to the Special Committee on Legal Education. After consideration the Special Committee on Legal Education recommended to your Committee that Practice Groups be made compulsory for students of the First year, and substituted for office service during the Law School term; and further recommends that Section 3, paragraph (a) to (f) inclusive in the report on Practice Groups of April 28th 1947 be approved and adopted.

Mr. Arthur Kelly, K.C. and Mr. W. B. Williston, who supervised the Practice Groups and Oral examinations during the past year, have submitted the following memorandum as to the organization of Practice Groups for the academic year 1947-48:

*Memorandum re Organization of Practice Groups.*

(1) Groups should be organized on the basis of one leader for each fifteen students. Since attendance will be compulsory, higher ratio will not be possible without destroying the effective value of the groups.

(2) The essential of these groups is that a permanent personal relationship be built up between the students and their leader and that he be sufficiently close to their own age that there is not a great difference of age to be bridged. This results in the students feeling free to bring up problems which they hesitate to bring to the lectures.

(3) Group leaders, as last year, should be Junior Barristers, preferably recent graduates; some especially selected third year students might be tried. Three or four of the higher ranking graduates of 1947 should be included. The purpose of this latter is two-fold. They would be closer to the problems which will be worrying the students; and the appointments might in time become akin to fellowships to which graduating students would aspire.

(4) In the opinion of the Dean, for the first part of the term, two hours a week would be the maximum the students would be able to assimilate. It is felt that ultimately four hours a week would be the goal to which we would work.

(5) In addition to the work in separate groups, once a week all groups should meet for a talk or discussion which would be the keynote for the group meetings to follow: e.g.—Mr. Johnston might give a talk on the library, followed by discussions in the groups on preparing memoranda of law; Mr. Smythe might give a talk on the organization of the Registrar's Office which would be followed by discussions in the groups on the issuing of Writs, filing of documents, setting motions.

(6) The time for the holding of groups will depend on the lecture hour. Assuming that the total number registered in the school will require first year lectures to be given daily from eleven to one, it is suggested the groups might meet in the latter



part of the afternoon thereby leaving time between lectures and group meetings when students could do individual work in the library.

(7) The work within the groups should follow a fairly consistent pattern. This would entail a syllabus being provided; it is suggested that Mr. Williston should be relieved of the conduct of any one group in order to co-ordinate the work within all groups.

(8) Definite assignments should be made periodically of practical problems so that students would be required to do certain work on their own initiative. This might take the form of requiring them to sit through a trial and later discuss the procedure or it might be the form of looking up a case on some point of law. Again the students might be directed to familiarize themselves with some selected statute upon which a subsequent discussion would take place.

(9) It is suggested that from time to time students be referred to statutes, be warned that they will be examined upon these statutes on their oral examinations, but be made clear to them that they will be required to familiarize themselves with the Acts by reading them themselves.

(10) Attendance should continue as long as lectures are given; and should, as far as possible, be looked upon as an integral part of the Students' course.

Your Committee approves of the recommendation of the Special Committee and recommends that the necessary Resolution be passed following the adoption of this report and further recommends approval of the Memorandum on Organization of Practice Groups.

#### SPECIAL PETITIONS.

Your Committee recommends that no petition for special relief be considered by your Committee until it has been referred to the members of the full-time staff and a report thereon submitted; and that notice to this effect be published in the Osgoode Hall News with the results of the examinations, be posted in the Law School and otherwise brought to the attention of students-at-law.

Moved by Mr. Cassels, seconded by Mr. Jamieson, that the Report be adopted.



Moved in amendment by Mr. Pickup, seconded by Mr. Beaton, that the report be adopted, but with the qualification as to Practice Groups that it shall not be deemed to prevent any First Year student who at this date has made definite arrangements to serve in a Toronto office as a First Year student, from continuing to serve in such office.

The amendment was lost. The Report was adopted.

PRACTICE GROUPS—Suspension (in part) of Rule 134.

Moved by Mr. Cassels, seconded by Mr. McLaughlin—

In view of the special circumstances existing by reason of the greatly increased registration of students-at-law following the discharge of large numbers of students and prospective students from His Majesty's Forces:

BE IT RESOLVED pursuant to section 43 of the Law Society Act that the provisions of rule 134 be suspended to the extent necessary to permit the following change with regard to the service under articles of students-at-law, namely: THAT during that portion of the first year of a student's service under articles in which the student is required to attend the Law School, attendance as a member of a practice group as constituted and conducted under the supervision of the Legal Education Committee, shall be compulsory, and shall be substituted for that portion of the year's service which would otherwise be spent in office work with the solicitor to whom he is articulated, and that none of that portion of the year's service shall be spent in service in the solicitor's office.

*Carried.*

DISCIPLINE COMMITTEE—*Jacob Laurence Cohen.*

Mr. Robinette asked that it be recorded in the Minutes of Convocation that he was not present during the consideration of this matter.

Mr. Pickup, the Vice-Chairman, presented the Report of the Discipline Committee herein.

The solicitor did not attend, but was represented by counsel, Mr. A. A. Macdonald, K.C.

Mr. Macdonald addressed Convocation.

Moved by Mr. Pickup, seconded by Mr. Beaton, that the Report be adopted.

An amendment was lost.

The Report of the Discipline Committee in the matter of JACOB LAURENCE COHEN, a Barrister, a member of this Society and a Solicitor of the Supreme Court of Ontario, was adopted.

It was resolved that upon the facts ascertained and appearing by the said Report and the evidence and other papers referred to and submitted to Convocation therewith, Convocation finds the said JACOB LAURENCE COHEN guilty of conduct unbecoming a Barrister and Solicitor in respect of the charges dealt with by the said Report.

THAT the said JACOB LAURENCE COHEN be disbarred.

THAT the said JACOB LAURENCE COHEN is unworthy to practise as a Solicitor.

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Convocation then adjourned at 5.40 p.m.

Your Committee recommends that this matter be referred to the Vice-Chairman, Mr. McLaughlin, to consult with Mr. Heeney and with power to act.

#### OSGOODE HALL LEGAL AND LITERARY SOCIETY.

The Legal Education Committee at its meeting on July 24, 1947 considered letters from the President of the Society and the Editors of *Obiter Dicta*. In consideration of the number of students in attendance, and of the plans for the present academic year, the Legal Education Committee recommends an annual grant of \$2,000.00, payment to be made on the recommendation of the Chairman of the Legal Education Committee; and for the publication of *Obiter Dicta* a guarantee against loss of a sum not in excess of \$600.00.

On August 8th the Editor of *Obiter Dicta* wrote a further letter requesting a grant of \$600.00 instead of the guarantee, on the understanding that any part of this sum not expended be returned to the Law Society.

Your Committee approves of the recommendations of the Legal Education Committee, but recommends that a grant of \$600.00 be made towards the publication of *Obiter Dicta* in place of the guarantee of a similar amount.

#### LUNCHEON ROOM.

Miss Margaret Lennox presented a statement of operations for the period, September 1, 1946 to August 31, 1947. During the year 30,952 meals were served, of which 1,357 were special dinners, including the Lawyers' Club.

## REPORTING COMMITTEE—MR. BEATON.

## RENEWAL OF PRINTING CONTRACT.

The Society's present contract for the printing of the Ontario Reports and The Ontario Weekly Notes expires on 31st December, 1947, and the printers drew the Editor's attention to the desirability of making a new contract well in advance of the time of commencement, because of the difficulty of obtaining supplies of suitable paper at the present time, and the necessity for making advance arrangements to continue the supply. An advertisement was published in July in the Ontario Weekly Notes and in the Globe and Mail, calling for tenders, on a three-year basis, to be in the Secretary's hands by August 15th.

After careful consideration, your Committee recommends that the tender of The Carswell Company Limited be accepted and that a formal contract be prepared and executed in accordance therewith.

## CANADA LAW REPORTS.

The attention of your Committee was drawn to the great delay in the publication of judgments of the Supreme Court of Canada in the Canada Law Reports, and it was pointed out that Part III of those Reports for 1947 was not received until July, and that it was the first part which contained any judgments delivered by the Supreme Court in 1947.

Your Committee recommends that a resolution be adopted protesting against the delay in the reporting of judgments of the Supreme Court of Canada, and that copies of this resolution be forwarded to the Chief Justice of Canada, the Minister of Justice, the Deputy Minister of Justice, the Registrar of the Supreme Court of Canada, and the King's Printer.

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## SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON LEGISLATION—MR. WALSH.

On June 17, 1947 there was read for the first time in the House of Commons, Bill 338, An Act to Provide for the Investigation, Conciliation and Settlement of Industrial Disputes. Section 32(8) of the Bill reads as follows:

"In any proceedings before the Conciliation Board, no person except with the consent of the parties shall be entitled to be represented by a barrister, solicitor or advocate and, notwithstanding such consent, a Conciliation Board may refuse to allow a barrister, solicitor or advocate to represent a party in any such proceedings."

The Bill was brought to the attention of the Secretary on June 20th, and he immediately brought the matter to the attention of the Chairman.

On the instructions of the Chairman, on June 21st the Secretary telegraphed the Minister of Justice pointing out that the Society was strongly opposed to any restriction of the traditional rights of the legal profession or to the rights of the public to be adequately represented by competent legal advisors. On the same date he wrote the Minister a covering letter to the same effect. On June 27th the Minister of Justice acknowledged receipt of the telegram and letter and stated in part that the Society's request had been placed before the Chairman for the attention of the Committee.

On further instructions of the Chairman, Mr. L. A. Kelley, K.C., of Ottawa was retained to represent the Society before the Committee and to make representations with reference to the above noted section. Mr. Kelley duly appeared before the Committee, made submissions in opposition to the section, and reported fully to the Secretary on July 1st. The Chairman has been informed that Mr. Kelley rendered creditable services before the Committee, and has also been unofficially informed that the section in question will probably be dropped from the Bill.

Your Committee requests approval of the action taken by the Chairman and Secretary, and asks authority to take any further and necessary action when the Bill is brought forward during the next session.

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#### WALLACE NESBITT STUDENTS' ESSAY COMPETITION.

The Treasurer presented the Report of the Trustees on the Wallace Nesbitt Students' Essay Competition, as follows:

To the Benchers of the Law Society of Upper Canada in Convocation assembled:

*Wallace Nesbitt Trust.*

1. In accordance with the Wallace Nesbitt Trust Declaration, accepted by Convocation on April 18th, 1929, Convocation on October 21st, 1937, approved regulations governing an Annual Prize Essay Competition as submitted by the Committee nominated in the trust declaration, consisting of the Treasurer of the Law Society, the Chairman of the Legal Education Committee and the Dean of the Law School.

2. The Committee now reports for the information of Convocation that in the competition held during the session of 1946-1947 a prize of \$150.00 was awarded to Miss H. A. L. Clark of the Third Year for an essay entitled, "An Unusual Piece of Legislation", and a prize of \$75.00 was awarded to John H. Stratton of the Second Year for an essay entitled, "Res Ipsa Loquitur and Medical Malpractice".

## DEAN'S REPORT.

The annual report of the Dean of the Law School for the session 1946-47 is submitted, as follows:

## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE DEAN OF THE LAW SCHOOL.

*8th September, 1947.*

1. I beg leave to submit my twenty-fourth annual report as Dean of the Osgoode Hall Law School, namely, for the law school session of 1946-1947.

*Registration of Students.*

2. The number of students registered and in attendance at the Law School during the session of 1939-1940, and for each of the last four sessions, was as follows:

3. The foregoing table shows the result of the continued decline in the number of students during the war years from the normal registration in 1939-40 to the lowest registration in 1943-1944, and the extraordinary increase in the number of students registered in 1945-1946 and 1946-47, owing to the return of ex-Servicemen to civilian life. In 1945-46 the lectures to the first year were given in Convocation Hall, none of the existing class-rooms being adequate for a class of 300. In 1946-47 lectures were again given in Convocation Hall to the first year class, numbering 352, while, as regards the second year class, temporary provision was made during the Christmas term, by use of the Metropolitan Church House, and, during the Easter term, the conversion of the two ground floor lecture rooms into one room provided adequate accommodation in Osgoode Hall for the second year class. The third year class was satisfactorily accommodated in the upstairs lecture room. Unfortunately, it is probable that in the forthcoming session of 1947-48 there will be three extraordinarily large classes instead of two, so that if the new third year class continues to occupy the ground floor lecture room, and the new second year class continues to occupy Convocation Hall, it may be necessary to give lectures to the new first year class at 11 a.m. and 12 instead of 9 a.m. and 10 a.m.

4. Even apart from the fact that Convocation Hall is not a satisfactory substitute for a regular lecture room, teaching has been rendered more difficult because the classes have been unduly large, as was the case in the first year in 1945-1946,

and as will be the case in all three years in 1947-1948. The inadequacy of library facilities which has prevailed for two sessions will of course be accentuated in 1947-1948. Some substantial progress was made in 1946-1947 towards remedying this inadequacy, and rendering teaching more effective, by the production of collections of cases and other teaching materials, the Law Society having purchased the equipment and employed special assistance so that the mimeographing could be done on the Society's premises in Osgoode Hall. The editorial work done by members of the teaching staff has been laborious, and the production of books has necessarily been slow, but it is hoped that further substantial progress will be made in 1947-1948.

5. Many special problems have arisen in the case of ex-servicemen, some of whom were admitted as matriculant students on qualifications not complying with the regular requirements. In the session of 1945-1946 special concessions were made to many ex-servicemen with regard to examination results, and in the course of the session of 1946-1947 the members of the full-time teaching staff submitted to the Legal Education Committee their views and recommendations on this and other matters relating to the conduct of the Law School. The whole subject of legal education is now under consideration by a special committee.

7. I regret exceedingly to have to record the loss suffered by the full-time teaching staff in consequence of the resignation of Mr. Willis, who has accepted an appointment as Canadian representative on the International Monetary Commission (Washington); but I am glad to record the appointment in his place of Mr Stanley E. Edwards, a graduate of the University of Alberta, Faculty of Law, who has just completed a year of post-graduate study at the Harvard Law School, where he has fulfilled the requirements for the degree of LL.M.

8. I recommend the reappointment for one year from May 13, 1947, of Messrs. Foster, Morden, Macdonald, Thomson, Martin, Guest, Johnston, Dubin and Wilson.

*Examinations for Matriculant Students.*

9. In accordance with rule 86D examinations on prescribed books were held in the spring of 1947 for students of the matriculant class who were not in attendance at the law school during the session of 1946-1947; and I recommend that similar examinations be held in 1948 and following years, as follows:

- (1) In the first of a student's five years of service under articles in which he is not attending the law school an examination on Adams, Constitutional History of England; and
- (2) In the second year of a student's five years of service under articles in which he is not attending the law school an examination on Corry, Democratic Government and Politics.

## ANNUAL FINANCIAL STATEMENT, 1946-47.

The annual statement for the year ending 31st August 1947, as certified by the auditors, Messrs. Clarkson, Gordon & Company, was before your Committee for consideration.

Your Committee recommends that the Annual Financial Statement as submitted, be approved for presentation to Convocation and publication pursuant to the Rules.

With the approval of the auditors, your Committee recommends that for publication the statement of "Society funds" be changed to "Statement of Society funds and assets", and that there be added at the foot of such statement the following note:

"Note: The amount shown above for building extension, furniture and equipment, alterations to library, etc., \$316,407.51, represents the expenditures on such items since 1937. In total the buildings owned by the Law Society and the contents thereof, including books and portraits, are valued for insurance purposes at approximately \$1,373,000.00."

## ESTIMATES—1947-48.

An estimate of the probable receipts and disbursements for the year 1947-48 is submitted herewith, and is recommended for approval.

## PORTRAITS.

Your Committee recommends that the painting of a portrait of the Treasurer be referred to the Vice-Chairman with power to act.

## MAINTENANCE STAFF.

Mr. Heeney recommends that Mr. Sheppard be appointed foreman in charge of all inside work and that a first rate gardener be engaged and placed in charge of the lawns, gardens, shrubbery and trees.

*Re Sick Leave Policy*—Mr. Heeney recommends as follows:

- (a) full-time employees be allowed one day sick leave for each unbroken fully attended month pay period on duty, such unused portion of sick leave credit to accumulate from year to year until retirement date;
- (b) as of October 1st 1947, each full-time employee be credited with 7 days sick leave;
- (c) in any case of absence where sick leave with pay is claimed the employer retains the right to require employees to present a doctor's certificate confirming the necessity of such absence, providing that the employer will pay the expense of such certificate but not exceeding \$2.00.

Your Committee approves of Mr. Heeney's recommendations herein.

## GREAT LIBRARY CEILING.

This matter was referred to the Vice-Chairman with power to act. With his approval, Mr. Heeney is making arrangements for a plastering contractor to undertake a general survey of the ceiling including the erection of a movable steel scaffold, the inspection and report to cost approximately \$250.00.

The King's Printer recently notified the Secretary that this year the Statutes of Canada will be printed in 2 volumes—volume 1 containing the public and private acts and a list of the divorce cases; and volume 2 containing the divorce acts only. These will sell at \$5.00 each volume or \$10.00 a set. With the approval of the Vice-Chairman the Secretary has published in O.W.N. a notice to the above effect and stating—

“Those members of the profession who have subscribed through the Society for the 1947 Statutes will receive Volume

I only. Any member who wishes to have Volume II should notify the King's Printer, Ottawa, *forthwith*."

#### CHARGE FOR ANNUAL STATUTES.

1948 *Dominion and Ontario*—The amount to be charged for the 1948 Statutes is before the Committee. The charge for the past few years has been \$5.50. The price to the Society for the Dominion Statutes is \$5.00, less 25 per cent. and for the Ontario Statutes \$2.00, less 20 per cent.

The King's Printer, Ottawa, informs the Secretary that the Dominion Statutes for 1948 will be printed in 2 volumes—volume 1 containing the public and private acts and a list of the divorce cases, and volume 2 containing the divorce acts only. These will sell at \$5.00 each volume, or \$10.00 a set. If both volumes are included in the price to the members of the profession who subscribe through the Society the price will have to be increased from \$5.50. If only volume 1 is included the annual fees notice will have to be changed and a draft of the new notice was before the Committee.

Your Committee recommends that volume 1 only of the Dominion Statutes 1948 be included in the Statutes subscribed for through the Society, and that the price for the Ontario Statutes and volume 1 of the Dominion Statutes 1948, be fixed at \$5.50.

Your Committee further recommends that the following paragraph be included in the Notice for Annual Fees 1947-48:

"The Annual Ontario Statutes and Volume I of the Dominion Statutes for 1948, will be supplied as issued to such members as pay to the Society on or before the 30th day of November 1947 the sum of \$5.50 in addition to the Annual Fees. In 1948 the King's Printer expects to print the Dominion Statutes in two volumes, Volume I containing the public and private acts and a list of the divorce cases; Volume II containing the divorce acts only. Members who wish to have Volume II of the 1948 Dominion Statutes should subscribe direct to the King's Printer, Ottawa."

Your Committee recommends that no general rule be adopted but that, as has been the policy of your Committee in the recent past, each case be considered on its merits.

**OBITER DICTA.**

Your Committee recommends that the Chairman be authorized on behalf of the Committee to write the Editor of Obiter Dicta congratulating him and his staff on the excellence of the first number of the magazine for this year.

## RE-READING OF EXAMINATION PAPERS.

At the September meeting of the Legal Education Committee it was recommended that this matter be referred for consideration and report to a Sub-committee to be appointed by the Chairman. The following Sub-committee was appointed: The Treasurer, the Chairman, and Messrs. Beaton, Chitty, Davis, Jamieson and Wilson. The Sub-committee met on two occasions and considered a letter from the Dean stating that views of the full-time staff as to the method of re-reading.

The report of the Sub-committee was considered on the 18th instant and your committee recommends its approval to the following effect:

1. Adoption of the principle of the right of any student to have an examination paper on which he has failed re-read on application in writing within ten days of the publication of the examination results, except in special cases where the time may be extended by the Committee. No right of re-reading in other cases.

2. A fee of \$10 for each paper payable with the application for re-reading, such fee to be refunded to the student if the marks of the paper re-read are increased.

3. Papers to be re-read are to be referred to the Dean who will appoint one or more qualified persons for that purpose. The Dean to recommend to the Legal Education Committee the fee to be paid to the person or persons who re-read each paper.

4. A revised examination list is to be compiled and posted after the results of the re-reading are reported to the Secretary.

5. All examination papers are to be delivered to the Secretary forthwith after marking; such papers to be arranged by the examiner in order by numbers in bundles convenient for handling. The examination papers are to be held by the Secretary, subject to instructions of your Committee.



## PRACTICE GROUPS.

Your Committee recommends that the Treasurer and Benchers give a dinner to the Practice Group Instructors on a date to be set early in December next and that the matter be referred to the Chairman and Secretary with power to act.

## FIRE INSURANCE.

Pursuant to the instructions of the Committee, the Secretary wrote Messrs. Armour, Boswell and Cronyn Limited, brokers for the Society on September 25th enclosing new statements of value as determined by Mr. Heeney, R. M. Brown, Roy Britnell and George A. Johnston, K.C. The Secretary stated in part as follows:

"I am directed to inform you that the Law Society of Upper Canada considers that it now fully complies with the 90% co-insurance clause with reference to the insurance covered by the enclosed statement of values. I am further directed to request you so to inform all your insuring companies and ask them to submit reasons if they do not consider that the Society has fully complied with the co-insurance clause."

On October 23rd the Society's insurance brokers wrote enclosing letters from all the companies carrying the Society's fire insurance.



Your Committee has read the letters from the insuring companies and considers them to be as satisfactory as can be obtained.

#### RE IRON FENCE.

The Chestnut Street frontage has been completed with the exception of a few castings which will not be placed until they are cast for the whole fence.

Your Committee recommends that the repairs and the restoration of the whole fence be proceeded with under the contract.

#### RE GROUNDS—Tulips, 1948.

This matter was before the Committee on June 17th and was referred to the Vice-Chairman with power to act. The Vice-chairman obtained the opinion of Helen M. Kippax, landscape architect, and the four main centre beds and the borders have been planted in accordance with her recommendations.

*Approved.*

#### GREAT LIBRARY CEILING.

This matter was referred to the Vice-Chairman with power to act. With his approval Mr. Heeney had a contractor make a general survey of the ceiling. The contractor reported that he found considerable plastering repairs necessary, caused through deterioration by dampness through the past years. W. J. Crowe Limited, plastering contractor, is prepared to undertake this work on a cost plus basis of 15% and 10%. With the approval of the Vice-chairman, Mr. Henney has been instructed to proceed with this work as soon as possible. The estimated cost is approximately \$1,000 plus decorating should this be done.

Your Committee approves of the action taken by the Vice-chairman and authorizes him to approve of the decorating of the Library ceiling.

#### RE NORTH PARKING AREA.

The Ramsay Contracting Company Limited quote a price of \$795 to re-pave the Society's parking area.

Your Committee recommends that this matter be referred to the Vice-Chairman with power to act after making enquiries from the Department of Public Works as to the paving of their

part of the area and the possibility of the Department paying part of the cost of paving the Society's area.

#### LUNCHEON ROOM FURNITURE.

For several years the furniture from the upper floor of the Phillips Stewart Library has been used in the luncheon room. Mr. Heeney recommends that this furniture be removed from the luncheon room as the present use of the furniture will ruin it and new tops will have to be put on it.

Mr. Heeney recommends purchase for the luncheon room of new furniture of the latest design with leatherette seats and backs on the chairs and 30" x 48" tables, steel construction and formica tops in colour to be selected. Mr. Heeney estimates that the new furniture will give 50% more seating accommodation in the luncheon room. The restoration of the furniture to the Phillips Stewart Library will give additional study tables if the top floor is opened for students.

Your Committee approves of the recommendations of Mr. Heeney herein.

#### CLUB-ROOMS—Old Phillips-Stewart Library.

Your Committee had before it a letter from The Lawyers Club with reference to the decoration and furnishing of the old Phillips Stewart Library as Club rooms for use by all members of the profession.

Your Committee approves in principle of the proposed use of these rooms and recommends to Convocation that the work be done under the supervision of Mr. Arthur Heeney, Jr., under the direction of the Committee.

At the request of the Vice-Chairman, Mr. P. D. Wilson explained the plans for the proposed furnishing of the old Phillips-Stewart Library as club rooms for members of the profession, and the use to which it might be put in providing for club facilities and as a meeting place for all members of the Society. Convocation adjourned briefly to permit the Benchers to inspect the proposed club rooms.

Moved by Mr. McLaughlin, seconded by Mr. Wilson, and unanimously carried, that the report of the Finance Committee, including the proposal as to club rooms, be adopted.

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ORAL EXAMINATIONS 1948.

*First and Third Years.*

Your Committee gave consideration to the arrangements for and the date of these examinations and also the form of the examination for the First year students in view of the fact that they are not in offices but assigned to Practice Groups.

The Chairman presented the following suggestions by Mr. Arthur Kelly, K.C.:—

*re First Year Oral Examinations.*

As one of the main purposes of the Oral examinations of first year students was to find what practice they were getting in offices and to make them aware of the possibilities which were open to them, under the present system where instruction is being given to them under a program which the Society

has laid down, there does not seem to be a good reason for conducting the examinations as they have been in the past. As an alternative it would seem that the following would serve our purposes—

(1) That at the conclusion of the spring term each group leader be asked to rate the members of his group on their knowledge of the matters covered, their interest in the work of the group, the regularity of their attendance and the extent to which they appeared to have benefited by their work in the group.

(2) That a small Board of Examiners conduct an oral examination of two from each group, selected at random, as a means of determining the effectiveness of the various groups and to relate the reports of the Group Leaders to a common denominator. It would be desirable that these examinations all be carried on by the same group of examiners. Since this would entail about 40 examinations, they could be concluded within one week.

*re Third Year Students.*

Owing to the number in Third year a number of groups of examiners will be required. On past experience, a maximum of 60 candidates a week is all that one pair of examiners can handle. As a means of increasing uniformity I would suggest that instead of two examiners remaining together for the same period there should be rotation each day, or possibly each half day. If the examiners are grouped with relation to their suitability to litigation on the one hand and conveyancing on the other, the same relationship can be kept as the members of the groups are varied.

Your Committee recommends that the suggestions made by Mr. Kelly be approved and that in addition, those First year students who are given no rating by their Group Leaders be re-examined by a special examining Board composed of Mr. Arthur Kelly, K.C., and Mr. W. B. Williston and other members of the Bar and that a full report be submitted to your Committee.

Your Committee recommends that students of the present First year be required to take a regular Oral examination during their second year at the Law School.



Your Committee further recommends that the date of and arrangements for the examinations be referred to the Chairman with power to act.

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#### REFRESHER COURSE PRINTED LECTURES.

On October 3rd last the Committee referred the question of the disposal of the remaining sets to the Chairman and Secretary, with power to act. The books have now been distributed as follows:

#### ASSOCIATION OF AMERICAN LAW SCHOOLS.

The Dean received a letter, dated 1st December 1947, from W. A. Seavey, President of the Association of American Law Schools, inviting him or any members of the faculty to attend the meetings of the Association in Chicago from December 28th to 30th. With the approval of the Chairman and the Treasurer, Dr. Wright and Mr. Laskin attended these meetings at the expense of the Society. The correspondence was submitted and the matter was before the Committee for approval.

Your Committee approves of the action taken therein and recommends that the correspondence, the report by Dr. Wright, and also the correspondence with Harvard Law School, be referred to the Special Committee on Legal Education.

#### CANADIAN TAX FOUNDATION.

With the approval of the Chairman, Mr. Edwards attended the Conference of the Canadian Tax Foundation in Ottawa on December 8th and 9th 1947, at the expense of the Society. The matter was before the Committee for approval.

Your Committee approves of the action taken therein.

#### DINNER TO THIRD YEAR STUDENTS.

Your Committee recommends that the customary Dinner be given the graduating year of the Law School, and that the matter be referred to the Chairman with power to act.

##### RE INSURANCE—Bank Vault Insurance.

In December 1947 the Secretary was requested to obtain information with reference to this question. The Society's brokers advised that the rate applicable for the Society's safety deposit box at the Canadian Bank of Commerce, City Hall Branch, was 60 cents per annum per \$1,000 for robbery and theft.

Your Committee recommends that bank vault insurance in the sum of \$50,000.00 be placed forthwith.

At the meeting of the Finance Committee on November 18th, following consideration of repairs to the Great Library Ceiling, the Vice-Chairman was authorized to approve of the decoration of the Library ceiling. Mr. Heeney reports that the plaster ceiling repairs make it imperative to decorate not only the Library ceiling, but the whole Library. One estimate to do a redecorating job, but not including the large steel windows in the south elevation, has been received.

Your Committee recommends that consideration be deferred pending the report of the Library Committee.

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## LIBRARY COMMITTEE—MR. GORDON N. SHAVER.

*Western Weekly Reports and Irish Jurist.*

Your Committee reports that it has approved the purchase of a second set of Western Weekly Reports at a price of \$400.00, and a set of Irish Jurist reports for \$250.00. In view of these purchases, and of the increase in the number of law books now being published, the cost of the purchase of law books may exceed the budget in this fiscal year.

## LIBRARY FLOOR AND DECORATION.

Your Committee reports that it has appointed a sub-committee, consisting of the Chairman and Mr. Walsh to decide upon the best type of floor for the Great Library, how and when the Library should be decorated, and the probable cost of laying the floor and of decorating the Library, which Sub-committee is to report on these matters at the next meeting of the Library Committee.

## LIGHTING IN TEXT-BOOK ROOM.

Your Committee recommends that fluorescent lighting be installed in the text-book room.

## LOST BOOKS.

Your Committee reports that 55 volumes of text books have disappeared from the Great Library in the past eight years, and recommends that a note be inserted in the Ontario Weekly Notes, asking members of the Society to return any Great Library books, which they may have in their possession.



## UNAUTHORIZED PRACTICE COMMITTEE.

Mr. Walsh reported orally on several matters presently under consideration by the Committee.

THE REPORT WAS RECEIVED.

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## RULES COMMITTEE.

Mr. Walsh addressed Convocation on the question of the Tariff of Fees in the Supreme Court of Ontario, and pointed out that there has been no increase in the tariff since 1920. He suggested that in view of the greatly increased cost of living it was desirable that some reasonable increase be made in the tariff of fees commensurate with these increased costs.

Moved by Mr. Walsh, seconded by Mr. Middlebro', that Convocation approve in principle of a reasonable increase in the Tariff of Fees in the Supreme Court of Ontario, and recommends to the Rules Committee that favourable consideration be given to such increase.

The Treasurer read a memorandum dated January 13, 1948 from Peter White, K.C., Chairman of the Finance Committee, and the Report of the Committee and the memorandum were carefully considered.

Moved by Mr. Carson, seconded by Mr. Wilson, and carried, that Convocation approve the suggestion that the west room only be furnished as a club room without bar facilities of any kind.

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SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON PUBLIC  
RELATIONS—MR. PICKUP.

At the meeting of Convocation on May 15, 1947 the matter of institutional advertising was referred to a Special Committee to be appointed by the Treasurer. The Treasurer appointed Messrs. Beaton, Chitty, Pickup and Shaver to be the Committee; Mr. Pickup being the Chairman.

This matter was brought to the attention of Convocation by a letter from the Essex Law Association and since the appointment of the Committee communication has also been received from the Law Association of Middlesex County requesting the approval of the Benchers to that Association proceeding with a program of Public Service Education to be carried out on a similar basis to that presently being carried out by the Law Society of Manitoba.

Your Committee has made inquiries and considered the matter. The program carried on in Manitoba is under the heading of "Diary of Harold Lex" and articles are published in the press by the Manitoba Bar Association illustrating the necessity or advisability of consulting a lawyer. To meet the expense of such publications assessments, voluntary in character, are made upon members of the Bar of the Province of Manitoba. The Law Society of British Columbia carries on a similar program of Law

Society publicity following the pattern of a question from a client with the answer of a lawyer and the advice to consult a lawyer.

The matter has also been considered in the Province of Saskatchewan and the Law Society of that Province has directed the Benchers in the following terms:

“The matter of institutional advertising having been fully discussed once again at this Annual Meeting of the Society, be it resolved that the Benchers initiate a scheme of institutional advertising and that the cost of such advertising be assessed and levied against all the members of the Society and that such scheme be proceeded with as expeditiously as possible.”

In the Province of Alberta a Committee was appointed and recommended to the Law Society of that Province that no action be taken by the Law Society, which recommendation was adopted by the Benchers.

Your Committee, after considering the methods already adopted in some of the Provinces and other methods which might be adopted, is of the opinion that no scheme of institutional advertising or public relations publicity would be effective to improve public relations and that any scheme which might be adopted would sooner or later have the appearance of advertising intended to bring professional business to lawyers and would not be in keeping with the traditions of the profession. Your Committee considers that the most effective way, if not the only way, of maintaining proper relations with the public is for the Law Society to maintain the high standing and traditions of the profession by example and by proper exercise of its disciplinary control over the members of the profession.

Your Committee, therefore, recommends against any action being taken by the Law Society of Upper Canada in this matter.

THE REPORT WAS ADOPTED.

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#### SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON LEGAL AID FOR NEEDY PERSONS—MR. CHITTY.

At the meeting of Convocation on October 16th 1947, the Treasurer read a letter from the Secretary-Treasurer of the Canadian Bar Association enclosing copy of a resolution respect-

ing Legal Aid for Needy Persons passed by the Canadian Bar Association at the 29th Annual Meeting September 5th 1947. It was ordered that the matter be referred to a Special Committee composed of Messrs: Chitty (convener), Conant, and Jamieson.

Your Special Committee met on 13th January 1948. The Committee feels that the situation is such in Ontario that there is no real need for "in forma pauperis" procedure. If a litigant has a cause which is sufficient under the in forma pauperis rules to comply with their requirements he would have little or no difficulty in obtaining the services of a solicitor to take his case.

Your Committee feels a scheme of the nature of that propounded by the Rushcliffe report, simplified and amended to meet local conditions, ought to be instituted in Ontario; that primarily the responsibility for the organization of such a scheme rests with the Law Society. Ultimately when this scheme has been put into operation a good case can be made for assistance from the Province in the financing of the scheme.

Your Committee therefore recommends that the committee be enlarged and made a committee to report to Convocation upon such a scheme and for that purpose be empowered to make investigations and hold hearings as it may deem necessary.

#### THE REPORT WAS ADOPTED.

The Treasurer appointed Messrs. Cartwright, Common, Springsteen and Willmott as additional members of the above Special Committee.

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#### MEMORIAL TO THE LATE WILLIAM EDMUND NEWTON SINCLAIR, K.C.

Mr. Willmott presented the report of the Special Committee appointed to prepare a memorial to the late William Edmund Newton Sinclair, K.C., and it was ordered that it be recorded on the Minutes of Convocation and a copy sent to the family of the late Mr. Sinclair:

## MEMORIAL

TO THE LATE

WILLIAM EDMUND NEWTON SINCLAIR, K.C.

The Benchers in Convocation assembled record with profound regret the death of William Edmund Newton Sinclair, who died at his home in Oshawa on November 26th, 1947 in his 75th year.

The late Mr. Sinclair was born in the Township of Whitby, County of Ontario, a son of John Sinclair and Lucy B. Rogers. He received his early education at the public school on the corner of his father's farm and at Whitby Collegiate Institute. In 1896 he graduated from the University of Toronto in Political Science with the degree of Bachelor of Arts, and later attained the degree of Bachelor of Laws.

He was admitted as a student-at-law of the Graduate Class at Osgoode Hall in Easter Term 1896 and was called to the Bar and sworn in as a solicitor in Easter term 1899. He was appointed one of His Majesty's Counsel on December 29th, 1921. He was first elected a Bencher in 1931 and was re-elected in 1936, 1941 and 1946 and became a life Bencher in the last mentioned year. He rendered service on and was a valued member of several committees including the Discipline Committee.

Following his call to the Bar, the late Mr. Sinclair commenced the practice of law in Oshawa which he continued until a month before his decease. He was greatly interested and took an active part in the public affairs of Oshawa of which he was six times Mayor. He was also the first President of the Oshawa Red Cross Society and the Oshawa Branch of the Victorian Order of Nurses.

The late Mr. Sinclair was first elected to the Ontario Legislature in 1911, and was re-elected in every election except one until his retirement in 1934. He was the leader of His Majesty's Loyal Opposition in the Ontario Legislature for many years. He was elected in 1945 and was a member of the House of Commons at the time of his death.

The late Mr. Sinclair was married in 1907 to Minerva Montgomery, who died the same year. In 1918 he married Edna



Worden who survives him. He is also survived by a daughter Mrs. Allen G. Talbot of Brownsburg, Quebec, and a brother, Rev. N. D. Sinclair of Barrie.

By the death of the late Mr. Sinclair the profession has lost an honoured member and a career of valued service to the citizens of Oshawa and of Ontario has closed.

Convocation expresses appreciation of the fine qualities of William Edmund Newton Sinclair and extends sincerest sympathy to his family.

"A relative of the late Mr. T. B. Phillips-Stewart who gave his estate to the Law Society for library purposes, told me that she had a report from the McIntosh monument people that the monument to his memory in Mount Pleasant Cemetery was in need of repair and that there were no funds in his estate with which to do it.

I communicated with Mr. W. F. Wilson of the McIntosh Company. He said that the monument was built of stone and marble, that it has been up for fifty-five years and that the life of that type of monument is from sixty to eighty years. He advises against doing any repairs now but says that the monument will probably have to be replaced in from twenty to twenty-five years. The Law Society will probably desire to make a grant for a new monument at that time if a record is made in the minutes of these circumstances."

#### ARREARS OF ANNUAL FEES.

#### CONFERENCE OF THE GOVERNING BODIES OF THE LEGAL PROFESSION IN CANADA.

At the Mid-Winter Meeting of the Executive of the Conference it was decided to request a further grant for the work of the Conference similar to that of last year, i.e., a grant of \$400.00 from the Canadian Bar Association, \$100.00 from the Law Society of Upper Canada, \$25.00 from the Law Society of Prince Edward Island, and \$50.00 from each of the other Provincial Societies and from the Board of Notaries of Quebec.

Your Committee recommends that a grant of \$100.00 be made to the Conference for the year 1948.

#### RE OSGOODE HALL LEGAL AND LITERARY SOCIETY.

On January 27th, N. M. Rogers, Secretary-Treasurer, wrote the Secretary asking for the use of a basement room for the Executive of the Society and the staff of *Obiter Dicta*, the room to be cleaned, painted and furnished at the expense of the Legal



and Literary Society. The Vice-Chairman of this Committee, after consultation with the Treasurer and the Chairman of the Legal Education Committee, informed Mr. Rogers that they were prepared to recommend approval of the request, and authorized the Legal and Literary Society to proceed with the repairs.

Your Committee approves of the action taken herein, and recommends that the sub-committee on Insurance be requested to inspect the premises with respect to fire protection.

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T. A. O'Flaherty asks for the use of Convocation Hall for a Moot Court on Friday, February 20th.

Your Committee recommends that the request be granted.

#### RE GROUP INSURANCE FOR MEMBERS OF THE SOCIETY.

In November 1947, Fraser Deacon of the Canada Life Insurance Company, wrote the Secretary with reference to a proposed plan of group insurance for members of the Law Society. The letter was referred to the Vice-Chairman, and he and the Chairman of the Legal Education Committee have had further interviews with Mr. Deacon. Mr. Deacon now submits a letter with reference to the plan, together with a suggested circular letter for submission to the members of the Society.

Your Committee refers this matter to Convocation for directions and without any recommendation.

An amendment was lost.

The report of the Discipline Committee in the matter of Thomas Field Hall, Barrister, a member of this Society and a Solicitor of the Supreme Court of Ontario, was adopted.

It was resolved that upon the facts ascertained and appearing by the said Report and the evidence and other papers referred to and submitted to Convocation therewith, Convocation finds the said THOMAS FIELD HALL guilty of professional misconduct, and of conduct unbecoming a Barrister and Solicitor in respect of the charges dealt with by the said Report.

THAT the said THOMAS FIELD HALL be suspended from practice as a Barrister and Solicitor for the period of One Year from the 19th day of February 1948.

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#### JOHN HOOD.

Mr. Pickup, the Vice-Chairman, presented the report of the Discipline Committee herein.

The solicitor did not attend, nor was he represented by counsel. Mr. Pickup read a letter dated February 18th from Mr. A. A. Macdonald, K.C., counsel for the solicitor, and a copy of an enclosed letter dated February 16th from the solicitor to Mr. Macdonald.

MOVED by Mr. Pickup, SECONDED by Mr. Parkinson, that the report be adopted.

The Report of the Discipline Committee in the matter of JOHN HOOD, Barrister, a member of this Society and a Solicitor of the Supreme Court of Ontario, was adopted.

It was resolved that upon the facts ascertained and appearing by the said Report and the evidence and other papers referred to and submitted to Convocation therewith, Convocation finds the said JOHN HOOD guilty of professional misconduct, and of conduct unbecoming a Barrister and Solicitor in respect of the charges dealt with by the said Report.

THAT the said JOHN HOOD be suspended from practice as a Barrister and Solicitor for the period of One Year from the 19th day of February 1948.

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#### UNAUTHORIZED PRACTICE COMMITTEE.

In the absence of the Chairman, Mr. Beaton presented the report.

#### RE TRUST COMPANIES, DRAWING WILLS.

On January 3, 1948, the Secretary received a letter enclosing a notice dated January 1, 1948, from the Canada Trust Company to Board of Trade Club Members. The attention of the Chair-

man has recently been drawn to two wills drawn in York County by another trust company. The activities of trust companies in general have been drawn to the attention of the Committee in many instances.

Your Committee is of the opinion that this question has become so acute, and is of such interest to the profession as a whole, that it is beyond the ordinary functions of your Committee, and recommends to Convocation the appointment of a Special Committee to investigate and report.

THE REPORT WAS ADOPTED.

Mr. Wilson presented the report of the Special Committee on Legal Education.

#### *Law School—The Dean.*

Your Committee recommends to Convocation that Dr. C. A. Wright, K.C., B.A., S.J.D., be appointed Dean of the Law School as of June 1st, 1948, in succession to J. D. Falconbridge, K.C., M.A., LL.B., who has expressed his urgent desire to be relieved of the office and duties of Dean forthwith.

Moved by Mr. Wilson, SECONDED by Mr. Cartwright, that the report be adopted.

*Carried.*

Moved by Mr. Wilson, SECONDED by Mr. McLaughlin, that in consideration of the expressed wishes of Dean Falconbridge, the appointment of Dr. Wright as Dean date from March 1, 1948.

*Carried.*



## SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON THE APPOINTMENT OF KING'S COUNSEL.

Mr. Pickup presented the report of the Special Committee:

1. At the meeting of Convocation on November 20th, 1947, a Special Committee was authorized to be appointed by the Treasurer to consider and report to Convocation on a resolution received from the Canadian Bar Association expressing the opinion that no Provincial Government should appoint a King's Counsel unless the appointment is first approved by a Committee composed of the Attorney-General, the Chief Justice of the Court of Appeal, the Chief Justice of the Superior Court of the Province and two members of the governing body of the legal profession selected by such governing body in Convocation. Pursuant to the resolution of Convocation, the Treasurer appointed as the Special Committee Messrs. Pickup (Chairman), Beaton, Chitty, McLaughlin and Walsh.

2. After a preliminary meeting of the Committee held on December 15th, 1947, a conference was arranged with the Attorney-General of the Province. This conference was held on January 8th, 1948, the Treasurer and all other members of the Committee being present, when the matter was fully discussed. The Attorney-General outlined the precautions presently being taken in this Province in the appointment of King's Counsel and outlined to your Committee his own views on the subject matter of the resolution under consideration. He was speaking for himself only and made it clear that any views expressed by him could not be considered the views of the Government unless and until occasion arose for him to lay them before the Government by way of recommendation. Among the difficulties which he outlined to your Committee and which he felt would have to be taken care of before any action could be taken by the Government of this Province in respect of the resolution under consideration were the following:

(1) The Law Society of Upper Canada would have to assume full responsibility and speak for the profession as a whole in laying down the qualifications for appointment as King's Counsel which qualifications would require to be sufficiently defined to enable any application for appointment as King's Counsel to be dealt with by the Committee



on the basis of established rules. This involved a procedure whereby application would be made for appointment as King's Counsel and dealt with by applying to the application the rules laid down by the Law Society of Upper Canada for which the Law Society had assumed full responsibility.

(2) If such procedure as above outlined were practical and adopted, all existing appointments as King's Counsel would have to be reviewed by applying to such appointments the test of the rules so laid down and revoking appointments where necessary. The main purpose of this was to prevent discrimination against lawyers, who are not now King's Counsel and who have to wait to qualify under the new rules, by reason of being in competition with other lawyers who have heretofore been appointed as King's Counsel and who could not qualify as such under the new rules which might be laid down.

Subject to the foregoing, the Attorney-General indicated his personal desire to co-operate with the Law Society of Upper Canada in improving the situation with regard to the appointment of King's Counsel.

3. Your Committee also reviewed the action of governing bodies of the legal profession in other Provinces, but is of the opinion that the action taken or not taken by governing bodies in other Provinces is not of much, if any, assistance in considering the situation in the Province of Ontario.

4. Your Committee met again and reconsidered the matter in the light of the position indicated by the Attorney-General of Ontario and is of the opinion that in the situation existing in Ontario, it is not feasible or practicable to bring into operation any plan for the appointment of King's Counsel in Ontario by means of a Committee such as that suggested by the Canadian Bar Association, and therefore recommends to Convocation that no action be taken by the Law Society of Upper Canada in respect of the resolution above referred to received from the Canadian Bar Association.

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Convocation resumed at 2 p.m., a quorum being present.

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#### SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON 150TH ANNIVERSARY.

Mr. Cassels presented the report of the Special Committee:

At the meeting of Convocation on April 17th, 1947, the Treasurer (Mr. J. S. Denison, K.C.) read a letter from Mr. C. F. H. Carson, K.C., with a suggestion that some function might be arranged to celebrate the 150th anniversary of the founding of the Law Society. The matter was referred to a Special Committee to be appointed by the Treasurer at Convocation in May. At the May meeting the Treasurer (Mr. G. W. Mason, K.C.) appointed the following Special Committee: Mr. Hamilton Cassels, K.C., Chairman, Mr. C. F. H. Carson, K.C., Mr. J. R. Cartwright, K.C., Mr. A. G. Davis, K.C., Mr. H. J. McLaughlin, K.C., and Mr. P. D. Wilson, K.C.

Your Committee met on several occasions to make the necessary arrangements for the formal celebration of the anniversary on Friday, October 31st 1947.

In the afternoon of that date from 3.15 to 6 p.m a Reception was held in Convocation Hall for Judges, members of the profession and distinguished guests representing the other learned pro-

fessions and other educational institutions. The Benchers and the Guest Speakers occupied the dais while the guests and members of the profession with their wives occupied the body of the Hall. The ceremony was opened by the Secretary reading the Minutes of the first meeting of the Society at Newark on July 17th, 1797. Addresses were delivered by Mr. G. W. Mason, K.C., the Treasurer, The Honourable Ray Lawson, O.B.E., Lieutenant Governor of Ontario, The Honourable R. S. Robertson, Chief Justice of Ontario, The Honourable L. E. Blackwell, K.C., Attorney-General of Ontario, and The Right Honourable L. S. St. Laurent, P.C., K.C., Secretary of State for External Affairs. Following the addresses an informal reception was held by His Honour the Lieutenant Governor and Mrs. Lawson, other distinguished guests, the Treasurer and Benchers. Tea was served in the lower rotunda of the Centre wing to about 500 members of the profession and their guests. Mr. St. Laurent's address will be printed in full in the March issue of the Canadian Bar Review and in the same issue will appear a short descriptive account of the celebration together with extracts from the four other addresses.

In the evening a Reception and Dance was held for Judges and members of the profession in Ontario and their wives. About 1,500 persons attended the reception and were received by the Treasurer and Benchers with their ladies in the Great Library. Osgoode Hall was thrown open for this historic occasion and the visitors could hardly fail to be impressed by the dignity and beauty of the building and some of its rooms, particularly Convocation Hall with its panelled and booklined walls and imposing portraits, the Great Library decorated with autumn flowers and with its domed ceiling lighted by the brilliant cove lights and the lower rotunda of the centre wing where the supper tables were laid out.

A special brochure on the history and activities of the Society was prepared by George A. Johnson, K.C., Chief Librarian, and a copy has been sent to all members of the Society including students-at-law and to the Society's special guests at the celebration. Many letters have been received complimenting the Society on the excellence of the arrangements for the two receptions on October 31st, and for the admirable brochure on the history of the Society.

Your Committee considered publication of the full text of the four addresses other than that of Mr. St. Laurent in pamphlet form to be distributed to the profession. In view of the fact that extracts from these speeches will be published in the Canadian Bar Review in March 1948, your Committee recommends against further publication.

In view of the success of this celebration and of the many favourable comments on the entertainment of the members of the Society your Committee recommends to Convocation consideration of the holding of a suitable function for the members of the profession in Ontario every few years.

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#### RE LAW SOCIETY MUSEUM.

Mr. Cassels spoke of the possibility of establishing a museum in connection with Osgoode Hall for the collection of articles of historical value that might be of interest to the profession as a whole.

Mr. Beaton spoke of the regret of the Benchers in the voluntary retirement of the Dean, and of the great contribution that he had made to Legal Education during his connection with the Law School.

Moved by Mr. Beaton, seconded by Mr. Carson, and unanimously carried, that Convocation accepts, with regret, the resignation of John Delatre Falconbridge, K.C., M.A., LL.B., as Dean of the Osgoode Hall Law School. In doing so, Convocation notes, with satisfaction and appreciation, the many years Dean Falconbridge has been associated with the Law School:

Lecturer since 1909

Acting Principal, 1923

Appointed Dean, March 20th, 1924.

During these years he has brought to the discharge of his important duties a sound knowledge of law, a ripe scholarship, and an unflinching courtesy.

The success of Dean Falconbridge's administration may best be assessed by consideration of the many graduates of his day

who have had distinguished careers on the Bench, in Parliament, and at the Bar, as well as the less spectacular but important role of solicitor.

### GENERAL PETITION FOR EARLY CALL TO THE BAR.

#### *Veteran Students—3rd Year—Graduate Class.*

N. McL. Rogers, Secretary-Treasurer, Osgoode Hall Legal and Literary Society, on behalf of all veteran students of the Third Year (including those who were admitted to the special course in January 1946) asks that they be permitted to be Called to the Bar and issued a Certificate of Fitness in June 1948. Mr. Rogers' letter and a Memorandum from the Dean are submitted.

Your Committee recommends pursuant to the powers conferred under Section 43 of the Law Society Act, that the relevant Rules be suspended, and that all Veteran Students of the Graduate Class of the present Third year who were admitted as students prior to October 1st 1945, on successfully completing all required examinations be permitted to be Called to the Bar in June 1948; and that all other Veteran Students of the Graduate Class of the Third year, including those who were admitted for the Special

Course beginning in January 1946, on successfully completing all required examinations, be permitted to be Called to the Bar in September 1948.

#### EXAMINATIONS.

##### *Second Year Failures*

At the Christmas examinations of the second year, five students failed in all four subjects. Under the rules these students are not entitled to write at the supplementals and may repeat only with special leave. At the February meeting the Committee recommended that the matter stand to the March meeting for a report from the Dean as to whether these students would be (a) allowed to continue in the second year, or (b) allowed to repeat their year, and that the students concerned be allowed to take lectures in the meantime.

Two of the five students concerned have discontinued. The Dean submits a report on each individual.

Your Committee recommends that all three students be allowed to continue in the second year and to write on the Easter examinations and that otherwise consideration be deferred until the examination results are announced.

ADMISSION—*Graduates*—Rule 86A (1) (b).

##### *Royal Military College*

Under the above Rule a complete course at the Royal Military College, Kingston, is approved. The College has now been re-organized on a four-year basis and the new syllabus is submitted.

The Dean recommends that in accordance with the previous practice, graduates who fulfil the four-year course satisfactorily at the institution, be admitted as students of the graduate class under the above Rule.

Your Committee approves of the Dean's recommendation.

##### *Carleton College, Ottawa.*

The Dean recommends approval of the faculties of Arts and Commerce of Carleton College, Ottawa, Ontario, as affording sufficient qualification to a graduate therein for admission to the Law Society as a student-at-law of the graduate class.

Your Committee approves of the Dean's recommendation.



ADMISSION—*Matriculants*—Rule 86B (2).

*H.M.C.S. "Royal Roads", Royal Roads, B.C.*

The Dean recommends that Rule 86B (2) be amended to include H.M.C.S. "Royal Roads", Royal Roads, B.C.

Your Committee approves of the Dean's recommendation.

The usual monthly statement was presented.

OSGOODE HALL LEGAL & LITERARY SOCIETY—Debating Committee.

The Debating Committee asks for the use of Convocation Hall for the evening of Thursday, March 18th, for the final debates of the year.

Your Committee recommends that the request be granted.

GREAT LIBRARY CEILING.

During the week of March 1st evidence of leaking was discovered in the north-east corner of the central part of the ceiling. Mr. Ferguson made temporary repairs, and later Mr. Heeney, through the Department of Public Works, had some further repairs made. Mr. Heeney suggests that it might be advisable to approach the Provincial Government to see if provisions could be made in their estimates for a new roof.

The Committee recommends, in view of the contemplated extensive repairs and complete redecoration of the Library, that a sub-committee composed of the Treasurer and any other Benchers appointed by him, attend on the Minister of Public Works and request a new copper roof over the Great Library.

#### GREAT LIBRARY DECORATING.

This matter stands referred to a sub-committee consisting of Mr. McLaughlin, the Treasurer, and Messrs. Shaver and Walsh, with power to act. A further memorandum dated February 25, 1948, from Mr. Heeney is before the Committee.

Your Committee recommends that this matter stand to the next meeting.

#### DEFERRED MAINTENANCE.

In June 1947 certain work was authorized, including eaves-troughing and other exterior work. Suitable arrangements could not be made, and Mr. Heeney now recommends that this work be proceeded with on a cost-plus basis.

Your Committee recommends that the proposed maintenance work be proceeded with.

#### RE FIRE HAZARD—Osgoode Hall.

For the permanent Sub-Committee on Insurance appointed by the Finance Committee on the 16th September 1947, and approved by Convocation on the 18th September 1947, Mr. Shaver presented the following report:

*"Report to the Finance Committee of the Law Society of Upper Canada concerning Fire Hazard in Osgoode Hall.*

"On the 8th of March, 1948, Messrs. McLaughlin and Shaver of the Insurance Committee made an inspection of some portions of the cellars of Osgoode Hall, and beg leave to report as follows:

##### 1. *Re: Basement of Law Society Building.*

There are several rooms in this basement used by the Librarian, the Secretary's Office, etc., which contain shelving, books and papers, and are unlocked, and are consequently, to some extent, a fire hazard. It is recommended that the various rooms be placed under the supervision of officials of the Society, that they

be cleaned and locked, and that a card be placed on the door of each room, indicating the use of the room and the name of the official in charge of the room.

A room is used by the staff of *Obiter Dicta*. Generally speaking, it is clean and in good order. Papers, however, have been burned in an open grate for which there is no screen. It is recommended that the staff be requested not to use the grate, and that, as an extra precaution, a screen be purchased for the grate.

There are broken chairs, etc., in some portions of this basement. It is recommended that the basement be cleaned, and all useless papers and articles be disposed of. This might be done after the close of the Law School term.

## 2. *Re: Cellars of the Centre Building and West Wing.*

These cellars remain in much the same condition as they were in when inspected on the 10th of November, 1943, and as shown by the report made to the Fire Marshal by L. C. Anderson, Fire Prevention Engineer. The paint shop is a definite fire hazard and some of the rooms in which papers are stored are in a disgraceful condition. Several tons of paper and cartons, being the exhibits in a brokerage case, are still in the basement. The fire door which was to have been installed in the opening in the fire wall immediately south of the elevator shaft has not been installed, and we understand that the hose lines will not reach from the north-west building into the cellars of the main building. It is recommended that this condition be drawn to the attention of The Honourable, the Minister of Public Works.

RE BARRISTERS AND SOLICITORS STRUCK OFF THE ROLLS.

On January 15th the Secretary reported that in the autumn of 1947 he had again discussed with the Inspector of Legal Offices the question of cancellation of commissions as Notaries Public of persons struck off the Rolls.

Bill No. 69, An Act to amend the Notaries Act, presently before the Legislature, provides as follows:

“1. The Notaries Act is amended by adding thereto the following section:

8. The disbarment of a barrister or the striking off the rolls of a solicitor who holds an appointment as a Notary Public, shall have the effect of revoking such appointment.”

This amendment is similar to the amendment to The Barristers Act of 1946 cancelling appointment as King's Counsel in similar cases, and is retroactive.

Your Committee wishes to record its approval of this legislation, and recommends that the Secretary write the Attorney-General thanking him for his consideration and assistance in this matter.

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#### SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON LEGISLATION—Mr. Walsh.

In 1946 the Special Committee and Convocation considered at length the following draft bills—

1. An Act respecting Conveyancers.
2. An Act respecting Commissioners for taking Affidavits, and Notaries Public.
3. An Act to amend The Solicitors' Act.

The draft bills were not approved by Convocation.

The following correspondence with reference to these matters is before the Committee:

1. Letters dated May 22nd and June 17th, 1946 from the Attorney-General.
2. A letter of June 24, 1946 from the Secretary, Wellington Law Association, disapproving both in principle and in detail the several draft bills.
3. A letter of October 24, 1946 from the Secretary of the Timmins-Porcupine Law Association approving of the above bills, and requesting the Society to ascertain the views of the various County Law Associations.
4. A letter dated January 28, 1948 from Mr. R. M. Willes Chitty, K.C., enclosing a copy of a resolution of the Federation of Law Associations favouring an amendment to The Solicitors Act to protect the profession from unauthorized practice by a proper definition of the practice of law.

At the meeting of your Committee on March 18th all the relevant correspondence in this matter was read by the Chairman, who also reported that the Chief Justice of the High Court was still opposed to the appointment of Notaries Public by Justices of the Supreme Court.

Your Committee has on several occasions recorded its unanimous approval of the provision that Notaries Public be appointed by a Justice of the Supreme Court of Ontario, and that the bills referred to be not proceeded with until this provision is included.

Your Committee recommends that the Chairman confer once more with the Chief Justice of the High Court in this matter.

RE BILL NO. 72—*An Act to amend The Commissioners for taking Affidavits Act.*

Section 2 of the above Bill provides in part as follows:

"2. Section 7a of The Commissioners for taking Affidavits Act, as enacted by section 1 of The Statute Law Amendment Act, 1939 (No. 2) and amended by section 1 of The Commissioners for taking Affidavits Amendment Act, 1944, is repealed and the following substituted therefor:

7a—(1) Any insurance broker or agent licensed under The Insurance Act or any real estate broker registered under The Real Estate and Business Brokers Act, 1946, who maintains business premises and who does not engage in conveyancing, may apply to the Superintendent of Insurance or to the Registrar of Real Estate and Business Brokers, as the case may be, for a certificate stating that he is a commissioner for taking affidavits in the county or district in which the business premises are situate pursuant to this section, and if the Superintendent of Insurance or the Registrar of Real Estate and Business Brokers, as the case may be, is satisfied that the applicant meets the requirements of this section, he shall issue the certificate."

Your Committee is of the opinion that the proposed legislation should not be passed.

Your Committee further recommends that the Chairman interview the Attorney-General and acquaint him with the recommendations of the Committee.

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## LEGAL EDUCATION COMMITTEE—Mr. Cassels.

### RE-READING OF EXAMINATION PAPERS.

Following the adoption by Convocation on the 20th November 1947 of the Committee's report recommending re-reading examination papers, students of all three years applied for re-reading of Christmas 1947 examination papers as follows:

Third year .....	14 students
Second year .....	47 students
First year .....	48 students

At the meeting of the Committee on March 17th the matter was referred back to the Dean for report and recommendations of the Faculty on re-reading. The report of the Dean reads in part as follows:

### *"Memorandum on Re-Marking of Christmas Examination Papers.*

"At the meeting of the Committee on March 17th, after consideration of my previous report on individual returns of the examiners on the re-marking, and after consideration of the way in which the results of the re-marking should be announced to the students, the matter was referred back to me for report and recommendations of the Faculty.

"The Faculty met to consider the individual reports of the examiners on March 31st and the following resolution was duly adopted at that meeting:

'That the Faculty having considered all returns on re-readings, report to the Legal Education Committee that, except in the case of one paper raised by Mr. Foster from 46 to 50, the students be advised that the re-reading results warrant no change in their marks as originally posted.'

"This resolution expresses the view that the only time a student is entitled to have his standing or marks actually changed is in the case of an error on the part of the examiner, and it was the feeling of the meeting that such an error could only be said to exist where a failure was raised to pass standing or some other substantial change such as a failure to read a question or a failure in addition which might result in a change of five marks other than a change from failure to pass standing."

Your Committee recommends that the report of the Dean be adopted and that the names of those students whose papers were re-read be posted with no increase, and that in the case of the one change, the student be notified that his mark in Practice II is increased from 46 to 50 and that the necessary change be made on the record of the examinations.

Your Committee further recommends that the question of amending the Rule as to re-reading be considered at the May meeting of the Committee.

#### PRACTICE GROUPS.

Your Committee recommends that Mr. George Dodd and Mr. Al. Brown be paid honoraria for their lectures to the Practice Groups.

Your Committee further recommends that the Practice Group Instructors and Mr. Williston, the Supervisor, be paid honoraria for their services therein.

#### GENERAL POLICY FOR EARLY CALL TO THE BAR.

*Veteran Students—3rd Year—Matriculant Class.*

This matter was referred to the Dean to consider with his staff and make recommendations.

The Dean for the Faculty recommends to the Committee as follows:

"For the purpose of computing the five years of service (60 months) under articles required of matriculant students, the number of months of service under articles remaining to be served by a student who had been on active service during the last war after successful completion of his final examinations shall be reduced by a period equal to the number of full months of such student's active service; provided that in no circumstance shall a student who has seen active service in the last war and who has been admitted to the matriculant class of students be entitled to be called to the Bar or admitted to practice as a solicitor unless he has actually served at least 32 months under articles.

"Any student of the matriculant class entitled under the last resolution to be called before the expiration of one year from the time of successful passing of his final examinations at the law school, shall be exonerated from writing examinations on the two books presently prescribed for matriculant students; and if any such student is entitled to be Called after one year but within two years of successfully passing his final examinations at the law school, he shall be required to write on the one book presently prescribed for the second year of matriculant students not attending law school and serving under articles."

Your Committee recommends to Convocation that the report of the Dean be adopted.

On March 23rd the Secretary wrote the Attorney-General informing him that Convocation had authorized Mr. G. T. Walsh, K.C., Chairman of the Special Committee on Legislation, to interview him and express to him the recommendations of the Committee and Convocation.

On April 6th the Nipissing Law Association telegraphed the Committee expressing its views in opposition to the Bill, and the telegram was acknowledged and the Association was informed of the action taken to date.

On April 9th the Chairman, Mr. Walsh, appeared before the Legal Bills Committee, together with Paul Mills, K.C., for the County of York Law Association, D. J. Ongley for the Lawyers' Club, and George T. Gale, Secretary of the Federation of the County and District Law Associations. The Attorney-General informed the Committee that he had telegrams from approximately twenty-five of the County or District Law Associations opposing the above section. The Legal Bills Committee recommended that the section be deleted, and the Bill was passed as amended, and will come into effect sixty days from April 16, 1948.

RE BILL 195, Parliament of Canada—*An Act to Provide for the Investigation, Conciliation and Settlement of Industrial Disputes.*

In June 1947 the Society retained Mr. Lee A. Kelley, K.C. of Ottawa to appear before a Committee of the House to oppose section 32(8) of Bill 338, 1947 (now Bill 195, 1948). In September 1947 Mr. Walsh reported to Convocation on the action taken in this matter, and Convocation approved and gave authority to the Special Committee to take any further and necessary action when the Bill is brought forward during the next session.

On April 9th Mr. Kelley informed the Secretary that section 32(8) is included again in the Bill this year. With the approval of the Chairman, the Secretary has instructed Mr. Kelley to carry out his original instructions and to follow the progress of the present Bill and appear again before the Committee whenever he considers necessary.

Your Committee recommends that the action taken by the Chairman and Secretary be approved.

## AMENDMENTS TO THE RULES.

A memorandum from the Dean with certain proposed amendments to Rules dealing with the Law School, was before the Special Committee on Legal Education on the 4th instant and was referred to this committee for consideration. Copies of the proposed amendments were sent to the members of the committee.

Your Committee recommends that the Dean's suggestions as to Rules 104, 105 and 113 with reference to the dates of the opening and closing of the Law School, the length of each session, and the holding of final examinations be approved and adopted under the existing Rules, and that the Dean submit a memorandum as to his proposals for marking on a weighting basis under Rule 114; and that otherwise the Dean's recommendations stand for future consideration.

Your Committee further recommends that a summary of the above Rules be included in the next issue of the Students' Handbook.

## ADMISSION—Rule 86A(b).

*B.B.A. degree—Ottawa University.* Under Rule 86A(b) Convocation has approved of the degree of Bachelor of Commerce of the University of Ottawa for admission in the Graduate Class. A letter has been received from the registrar stating that the degree of Bachelor of Commerce has been changed to "Bachelor of Business Administration" and asking that this degree be approved. He states that the courses of study and their duration have not been changed. A memorandum from the Dean is submitted.



Your Committee recommends the approval of the degree of Bachelor of Business Administration of the University of Ottawa, as sufficient qualification for admission to the Law Society in the Graduate Class.

#### LAW SCHOOL STAFF—Part-time Lecturers.

At a joint meeting of the Finance and Legal Education Committees on May 10th, it was recommended that this matter be referred to the Legal Education Committee for review.

After careful consideration and having in mind the appointment of two additional full-time lecturers, your Committee recommends as follows:

(1) The subject of Mortgages and Sales of Land, presently given by Mr. John C. Thomson, K.C., will, next fall, be given by a full-time lecturer, in a new course. This will relieve Mr. Thomson of his duties in connection with the present course. Your Committee recommends that the Treasurer be asked to write to Mr. Thomson thanking him for his services to the Society and the profession over a period of years.

(2) The subject of Practice in the First year, presently given by Mr. H. W. A. Foster, K.C., will, next fall, be embodied in a new course to be given by a full-time lecturer. This will relieve Mr. Foster of his duties in the First year.

(3) The subject of Property I (Personal Chattels) in the First year, presently given by Mr. A. A. Macdonald, K.C., will, next fall, be embodied in a new enlarged course in Property I. This will relieve Mr. Macdonald of his duties in connection with the present course. Your Committee recommends that the Dean inform Mr. Macdonald of the proposed changes and express the hope of the Committee that his services may be available when clinical work is established under new arrangements.

RE LAW SCHOOL—TEACHING STAFF.

At a meeting of the Special Committee on Legal Education on May 4, 1948, the Committee had before it a memorandum from the Dean with a proposed salary scale for the full-time teaching staff. The Special Committee also considered the question of office accommodation for the Dean and his secretary.

The Special Committee recommended that these two matters be referred for consideration to the Finance and Legal Education Committees. A joint meeting of the two Committees was held on May 10th, 1948.

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#### SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON LEGAL EDUCATION.

At the request of the Chairman, Mr. Cartwright presented the report of the Special Committee on Legal Education.

On April 7, 1948 the Dean of the Law School presented a memorandum with certain recommendations as to changes in the staff and curriculum of the Law School. At a meeting on April 15th your Special Committee considered the Dean's report, together with letters from Arthur Kelly, K.C., and W. L. N. Somerville, President of the Osgoode Hall Legal and Literary Society, with certain suggestions as to the improvement of legal education.

Your Special Committee is of the opinion that a full-time Law School at this time is not practicable or desirable.

Your Special Committee recommends that the present arrangements for First Year be continued on a full-time basis, with compulsory attendance at Practice Groups substituted for service under articles; and that the full-time Law School staff be increased by the appointment of one or two additional members, with the recommendation that the persons appointed to the full-time staff be, if possible, barristers who have had some experience in the practice of law; that the question of curriculum be left largely to the Dean and his staff for suggestions and report to this Committee for final decision pursuant to the Rules; and that the other suggestions of the Dean in his report stand for further consideration.

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#### SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON LEGISLATION—MR. WALSH.

*Re Bill 195, Parliament of Canada, An Act to Provide for the Investigation, Conciliation and Settlement of Industrial Disputes.*

In a Report dated April 15, 1948 the Special Committee reported to Convocation that it had again retained Mr. Lee A. Kelley, K.C., of Ottawa to appear before the Committee of the House to oppose section 32(8) of Bill 195, 1948. On May 11th Mr. Kelley, counsel for the Society in this matter, telegraphed the Secretary as follows:

"By vote of the Committee this morning, subsection 8 of section 32 deleted from Bill."

On the same date he wrote the Secretary as follows:

*"Re Bill 195*

I today wired you that the Committee had voted to delete subsection 8 of section 32 of the Bill.

The Bill will now be reported to the House of Commons where another vote may be forced, but ordinarily unless on very serious grounds, the House does not change the report of the Committee."

Your Committee with approval and satisfaction reports this information to Convocation; and records its appreciation of the valuable services of Mr. Kelley in this matter.

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LIBRARY COMMITTEE—Mr. Shaver.

LIBRARY PAINTING AND DECORATION AND FLOOR.

Your Committee at a special meeting considered certain details of the specifications for painting and decorating the walls and ceiling of the Great Library and the laying of a new floor. In particular, there was a discussion as to whether the woodwork, galleries and windows, should be painted like the flat wall and panel surfaces, glazed like the ornamental work on the ceiling, or varnished and finished as they are at present. Your Committee decided that the woodwork should be either painted or glazed and wiped and recommended that a final decision as to these matters should be made as this work proceeds.

#### RE LAW SCHOOL CURRICULUM.

At the meeting of the Committee on June 28th it was recommended that the Dean be asked to prepare for consideration at the next meeting, a syllabus for the Second and Third

Years with a note as to the marks to be allowed in each subject in each of the three years. The Dean submits the following memorandum:

"At the last meeting of the Legal Education Committee it was suggested that I prepare a syllabus of the courses being given in the Law School with a note as to marks to be allotted in each subject.

"The following are the courses in First Year:

Torts—3 hours, both terms (90 hours)  
 Contracts—3 hours, both terms (90 hours)  
 Civil Procedure—3 hours, both terms (90 hours)  
 Property—3 hours, both terms (90 hours)  
 Criminal Law—3 hours, one term (45 hours)  
 Agency—3 hours, one term (45 hours)

"In view of the fact that Rule 116 has been amended so that a failure in any subject running throughout two terms is the equivalent of two failures for the purpose of writing supplementals, it would seem to be desirable in computing averages that the four two-term subjects should be rated at 100 marks apiece while the other one-term subjects should be rated at 50 marks apiece, making a total of 500 marks for average purposes.

"The subjects of the Second Year are:

Constitutional Law—2 hours, both terms (60 hours)  
 Agency—3 hours, one term (45 hours)  
 Equity—3 hours, one term (45 hours)  
 Family Law—2 hours, one term (30 hours)  
 Practice II—2 hours, one term (30 hours)  
 Contracts II—3 hours, one term (45 hours)  
 Mortgages and Conveyancing—3 hours, one term (45 hours)  
 Bills and Notes—2 hours, one term (30 hours)  
 Company Law—3 hours, one term (45 hours)

"Theoretically, in light of the different number of classroom hours given in the subjects, it would be desirable to weight these subjects according to the number of hours given but it is the opinion of the Faculty that in the present transitional period, it is not desirable to introduce this system in Second and Third Year and, accordingly, all subjects will be rated as

of 100 marks each. The rule with regard to supplementals and a two-term course counting as two subjects should be sufficient to take care of any discrepancy.

“The subjects of the Third Year are:

Wills and Trusts—3 hours, both terms (90 hours)  
 Taxation—2 hours, both terms (60 hours)  
 Constitutional Law—2 hours, both terms (60 hours)  
 Conflict of Laws—3 hours, one term (45 hours)  
 Practice III—2 hours, one term (30 hours)  
 Bookkeeping—1½ hours, one term (about 24 hours)  
 Evidence—3 hours, one term (45 hours)  
 Bankruptcy—2 hours, one term (30 hours)  
 Municipal Law—one hour, one term (15 hours)

“There is no examination in the subject of Municipal Law and while, theoretically, the three courses running throughout two terms should be weighted as the equivalent of two subjects as compared with other one-term subjects, it is the Faculty’s opinion that in the third year all subjects should be marked as of 100, leaving any discrepancy in the subjects themselves to be taken care of by the amended Rule 116.”

Your Committee recommends that the memorandum of the Dean be approved for the academic year 1948-49, with the following changes in the value of Third Year subjects:

Wills and Trusts .....	150 marks
Practice III .....	50 marks
Bookkeeping .....	50 marks
Bankruptcy .....	50 marks

Your Committee recommends that any Third year student who has failed in one or more subjects at the supplementals be permitted to write on these subjects at the regular or supplemental examinations during the current year or on special supplementals at Christmas 1948, if desired, without repeating his year, or such student may repeat his Third year if so desired; the above recommendation to be subject to any action taken on individual petitions.

#### OBITER DICTA.

A report is submitted from Mr. R. W. Macaulay on the operations of Obiter Dicta for the year ending May 29th 1948, together with a statement of Revenue and Expenditure.

Your Committee recommends that the report be received and that any balance in the hands of the editorial board be retained by the board notwithstanding the agreement made at the time of the grant of \$600 in the autumn of 1947.

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#### OBITER DICTA—*Use of the Seal.*

A letter is submitted from R. E. Barnes, Editor of Obiter Dicta, asking permission to use the Seal of the Law Society on the cover of the magazine.

In consideration of the fact that Obiter Dicta is not an official publication of the Law Society of Upper Canada, your Committee recommends that the request be refused.

Your Committee approves of the estimates for the year for submission to the Finance Committee.

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## SPECIAL LECTURES—Barristers and Solicitors.

The question of a series of lectures for Barristers and Solicitors, similar to those of 1943 and 1944, has been before the Committee on several occasions and was directed to stand to this meeting.

Your Committee recommends that consideration of this matter stand *sine die*.

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## CHANGE OF NAME.

*Jasper Maxwell Franklin Reycraft*, Barrister of Port Arthur asks to have his name changed on the Rolls and Records of the Society to *Maxwell Franklin Reycraft* as that is the name he uses and is known by.

Your Committee recommends that the petition be granted.

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## RE ADMISSION 1949.

Your Committee recommends that all applicants for admission as students-at-law for the year beginning September 1949 be required to comply strictly with the Rules of the Society and that concessions as to educational qualifications be not made in the case of Veteran applicants except in the most exceptional circumstances.

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## SPECIAL PETITIONS.

Your Committee considered and made recommendations on petitions for special relief.

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## RE CHANGE OF NAME.

*Eugene Wilfred Victor Starnaman*, Barrister and Solicitor, asks to have his name changed on the Rolls and Records of the

Society to *Eugene Wilfred Victor Scott*. He submits a Certificate of an Order by His Honour Judge Shea dated 27th July 1948 under the Change of Name Act 1939.

Your Committee recommends that the petition be granted.

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#### OSGOODE HALL LEGAL AND LITERARY SOCIETY—Grant.

A letter is submitted from F. V. Regan, Treasurer, asking for a grant to the Society of \$1,000 for the coming year. An advance of \$250 has already been paid to the Society.

Your Committee recommends that a sum of \$1,000 be granted on account of the annual grant for the current year and that the matter be further considered in October.

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#### ORAL EXAMINATIONS.

##### *Third Year.*

A report of Mr. Arthur Kelly dated June 15th 1948 was before the Committee on June 28th and was referred to a Sub-committee consisting of The Chairman, The Treasurer and Messrs. 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### OSGOODE HALL LEGAL AND LITERARY SOCIETY.

The Chairman of the Dance Committee asks for permission to hold an autumn dance on Friday, October 29th 1948 in Convocation Hall. If permission is granted the decorations will be for a Hallowe'en Party, and a light supper will be served.

Your Committee recommends that the request of the Society be granted, and that the Secretary make arrangements for adequate protection from fire.

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### STUDENTS' COMMON ROOM.

In June 1948 Mr. Heeney pointed out that some of the furniture in these rooms is in very poor condition, and suggested that consideration be given to the purchase of new furnishings for the women's room and one of the men's rooms. It was directed that consideration stand to this meeting.

Your Committee recommends that this matter be referred to the Vice-Chairman and Secretary with power to act.

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### PARKING.

Your Committee recommends that Mr. Wilson be granted power to add to his Committee such members as he may find



advisable and to consider and report on the whole question of parking, in October.

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#### GREAT LIBRARY.

The Library Committee recommends that the stacks, tables and chairs in the Great Library be refinished as the other wood-work in the Library, and that the work be proceeded with by instalments over the next few months.

Your Committee approves of the recommendation of the Library Committee, and authorizes the necessary expenditure herein.

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#### DISCIPLINE COMMITTEE.

JOHN JUDAH GLASS—Mr. Carson presented the Report of the Discipline Committee herein, which Report was presented to Convocation on June 17th when it was ordered that consideration be deferred to September Convocation as requested. Mr. Carson read a letter dated September 10th, 1948 from Percy Shulman, K.C., President, Reading Law Club, Toronto.

Moved by Mr. Carson, seconded by Mr. Pickup, and carried, that the Report be adopted.

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#### ORDER.

The Secretary placed before Convocation the following Order which, in compliance with Rule 79, is entered on the Minutes of Convocation:

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#### LIBRARY COMMITTEE—Mr. Shaver.

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#### REPAIRS, REDECORATION AND FLOORING.

Your Committee reports that the repairs to the dome of the library ceiling, redecoration of the library, and the laying of new flooring are now (subject to some small details) completed.

Certain alterations are being made to the Phillips Stewart Library.

Your Committee recommends that the tables, chairs and book stacks be refinished so that they will match the wood-work in the library. Mr. Heeney reports that this work could be done during the Fall.

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#### BUDGET ESTIMATES.

Your Committee's estimate of Library Expenditures for the ensuing year (1948-49) together with estimates and actual expenditures for the past year (1947-48) are submitted for consideration of the Finance Committee.

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#### NIGHT LIBRARIANS.

Your Committee recommends that the following students be appointed to act as night librarians for the year 1948-49:

Second year: Messrs. N. W. Baksi and J. Rundle.

Third year: Messrs. B. W. N. Apple, J. W. Burridge, J. M. Greer, H. M. Harrison, J. S. Nutt and R. F. Reid.

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#### LIBRARY HOURS.

Your Committee directed that commencing on Wednesday, the 15th of September, the Great Library be open in the evenings, except on Saturdays and holidays, from 6.30 to 10 o'clock and on Saturday afternoons from 2 to 5 o'clock. Your Committee further directed that the Students' Library be open from time to time as considered necessary by the Chief Librarian.

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#### PHOTOGRAPHS PRESENTED BY MR. CASSELS.

Your Committee gratefully acknowledges a gift from Mr. Hamilton Cassells, K.C. of a collection of photographs of men prominent in England in the 19th century and has directed the Chief Librarian to send Mr. Cassels a letter of thanks and appreciation.

THE REPORT WAS ADOPTED.

## UNAUTHORIZED PRACTICE COMMITTEE.

In the absence of the Chairman, Mr. Wilson presented the Report.

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## ESTIMATES 1948-49.

Your Committee recommend for submission to the Finance Committee estimated expenditures for the year.

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RE AUBREY E. IRELAND & Co.

RE L. J. PHELAN (disbarred February 4, 1926).

The hearings of the charges against Phelan and Ireland were completed on June 24th, and Magistrate Prentice found that both of the accused were guilty on all three charges laid against each of them. In the case of Phelan the Magistrate suspended sentence, and in the case of Ireland he imposed a fine of \$50 with respect to each charge, or a total of \$150 or 30 days in gaol on each charge. The final report of Mr. J. L. McLennan, K.C. was before your Committee and was noted with approval.

Your Committee recommends that a Notice to the Profession setting out the charges and the result thereof, be printed in the Ontario Weekly Notes as follows:

"Certain alleged matters of Unauthorized Practice were brought to the attention of the Society by a solicitor and after investigation by Mr. J. L. McLennan, K.C. the Committee directed that proceedings be taken under The Solicitors Act. The charges laid against Leo J. Phelan were as follows:

"(1) 'That Leo J. Phelan of the City of Toronto in the County of York in the months of September, October, November and December in the year 1947, at the city of Toronto, in the county of York, not being admitted and enrolled and duly qualified to act as a solicitor, unlawfully did as a solicitor commence or carry on a proceeding in the name of Edward Pratt and Ethel Pratt, to wit, an application in the County Court of the County of York under the provisions of The Landlord & Tenant Act R.S.O. 1937, Chap. 219, part 3 between the said Edward Pratt and Ethel Pratt as Landlords and Mary Stasior as Tenant, contrary to Section 6 of The Solicitors Act, R.S.O. 1937, Chap. 223 and amendments thereto.'

"(2) 'That Leo J. Phelan of the city of Toronto in the County of York, in the months of September, October, November and December in the year 1947, at the City of Toronto, in the County of York, not being admitted and enrolled and duly qualified to act as a solicitor, unlawfully did hold himself out as or represent himself to be a solicitor to Ethel Pratt and Edward Pratt and to the presiding Judge in certain proceedings in the County Court of the County of York under part 3 of The Landlord & Tenant Act, R.S.O. 1937, Chap. 219, contrary to Section 6 of The Solicitors Act, R.S.O. 1937, Chap. 223 and amendments thereto.'

"(3) 'That Leo J. Phelan of the City of Toronto in the County of York in the months of September, October, November and December in the year 1947, at the city of Toronto, in the County of York not being admitted and enrolled and duly qualified to act as a solicitor unlawfully did practise or for gain or reward act as a solicitor, contrary to the provisions of The Solicitors Act, R.S.O. 1937, Chap. 223 and amendments thereto.'

"Three charges were laid against Aubrey E. Ireland carrying on business as Aubrey E. Ireland & Company and were in identical terms to the charges laid against Leo J. Phelan.

"The charges against the accused were returnable in the first instance on April 2nd, 1948 at Toronto, and after several adjournments the trials were begun on June 4th, 1948 before Magistrate Prentice when each of the accused pleaded not guilty.

"Mr. J. L. McLennan, K.C. and Mr. G. A. Martin, K.C. appeared as Counsel for the Law Society. Mr. A. A. Macdonald, K.C. appeared for Leo J. Phelan and Mr. C. L. Yoerger for Aubrey E. Ireland.

"Evidence was heard on June 4th, 17th and 18th and judgment was reserved until June 24th. On that date Magistrate Prentice delivered judgment convicting both accused on all charges.

"With respect to Leo J. Phelan, Magistrate Prentice stated that he was satisfied that the accused was guilty on all three charges but it had been brought out in evidence that the accused had at one time been a solicitor and it was possible that on the spur of the moment he had expanded his activities too much. As this was a first offence, sentence was suspended on each charge.



"With respect to the accused Ireland, Magistrate Prentice stated that he was satisfied that the accused was a party to the transactions complained of and was guilty on all three charges. He pointed out that Mrs. Pratt, referred to in the charges set out above, went to the office of Ireland and was told by him that his solicitor would look after the case; that all letters were on the letterhead of Ireland and he gave instructions to Phelan who carried them out. Magistrate Prentice said that the accused, Ireland, was the mainspring in the whole programme, that he was using Phelan to carry out the work, and as the accused Ireland was much more responsible for what was done than Phelan, he was imposing a penalty of \$50 or thirty days on each charge."

RE HAROLD GRAHAM MEIR, Seaforth (*disbarred 17th June 1948*).

Following the meeting of the Committee in June 1948 certain information was brought to the attention of the Secretary indicating that Mr. Meir was continuing to practise and to hold himself out as qualified to practise after his disbarment. With the authority of the Chairman the matter was referred to Mr. McLennan for investigation, and his report was before your Committee for consideration.

Your Committee recommends that Mr. McLennan be instructed to take action forthwith under The Solicitors Act in accordance with his own recommendations.

BARRISTERS AND SOLICITORS STRUCK OFF THE ROLLS,  
*Notaries Amendment Act, 1948, Chap. 63, Ontario Statutes 1948.*

In March 1948 the Secretary reported to the Committee that Bill No. 69, An Act to amend The Notaries Act, was before the Legislature and provided as follows:

"1. The Notaries Act is amended by adding thereto the following section:

(8) The disbarment of a solicitor or the striking off the rolls of a solicitor who holds an appointment as a notary public, shall have the effect of revoking such appointment."

The Bill was passed at the last session of the Legislature, came into effect on June 15, 1948, and is retroactive.

## COUNTY LIBRARIES COMMITTEE—Mr. Marshall.

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BUDGET ESTIMATES, 1947-48.

Estimates of expenditures for the year 1947-48 were adopted and referred to the Finance Committee.

## GOVERNMENT GRANT.

Your Committee recommends that the list of County Law Associations which are to share in the government grant for 1948 include all of the 42 associations.

THE REPORT WAS ADOPTED.

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## SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON LEGISLATION.

In the absence of the Chairman, Mr. Marshall presented the Report.

BILL 195 (Canada), *An Act to Provide for the Investigation, Conciliation and Settlement of Industrial Disputes.*

In June 1947 attention was drawn to Section 32(8) of the above Bill which reads as follows:

"In any proceeding before the Conciliation Board, no person except with the consent of the parties shall be entitled to be represented by a barrister, solicitor or advocate and, notwithstanding such consent, a conciliation board may refuse to allow a barrister, solicitor or advocate to represent a party in any such proceedings."

On behalf of the Society the Special Committee on Legislation immediately retained counsel, and from that time continued to make representations to the Minister of Justice and to the Committee of the House advocating deletion of this Clause. The Bill has now been passed with the clause omitted.

Your Committee notes with approval the successful action taken in this matter.

## RE THE BANKRUPTCY ACT, 1948, BILL L-11 Dominion.

On June 17th the Committee had before it a memorandum from Mr. Gordon Cook with reference to the above Bill. The

Chairman was given authority to retain counsel to make representations with reference to the Bill if he thought it necessary. On July 9th Robert Forsyth, K.C., Superintendent of Bankruptcy, in reply to an inquiry, informed the Secretary as follows:

"I enclose herewith a copy of the Bill Respecting Bankruptcy. This Bill was filed in the Senate and it was not intended that it should pass at this session. The purpose of filing it is to enable persons who have any objections to make in respect to the Bill, to communicate them."

Your Committee recommends continuance of the authority given the Chairman to retain counsel to peruse the draft Bill with a view to conferring with the Registrar in Bankruptcy and, if necessary, to make representations with reference to any proposed amendment or revision.

#### THE COMPANIES ACT, ONTARIO.

The Honourable D. R. Michener, K.C., Provincial Secretary, on August 25th, wrote the Society enclosing a copy of a proposed revision of The Companies Act of Ontario.

The proposed revision was considered and your Committee recommends that if the Chairman thinks it necessary or desirable, he be authorized to retain counsel to consider the revision and make any necessary representations.

THE REPORT WAS ADOPTED.

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#### AMENDMENT OF RULES—Rule 74.

With the consent of Mr. Jamieson, who had given notice of motion at June Convocation, it was ordered that this matter stand to October Convocation.

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#### CANADIAN BAR ASSOCIATION.

Mr. Chitty informed Convocation that at the recent Annual Meeting of the Canadian Bar Association, Mr. D. Park Jamieson, K.C. had been elected Vice-President for Ontario of the Canadian Bar Association. The Treasurer, on behalf of Convocation, extended to Mr. Jamieson congratulations on his election.

## CORRESPONDENCE.

The Treasurer read a letter from Mrs. C. A. Wright thanking the Treasurer and Benchers for the flowers sent to Dean Wright during his recent illness.

Ordered that the correspondence be received and filed.

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## CONVOCATION ADJOURNED AT 1 P.M.

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The Treasurer and Benchers entertained at luncheon the Honourable John A. Costello, S.C., T.D., Prime Minister of Ireland, the Honourable J. J. Hearne, High Commissioner for Ireland in Canada, the Chief Justice of Ontario, the Chief Justice of the High Court, and Mr. Falconbridge representing the Dean.

HONOUR BOARDS.

*Record of Medal Awards  
Treasurers, Secretaries and Librarians*

In March 1945 the Dean suggested that some permanent record be erected in the Society's building containing the names of all members of the Society who have been awarded Gold, Silver or Bronze Medals. The Committee approved of the suggestion in principle and referred the matter to the Dean and the Secretary for suggestions as to the form of the record and the probable

cost. From the Minutes of Convocation a list of the Medal winners was prepared. On 15th May 1947 the Committee recommended to Convocation that the matter be referred to the Vice-chairman to consult with Mr. F. H. Marani, FRAIC, ARCA, as to the form the record might take. It was also suggested that some permanent record be erected in the Society's buildings containing the names of all Treasurers of the Society since 1797. On 15th May 1947 the Committee recommended that a permanent record of all Treasurers, Secretaries, and Librarians be erected in the Society's building and that the matter be referred to the Vice-chairman to confer with Mr. Marani as to the form the record might take.

After careful consideration, Mr. Marani recommends that the panelling for these purposes be placed in the Entrance Hall at the south end of the Law School wing, immediately south of the Barristers' Locker Rooms.

Your Committee recommends that the work be proceeded with.

#### RE LAW SCHOOL—Lecturer

Owing to the illness of the Dean it was necessary to engage a lecturer to take the Dean's course in First year Torts. Mr. Falconbridge, with the approval of the Chairman, arranged with Mr. Sydney L. Robins to take the Dean's lectures until his return.

Your Committee approves of the engagement of Mr. S. L. Robins.

##### *Change of Name.*

*Philip Gerald Givens*—asks that his name be changed on the Rolls and Records of the Society to the above, from "Philip Gerald Wolfe Giverts" as it now appears. He submits a certificate of Order of His Honour Judge Shea dated 4th August 1948 pursuant to The Change of Name Act 1939.

Your Committee recommends that the request be granted.

*Milton Alexander Cadsby*—asks that his name be changed on the Rolls and Records of the Society to the above from "Milton Alexander Cadesby" as it now appears. He submits a certificate

of Order of His Honour Judge Denton dated 5th April 1948 pursuant to The Change of Name Act 1939.

Your Committee recommends that the request be granted.

*Neil Harry Karal*—asks that his name be changed on the Rolls and Records of the Society to the above from “Neil Harry Karalnick” as it now appears. He submits a Certificate of Order of His Honour Judge Parker dated 2nd July 1948 pursuant to The Change of Name Act 1939.

Your Committee considered and made recommendations on petitions for special relief.

#### RE SPECIAL PETITIONS

The following is a memorandum submitted by the Faculty:

In dealing with individual First year petitions respecting the results of the supplemental examinations, the Faculty has been guided by the General policy set out in its memorandum of October 4th 1948, and has applied that policy subject to special circumstances disclosed in the individual petitions, in so far as those circumstances were directly related to the examination and had an academic relevance, e.g. illness.

In adopting the general policy of October 4th 1948, the Faculty had in mind that in reviewing the results of the regular examinations it had already made whatever allowances it felt were advisable in respect of student failures, so that a student's final marks on his regular examination represented a careful consideration of his whole record. Again in reviewing the results of the supplemental examinations the Faculty did so on the basis of the student's whole record.

Accordingly where a student is shown as having failed in one or more subjects on his supplemental examinations, this indicates the Faculty's considered opinion that he is not fit to go on. The question is not that he has failed in one subject only or two only, rather is it a case where the student has had a multiplicity of failures in both his regular and supplemental examinations and has been unequal to the task of proving his competence on the supplemental examinations.

Moved by Mr. Cassels, seconded by Mr. Walsh, that the Report be adopted. Two amendments were lost. The motion was carried.

Moved by Mr. Cassels, seconded by Mr. Shaver, that the veteran students of the First Year who have passed in all subjects but one, and who have not petitioned, be granted pass standing in the one subject and allowed to proceed to their Second Year.

#### ANNUAL FINANCIAL STATEMENT, 1947-48.

The Annual Statement for the year ending 31st August 1948, as certified by the Auditors, Messrs. Clarkson, Gordon & Company, was before your Committee for consideration.



Your Committee recommends that the Annual Financial Statement, as submitted, be approved for presentation to Convocation and publication pursuant to the Rules.

#### ESTIMATES 1948-49

An estimate of the probable receipts and disbursements for the year 1948-49 is submitted herewith, and is recommended for approval.

#### INSURANCE

In view of the increasing costs, and on the instructions of the Vice-Chairman, Mr. Heeney was requested to submit his opinion on the increase in the cost of building construction since the Society gave new statements of value and increased its insurance in August 1947. In the meantime the following temporary fire insurance has been placed:

\$100,000.00, blanket on buildings and contents.

\$20,000.00 additional to Policy No. 61990 covering buildings only—Great Library and adjoining rooms.

It is planned to hold a meeting of the sub-committee on insurance within the next month to consider Mr. Heeney's report, and to review the insurance situation generally.

Your Committee approves of the action taken herein.

#### GREAT LIBRARY—Stacks and Furniture.

In September the Library Committee recommended that the tables, chairs and book stacks be refinished to match the new woodwork. Mr. Heeney had stated that this work could be done during the autumn at an approximate cost of \$2,500.00. The Finance Committee approved of the recommendation of the Library Committee and authorized the necessary expenditure.

Mr. Heeney submits quotations for this work on his specifications:

In view of the fact that the T. Eaton Co. Limited are prepared to start this work immediately and complete it within two months, he recommends that the contract be placed with them.

Your Committee recommends, the Library Committee concurring, that the contract of the T. Eaton Co. Limited be accepted.

## CHARGE FOR ANNUAL STATUTES.

1949 *Dominion and Ontario.*

For the past few years the charge to the profession has been \$5.50. The price to the Society for the Dominion Statutes has been \$5.00 less 25%, and for the Ontario Statutes, \$2.00 less 20%.

In 1947 the Statutes of Canada were printed in two volumes, Volume I containing the Public and Private Acts and a list of the divorce cases; and Volume II containing the Divorce Acts only. These sold at \$5.00 each volume, or \$10.00 a set. For 1947 and 1948 members of the profession who subscribed through the Society for statutes received Volume I only of the Dominion Statutes. Any member who wished to have Volume II was asked to notify the King's Printer, Ottawa. For 1949 the Statutes of Canada will again be printed in two volumes at the same price and at the same discount to the Society.

In March 1948 the King's Printer, Ontario, presented his account for 1947 Statutes, allowing a discount of 10% in place of the former 20%. After some correspondence the Society was informed that the Speaker of the House was authorized to fix the selling price for publications and statutes, and that he had fixed the 10% discount on all yearly statutes. This change resulted in a deficit for 1947 Statutes of \$169.72. As the members of the profession had already paid for their Annual Statutes before March 1948, the auditor estimates the loss for 1948 statutes at \$281.24. These deficits do not include the cost of preparing lists, correspondence, and other services in this connection.

For the 1949 Statutes the cost would appear to be as follows:

If Volume I only of the of the Dominion Statutes is included, the annual Fees Notice should follow the new form adopted in October 1947.

Your Committee recommends that Volume I only of the Dominion Statutes 1949 be included in the Statutes subscribed for through the Society, and that the price for the Ontario Statutes and Volume I of the Dominion Statutes, 1949, be fixed at \$6.00.

Your Committee further recommends that the Notice for Annual Fees, 1948-49 include a paragraph similar to that published in 1947.

#### THE LAWYERS CLUB.

The Lawyers' Club has asked permission to hold its dinner meetings in Convocation Hall for the current year. With the approval of the Vice-Chairman the first three meetings have already been held.

Your Committee recommends that permission be granted, the arrangements for the dinner meetings to be subject to the approval of the Vice-Chairman and Secretary.

#### REUNION, CLASS 1927.

Mr. F. T. Watson, on behalf of the Class of 1927, asks permission to hold the reunion of their Class on Friday, November 12th next, in Osgoode Hall, including the use of the new Club Room.

Your Committee, with regret, recommends that as a matter of policy the request be refused.

#### LUNCHEON ROOM.

Miss Margaret Lennox presented a statement of operations for the period September 1, 1947 to August 31, 1948, showing a net profit of \$2,000.00. During the year 31,355 meals were served, of which 2,104 were special dinners including those of The Lawyers Club.

#### RE CLUB ROOM.

##### *Recommendation to the Finance Committee*

Mr. P. D. 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## UNAUTHORIZED PRACTICE COMMITTEE—Mr. Walsh.

RE HAROLD GRAHAM MEIR, Seaforth  
(*disbarred 17th June 1948.*)

Following the meeting of your Committee in June 1948 certain information was brought to the attention of the Secretary indicating that Mr. Meir was continuing to practice and to hold himself out as qualified to practice after his disbarment. The matter was referred to Mr. J. L. McLennan, K.C., for investigation, and on consideration of his Report at the September meeting your Committee recommended that Mr. McLennan be instructed to take action forthwith under The Solicitors Act in accordance with his own recommendations.

Notice of Motion was duly served for hearing at Goderich on October 12, 1948. The motion asked for the following relief:

"(a) A declaration that Meir is not duly qualified to act or practice as a Solicitor and is prohibited by Sec. 6 of the Act from holding himself out as or representing himself to be a Solicitor or practicing as such.

"(b) For an order that Meir pay the penalties provided by the Statute by reason of his holding himself out as a Solicitor from the 18th of June, 1948 to the 29th of September, 1948.

"(c) An order enjoining Meir from practicing as a Solicitor."

Mr. Meir appeared and asked for an adjournment. Mr. McLennan, for the Society, did not insist that the presiding Judge hear the motion, on condition that a declaratory judgment be given,

an interim injunction granted, and all costs reserved to be disposed of at the adjourned hearing. Mr. Meir consented to these terms, and an order is being taken out to the above effect. The adjourned motion will be heard at Goderich on November 22, 1948.

Your Committee approves of the action taken herein.

RE BARRISTERS AND SOLICITORS STRUCK OFF THE ROLLS.

*Notaries Amendment Act, 1948, Chap. 63, Ontario Statutes 1948.*

At the September meeting the Secretary reported on the passing of the Notaries Amendment Act 1948. It was directed that inquiries be made as to procedure under the amendment.

The Inspector of Legal Offices informs the Secretary that as far as possible persons who had been disbarred prior to the passing of the Act who held Commissions as Notaries Public, will be notified that their Commissions have been revoked. For this purpose the Inspector of Legal Offices will use the list of persons disbarred since January 1, 1915 prepared by the Secretary. In future the Inspector of Legal Offices will be notified forthwith of each disbarment, and given a copy of the Order. Notice will forthwith be given that the Commission as Notary Public is revoked.

Your Committee noted with approval the action to be taken in these matters, and recommends that the Secretary request the Inspector of Legal Offices to notify Local County and District Court Clerks of the revocation in view of the fact that these clerks might be asked to furnish certificates that persons struck off the rolls are Notaries Public.

RE UNAUTHORIZED PRACTICE, AMERICAN BAR ASSOCIATION.

*Standing Committee on Unauthorized Practice.*

On April 27, 1948 the above Committee sent out a circular letter with an enclosure reporting a Judgment with reference to unauthorized practice by accountants. Letters from several solicitors with reference to accountants incorporating companies were also considered.

Your Committee recommends that this matter be referred to Mr. J. L. McLennan, K.C. for his opinion and recommendations.

RE AMERICAN ATTORNEYS.

It was brought to the attention of your Committee that in several cases American attorneys were attending on the Succes-

sion Duty Departments at both Toronto and Ottawa to settle succession duties in connection with Estates.

Your Committee recommends that this matter be brought to the attention of the proper Ministers at Toronto and Ottawa, with the request that such practice be discontinued.

THE REPORT WAS ADOPTED.

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## COUNTY LIBRARIES COMMITTEE.

At the request of the Chairman, Mr. Bowlby presented the report of the County Libraries Committee.

### ANNUAL GRANTS.

Your Committee reports specially that the LINDSAY LAW ASSOCIATION, having failed to file its annual returns within three months from the 15th day of January, 1948, has now filed its annual returns for the year 1947 and otherwise complied with the rules adopted from time to time relating to county law libraries, and recommends that a grant be made to it of \$313.33 to which it would have been entitled if its returns had been filed within the time limited under Rule 62.

THE REPORT WAS ADOPTED.

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### RULES COMMITTEE.

Mr. Walsh reported to Convocation that the Rules Committee had passed certain amendments regarding increases to the Supreme Court and County Court tariffs, which amendments were approved and would become effective on October 23, 1948.

The amendments providing for these increases are as follows:

### THE JUDICATURE ACT

O. Reg. 234/48.

Amending O. Reg. 261/44.

Rules of Practice.

Made—26th June, 1948

Approved—7th October, 1948

Filed—14th October, 1948, 10.30 a.m.

AMENDMENTS to the Rules of Practice and Procedure of the Supreme Court of Ontario, including the Tariff of Fees and Costs, made by the Rules Committee on June 26th, 1948, under The Judicature Act.

1. Rule 326.—(2) of Ontario Regulations 261/44 is repealed and the following substituted therefor:

“326.—(2) In default of such election the counterclaim shall on the discontinuance of the action be deemed to be discontinued without costs or on the dismissal of the action be deemed to be dismissed without costs.”

2. Rule 349 of Ontario Regulations 261/44 is amended by striking out the words “a Judge” and inserting in lieu thereof the words “The Court” so that the said Rule 349 shall now read as follows:

“349. The Court may at any time order production and inspection of documents generally or of any particular document in the possession of any party, and if privilege is claimed for any document may inspect the document to determine the validity of such claim.”

3. Ontario Regulations 261/44 are amended by adding the following Rule:

“676” A.—(1) Subject to further order and notwithstanding anything contained in Rule 676 (1) and (2) the total in any bill of costs of the fees prescribed by Tariff “A” (as distinct from payments) shall in respect of business done in any cause or matter in the Supreme Court or any County Court be increased by fifteen per cent. and such increase shall be allowed upon any taxation of costs in respect of any such business as well between party and party as between Solicitor and client.

(2) This Rule shall not apply to counsel fees nor to the allowance for commission and disbursements pursuant to Rule 653 nor shall it interfere with the power to allow a fixed sum for costs.

(3) This Rule shall apply only to fees for services rendered after this Rule goes into effect.”

4. Item 13 of Tariff “A” County Court Costs is repealed and the following substituted therefor:

“13. Counsel fee at trial, up to ..... \$ 25.00  
Subject to increase in the discretion of the Judge



- (A) In cases involving less than \$200.00 where the trial lasts more than one day to an additional sum not exceeding \$10.00 per diem for each additional day, such counsel fee not to exceed in all the sum of ..... 40.00  
and
- (B) In cases involving \$200.00 or more to a sum not exceeding ..... 40.00  
And where the trial in such cases lasts more than one day to an additional sum not exceeding \$20.00 per diem for each additional day, such counsel fee not to exceed in all the sum of ..... 70.00  
and
- (C) In cases involving \$400.00 or more to a sum not exceeding ..... 70.00  
And where the trial in such cases lasts more than one day to an additional sum not exceeding \$30.00 per diem for each additional day, such counsel fee not to exceed in all the sum of ..... 120.00
- (In cases where the claim is not a money demand the Judge shall determine the amount involved.")

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The Treasurer then retired, and Mr. H. J. McLaughlin, K.C. was appointed Chairman.

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#### AMENDMENT OF RULES—Rule 74.

At the request of Mr. Carson, Chairman of the Discipline Committee, and with the consent of Mr. Jamieson who had given Notice at June Convocation, it was ordered that this matter stand to November Convocation. Moved by Mr. Chitty, seconded by Mr. Davis, that from this date, on the receipt of any Petition for Reinstatement by any person who has been struck off the Rolls, the Secretary shall publish such notice as the Discipline Committee may direct.

*Carried.*

#### INNS OF COURT.

Mr. Jamieson, Vice-President for Ontario of the Canadian Bar Association, referred to the proposal that some contribution to

the restoration of the Inns of Court be made by the profession in Canada, and referred to the Special Committees on this matter appointed by the Canadian Bar Association and by this Society. He requested information as to whether it was proposed that a contribution might be made by the Society rather than by individual members of the Bar.

Mr. McCarthy, Chairman of the Special Committee of this Society, reviewed the history of this proposal, both in the Canadian Bar Association and in Convocation.

Ordered that this matter stand to January Convocation.

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#### CORRESPONDENCE.

The Chairman read a letter from G. E. F. Sweet, Barrister of Brantford, thanking the Benchers for the expression of sympathy on the death of his father, the late Edmund Sweet, K.C., sometime a Bencher and Chairman of the Reporting Committee.

## RE GROUP INSURANCE FOR MEMBERS OF THE SOCIETY.

In November 1947 one of the well-known Life Insurance Companies wrote the Secretary with reference to a proposed plan of group insurance for members of the Law Society. The matter was referred for consideration to the Vice-Chairman and the Chairman of the Legal Education Committee. In February 1948 they submitted a draft letter with reference to the plan, together with a suggested circular for submission to the members of the Society. The matter was referred to Convocation for directions and without any recommendation. Convocation resolved that a form letter be sent to all members of the profession to obtain their views on the matter.

On September 27, 1948 the Insurance Company reported that out of 3,300 letters sent out, replies were received from about 500 lawyers indicating that 243 firms were interested in the proposal. The sub-committee is of the opinion that sufficient interest has not been shown to justify the matter being proceeded with further, and recommends that no further action be taken.

Your Committee approves of the recommendation of the Sub-Committee.

## STUDENTS COMMON ROOMS.

In June 1948 Mr. Heeney pointed out that some of the furniture in these rooms is in very poor condition, and suggested that consideration be given to the purchase of new furnishings for the women's room and one of the men's rooms. The Committee directed that the matter stand to the September meeting when it was referred to the Vice-Chairman and Secretary with power to act.

On November 3rd the Vice-Chairman, the Secretary and Mr. Heeney inspected the three common rooms. The old furniture, which is in very poor condition, has been removed from the second floor men's common room, and good furniture from Consulting

Rooms 3 and 4 (now the Dean's rooms) has been placed in this common room. The furniture in all three common rooms is now in good condition and there appears to be ample seating accommodation. At the present time all three rooms are used as common rooms, study rooms and lunch rooms. Mr. Ferguson has been instructed to place large wastepaper baskets in each room, and a generous supply of ash trays.

The Vice-Chairman and Secretary recommend that no further furnishings be purchased at this time, and that the matter stand until the attendance at the Law School returns to normal.

Your Committee approves of the recommendation of the Vice-Chairman and Secretary.

#### OSGOODE HALL LEGAL AND LITERARY SOCIETY.

W. L. N. Somerville, President, requested permission for the installation of a Coca Cola dispensing machine for the use of students in the Law School.

Your Committee recommends that the request be granted, provided the machine is installed in the basement of the Law School on conditions subject to the approval of the Vice-Chairman and Secretary.

*Re Christmas cards*—Miss Barbara J. Duncan, Vice-President, has written the Secretary stating that this year the members of the Executive wish to make available to both law students and members of the profession a recognized Law School card. She asked permission to use the Law Society seal, and the cut of Osgoode Hall used in the booklet commemorating the 150th Anniversary.

Your Committee recommends that the request be granted as far as the use of the cut of Osgoode Hall is concerned, but that the request for the use of the Law Society seal be refused.

#### RE LIGHTING H.E.P.C. BLACKOUTS.

Mr. Shaver reported on the temporary arrangements made for the use and the lighting of the Great Library and the Phillips-Stewart Library during the current blackouts.

Your Committee recommends that the whole matter of lighting during the present emergency be referred to the Treasurer and Messrs. McLaughlin and Shaver with power to act and to make any necessary expenditures.

## UNAUTHORIZED PRACTICE COMMITTEE.

In the absence of the Chairman, Mr. Beaton reported orally on several matters presently under consideration by the Committee.

## AMERICAN ASSOCIATION OF LAW LIBRARIES.

Your Committee recommends that the Chief Librarian be directed to attend the Executive Committee Meeting of the American Association of Law Libraries to be held at Washington on the 22nd and 23rd days of January next and that his expenses be paid.

## MEMORIAL TO THE LATE GOLDWIN LARRATT SMITH, K.C.

Mr. Geary presented the Report of the Special Committee appointed to prepare a Memorial to the late Goldwin Larratt Smith, K.C., and it was ordered that it be recorded in the Minutes of Convocation and a copy sent to Mrs. Smith:

## MEMORIAL

to the late

GOLDWIN LARRATT SMITH, K.C.

The Benchers in Convocation assembled record with regret the death of Goldwin Larratt Smith who died at his home in Toronto on Saturday the 2nd day of October A.D. 1948.

Mr. Goldwin Larratt Smith was born in Toronto a son of Larratt William Smith, K.C., distinguished member of the Bar and Bench of the Law Society, and Mary Elizabeth Smith. He was educated at Upper Canada College and the University of



Trinity College graduating from the latter in 1893, was admitted to the Law Society as a student-at-law of the Graduate class in Easter Term 1893 and was Called to the Bar and admitted as a Solicitor in Easter Term 1896. He was appointed one of His Majesty's Counsel in 1928; was first elected a Bencher of the Law Society in 1930 and served as such until 1941.

Mr. Smith's outstanding usefulness as a member of the Benchers was early recognized and he was appointed Chairman of the important Finance Committee on 15th November 1932. Soon after this appointment the need of providing necessary and proper accommodation at Osgoode Hall for members of the profession, for Library purposes, for the staff of the Law School and for the Society's own staff became pressing and upon the Finance Committee devolved the duty of making proposals in this regard. Upon Mr. Smith as Chairman fell the burden of the task and it was largely due to his untiring efforts that there emerged in good time a plan that was adopted by Convocation for construction of what is now known as the New East Wing. A committee called the Building Committee was formed under the Chairmanship of Mr. Smith, contracts were let and the work undertaken and completed largely under his personal supervision. The Society's Staff moved in in May 1938 and the Wing was formally opened on March 31st 1939 in an impressive and dignified ceremony which was graced by the presence of the then Governor-General of the Dominion, Lord Tweedsmuir.

It may be truly said that the New East Wing is itself a memorial to Mr. Goldwin Larratt Smith. It is interesting to recall that Mr. Smith's father, the late Larratt William Smith, had been Chairman of the Building Committee of the Law Society which carried out the construction of the present Law School building.

Mr. Smith's interest in the profession was constant throughout his life, his practice was a large one but he found time to enjoy many outside interests, one of them, perhaps the nearest to his heart after his family and his profession, a model farm where he got together a famous herd of Shorthorn cattle.

In 1901 he was married to Alice Bethune, the daughter of Robert Henry Bethune, General Manager of the Dominion Bank; she died in 1917. There are three children living, Bethune Larratt Smith, K.C., now a member of his father's firm, Mary

Goldie and Cecily Robertson. Their younger son, Anthony Larratt Smith, was killed in action in 1944.

In 1923 Mr. Smith was married to Ethel Baldwin, a member of the old Toronto family of that name, who survives him.

Mr. Goldwin Larratt Smith was a man who had many friends; he occupied a distinguished place in the community as well as in the profession and his loss is widely felt.

The Benchers of the Law Society extend their heartfelt sympathy to Mrs. Goldwin Larratt Smith and the family in their bereavement.

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#### AMENDMENT OF RULES—Rule 74.

Mr. Jamieson having given due notice, moved, seconded by Mr. Cartwright, that Rule 22 be suspended:

That Rule 74 be amended by adding thereto the following as subsection 12 thereof:

“12. Upon receipt of any Petition for re-instatement as a barrister and/or solicitor by a former member of the Society who has been disbarred and/or struck off the rolls, the Secretary shall publish in two consecutive issues of the Ontario Weekly Notes a notice of such application for re-instatement, together with a statement that any representations desired to be made with respect thereto are to be sent to the Secretary, and such application shall not be considered by Convocation and/or the Discipline Committee until one month after the date of such last publication.”

Moved in amendment by Mr. Parkinson, seconded by Mr. Davis, that Rule 74 be amended by adding thereto the following as subsection 12 thereof:

“12. No application for re-instatement as a barrister or solicitor by a person who has been disbarred as a barrister or struck off the Roll of Solicitors shall be considered by Convocation or the Discipline Committee unless the applicant has first published a notice of such application containing a statement to the effect that any person desiring to make any representations with respect thereto is requested to communicate in writing with the Secretary.

“The publication of such notice shall be by insertion thereof in two consecutive issues of the Ontario Weekly Notes and in two issues (one week apart) of a newspaper published in the

place where the applicant was practising at the time of being disbarred or struck off the Roll of Solicitors provided that, if there is no newspaper published in such place, such notice shall be inserted in two issues (one week apart) of a newspaper published nearest to such place. Such application shall not be considered by Convocation or the Discipline Committee until one month after the date of the last of such publications and until proof of such publications has been furnished to the Secretary.

"The notice aforesaid shall be substantially in accordance with the following form:

AND FURTHER TAKE NOTICE that any person desiring to make any representations with respect to such application is requested to communicate in writing with the Secretary of The Law Society of Upper Canada, Osgoode Hall, Toronto.

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INNS OF COURT.

Mr. McCarthy informed Convocation of the presentation of certain relics from the British House of Commons to the capitol at Washington, D.C., and to all the State capitols, and of a suggestion that relics from the Inns of Court (Inner Temple) be presented to the American Bar Association and other legal bodies. He referred to an article in the Times (London) of October 14, 1948, and read a letter dated November 5, 1948 from Lord Schuster which stated in part as follows:



"I am extremely glad that you wrote to me on the subject for it gives me the opportunity of saying that we should be delighted to give to any one or more of your provincial Law Societies or to the Canadian Bar Association any relics from the ruins of the Inner Temple which they would like to have."

Convocation recorded its approval of the suggestion of asking for such relics.

ORDERED that the matter be referred with power to act to a Special Committee consisting of Messrs. Pickup (Convener), Cartwright, Carson and McCarthy.

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### CORRESPONDENCE.

#### SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON MEMORIAL TO THE LATE WILLIAM SORA MIDDLEBRO', K.C.

The Secretary presented the Report of the Special Committee appointed to prepare a Memorial to the late William Sora Middlebro', K.C., and it was ordered that it be recorded in the Minutes of Convocation and a copy sent to Mrs. Middlebro'.

#### MEMORIAL to the late

#### WILLIAM SORA MIDDLEBRO', K.C.

The Benchers in Convocation assembled record with regret the death of William Sora Middlebro', who died at the Sittings of the Court of Revision at the City Hall, Owen Sound, on Wednesday afternoon, November 17th, A.D. 1948.

Mr. William S. Middlebro' was born in Orangeville, in the Province of Ontario, on the 17th day of October, 1868, a son of John Middlebro', who came to Canada from Lancashire in the '50s, and of Margaret Burrows, his wife.

He was educated in the public schools of Orangeville, and the public schools and the Collegiate Institute of Owen Sound, was admitted as a student-at-law of the matriculant class in the Easter Term 1887, called to the Bar and sworn in as a solicitor in

the Easter Term 1892, appointed a King's Counsel in 1910, first elected a Bencher at the regular election of 1926, and subsequently in 1931, 1936 and 1941, becoming a life Bencher at the last named election.

In 1903 he was married to Laura J. Tretheway, a daughter of Captain John Tretheway. There were no children of the union. In 1913 he was married to Pearl Irene Ryan of the City of Guelph, their only child being William George Middlebro'.

Of some men the mere factual recording of the circumstances of their lives gives a true picture. Not so, however, with William Sora Middlebro' in whose "constellation of gifts there were visible many brilliant stars."

Dignified in appearance, in manner reserved, to some perhaps at times appearing austere, yet he had understanding of and sympathy for the problems of those who were unfortunate or in distress.

In the comradeship of his home he was the idol of those who shared it with him.

Robbed by an incident in the Second Great War of his son, an Airman, his only child, he winced but never faltered in the pursuit of what to him was worthwhile.

Deprived by the caprice of politics of well-deserved recognition, Ontario lost the opportunity of his demonstrating as a Judge his abilities, and his wisdom.

In debate and discussion Mr. Middlebro' was restrained and deliberate, and thereby more effective.

With Party affiliates and other friends he chatted merrily and humorously, while listening attentively.

He was loyal—

(1) To the British Commonwealth in whose future he had abiding faith.

(2) To Canada, which he dearly loved and greatly served in the Dominion Parliaments of 1908 to 1921.

(3) To the Liberal Conservative Party, to which he gave adherence, and was for many years its tactful and efficient Whip.

(4) To Owen Sound, the City of his adoption, where he served for many years as Alderman and Mayor.

(5) To himself, for whom he demanded as a right freedom of thought and expression, recognizing for others the right he claimed for himself.

In the words of The Right Honourable William Lyon Mackenzie King—"His career was outstanding in his contribution to the legal profession, the Parliament, and indeed to our Country as a whole."

Impaired in health and aware of the risk attendant on effort, he upheld to the end what he was convinced was the right.

Suddenly, "*The Happy Warrior*" passed to his rest.

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#### SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON TRUST COMPANIES.

At the request of the Chairman, Mr. Parkinson, it was ordered that this matter stand to the next meeting of Convocation.

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#### SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON PRESENTATION FROM THE INNS OF COURT.

Mr. Pickup, the Chairman, reported orally that the Committee had decided to suggest that a stone from the ruined buildings of the Inner Temple be presented to the Society; the stone to be about six inches to eight inches high, and about one foot in length and left in its rough and damaged state. The Committee also suggested that Lord Schuster give a suitable statement about the stone and its history. The Committee has now been informed that the stone has been shipped, and a statement with a short history prepared by Lord Schuster has arrived. The Committee will later decide what should be done with the stone, the present suggestion being to have it placed in a suitable showcase, along with the memorandum describing it and its source.

Your Committee recommends pursuant to the powers conferred under Section 43 of the Law Society Act, that the relevant Rules be suspended, and that all veteran students of the Graduate Class of the present Third year who were admitted as students prior to October 1st 1946, on successfully completing all required examinations, be permitted to be Called to the Bar in June 1949.

CONFERENCE OF GOVERNING BODIES OF THE LEGAL PROFESSION  
IN CANADA.

At the Mid-Winter Meeting of the Executive of the Conference it was decided to request a further grant for the work of the Conference similar to that of the past two years, i.e., a grant of \$400.00 from the Canadian Bar Association, \$100.00 from the

Law Society of Upper Canada, \$25.00 from the Law Society of Prince Edward Island, and \$50.00 from each of the other Provincial Societies and the Board of Notaries of Quebec.

Your Committee recommends that a grant of \$100.00 be made to the Conference for the year 1949.

#### ARREARS OF ANNUAL FEES.

The Secretary submits a list of those members in arrears, showing seventy-eight (78) in arrears for Barristers and Solicitors Fees, of whom fifteen (15) are in arrears for more than one year; and forty-one (41) are in arrears for Bar Fee only, of whom six (6) are in arrears for more than one year.

Your Committee recommends that a letter be written to all members in arrears for fees for a period of more than one year, informing them that unless their arrears are paid forthwith a further notice will be served on them notifying them that a resolution as to their suspension from practice will be considered at the March meeting of Convocation.

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#### UNAUTHORIZED PRACTICE COMMITTEE.

In the absence of the Chairman, Mr. Springsteen presented the Report.

HAROLD GRAHAM MEIR, SEAFORTH.

In October 1948 your Committee reported to date on this matter, informing Convocation that a declaratory judgment was given in the terms of the Notice of Motion, an interim injunction granted, and all costs reserved to be disposed of at the adjourned hearing which would be heard at Goderich on November 22, 1948. This report also appeared in the printed Minutes of Convocation.

The facts in this matter briefly are:

By an order of the Registrar of the Supreme Court of Ontario dated the 17th day of June 1948 Harold Graham Meir was disbarred and his name was struck off the roll of solicitors. Meir was immediately notified of this Order by registered post.

Meir occupied offices in the Village of Seaforth and during the months of June, July, August and September 1948 there

appeared under his name on the door and window of his offices the words "Barrister and Solicitor" and "Law Office". A legal card under his name also appeared in the Clinton News Record on one occasion subsequent to his disbarment.

On the 28th day of July, 1948 the Secretary of the Law Society requested Meir to remove the signs from his office and discontinue advertising.

On his failure to do so an originating motion was launched dated 30th September "for a declaration that the said Harold Graham Meir, having been disbarred and struck off the roll of solicitors on the 17th day of June, 1948, is not from that date duly qualified to act or practise as a solicitor and from such date is prohibited by section 6 of the Solicitors Act from holding himself out as or representing himself to be a solicitor or practising or for gain or reward acting as a solicitor and for an order that the said Harold Graham Meir do pay the penalties provided by the said Statute by reason of his holding himself out as or representing himself to be a solicitor from the 18th day of June 1948 to the 29th day of September, 1948 at the Towns of Seaforth and Clinton in the County of Huron and for an Order enjoining the said Harold Graham Meir from practising as a solicitor. . . ."

The motion came on for hearing at Goderich before Gale J. on October 12, 1948 at which time a declaration was made in the terms of the Notice of Motion, and otherwise adjourned at the respondent's request until November 22nd the respondent in the meantime to be enjoined from practising.

On the 22nd November 1948 the motion was heard before Barlow J. at which time he made an Order finding that there had been a breach of the Statute by Meir as set forth in the Notice of Motion, and also granting a permanent Injunction restraining Meir from practising as a solicitor, and imposed a penalty of \$25.00.

Mr. Justice Barlow's Order provided for the costs of the motion before Mr. Justice Gale and also of the motion on November 22nd, and subsequently the costs were taxed and execution issued.

Your Committee recommends that a note of this case be published in the Ontario Weekly Notes, and that otherwise no further action be taken.



RE NINA E. NEADS, BOWMANVILLE.

Two solicitors in the neighbourhood brought to the attention of the Secretary certain advertisements published by Miss Neads in local newspapers. On the instructions of the Chairman the matter was referred to Mr. McLennan for investigation, and his report dated February 5th was considered by your Committee.

In view of the information contained in Mr. McLennan's report, your Committee recommends that he be instructed to take action forthwith.

THE REPORT WAS ADOPTED.

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## SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON LEGISLATION.

In the absence of the Chairman, Mr. Chitty presented the Report of the Special Committee.

RE COMPANIES ACT (ONTARIO), BILL NO. 155 (Co-operative Corporations).

In March and April 1948 copies of this Bill, together with letters from the Provincial Secretary and the Deputy Provincial Secretary, were sent to the Secretary and were referred to the Chairman who retained Mr. David Guest, Lecturer in Company Law, to consider the Bill and make any necessary representations. Mr. Guest consulted with the then Provincial Secretary, Mr. D. R. Michener, K.C., and made certain suggestions which were incorporated in a new draft Bill. In August Mr. Michener

wrote the Secretary enclosing a copy of the proposed revision, and the correspondence was before the Committee on September 16th. The Committee recommended that if the Chairman thought it necessary or desirable, he be authorized to retain counsel to consider the revision and make any necessary representations.

On January 19th Mr. Michener, who has been retained by the Government to consider this Bill, again wrote the Secretary enclosing a copy of the proposed revision. With the approval of the Chairman, the Secretary instructed Mr. Guest to look over the Bill again and make such representations as he considered advisable. On February 25, 1949 Mr. Guest wrote the Secretary as follows:

"I have your letter of January 28th. Following Mr. Walsh's instructions in April of last year I considered the Bill in the form it was originally presented and attended at the office of the Provincial Secretary where I raised a number of objections to the Bill. I received explanations to some of these which appeared to be satisfactory; with respect to others the persons proposing the Bill agreed to make amendments. Following this meeting I reported to Mr. Walsh by letter dated April 6th. Subsequently I received and considered a revised draft and reported to Mr. Walsh by letter April 16th that the Bill had been completely revised and in my opinion substantially improved and I was therefore taking no further action.

Last month I received from Mr. D. R. Michener a printed copy of the Bill which it is proposed to re-introduce at the forthcoming session of Legislature. I considered the Bill and advised Mr. Michener that I felt that the points which I had raised during the discussions last April had been met by suitable revisions and that I therefore did not consider it necessary to attend any further conferences on the Bill. I drew to his attention two sections in which I considered the drafting to be ambiguous, which suggestions he acknowledged by letter dated January 22nd. Accordingly I do not consider that there is anything further for me to do in connection with this Bill."

Your Committee recommends that the action taken by the Chairman herein be approved.

## RE BANKRUPTCY ACT 1949 (DOMINION).

In June 1948 the Committee had before it the draft Bill 1948, together with a memorandum from Mr. Gordon Cook, K.C. The Chairman was given authority to retain counsel to make representations with reference to the Bill if he thought it necessary. On June 9th Robert Forsyth, K.C., then Superintendent of Bankruptcy, in reply to an inquiry, informed the Secretary as follows:

"I enclose herewith a copy of the Bill Respecting Bankruptcy. This Bill was filed in the Senate and it was not intended that it should pass at this session. The purpose of filing it is to enable persons who have any objections to make in respect to the Bill, to communicate them."

In September the Committee recommended continuance of the authority given the Chairman to retain counsel to peruse the draft Bill with a view to conferring with the Registrar in Bankruptcy, and if necessary to make representations with reference to any proposed amendment or revision.

On January 21, 1949 the Board of Trade of the City of Toronto wrote the Secretary enclosing a memorandum of recommendations on bankruptcy law revision. At the request of the Chairman the Secretary had an interview with Mr. Gordon Cook who was a member of the Committee that prepared the memorandum for the Board of Trade. Mr. Cook understood that the memorandum would be further considered by the proper authorities at Ottawa and would probably result in a new draft of the Bill.

A new draft has been made, and a copy was before the Committee together with a letter from Mr. C. L. Dubin, Lecturer in Bankruptcy, and a memorandum of the Secretary on a further interview with Mr. Cook.

Your Committee recommends that this matter be referred to the Chairman with power to act as far as any emergency is concerned.



## SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON TRUST COMPANIES.

Mr. Parkinson presented the Report of the Special Committee.

To the Benchers of the Law Society of Upper Canada in Convocation assembled:

The Special Committee on Trust Companies begs leave to report as follows:

Your special committee was appointed on 19th February 1948 by Convocation and consists of A. L. Brooks, K.C., J. R. Cartwright, K.C., W. B. Common, K.C., G. W. Mason, K.C., (Treasurer), A. R. Willmott, K.C., W. J. Beaton, K.C., (Vice-Chairman) and H. F. Parkinson, K.C., (Chairman). Your Committee carefully considered the report of your former special committee upon the same subject dated 8th November 1933 and published in 1934 O.W.N. ix, and submits the present report as an endeavour to bring that report up to date. The members of your committee considered correspondence on the subject, the advertising of the trust companies both by circulars and booklets and in the public press, and legislation dealing with the problem in the other provinces. The members of your committee discussed the problems at considerable length with the officers of several of the larger trust companies in Toronto and with numerous members of the profession. Your committee now reports as follows:

## I.

The trust companies assert that it is their right and duty to handle trustee business and that they are justified in advertising and canvassing actively to secure that business. They consider that the will is the instrument whereby such business is secured and that the drawing thereof is merely incidental.

## II.

The companies undoubtedly advertise extensively to secure their appointment as executor and this advertising seems to emphasize (a) the unsuitability of personal executors; (b) the permanence and suitability of corporate executors. The policies of the companies as to canvassing appear to vary greatly. One of the companies claims not to indulge in "cold canvass" but will

send out representatives upon contact. Some of the companies indulge in "cold canvass" to a lesser degree and as incidental to canvassing for other types of business, e.g., stock transfer business. One of the companies interviewed frankly claimed the right to canvass openly for executorships and does so.

### III.

It appears to your committee that formerly members of the legal profession handled a great deal more of the trustee business than at the present time and this is probably due to the growth and development of the trust companies. All of the companies interviewed assert that the solicitor directing the business to the company or the solicitor named by the testator is invariably retained in connection with the legal business resulting. Your committee is of the opinion that in Toronto at the present time very little legal business of estates finds its way to other than such solicitors.

### IV.

Some of the companies were quite frank in stating that the complaints of lawyers stem from the loss of the trustee business to the companies rather than merely from the incident of the drawing of the will. Some of the companies pointed out that the lawyer is at a disadvantage because he cannot advertise his capacity to handle estates or actively canvass for such business.

### V.

At the moment your committee is of the opinion that under Ontario law the companies cannot be prevented from actively advertising, canvassing and actually drawing wills. Convocation is familiar with the present legislative situation. Convocation is familiar with the possibility (or otherwise) of securing legislation preventing the preparation of legal documents for a fee by other than lawyers. All of the companies assert that they never charge for the drawing of a will. Whether the subsequent remuneration could be deemed to be consideration for the preparation of the document is very questionable.

### VI.

Examples of such legislation are the recent amendments in the Provinces of Manitoba and Nova Scotia. The Manitoba legislation provides:

"No person shall in the Province of Manitoba . . . carry on the practice or profession of barrister or attorney-at-law or solicitor . . . unless he has been duly called. . . ."

and one is declared to be carrying on the practice who:

"either directly or indirectly for or in expectation of any fee, gain, or reward direct or indirect . . . draws, revises, or settles . . . any document relating to real or personal estate. . . ."

but the Statute sets out the following exception:

"This section shall not . . . prohibit . . . any incorporated loan or trust company authorized to carry on business within the Province from doing anything which its act or charter of incorporation empowers it to do."

The Nova Scotia amendment seems to go even further and provides:

"No corporation . . . for or on behalf of any person, estate or trust (may draw) any deed . . . or any testamentary document."

and canvassing in respect of such matters is forbidden.

There is also legislation along the same lines in the Provinces of Alberta and Saskatchewan but your committee considers the above examples to be sufficient for this report.

## VII.

Convocation is familiar with the ethics involved in the matter of solicitors advertising or actively seeking business whether that be the mere drawing of a will or the subsequent trustee business or any other type of business. The companies actively advertise concerning the unsuitability of personal executors. In Ontario there has been no advertising, institutional or otherwise, to offset this publicity and to indicate to the public the suitability of individuals in general and lawyers in particular to act as executors and trustees nor to educate the public in respect of an alleged tendency of corporations to create, in some matters, lengthy and unsuitable trusts. At the moment your committee is of the impression that the right of the legal profession to advertise, institutionally or otherwise, might well receive further consideration of Convocation in view of the growth of the competition of the trust companies.

## VIII.

Your Committee was furnished with the following analysis of 117 estates following a recent three-month investigation which shows:

- “44%—one or more individuals not lawyers were named  
as executors;
- 26%—a trust company was sole executor;
- 15%—a trust company and an individual, not a lawyer,  
were executors;
- 9%—a lawyer was sole executor;
- 3%—a lawyer and an individual were executors;
- 3%—a lawyer and a trust company were executors.”

It must be observed that although this analysis is probably far from accurate it does indicate the present trend.

## IX.

All of the companies expressed a firm desire to co-operate in all reasonable ways with the legal profession and some of them felt that such relationship has deteriorated and that steps should be taken to improve it. The companies in some instances appear to be interested in this relationship from the point of view of business other than executorships. One of the companies frankly pointed out that a solicitor who is not an executor secures all of the legal business whether he draws the will or not, and, if the lawyer is interested in the executorship, then the company and he are in direct competition. It was suggested to your committee that the legal profession should be informed concerning the policies followed by the various companies so that the individual lawyer could favour the companies which “played ball”. There is great difficulty in connection with such suggestion and, before being acted on, it would undoubtedly warrant further consideration.

## X.

One company asserts that, as a matter of fixed policy, it does not draw wills and that it invariably refers the instructions for a will to the testator's solicitor or to a solicitor named by the testator upon the request of the company. This company admits that in recent years competition (between the companies) has



compelled departures from this policy. This company states there have been occasions when the testator either (a) refused to have his own lawyer act; or (b) refused to name any lawyer to act, resulting in the possibility of the business being lost to another company which would draw the will.

## XI.

Complaints were voiced to your committee by one of the companies in reference to the co-operation received from lawyers in respect of the preparation of wills upon the instructions of the company and also in respect of the capacity of some lawyers to carry out effectively the instructions. These complaints seem to be as follows: (a) dilatoriness on the part of solicitors and delay in carrying out the instructions of the trust company with subsequent risk to the company of losing the business; (b) in a lesser degree, incompetence on the part of some solicitors to draw a will properly in accordance with instructions; and (c) non-co-operative attitude on the part of a few lawyers with resultant interference with instructions and risk to the company as to the business. Some proof of delays by solicitors in such matters was presented to your committee but your committee feels that the suggestion that the members of the profession are incompetent or antagonistic (except possibly in isolated cases) is unwarranted and without foundation. The company ventured the opinion that a great deal might be accomplished if the legal profession showed more co-operation with the trust companies in the drawing of wills with mutual advantage to both. Your Committee, however, expresses no opinion on these matters because it has not been able to formulate any proposal in respect thereof to submit to Convocation.

## XII.

None of the companies would admit that solicitors in its employ engaged in "cold canvass". Your committee suspects that in some cases lawyers engaged by trust companies do approach their former clients or their friends. One of the companies asserted that its circular advertising was an offer to make suggestions as to the manner in which an estate should be administered but that none of the advertising amounted to a suggestion that the will would be drawn by the trust company.

## XIII.

The solicitors in the employ of trust companies who interview prospects who have come to the office as the result of the advertising or as the result of a canvass undoubtedly advise the prospects upon legal matters connected with their wills. The companies take the position in this respect that the prospect knows that the solicitor is the employee of the trust company and that he receives no fee in respect of the advice and that there is no conflict of duty. This was dealt with at some length in the report of 8th November 1933. Whether or not solicitors in such capacity are acting unprofessionally is not within the instructions of your committee. Convocation might deem it advisable to consider this matter further although your committee is of the impression that the practical benefit might not be very far-reaching. It was intimated to your committee that such solicitors might find it expedient to sever their relations with the Society rather than with the company by whom they are employed.

## XIV.

None of the companies interviewed admit that they ever pay a fee to a solicitor bringing a will to them. It is possible that some of the trust companies do follow such practice and may even pay a commission on the estimated amount of the estate. Such a practice is not within the purview of your committee's instructions. Such an activity would be a question of discipline of a solicitor so involved rather than a question of what steps which might be taken against the trust company. It was admitted that on occasions, where the testators so insisted, the wills were actually drawn by lawyers selected by the company who were paid fees therefor by the company. In this regard, however, it was asserted that the lawyer so drawing the will would not come in personal contact with the testator but would take all of his instructions directly from the trust company. Again this is a matter involving the solicitor rather than the company.

## XV.

*Your Committee therefore recommends to Convocation:*

(a) Consideration of the possibilities of securing legislation in Ontario with respect to the drawing of wills for reward by

other than solicitors with provision that remuneration is involved where the party drawing the will is named as executor;

(b) Consideration of the problem of advertising and canvassing by the legal profession either individually or institutionally;

(c) Consideration of the position of a solicitor in full-time employment by a trust company who interviews prospects attracted to the office of the company by advertising or canvass or otherwise and who advises such a prospect as to legal matters concerning his estate and the disposition thereof by will.

## XVI.

Your Committee realizes that the members of the Society are aroused and disturbed because of the extent to which the trust companies have encroached upon a field of business which was formerly considered to belong almost exclusively to the legal profession. Your committee considers that the possibilities of remedial action are indicated in this report. The files which have been received by your committee from the Secretary of the Society and the file built up in connection with the preparation of this report are forwarded to the Secretary herewith.

Moved by Mr. Parkinson, seconded by Mr. Cartwright, that the Report be adopted and that the Special Committee be discharged.

*Carried.*

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## COMMISSION ON REVISION OF CRIMINAL CODE OF CANADA.

Mr. Slaght referred to the Commission on the Revision of the Criminal Code of Canada, and as consulting Counsel spoke of the work of the Commission and requested individual members of Convocation to write him with suggestions as to changes of policy in, or proposed amendments to, the Criminal Code of Canada.

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## LEGAL EDUCATION COMMITTEE.

Mr. Cassels presented the Report of the Special Meeting of the Legal Education Committee held on January 24, 1949:

At a special meeting of your Committee on the 24th January 1949, the following Resolutions were made:



RESOLVED unanimously that a statement setting forth the views of the Legal Education Committee be issued immediately by the Treasurer;

RESOLVED that the Committee recommend to Convocation that the resignation of the Dean be accepted forthwith; that the resignations of Messrs. Willis, Laskin and Edwards which were tendered as of the end of the present year, be accepted; and that Dr. Wright be advised that it is the desire of the Committee that he continue his lectures until the end of the present term as suggested by him;

RESOLVED that the Treasurer ask Mr. Falconbridge if he will act as Acting Dean for the present.

Mr. Cassels moved the adoption of the Report.

The Treasurer laid before Convocation a number of representations relating to Legal Education in Ontario, and in particular relating to the basic principles adopted by Convocation in January which were referred to the Standing Committee on Legal Education for consideration.

Moved in amendment by Mr. Pickup, seconded by Mr. Seymour, that there be substituted for the motion of Mr. Cassels the following:

(1) That a special Meeting of Convocation be called to be held at the call of the Treasurer, when Convocation in Committee of the whole will review the decision of January Convocation and consider the representations received or to be received on the subject of Legal Education in Ontario.

(2) That all County and District Law Associations in Ontario be requested to submit their views on the questions in controversy so that they may be fully considered by Convocation at such Special Meeting.

(3) That the resignation of Dean Wright be accepted as tendered and that Convocation concur in the recommendation of the Standing Committee on Legal Education that Dr. Wright be requested to continue his lectures to the end of the present term as suggested by him.

(4) That action on the resignation of Messrs. Willis, Laskin and Edwards be deferred until after review of the whole situation by the Special Meeting of Convocation.



Moved in amendment to the amendment by Mr. Robinette, seconded by Mr. Shaver, that paragraphs 3 and 4 of the amendment be struck out, and the following substituted therefor:

(3) That action on the resignations of Dean Wright and Messrs. Willis, Laskin and Edwards be deferred until after review of the whole situation by the Special Meeting of Convocation.

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After discussion Convocation adjourned at 1 p.m.

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Convocation resumed at 2.10 p.m.

"(3) That action on the resignations of Dean Wright and Messrs. Willis, Laskin and Edwards be deferred in view of this decision to review the whole situation by the Special Meeting of Convocation."

*Carried.*

Moved by Mr. Shaver, seconded by Mr. McKay, that the Treasurer be authorized to appoint a special committee to make all arrangements to obtain the views of the County and District Law Associations and otherwise, and for the Special Meeting of Convocation.

*Carried.*

The Treasurer appointed the following special committee herein: Mr. Pickup (Chairman) and Messrs. Beaton, Chitty, Shaver and Willmott.

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#### LAW SOCIETY SEAL.

The Treasurer read a letter from the Chairman of the Dance Committee of the Osgoode Hall Legal and Literary Society requesting the use of the Law Society seal on the program for the annual Osgoode Hall dance.

Ordered that as a matter of policy the use of the Law Society seal be limited to official Law Society matters or matters arising in Convocation.

Ordered that the Treasurer appoint a special committee to consider the question of designing a Law Society crest which might be used for other than official occasions.

The Treasurer appointed the following Special Committee on Law Society Crest: Messrs. McLaughlin, Robinette and Common.

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Mr. Chitty spoke on the question of Benchers appearing before County Law Associations when requested to make a statement in connection with legal education, and referred to a recent request from the County of Hastings Law Association.

The Society requests permission to use the Seal of the Law Society on the award and for this purpose to have a special die made of an appropriate size. A letter from the President of the Osgoode Hall Legal and Literary Society was submitted to the meeting on 16th February and the Committee directed that further information be obtained as to the nature of the award and how to be selected. A further letter from the President was submitted outlining the conditions of the Award.

Your Committee has no objection to the general scheme as proposed but in view of the fact that the Seal of the Society cannot be used for such purposes, suggests that the insignia used be such crest as may be approved by Convocation.

## EXAMINATION PAPERS.

At its meeting on 18th November 1947, the following Resolution was adopted by the Committee:

(5) All examination papers are to be delivered to the Secretary forthwith after marking; such papers to be arranged by the examiner in order by numbers in bundles convenient for handling. The examination papers are to be held by the Secretary subject to instructions of your Committee.

Under this ruling, examination papers may not be returned to the examiner for discussion with the student, and in many cases this has been considered a hardship by the students. Letters are submitted from R. D. Poupore and Miss Sydney Dymond, third year students.

Your Committee recommends that for this purpose examination papers may be returned on requisition by the examiners and that they be responsible for the return of the papers to the Secretary.

## CHANGE OF NAME.

*Harold Stanley Chaplan*, Barrister and Solicitor, asks to have his name changed on the Rolls and Records of the Society to "Harold Stanley Chaplin." He submits a Certificate of an Order by His Honour Judge Factor dated 18th February 1949 under the Change of Name Act 1949.

Your Committee recommends that the request be granted.

## GURSTON ALLEN PRIZE—For Highest Mark in Conflict of Laws.

A letter was submitted from Gurston Allen, solicitor of Toronto, with reference to his annual prize of \$25 awarded for the highest mark in the subject of Conflict of Laws.

Your Committee recommends approval of the continuance of this Prize on an annual or other basis as Mr. Allen wishes. Your Committee wishes to record its thanks to Mr. Allen for his continued interest in the Law School.

## SPECIAL PETITIONS.

The committee considered certain petitions for special relief and made recommendations thereon.

## RE-READING OF EXAMINATION PAPERS.

Under the special rules approved by Convocation 20th November 1947, certain students applied for a re-reading of their examination papers. The papers were re-read in accordance with the rules and the examiners report no changes in the marks of any of the papers.

*Approved.*

## LAW SCHOOL—Staff.

Your Committee recommends that a Committee, consisting of the Chairmen and Vice-Chairmen of the Standing Committees and Mr. P. D. Wilson, be appointed to consider the field with reference to the appointment of a Head of the Law School and staff, and to report to the Special Meeting of Convocation.

## PUBLIC RELATIONS.

Your Committee recommends that Convocation appoint a Public Relations Committee.

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At the request of Mr. McKay, Mr. Cassels and Mr. Jamieson explained briefly what the Committee had in mind in recommending this appointment.

## THE REPORT WAS ADOPTED.

Moved by Mr. Jamieson, seconded by Mr. Walsh, and carried, that the Treasurer be requested to appoint a Special Committee on Public Relations. The Treasurer appointed the following Special Committee on Public Relations: Messrs. Beaton (Chairman) Cassels, Chitty, Jamieson and Walsh.

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NOTICE OF MOTION—Amendment of Rules.

Mr. Chitty gave notice that at the meeting of Convocation on April 21st he would move that Rule 27(1) be amended by adding a committee on Public Relations as the eighth Standing Committee.

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## DISCIPLINE COMMITTEE.

Mr. Pickup, the Vice-Chairman, reported briefly on the work of the Discipline Committee for the calendar year 1948, informing Convocation of the number of meetings held, the number of complaints considered by the Chairman or the Vice-Chairman, and the number investigated by the Committee with the action taken thereon.

THE REPORT WAS RECEIVED.

UNAUTHORIZED PRACTICE COMMITTEE—Mr. Walsh.

RE NINA E. NEADS, Bowmanville.

Two solicitors in the County of Durham brought to the attention of the Secretary certain advertisements published by Miss Neads in local newspapers. In the issue of January 20, 1949 of the Newcastle News the following advertisements appeared in the classified advertising section under the heading, "Legal":

"Conveyancing  
Drawing all Legal Documents  
Reasonable Prices  
Nina E. Neads  
Telephones  
Office 355 - Res. 489  
King Street E. - Bowmanville, Ont."

On the instructions of the Chairman of the Committee on Unauthorized Practice the matter was referred to Mr. J. L. McLennan, K.C., for his investigation, and on receipt of his report the Committee recommended that Mr. McLennan be instructed to take action forthwith.

The following Charge was laid against Miss Neads:

"At the Village of Newcastle and the Towns of Port Hope and Bowmanville, in the County of Durham and elsewhere in the said county in the months of January and February in the year of our Lord 1949, not being admitted and enrolled and duly qualified to act as a Solicitor unlawfully did hold herself out as or represent herself to be a Solicitor contrary to the provisions of the Solicitors Act, R.S.O. 1937, ch. 223 and amendments thereto."

The Charge was heard before Magistrate R. B. Baxter at Bowmanville on March 15th, and Miss Neads was convicted of the offence as charged. Sentence was suspended, and she was bound over for two years to keep the peace on her undertaking, assented to by her counsel, that she would not again offend against the Act.

In his decision Magistrate Baxter stated in part as follows:

"I am finding that sometime during the months of January and February 1949 Miss Neads did hold herself out to act as a

solicitor in that she advertised in the Newcastle News that she was prepared to do conveyancing, draw up all legal documents, and that as she held herself out as a person prepared to draw all legal documents she represented herself to be a solicitor duly qualified to act as a solicitor she contravened the provisions of the Solicitors' Act; and I must find her guilty as charged.

"This is the second case I have had within the last few years. You may remember the James case at Belleville a few years ago in which I gave a different decision which was reversed on appeal.

"In both cases I appreciate the position of the Law Association. As Mr. McLennan says it is to protect people from persons who are not qualified to do what they represent themselves to be qualified to do. There are numerous instances where unqualified persons attempted to draw up legal documents with the result that a client happens to find that the cost of rectifying the mistake far exceeds what would have been the initial cost by a properly duly qualified solicitor."

THE REPORT WAS ADOPTED.

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## COUNTY LIBRARIES COMMITTEE—Mr. Marshall.

### ANNUAL GRANTS.

Your Committee reports to the Finance Committee that the following County Law Associations have filed their annual returns for the year 1948 in accordance with Rule 62 and have complied in all other respects with the requirements of the Rules adopted from time to time by Convocation in relation to County Libraries, and recommends that grants be made to such Associations as follows:

And your Committee reports specially that the Waterloo Law Association, having failed to file its annual returns for the year 1947 within three months from the 15th day of January, 1948, has now filed its annual returns for the year 1947 and otherwise complied with the rules adopted from time to time relating to County Law Libraries, and recommends that a grant be made to it of \$817.50 the amount to which it would have been entitled if its returns had been filed within the time limited under rule 62.

## SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON LEGISLATION—Mr. Walsh.

## RE BANKRUPTCY ACT 1949 (Dominion).

On February 17th the Committee was brought up to date with reference to this Bill, and had before it a new draft (1949) of the Bill, a memorandum of January 1949 from the Board of Trade of the City of Toronto with its recommendations on bankruptcy law revision, a letter from Mr. C. L. Dubin, lecturer in Bankruptcy, and a memorandum of the Secretary on an interview with Mr. Gordon Cook, K.C. The Committee recommended that this matter be referred to the Chairman with power to act as far as any emergency was concerned.

On February 18th the Secretary was informed that the Bill had been read a second time in the Senate, and had been referred to the Banking and Commerce Committee of the Senate for hearing on March 10th. On the instructions of the Chairman, Mr. C. L. Dubin was retained to prepare a memorandum of the representations of the Society, and Mr. Lee A. Kelley, K.C., of Ottawa was retained to appear for the Society before the Senate Committee. Mr. Kelley appeared for the Society on March 10th, and his report was before the Committee. At the suggestion of members of the Senate Committee, Mr. Dubin is preparing for filing a written brief on behalf of the Society, together with a draft of any amendments proposed by the Society.

Your Committee approves of the action taken to date, and recommends that Messrs. Kelley and Dubin be requested to follow the course of the Bill, and take such further action as they consider necessary.

## RE INCOME WAR TAX ACT.

Mr. John F. Boland, K.C., wrote the Society with reference to the policy of certain Inspectors of Income Tax taking the position that they will not allow as a disbursement out of income any bill of costs rendered to a trustee or personal representative of an estate which has not been passed by a Surrogate Court Judge.

Your Committee is of the opinion that this is a matter of administration rather than of legislation, and recommends that the letter be referred to the Ontario branch of the Section on



Administration of Civil Justice of the Canadian Bar Association, with a request for consideration, and a report direct to Mr. Boland.

RE BILL NO. 49, ONTARIO LEGISLATURE—An Act to Amend the County Courts Act.

The Chairman reported that this Bill had been passed increasing the jurisdiction of the County Courts in cases where it was formerly \$800.00, \$500.00 and \$2,000.00, to \$1,200.00, \$1,000.00 and \$4,000.00 respectively, and that the Bill provided that it shall come into force by proclamation.

Your Committee recommends that the Chairman be authorized to make representations to the Attorney-General against the proclamation of the Act.

THE REPORT WAS ADOPTED.

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#### INNS OF COURT.

Consideration of the suggestion of a contribution to the restoration of the Inns of Court has been before Convocation at several meetings recently, and has been directed to stand. Mr. Jamieson reported on the action being taken by a Special Committee of the Canadian Bar Association, and stated that no further action was necessary on the part of the Law Society of Upper Canada.

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#### SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON SPECIAL CONVOCATION—Legal Education.

Mr. Pickup reported orally on the action taken by the Special Committee; that a circular letter had been sent to all County and District Law Associations, and other legal associations in Ontario; that approximately fifteen Briefs had been received, and that these and others to be received together with the proceedings before the Special Committee on Legal Education, will be perused and collated for the information of Convocation; that the Committee recommends that the date of the Special Convocation be April 20th continuing as may be necessary, with an adjournment for the regular meeting of Convocation; that a

follow-up letter be sent forthwith to those Associations which had not yet replied, setting a deadline of April 11th for submitted Briefs.

THE REPORT WAS RECEIVED.

Moved by Mr. Pickup, seconded by Mr. Shaver, that the Special Meeting of Convocation on Legal Education be held on Wednesday, April 20th, at 10:30 a.m., and that the last date for receiving Briefs be April 11th.

*Carried.*

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CORRESPONDENCE.

The Chairman read the following correspondence:

A letter from Mrs. W. S. Middlebro' thanking the Treasurer and Benchers for the Memorial to her late husband, W. S. Middlebro', K.C.

A letter from the Conference of Governing Bodies of the Legal Profession in Canada enclosing a copy of the Minutes of the Mid-Winter Meeting of the Executive.

ORDERED that these letters be received and filed.

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Convocation adjourned at 1 p.m.

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Convocation resumed at 2:10 p.m.

Present: Messrs. Beaton, Cartwright, Chitty, Clement, Geary, Hughes, Jamieson, F. D. Kerr, W. G. Kerr, Marshall, McKay, McLaughlin, Seymour, Shaver, Springsteen, Walsh and Wilson.

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Convocation proceeded with the consideration of the correspondence read earlier by the Chairman.

LEGAL EDUCATION—Law School Staff.

Moved by Mr. Jamieson, seconded by Mr. Wilson, that the resignations of Dr. Wright, and Messrs. Willis, Laskin and

Edwards, be accepted, effective on completion of their duties for the present school term for which they were engaged; and that in accepting the resignations Convocation express its appreciation of their past services as members of the staff of the Osgoode Hall Law School.

Moved in amendment by Mr. Hughes, seconded by Mr. Clement, that action on these resignations be deferred as resolved by Convocation at the February meeting.

The amendment was lost. The motion was carried.

Moved by Mr. Jamieson, seconded by Mr. Chitty, that the Treasurer be requested to reply to the letter from Dr. Sidney E. Smith advising him that when Convocation has reached a decision as to the changes, if any, to be made in the Law School and training at Osgoode Hall, a Committee from or representatives of the Benchers would be glad to meet with Dr. Smith and representatives from the University of Toronto to discuss co-operation between the two bodies which may be of benefit to the profession and the public generally.

Moved in amendment by Mr. Walsh, seconded by Mr. F. D. Kerr, that the Treasurer be requested to acknowledge Dr. Smith's letter, and inform him that the matter will be duly considered.

The amendment was lost.

Moved in amendment by Mr. Wilson, seconded by Mr. W. G. Kerr, that the Treasurer be requested to reply to the letter from Dr. Sidney E. Smith, advising him that when Convocation has reached a decision as to the changes, if any, to be made in the Law School and training at Osgoode Hall, consideration will be given to the appointment of a Committee from the Benchers of the Law Society to meet with Dr. Smith and representatives from the University of Toronto to discuss co-operation between the two bodies which may be of benefit to the profession and the public generally.

The amendment was lost.

The motion was carried.

SPECIAL MEETING OF CONVOCATION ON LEGAL  
EDUCATION.

WEDNESDAY, 20TH APRIL 1949.

Present: The Treasurer, and Messrs. Beaton, Bowlby, Brooks, Carson, Cartwright, Cassels, Chitty, Common, Conant, Denison, Evans, Geary, Hays, Jamieson, W. G. Kerr, Marshall, McCarthy, McLaughlin, McTague, Pickup, Rigney, Robinette, Roebuck, Shaver, Walsh and Wilson.

The Treasurer spoke briefly on the purposes for which this Special Meeting of Convocation was called.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON SPECIAL CONVOCATION—Legal Education.

Mr. Pickup, the Chairman of the Special Committee, reported orally on what the Committee had done in sending out copies of the briefs received from the County and District Law Associations and other legal associations, and of a summary thereof prepared by Mr. W. S. Rogers. He stated that thirty-five of the forty-two county and district law associations had filed briefs together with other legal associations in the Province, and that Mr. Rogers had analyzed these briefs and as far as possible grouped the information under headings. Copies of all material had been sent to the Benchers.

Mr. Pickup informed Convocation that there were at the present time 3,470 members of the Law Society in good standing. Of these 3,120 were practising barristers and solicitors, 336 paid Bar fees only, and 14 were solicitors only. The membership of the county and district law associations which had filed briefs (not including Rainy River who had filed its brief late) was 2,620, and of this number those attending the meetings at which the briefs were discussed was 620. In arriving at these last two figures duplications had been deducted.

The Special Committee was of the opinion that it should not attempt to summarize the transcripts of the opinions expressed before the Special Committee on Legal Education. The Committee had further decided, in consideration of the very divergent views expressed in the briefs, not to present any resolution to Convocation, but simply to make the necessary preparation for receiving the material and to analyze it for presentation to Convocation.

Mr. Pickup read to Convocation a resolution received from the Rainy River Law Association.

Mr. Pickup stated that the Special Committee wished to record its thanks to Mr. Rogers for the excellent work he had done in preparing the Report, and its appreciation of the Report and its usefulness.

*Carried.*

#### SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON LAW SCHOOL STAFF.

Mr. Carson reported orally on the efforts made by the Committee to obtain a Dean of the Law School, both here and in England, and stated that the Committee recommended that two Benchers be sent forthwith to England to survey the field there. He also stated that the Committee had considered a revised curriculum and a list of names suggested as part-time lecturers.

The appointment of a Dean and the general principles of legal education were then discussed at length.

Moved by Mr. Jamieson, seconded by Mr. Shaver, that:

WHEREAS at February Convocation the Benchers decided to reconsider their resolution of January 20th relating to Legal Education in Ontario;

AND WHEREAS in order to assist them in their reconsideration the Benchers requested all County and District Law Associations in Ontario and other law organizations to give consideration to the matter and to submit briefs and opinions with regard thereto;

AND WHEREAS 35 of the 42 County and District Law Associations as well as other law organizations have submitted briefs and opinions that disclose a considerable divergence of views, all of which have been carefully reviewed and considered.

AND WHEREAS all briefs submitted affirm the vital necessity of practical office training as a prerequisite to admission of students to the practice of law in Ontario.

AND WHEREAS it is deemed desirable that the broad general principles governing the future of the law school should be clarified before the appointment of a new Dean.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Benchers of the Law Society of Upper Canada in Convocation assembled adopt the following basic principles applicable to future students of the law at Osgoode Hall.

1. The period of training should be four years in the case of graduates with an additional period of from one to two years preliminary service under Articles of Clerkship in the case of students-at-law admitted on Senior Matriculation standing.

2. The instruction in the Law School is to proceed on a system of teaching that gives emphasis to principles of law illustrated by reference to leading cases, somewhat on the pattern of a well-written text book, rather than the so-called case system which puts emphasis on the extraction of principles from a close analysis of numerous cases.

3. That during the law school terms of the first two years students-at-law give their full time to attendance at Law School. The law school curriculum for these two years will consist of introduction to law and broad general principles of law with practice groups and other methods of instruction in practice which can be given in a law school.

4. That during the third year students-at-law must spend their full time in a law office in Ontario under Articles of Clerkship in order to gain practical experience.

5. That during their fourth year students-at-law must attend lectures at Osgoode Hall concurrently serving under Articles of Clerkship in a law office in Toronto, the curriculum in this year to consist of special lectures on specialized subjects.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this Convocation do express its opinion that it is desirable that a post graduate school of law be established in Ontario.

After full discussion the motion was carried.

Moved by Mr. Pickup, seconded by Mr. Evans, that two Benchers to be appointed by the Treasurer be sent to England as soon as possible to engage a Dean of the Law School; and further that they be authorized to engage a full-time lecturer on such terms as they may deem advisable.

*Carried Unanimously.*

The Treasurer referred to the possibility of some form of co-operation with the University of Toronto, and reported that he had had several conversations with Dr. Sidney Smith, President, and that the University of Toronto would appoint a com-

mittee of five for this purpose, and that it seemed advisable now to appoint a committee of Benchers of an equal number.

Moved by Mr. Rigney, seconded by Mr. Hays, that the Treasurer appoint a committee of five or six with the Treasurer as Chairman, to confer with the University of Toronto on matters of legal education.

*Carried.*

Moved by Mr. Shaver, seconded by Mr. Pickup, that the Special Committee on Law School Staff be authorized to engage for a period of one year from June 1, 1949 on such terms as the Committee may decide, such full-time and part-time lecturers as may be required.

*Carried.*

Convocation adjourned to 2 p.m. on Thursday, April 21, 1949.

#### INTER-AMERICAN BAR ASSOCIATION.

At the meeting of Convocation on November 18, 1948 the Treasurer read a letter from Mr. D. L. McCarthy, K.C., with reference to the next Annual Meeting of the Inter-American Bar Association at Detroit, May 22—June 1, 1949. Convocation approved of the suggestion that some entertainment should be offered the delegates to this meeting, and it was ordered that the matter be referred with power to act to a Special Committee consisting of Messrs. McLaughlin (Convener), Cassels, McCarthy and Springsteen.

Arrangements for the meeting have now been changed, and the South American delegates will not be making any side trips in Canada. There will, therefore, be no occasion for the Special

Committee to arrange any function in Toronto. The Essex Law Association is, however, giving an entertainment for the delegates, including wives and children, and it is estimated that the cost will be approximately \$1,500.00. As the Essex Law Association will in effect be hosts on behalf of the profession in Canada, it is understood that the Canadian Bar Association will make a grant of \$500.00 towards the necessary expenses.

As no entertainment will be provided in Toronto, your Committee recommends that the Law Society make a grant to the Essex Law Association of a sum equal to one-third of the cost of the entertainment, provided that the grant does not exceed the sum of \$500.00 in any event.

#### RE PORTRAITS.

Some months ago your Committee recommended that Mr. McLaughlin be authorized to make arrangements for the painting of the portrait of the Treasurer. The Treasurer has now arranged to sit for his portrait by Lilius Torrance Newton. Your Committee approves of these arrangements, and authorizes payment for the painting of the portrait.

THE REPORT WAS ADOPTED.

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#### DISCIPLINE COMMITTEE.

##### LOUIS TAUBE.

At the request of the Chairman, Mr. Pickup, the Vice-Chairman presented the report of the Discipline Committee herein and moved its adoption.

Mr. Pickup read to Convocation a letter dated April 20, 1948 from Mr. G. A. Martin, K.C., counsel for the Solicitor, to the effect that neither the Solicitor nor his Counsel would attend before Convocation.

The Solicitor did not attend nor was he represented by counsel.

The report of the Discipline Committee in the matter of LOUIS TAUBE, Barrister, a member of this Society and a Solicitor of the Supreme Court of Ontario, was adopted.

IT WAS RESOLVED THAT upon the facts ascertained and appearing by the said Report and the evidence and other papers referred



to and submitted to Convocation therewith, Convocation finds the said LOUIS TAUBE guilty of professional misconduct, and of conduct unbecoming a Barrister and Solicitor in respect of the charges dealt with by the said Report.

THAT the said LOUIS TAUBE be suspended from practice as a Barrister and Solicitor for the period of three months from the 21st day of April 1949.

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### UNAUTHORIZED PRACTICE COMMITTEE.

At the request of the Chairman, Mr. Wilson presented the Report.

#### UNAUTHORIZED PRACTICE—Accountants.

Your Committee had before it certain information from the Standing Committee on Unauthorized Practice, American Bar Association, and letters from several Solicitors in Ontario with reference to the incorporation and organization of companies by Accountants. In October 1948 your Committee recommended that this whole question be referred to Mr. J. L. McLennan, K.C., for an opinion and for his recommendations as to whether or not action should be taken under the Solicitors Act.

Mr. McLennan presented a report to the effect that in his opinion the taking of the necessary steps to procure a charter of incorporation of a company and to organize it, and the proffering of the advice on matters of law which are necessarily incidental to that work by a person other than a solicitor on behalf of another for gain or reward constitutes practising or acting as a Solicitor in breach of Section 6 of the Solicitors Act. With this opinion your Committee agreed and recommended that Mr. McLennan make further investigation and report. Your Com-

mittee considered whether or not a reference might be had to the Supreme Court of Ontario rather than by individual prosecutions.

In April 1949 Mr. McLennan presented a further report. Your Committee recommends that he be instructed to interview the officers of the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Ontario and of the Certified Public Accountants (and other Accountants' organizations if necessary) informing them of the complaints and of the other information before the Committee and of the opinion of Counsel with reference to the incorporation and organization of Companies and to see if some plan of co-operation may be arrived at whereby the Associations would restrain their members from unauthorized practice in this connection. Your Committee further recommends that if the Associations or any of them, or individual accountants are not willing to co-operate, that Mr. McLennan be instructed to take proceedings forthwith and in particular against the accounting firms referred to in his letter.

RE NINA E. NEADS, Bowmanville.

In March 1949 your Committee reported fully on the charges laid against Miss Neads and her conviction thereon. Your Committee recommended that a suitable notice be published in O.W.N. and that arrangements be made if possible to have printed in the local Northumberland and Durham papers a notice quoting parts of the Magistrate's decision. These notices have now been published.

Your Committee also recommended that the Secretary write the Attorney-General informing him of the facts of the matter and of the recommendation of the Committee that Miss Neads' commission for taking affidavits be revoked. On April 1st 1949 the Deputy Attorney-General informed the Secretary that the commission of Miss Neads as a commissioner for taking affidavits would be cancelled.

THE REPORT WAS ADOPTED.

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## NOTICE OF MOTION, AMENDMENTS OF RULES.

At the March meeting of Convocation, Mr. Chitty gave notice that at the meeting of Convocation on April 21st he would move that Rule 27(1) be amended by adding a Committee on Public Relations as the eighth Standing Committee.

At the request of Mr. Chitty it was ordered that this matter stand to the May meeting of Convocation.

Mr. Chitty gave notice that at the May meeting he would move that Rule 28(1) be amended by adding thereto the words "except the Public Relations Committee which shall consist of five members"; and that a new Rule 84A be added setting out the powers of the Public Relations Committee.

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SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON LAW SOCIETY CREST—Mr.  
McLaughlin.

On several occasions the Osgoode Hall Legal and Literary Society or committees thereof, have requested the use of the Law Society seal on publications, Christmas cards, dance programmes, and for other purposes. Such a request was before Convocation on

February 17, 1949, and it was ordered that as a matter of policy the use of the Law Society seal be limited to official Law Society matters, or matters arising in Convocation.

It was further ordered that the Treasurer appoint a Special Committee to consider the question of designing a Law Society crest which might be used for other than official occasions.

The Treasurer appointed the following Special Committee on Law Society Crest: Messrs. McLaughlin (Convener), Robinette and Common.

Your Committee obtained from Henry Birks & Sons (Ontario) Ltd. several designs based in a general way on the figures and details of the Law Society seal.

Your Committee now recommends to Convocation the adoption of a Law Society crest as follows: In the centre of the design a doric column, on the dexter side the figure of Hercules, and on the sinister the figure of Justice with scales in her right hand and the sword in the left; at the base of the column a beaver and below, the words—"Osgoode Hall Law School".

Your Committee also recommends that in any case where it is desired to use such Crest for any purposes of the Society other than in connection with Law School activities, that the words "LAW SOCIETY OF UPPER CANADA" be substituted for "OSGOODE HALL LAW SCHOOL".

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## MEETING OF CONVOCATION.

THURSDAY, 19TH MAY, 1949.

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Mr. H. J. McLaughlin, K.C. was appointed Chairman.

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## ELECTION OF TREASURER.

Mr. Gershom William Mason, K.C. was unanimously elected Treasurer for the ensuing year. Mr. Mason then took the Chair and expressed to Convocation his thanks and appreciation on his election for another year. He thanked the Benchers for their loyalty, co-operation and assistance during a year that had demanded much work for many of the Benchers.

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The Minutes of the meeting of Convocation of April 21st were read and confirmed.

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## APPOINTMENT OF DEAN.

Mr. Beaton presented the report on behalf of himself and Mr. Chitty on the appointment of a new Dean. Part of the report follows:—

In pursuance of the authority vested in us by the resolution of Convocation, we advised Smalley-Baker that he had been appointed Dean of the Law School at Osgoode Hall, as of May 3rd, 1949 in accordance with the other terms of the resolution of Convocation, and we advised him that after we had reported to Convocation a contract would be mailed to him for his consideration. We also undertook to find living accommodation in Toronto and to arrange his transportation to Canada.

We gave to Smalley-Baker the resolution passed by Convocation on April 20th last, and explained that Mr. Hamilton

Cassels, K.C., the Chairman of the Legal Education Committee, would communicate with him at an early date with an outline of the new course of study, and his views would be sought. The new Dean is most anxious to be of assistance and to give us the benefit of his long experience in this work.

We also discussed with Sir Norman Birkett, Mr. Frank Gahan and Professor Smalley-Baker the engagement of an additional lecturer, and, after consideration, we decided to leave the choice to Smalley-Baker, as he is fully acquainted with the men available, their ability and capacity to fit into our Law School. We hope to have an announcement to make before September 1st next.

We both were very much impressed with Professor Smalley-Baker. He is a big man, physically and mentally, and, in our view, will admirably fill the role of Dean of the Law School. He is a Canadian, and was born on January 28th, 1891, at the little lumber mills and lime kiln village of Randolph, about five miles from St. John, New Brunswick. He is of United Empire Loyalist descent on both sides. He attended the village school at Randolph and at Fairville, and from 1903 the St. John High School. While in attendance there, his father died in 1904.

After graduating from the High School, he went to Acadia University at Wolfville, Nova Scotia, and took his B.A. there in 1912.

He then went to Harvard Law School, where he came under the personal influence of such great lawyers as Roscoe Pound, Williston and Beale, and took his LL.B. degree in 1915.

Meanwhile the first Great World War had broken out, and he came back to Canada and was commissioned in the 140th Battalion, C.E.F. His Colonel, who seems to have had something of the judgment of Lord Kitchener, told him that the war would last for years, and on his advice Smalley-Baker obtained leave to complete his Harvard Law Course and to pass the New Brunswick Bar Examinations, and was duly admitted as a Barrister to the New Brunswick Bar.

He joined the Nova Scotia Highlanders, and served in the 185th Battalion, then in the 215th, and went over to England with a detachment of reinforcements and served in the 85th Battalion in France. In September 1917, he was invalided back to England, and discharged as medically unfit for further active service.



After doing a considerable amount of Court Martial work, he was sent to organize and become Dean of the Law Department of the Canadian Army Educational Scheme, called the "Khaki University of Canada", with its offices in London, and he enlisted the aid of an Honorary Board of Examiners, including Dr. W. R. Holdsworth, as he then was, of Oxford, Professor H. D. Hazeltine of Cambridge, Mr. Justice R. M. Dennistoun, of the Court of Appeal of Manitoba (then Judge Advocate General of the C.E.F.), and W. Blake Odgers, K.C., of the Inns of Court.

In the term after the Armistice in 1918, he was granted a Rhodes Scholarship of Oxford by the Rhodes Trustees, being interviewed for the purpose by Sir George Parkin, once the Principal of Upper Canada College, Lord Milner and Rudyard Kipling. He entered St. John's College, Oxford, and was elected to a College Exhibition. Five terms afterwards, he took his degree with Distinction in the Honour School of Jurisprudence, and later became an M.A.

He had intended to return to Canada after his Oxford studies were completed, but, as both his grandparents had died during that period, and his mother had gone to live near her two widowed sisters in British Columbia, ties with his old home seemed to be severed, and he decided to remain in England, having been called to the English Bar in the Inner Temple, after brilliant successes in the Bar examinations, including a First and a Certificate of Honour in the Final and winning of the Yarborough Anderson Scholarship of the Inner Temple.

He was married to Miss Mary Hadland in 1921, at the famous Temple Church. They have no children. This old Temple Church, as you all are aware, was almost completely destroyed by enemy action during the last War.

He practised at the Bar in London for four years, when he was appointed, in 1924, to be the first Professor of Law in the University of Birmingham, and has carried on that work there ever since, with great success.

In 1928, he founded a Society of his present and past students, which he called "The Holdsworth Club", after that most distinguished living English jurist, Professor Sir William Holdsworth, O.M., whose monumental "History of English Law" is the greatest piece of English legal scholarship of this century, and who was his tutor at Oxford.

Sir William Holdsworth became the patron of the Club, and Dean Smalley-Baker its life Vice-President. Its annual Presidents have included many of the most illustrious lawyers of our time, including some well known to Canadians, such as Lord Macmillan, Lord Hailsham, Lord Wright, Lord Greene, Lord Simon and Lord Oaksey, who have been guests at the annual meeting of the Canadian Bar Association. Each President has delivered a Presidential Address, which is printed and distributed, and the Holdsworth Club has acquired an international reputation through these addresses, which are regarded as forming a unique contribution to English legal literature.

Professor Smalley-Baker has always interested himself in many extra curricular activities. He has been President of the University Graduates Club of Birmingham, a Governor nominated by the University of Oxford of King Edward VI. School, a Past Master of Canada Lodge in London, and the Founder and first Master of the University of Birmingham Lodge, and two years ago the President of the great Society of Public Teachers of Law.

#### THE REPORT WAS ADOPTED.

Mr. Carson spoke of the splendid work done by Mr. Beaton and Mr. Chitty in obtaining a Dean of such remarkable distinction and referred to the assistance of Mr. Frank Gahan in preparing the way for them and in generously giving time out of a very busy life.

Moved by Mr. Carson, seconded by Mr. McLaughlin, that Convocation record its grateful appreciation of the splendid services rendered to the Society by Mr. Frank Gahan in the selection of a Dean of Osgoode Hall Law School, and that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to Mr. Gahan.

*Carried unanimously.*

Moved by Mr. Pickup, seconded by Mr. Seymour, that a suitable honorarium be sent to Mr. Gahan in recognition of his assistance, and that the amount of the honorarium be referred to a Committee consisting of Messrs. Carson, McLaughlin and the Treasurer.

*Carried.*

On behalf of Convocation the Treasurer thanked Mr. Carson for his work in making arrangements with Mr. Gahan, and stated that Convocation is greatly indebted to him for the time he has given.

*English Barrister.*

*Lionel A. W. Orr*—asks if he may be called to the Bar and/or admitted as a Solicitor in Ontario. In 1930 he was admitted as a Solicitor of the Supreme Court of the Irish Free State, and in 1945 was Called to the Bar by Gray's Inn, London. On 16th March the Committee referred the matter to Mr. Chitty to give

an opinion. Mr. Chitty's opinion and report was submitted to the Committee on 20th April and it was directed that copies of the opinion be sent to all members of the Committee and the matter be considered at this meeting.

Your Committee recommends that Convocation suspend the requirements of Rule 145 in so far as is necessary to permit Mr. Orr to be admitted and enrolled as a Solicitor upon showing that he was duly sworn admitted and enrolled as a Solicitor of the Irish Free State, and that he has been bound by articles of Agreement to a practising solicitor in Ontario to serve and has served him as his clerk for the period of one year.

#### RE ADMISSION.

##### *Graduate Class—School of Physical and Health Education.*

*E. P. Downs*—asks to be admitted as a student-at-law on graduating from the School of Physical and Health Education, University of Toronto. He was on active service from September 1941 to May 1946, serving overseas from 1945 to 1946. Certified Public Accountants Association (and other accountants' organizations if necessary) informing them of the information before the Committee and of the opinion of counsel, and to see if some plan of co-operation may not be arrived at whereby the Associations would restrain their members from unauthorized practice in this connection. Your Committee further recommended that if the Associations or any of them or individual accountants are not willing to co-operate, Mr. McLennan be instructed to take proceedings forthwith.

Mr. McLennan reported that his interviews with the officers of the Institute of Chartered Accountants and the Certified Public Accountants Association were entirely satisfactory, and that both bodies would co-operate with and assist the Society in this matter. One chartered accountant who had incorporated several companies was interviewed, and immediately terminated his work in this field. Mr. McLennan reported that charges had been laid against Everett E. Ott and Ernest William Dunn, neither of whom was a member of the above associations.

Your Committee recommends approval of the action taken to date, including retaining Mr. G. A. Martin, K.C. to assist Mr. McLennan in the prosecutions.

Your Committee recommends that the Chairman be authorized to make representations to the Attorney General against the proclamation of the Act.

That Rule 145 (5) be amended by striking out the words, "that he still remains duly enrolled as such and in good standing", in the fourth and fifth lines, and by adding after the word, "misconduct", in the tenth line, "and if he is no longer so enrolled, the circumstances under which his name was removed

from the Roll", and by striking out the words, "and is still a member in good standing of", in the eleventh and twelfth lines, and by adding after the word, "misconduct", in the sixteenth line "and if he has ceased to be a member", so that the Rule shall read as follows:

"145 (5). The Certificate of Standing in the applicants Law Society shall show that he was duly admitted and enrolled and has been in actual practice as a Solicitor; that since his admission, as aforesaid, no application has been made to any Court or Courts to strike him off the Roll of any Court, or otherwise to disqualify him from practice as such Solicitor, and that no charge is pending against him for professional or other misconduct, and if he is no longer so enrolled, the circumstances under which his name was removed from the roll; or

"that he was duly called to the Bar, and that since his Call no application has been made to disbar or otherwise disqualify him from practice at the Bar of which he claims to be a member, and that no charge is pending against him for professional or other misconduct, and if he has ceased to be a member of such Bar the circumstances under which he ceased to be a member.

## RE GREAT LIBRARY, INSPECTION OF WIRING.

At the January meeting of the Committee it was recommended that an inspection be made of the wiring in the parts of the centre and west wing belonging to or under the control of the Society. In a letter dated May 16th, 1949, the Standard Electric Company Limited reported as follows:

"We have checked the wiring as far as possible, and have found it in better condition than expected. Old open type wiring which is prevalent throughout the old section has been cut dead and replaced with either ABC cable or conduit which is in good shape.

"There was one exception in the American library where wires in loom were run from conduit in the skylight; with the approval

of Mr. Heeney this was replaced by ABC cable run into a conduit box on the beams, and fixtures were suspended on ball aligners.

"This report will tie in with the written survey forwarded to you previously.

"I would say that the wiring is now in good shape."

Necessary repairs were made at the time of the inspection.

Your Committee notes with satisfaction that the wiring in this part of the building is now in good shape, and approves of the necessary repairs made.

#### RE WEST LIBRARY ROOMS, DECORATING.

The Library Committee has had under consideration the cleaning and decorating of the American room, and the west room of the Library and the connecting corridors. At the suggestion of the Vice-Chairman of the Finance Committee and in view of the heavy expense which the Society has had to meet in the present financial year, the Library Committee recommends that the decorating of these rooms be deferred until the next financial year.

Your Committee approves of the recommendation of the Library Committee, but recommends that the ceiling glass in the American room be repaired and cleaned.

Your Committee recommends that the request be granted.

## OSGOODE HALL LEGAL &amp; LITERARY SOCIETY—Re Grant.

A letter is submitted from W. L. N. Somerville, President of the Society, asking that the method of allocating funds for the conduct of the Society's activities—including Obiter Dicta which had to be subsidized this year in the amount of \$300—be revised along the following lines: an additional sum to be charged to each student for his membership in the Society and collected along with his other fees. The grant from the Law Society would take the form of a sum equivalent in aggregate to that contributed directly by the students. The amount of the student fee would be voted on each year at the Spring meeting and certified to the Secretary of the Law Society as applicable to the following year. If this plan meets with approval, the General Meeting just held voted a fee for the next year of \$2.50 per student.

This matter was before the Committee on 20th April and was referred to the Chairman of the Legal Education Committee and the Vice-Chairman of the Finance Committee for consideration and report.

Your Committee recommends that the suggestion be approved in principle; that the Legal and Literary Society be authorized to collect the proposed fee from students and on certification of the amount collected, the Law Society will grant an equal amount not exceeding \$2.50 per student.

With reference to the other two suggestions from the Legal and Literary Society, your Committee wishes to record that there is already a placement service for graduates of the Law School under the supervision of the Secretary, and that a survey of the legal profession in Canada has already been undertaken by the Canadian Bar Association, and recommends that no action be taken by the Society.

## RE EXAMINATIONS—Pass standing on year's work.

A memorandum is submitted from Dean Wright recommending that all Veteran students of the Third year who have failed

in one subject only in their Third year examinations but have attained 55 per cent. or more on their year's work, be granted pass standing in such one subject in which they failed.

The Dean also recommends that Veteran students of the First and Second years who have failed in one subject only in their examinations but have attained a percentage of 40 or better in such subject and have attained 55 per cent. or more on their year's work, be granted pass standing in such one subject in which they failed.

The Dean further recommends that the Faculty be given authority to pass on petitions in the Third year for aegrotat standing in the case of students who for illness or other valid reasons were unable to write at the regular examinations.

Your Committee approves of the recommendations of the Dean, subject to the approval of the Chairman of this Committee in each case.

#### SPECIAL PETITIONS.

Your Committee considered petitions for special relief and made recommendations thereon.

#### RE LAW SCHOOL STAFF; RE CURRICULUM.

A report was submitted by the Chairman.

After consideration of the Chairman's report on the above matters your Committee recommends as follows:

1. The temporary suspension of any Rules necessary to carry out the policy of legal education adopted by Convocation on April 20th 1949.
2. That students of the Matriculant Class be required to serve under articles for a period of two years before attending the Law School.
3. That the Law School year be divided into two terms—Christmas Term of 12 weeks with examinations before Christmas, and an Easter Term of 18 weeks.
4. That students of the Graduate Class be required to serve under articles from September 1st following the completion of their 2nd year in the Law School until Called to the Bar.

### INSPECTION OF LIBRARIES.

Your Committee recommends that the Chief Librarian arrange to have an inspection made of the County Law Libraries by the end of 1949.

### ANNUAL SCHEDULE.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON LEGISLATION—Mr. Walsh.

THE INCOME TAX ACT, Chapter 52, 11-12 George VI.

INCOME TAX APPEAL BOARD.

Section 82(1) of the Act provides that the Minister and the Appellant may appear in person, or may be represented at the hearing by counsel or an agent.

Section 82(3) provides that the Income Tax Appeal Board is a court of record.

Your Committee is of the opinion that it is essential that proceedings before the Board be conducted according to the established rules of evidence; that the provision that parties may appear by agent is contrary to the immemorial rule of law that appearance before a court of record may only be in person or by counsel, and that it is contrary to public interest and the proper administration of justice.

Your Committee wishes to emphasize the fact that members of the profession are officers of the Court and as such have duties and responsibilities to which other persons are not subject.

Your Committee recommends that a request be made to the proper authorities that Section 82(1) of The Income Tax Act be amended by deleting therefrom the words "or an agent", and that the amending legislation be proceeded with as soon as possible.

Your Committee further recommends that for this purpose copies of this report be sent to the Prime Minister of Canada, and the Ministers of Justice, Finance and National Revenue.

Moved by Mr. Walsh, seconded by Mr. Wilson, that the Report be adopted.

*Carried.*

SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON WAR MEMORIAL.

In the absence of the Chairman (Mr. Beaton), the Secretary reported progress as follows:

In November 1947 Mr. Marani suggested that the lower rotunda, centre wing, in the government building would be a beautiful and fitting site for a statue or sculpture of some sort. The Secretary wrote the Minister of Public Works as to whether or not the Government might give permission to erect a statue there if such a plan were decided upon. Mr. Marani, with Mr. Cleeve Horne, the Sculptor, considered the matter for some months, had photographs taken of the site, and the approaches

thereto, and made a rough small-scale model of a proposed sculpture. The photographs with the model superimposed were submitted to the Minister of Public Works. On June 9, 1949, the Minister of Public Works gave permission for the Society to erect the sculpture if it is so decided.

Mr. Marani, the Chairman of this Committee, and the Secretary have all seen the model of the sculpture and thoroughly approved of the idea. Mr. Horne will now prepare a larger and more detailed model for submission to the Special Committee.

If the Committee approves, it is the hope of the Chairman that the work may be put in hand during the coming summer.

The Society owns two portraits of the late Chief Justice Armour, both painted by Sir Wyly Grier, one for the Society, and one painted in the robes of a Justice of the Supreme Court of Canada presented to the Society by the Province of Ontario who received the portrait from Mr. Donald Armour, a grandson of the Chief Justice.

Mr. Stuart Armour, the eldest son of the eldest son of the Chief Justice, asks for the loan to him of the second portrait upon such terms as might be agreeable to the Society. It was recommended that the portrait in question be loaned to Mr. Stuart Armour for the period of his lifetime upon the following conditions:

- A. He is to undertake to keep the portrait in his own possession.
- B. He is to insure the portrait against all risks for the sum of one thousand dollars, in the name of the Law Society of Upper Canada, and through the Society's insurance brokers.
- C. He is to enter into his own bond in favour of the Law Society in the sum of One Thousand Dollars, binding upon himself, his heirs, executors and administrators that the portrait will be returned to the Law Society in good condition within three months after his death.

Moved by Mr. Shaver, seconded by Mr. Davis, that the Report be adopted.

For the purposes of Rule 133 and 134 any person who prior to April 1st, 1949, had been duly sworn, admitted and enrolled as a Solicitor of any of His Majesty's Superior Courts of Law or Equity of Newfoundland or had been called to the Bar of Newfoundland shall be deemed to have been so sworn, admitted, enrolled or called in a Province of the Dominion of Canada."

That Rule 144(2) be amended by striking out the words, "and is still a member in good standing of", in the third line and by adding at the end thereof, "and if he has ceased to be a member of such Bar, the circumstances under which he ceased to be a member", so that the Rule shall read as follows:

"144(2). The Certificate of Standing in the applicant's Law Society shall show that the applicant was duly called to his Bar, and that since his Call no application has been made to disbar or otherwise disqualify him from practice at the Bar of which he claims to be or to have been a member and that

no charge is pending against him for professional or other misconduct, and if he has ceased to be a member of such Bar, the circumstances under which he ceased to be a member."

That Rule 145(5) be amended by striking out the words, "that he still remains duly enrolled as such and in good standing", in the fourth and fifth lines, and by adding after the word, "misconduct", in the tenth line, "and if he is no longer so enrolled, the circumstances under which his name was removed from the Roll", and by striking out the words, "and is still a member in good standing of", in the eleventh and twelfth lines, and by adding after the word "misconduct", in the sixteenth line "and if he has ceased to be a member of such Bar the circumstances under which he ceased to be a member", so that the Rule shall read as follows:

"145(5). The Certificate of Standing in the applicant's Law Society shall show that he was duly admitted and enrolled and has been in actual practice as a Solicitor; that since his admission, as aforesaid, no application has been made to any Court or Courts to strike him off the Roll of any Court, or otherwise to disqualify him from practice as such Solicitor, and that no charge is pending against him for professional or other misconduct, and if he is no longer so enrolled, the circumstances under which his name was removed from the roll: or

"that he was duly called to the Bar, and that since his Call no application has been made to disbar or otherwise disqualify him from practice at the Bar of which he claims to be or to have been a member, and that no charge is pending against him for professional or other misconduct, and if he has ceased to be a member of such Bar the circumstances under which he ceased to be a member.

"In case any such application has been made, the applicant shall set forth the facts and circumstances and show the result."

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## LEGAL EDUCATION.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE TO CONFER WITH THE  
UNIVERSITY OF TORONTO

Mr. Jamieson for the Special Committee, reported on the conversations and conferences, which had taken place to date, and read to Convocation a memorandum from the University of Toronto dated May 3, 1949.

He then read to Convocation a memorandum prepared by the Special Committee in reply to the memorandum of the University of Toronto and dated June 29, 1949 as follows:

# MEMORANDUM.

The Law Society of Upper Canada has had the opportunity of giving consideration to the memorandum from the University of Toronto, dated May 3, 1949, and has the following comments to make regarding its contents:

1. The Law Society of Upper Canada notes with appreciation that in paragraph 5 of its memorandum the University of Toronto recognizes the fact that the Law Society has the right to regulate Call to the Bar and enrollment of solicitors. The Law Society of Upper Canada would add that such right carries with it the corresponding responsibility to ensure in the public interest that those Called to the Bar and enrolled as solicitors in Ontario have the necessary character, cultural and legal (both academic and practical) qualifications.
4. The Law Society does not admit students to the course at the Osgoode Hall Law School on bare senior matriculation standing as set out in paragraph 4 of the memorandum of the University of Toronto. It is convenient to restate the nature of the course now established by the Law Society and the standing required of students for admission to the first year thereof.

The course at the Osgoode Hall Law School requires:

- (a) full time attendance during the first and second years at the Osgoode Hall Law School.
  - (b) full time service under Articles of Apprenticeship with a solicitor during the third year at any place in Ontario.
  - (c) service under Articles of Apprenticeship with a solicitor, with concurrent attendance at the Osgoode Hall Law School during the fourth year.
3. Admission to the first year at the Osgoode Hall Law School requires:
    - (a) Character qualifications satisfactory to the Law Society of Upper Canada, and
    - (b) Graduation from a university recognized by, and in a course and with standing acceptable to, the Law Society of Upper Canada, or

- (c) Senior Matriculation in the subjects prescribed by the Law Society with standing of at least 60% in each subject, together with full time service under Articles of Apprenticeship with a solicitor any place in Ontario for two years preceding attendance at the first year of the Osgoode Hall Law School, together with passing the examinations set by the Osgoode Hall Law School in prescribed extramural subjects.
4. Admission to the third year of the Osgoode Hall Law School course by a graduate of a recognized university in a recognized law course, will depend on:
- (a) Character qualifications satisfactory to the Law Society of Upper Canada;
  - (b) The entrance qualifications on which the student was accepted in the recognized law course at the recognized University having been (in the opinion of the Law Society of Upper Canada) equal to or higher than the entrance requirements for first year at the Osgoode Hall Law School.
  - (c) The examinations passed by the student in the recognized law course at the recognized University having (in the opinion of the Law Society of Upper Canada) given to him standing in all subjects of the curriculum for the first two years at the Osgoode Hall Law School at least equivalent to that required to enable a student at the Osgoode Hall Law School to enter the third year.
5. Relating the proposal contained in paragraph 6 of the memorandum of the University of Toronto to this memorandum, it would be hoped that the curriculum and the teaching and the examinations set for the three years of the University of Toronto's proposed course leading to the degree of Bachelor of Laws, would enable a student graduated from that course, subject to character qualifications, to be admitted without further examination to the third year of the Osgoode Hall Law School course, provided that such student had entered the proposed law course at the University of Toronto as a graduate of a university recognized by and in a course and with a standing approved by the Law Society of Upper Canada.



6. The Law Society of Upper Canada expects that the University of Toronto will bring to the attention of students applying for admission to the first year of the new law course at the University of Toronto, the requirements governing entrance to the Osgoode Hall Law School and later, call to the bar and enrollment as a solicitor in Ontario.
7. The Law Society of Upper Canada recognizes that it is not the present intention of the University of Toronto to establish a post graduate Law School, but wishes to assert the desire of the Law Society to co-operate in any possible way with the University in the establishment of a post graduate Law School, the desirability of which is recognized.
8. The Law Society of Upper Canada appreciates the expression of opinion by the University of Toronto that some measure of liaison and co-operation will be required between the University and the Law Society, and welcomes the assurance of the University that it stands ready to play its full part in this regard. The Law Society of Upper Canada suggests the continuance of a joint committee, and further suggests early continuance of meetings to examine the details necessarily related to the principles set forth in this memorandum.

DATED at Toronto this 29th day of June 1949.

Moved by Mr. Jamieson, seconded by Mr. Pickup, that the memorandum of the Special Committee be approved and adopted by Convocation, that a copy of the memorandum be sent first to the Chairman of the University of Toronto Committee, and at a later date sent to the other universities of Ontario; and that a copy of the memorandum be referred to the Committee on Public Relations for such action as it may decide.

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The Treasurer and Benchers, with the Honourable Mr. Garson and Mr. J. T. Hackett, K.C., then proceeded to Convocation Hall and took their places on the dais. The body of the Hall was occupied by the graduating students and their friends.

The Honourable Mr. Garson was then presented by Mr. Hamilton Cassels, K.C., in these words:

“Mr. Treasurer, I have the honour of presenting to you and to the Benchers of the Law Society of Upper Canada for Call to the Bar of Ontario, the Right Honourable Stuart Sinclair Garson, Minister of Justice and Attorney-General of Canada.”

The Treasurer then conferred upon Mr. Garson the degree of Barrister-at-Law, and called him to the Bar of Ontario.

He obtained his senior matriculation at the St. Stephen Collegiate High School in Hungary in 1940; attended the Law School in Budapest and obtained a diploma of Law from the Law Faculty of the Peter Pazmany University in November 1946, and served under articles in Budapest from 1st March 1945 to 1st March 1948. He has filed Declaration of Intention to become a Canadian citizen dated 21st March 1949. On 20th April 1949 the Committee recommended that in the special circumstances and pursuant to the powers granted under Section 43(a) of the Law Society Act, the applicant be admitted as a student of the Matriculant Class on production of acceptable evidence as to character; and that the applicant be warned that he must be a British Subject before Call to the Bar and admission as a solicitor. Convocation adopted the recommendation.

The applicant has now filed the required admission papers, including Articles of Clerkship to D. E. W. Tisdale, K.C., of Simcoe, and has filed 5 letters of character from persons who have known him since his arrival in Canada, including his uncle Paul Rapai, farmer of Delhi.

Your Committee recommends that no such examinations be required of Matriculant Students in the new course during their first, second and fifth years.

## UNAUTHORIZED PRACTICE COMMITTEE—Mr. Walsh.

## COLLECTION AGENCIES.

Your Committee had before it certain letters from collection agencies to debtors, some of which letters used language to the effect that the agency would "issue a writ" or "take legal action". As a result of certain information submitted by the Secretary, the Registrar of Collection Agencies suggested that if your Committee approved he might send a letter to all collection agencies warning them to avoid the use of language that might indicate to anyone that they were solicitors or entitled in any way to practice law. On September 29, 1949, the Registrar wrote to all collection agencies as follows:

"It has come to the attention of the Department that several agencies in writing letters to debtors demanding payment of accounts have stated that unless payment is made by a certain date, a 'writ' or 'writ of summons' will be 'filed', 'issued', or 'taken out'.

"Inasmuch as the large majority of claims come within the jurisdiction of Division Court, the term 'writ' or 'writ of summons' is not properly used in such letters, and instead the term 'summons' should be used, merely stating (as is done by most collection agencies) that unless payment is made 'a summons will be issued'.

"Furthermore in all cases involving amounts coming within the jurisdiction of County or District Courts, or the Supreme Court, and where it would be appropriate to refer to a 'writ' being issued, care must be exercised to avoid any language either in the collection letter or given personally that might indicate to the debtor that the collection agency is a solicitor or entitled in any way to 'issue a writ'. In such cases the more appropriate method would be to advise the debtor that 'our solicitor will be instructed to issue a writ'.

"Please bear this letter in mind in reprinting any form letters that might be in violation of the above instructions, and let me have your undertaking by return mail that these instructions will be followed."

On October 31st the Registrar informed the Secretary that since the circular letter went out to the agencies, he had re-

ceived an undertaking from a large number of the agencies as requested.

Your Committee approves of the action taken herein, and wishes to record its appreciation of the co-operation of the Registrar of Collection Agencies.

*Taxation, Wills—Third Year.*

The Dean submits the following memorandum herein:

*Lectures in Succession Duty.*

The number of hours allotted to the subject of Taxation for Third Year students this term in the course given by Mr. J. L. Stewart, M.B.E., B.A., are insufficient for him to deal adequately with all the different aspects of the subject.

The Dean recommends that Mr. Terence Sheard be invited to deliver as many lectures on Succession Duty as he is willing to give, and, if he has time, and subject to the approval of Mr.

Willes Chitty, to devote the remainder of his lectures to practical advice to the Third Year students on points in the drafting of Wills, as regards these matters, from his experience as an executor and trustee.

There will be difficulties in time-tabling these lectures. By the present time-table only Saturday is vacant, and Mr. Sheard could only lecture at 10:00 on that morning. This would mean that the students, all of whom are articulated, would not reach their offices until after 11:00 for a very short morning's work.

Mr. Sheard would be willing to lecture from Saturday, February 11th, until the end of the lecturing term on April 28th—13 lectures.

Your Committee approves of the Dean's recommendations and the matter is referred to the Vice-Chairman and the Dean to work out the details.

#### DEPARTMENT OF VETERANS AFFAIRS—*Allowances.*

The question of payment to students during the Third Year of the new four year course was before your Committee in September and October 1949 and your Committee recommended that the matter be referred to the Chairman with power to act and that he be authorized if he considered it necessary to attend on the Minister at Ottawa with the President of the Osgoode Hall Legal and Literary Society at the expense of the Law Society.

In August 1949 the Toronto office of the D.V.A. issued the following directive to its counselling staff:

"Toronto 1, August 11th 1949.

To: Counselling Staff

Subject: *New Osgoode Hall Course*

File No.: 66-9-5

This new Osgoode Hall course which commences this fall consists of four years of work of which the first two are entirely academic, the third is entirely training on the job, and the fourth is a combination of both types of training.

Some time ago, I requested Head Office to inform us of the policy to be followed concerning extension beyond entitlement in this course. No formal directive has yet been issued but the matter was discussed with Mr. H. W. Jamieson dur-

ing his visit to the district this week, and I was informed that it was expected that the following policy would apply:

1. If the Veteran has sufficient service entitlement to cover the full four years of the course, appropriate allowances will be paid throughout.

2. If the Veteran has sufficient entitlement to carry him through the first three years of the course but not the entire fourth year, he may elect to be paid allowances, if required, for such period of the third year as remains after reserving sufficient entitlement to cover the fourth year of the course.

3. If he has sufficient service entitlement for the first two years plus a balance not sufficient to cover the fourth year, he can earn extension beyond entitlement to complete the fourth year by obtaining top quarter standing in the second year examinations. It should be made clear that such extension will not cover any portion of the third year training on the job.

It is assumed that the regulations which give a pensioner unlimited entitlement, so long as he passes his examinations, will apply to the Osgoode Hall course and entitle the pensioner to payment of allowances if required during the T.O.J. Period.

In December 1949 Mr. Cassels had a long interview with Mr. H. W. Jamieson of D.V.A. Headquarters staff and Mr. Whitten, District Supervisor of Training Services in Toronto. The above directive was discussed at length. As a result of this interview Mr. Cassels was strongly of the opinion that it would be inadvisable to press at the present time, for a ruling in regard to the granting of allowances on the basis of examination standing during the period spent entirely in office work. The Chairman therefore recommends that this matter be taken up with the D.V.A. Toronto office in January 1951.

The above directive and the results of Mr. Cassels' interview with officials of the D.V.A. have been communicated to repre-



sentatives of the student body and they agree with Mr. Cassels' recommendation.

Your Committee recommends that this matter stand until January 1951.

### BAR ONLY.

In October last the Committee on Unauthorized Practice recommended to the Finance Committee that a survey be made of the status of members of the Society who do not pay fees to the Society and whose record sheets are presently in "Past Records"; and an inquiry as to the occupation of all members of the Society who pay Bar Fees only; and requested that the Finance Committee consider the question of whether representations should be made to the Attorney-General requesting the revocation of the appointment as notary public or commissioners of such persons as are not in practice or in legal positions, unless such appointments are in the public interest. The report was adopted, and the recommendation is before this Committee for consideration.

## INSPECTION.

Your Committee reports that the Report of the Chief Librarian on the inspection by himself and the Assistant Librarian, of the county libraries, has been presented and that copies are being sent to the county associations.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON LEGISLATION—MR. WALSH.  
RE INCOME TAX ACT (DOMINION).

On June 16, 1949 the Committee had before it for consideration a letter and brief on the above Act from the Board of Trade, Toronto, and letters from the Bar of the Province of Quebec and from the Bar of Montreal with certain enclosures dealing with the above Act. All three communications referred to representations to be made to the proper Ministers requesting amendment to the Income Tax Act by deleting from Section 82(1) the words "or an agent", and seeking the introduction of legislation for amendment of the said Act at the earliest possible date. This section refers to appearance before the Income Tax Appeal Board. The Committee approved of these recommendations, and recommended that representations of a similar nature be made to the proper authorities. The Secretary then wrote to the Prime Minister of Canada, the Ministers of Justice, Finance and National Revenue. All of these letters apparently were finally referred to the Minister of Finance.

On November 30th the Minister of Finance wrote as follows:

"I wish to acknowledge your letter of November 24th in which you refer to our previous correspondence concerning a suggested amendment of section 82(1) of The Income Tax Act.

"I gave careful study to your suggestion that the words 'or an agent' should be deleted from this section but I came to the conclusion that I could not recommend such a change to Parliament at this time."

Your Committee recommends that this matter be referred to Mr. MacTavish with the request that he interview the Minister of Finance and make further representations with reference to the proposed amendment of section 82(1); and that Mr. MacTavish be authorized if he so desires, to consult with and retain counsel.

RE BANKRUPTCY ACT, 1949 (DOMINION).

During the recent revision of this Act representations with reference to many sections were made by the Law Society through its counsel, Mr. Lee A. Kelley, K.C. At that time no mention was made of any increase in the tariff provided by the Act. By direction of the Chairman, counsel was instructed

to take this matter up with the Chairman of the House of Commons Committee and the new Superintendent of Bankruptcy. After consulting with both of these officials, Mr. Kelley informed the Secretary that he was satisfied to leave the matter of tariff increases to the new Superintendent to be dealt with when the Rules are revised. He reported fully on the matter to the Chairman of the House of Commons Committee, but decided that he would not make further representations to the Chairman or the Committee.

Your Committee recommends that the action of the Chairman and of counsel herein be approved and confirmed, and that counsel be requested to keep the matter in mind and to make such further recommendations to the Superintendent as may be necessary.

#### REVISION OF STATUTES, ONTARIO.

On November 18, 1949, L. R. MacTavish, K.C., Legislative Counsel, informed the Secretary that a consolidation and revision of the Statutes was under way pursuant to the Statutes Consolidation Act 1949. He stated that most of the Acts had been reviewed, including The Law Society Act, The Barristers Act, and The Solicitors Act. He suggested it would be desirable for the Society to assign someone to go over these Acts with him and suggest other possible changes in order to insure the best possible results within the terms of the reference. Within the terms of the reference Mr. MacTavish had made certain changes in the interests of uniformity and clarity.

On November 22, 1949, as the Chairman of this Committee was not available, the Treasurer and the Secretary read the three revised Acts, discussed them in detail with Mr. MacTavish, approved of the changes made by him with certain further revisions.

Your Committee recommends that the action of the Treasurer and Secretary be approved and confirmed.

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#### SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON MEMORIAL TO THE LATE PETER WHITE, K.C.

Mr. Geary presented the Report of the Special Committee appointed to prepare a Memorial to the late Peter White, K.C.,



and it was ordered that it be recorded in the Minutes of Convocation and a copy sent to Mr. Peter White, Jr.

MEMORIAL  
TO  
THE LATE PETER WHITE, K.C.

A distinguished and highly regarded member of the Bar and of this Bench passed away at Toronto on November twenty-sixth 1949, in the person of Peter White, B.A., LL.B., K.C. The Benchers of the Law Society of Upper Canada in Convocation assembled, desiring to have in their Minutes an expression of their feeling of sorrow in the loss of their colleague, now adopt this Memorial.

Peter White at the time of his death was in his seventy-eighth year. He was born in the Town of Pembroke, the son of Andrew Thompson White and Mary (Ranson) White and so was a member of a family prominent in the affairs of the Dominion of Canada and particularly of that part of it spoken of as the Ottawa Valley. After graduating from the University of Toronto and Osgoode Hall Law School he commenced the practice of law in Pembroke and in a short time assumed a commanding position at the Bar and in the political life of his Town and County becoming Mayor of the Town and Warden of the County of Renfrew. In 1916 he moved to Toronto and entered the firm of Bain, Bicknell, White and Bristol, of which firm he became in time (1932) the senior partner and so remained until 1945 when he became Counsel to the firm now named White, Bristol, Gordon, Beck and Phipps. He had a very large practice and was engaged as Counsel in many important cases. In addition he was called on to act as Counsel for the Select Committee of the House of Commons, investigating the Beauharnois Power project, 1931, for the Royal Commission investigating the loss of the "Gypsum Queen" and for the Commissioner investigating the affairs of the Toronto Transportation Commission.

Peter White was elected Benchers in 1936 and from that time until his activity was curtailed by illness, had a large part in carrying on the affairs of the Law Society of Upper Canada; he was Chairman of the Discipline Committee (1941-1944), Chairman of the Finance Committee (1944-1949), and at all



times was devoted to the interests of the lawyer and student members of the Society.

Through all this he had the affection and respect of his fellow-members of the Bench who are as one in mourning his loss.

Mr. White whose wife, formerly Kate E. Lloyd, predeceased him, had one son Peter White, Jr., and two daughters (Mrs.) Mary Earla Lloyd Chisholm and (Mrs.) Mary Cecilia McGill to whom the members of Convocation would express the heartfelt sympathy they feel for them in their bereavement.

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#### SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON WAR MEMORIAL—MR. BEATON.

Since its appointment in March 1946 your Committee has given serious consideration to several suggestions for a war memorial, including wrought iron gates for the Great Library with plaques on either side for the Roll of Honour; a statue or monument in the grounds south of the roadway; a series of battle pictures to be hung in the Society building; a memorial assembly hall, gymnasium or swimming pool; bronze doors in the Great Library with a marble strip to the south windows and a statue against the south wall facing the doors; a war memorial in the form of an arcade with appropriate panels for the Roll of Honour if the memorial hall plan were proceeded with; memorial fire-place on the west wall with appropriate statue and panels above.

After consideration of these various suggestions they were discarded for structural or artistic reasons.

Early in 1946 your Committee decided to consult an architect, and retained Mr. F. H. Marani, F.R.A.I.C., R.C.A., and had the benefit of his advice on the various suggestions.

In November 1947 Mr. Marani suggested that the lower rotunda of the centre wing of Osgoode Hall would be a beautiful and natural setting for a war memorial in the form of a statue with appropriate base. He asked and was given authority to consult Mr. Cleeve Horne, President of the Ontario Society of Artists, a sculptor and portrait painter, with reference to the proposed statue.

In November 1947 the Secretary, on the instructions of the Committee, wrote the Minister of Public Works with reference

to the proposal, and asking if his Department would favourably consider allowing the Law Society to erect a statue on government property. The Minister later submitted an alternate proposal, but finally, in June 1949, the Minister gave the consent of his Department to the erection of the statue if Convocation so decided.

In the meantime Mr. Horne had photographs made of the proposed site of the statue, and in the spring of 1949 presented his idea to Mr. Marani, the Chairman of your Committee, and the Secretary.

He had on view in his studio an 8-inch model of the figure he planned for the memorial. Mr. Marani, the Chairman and the Secretary were so favourably impressed with the model and with the conception of the artist, that they requested him to produce a larger scale model for inspection by the members of your Special Committee. By the autumn of 1949 Mr. Horne had completed a 3-foot model of the statue which was inspected by the Treasurer and Messrs. Beaton, Cassels and McLaughlin, and the Secretary. All members of the Committee, with the exception of Mr. Cartwright who was out of town, were most favourably impressed, and decided to report to Convocation forthwith. Mr. Horne's proposal consists of a life-size figure of a young woman holding aloft in her arms a young child. The figure with child will be 7 feet high, and will be mounted on a granite base so that the height of the memorial will be approximately 12 feet. The names on the honour roll will appear on the two sides of the granite base, and on the face will be an appropriate inscription. The figure is designed to express youth and hope in the future, and gives almost the impression of flight. In the artist's own words, "As opposed to the conventional conception of grief or sorrow, I have endeavoured to envisage a memorial imbued with the expectation of a new life; in appreciation of those who gave their lives in the hope that we, and the generations to come, may live without fear or oppression." A photograph of the original 8-inch scale model and of the 3-foot model are submitted to Convocation with this report.

Subject to the acceptance by Convocation of the cost your Committee recommends approval of the plans as submitted, and authority to instruct the architect and artist to proceed with the completion and erection of the war memorial.

THE REPORT WAS ADOPTED.

## SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON CONTINUING EDUCATION OF THE BAR.

In the absence of the Chairman, Mr. Shaver presented the Report:

At the Meeting of Convocation on November 17, 1949, Mr. Jamieson referred to the special courses of lectures given by the Law Society in 1943 and 1944, and spoke of the desirability and of the demand by the profession for another course of lectures for the coming winter. It was moved by Mr. Jamieson, seconded by Mr. Walsh, and carried, that the Treasurer be authorized to appoint a Special Committee to inquire into and make recommendations to Convocation at its January meeting, for provision of continuing education for members of the legal profession after graduation from Law School by way of special lectures, refresher courses, or otherwise.

The Treasurer appointed the following Special Committee on Continuing Education of the Bar:—Messrs. Pickup (Chairman), Jamieson, Beaton, Davis and Shaver.

Your Committee has met on three occasions, and given careful consideration to the questions involved. In December your Committee sent a letter to each of the County Law Associations outlining its preliminary plans, and asking for information and suggestions. Replies were received from nineteen Associations, and valuable suggestions were made for consideration if courses are given in future years.

Your Committee agrees in principle, and recommends that a course of lectures be given this winter, one lecture a day for two weeks of five days each; this year to be experimental, with the idea that a course of lectures might be given each year.

Your Committee recommends—

1. As the subject for this year's course—*Company Law*, including incorporation, company practice, departmental regulations, corporate finance, corporate taxation, etc.

2. That for the course this year lectures be held at Osgoode Hall at 4:15 p.m., March 13-17th, and March 20-24th inclusive.

3. That your Committee be authorized to employ suitable lecturers at fees to be determined by your Committee; to have the lectures printed or mimeographed and made available to all members of the profession in Ontario, and to fix the charge therefor.



4. That a registration fee of \$10.00 be fixed for attendance at the course of lectures, such registration fee to include a copy of the printed or mimeographed lectures.

Your Committee has under consideration certain lecturers for the course this year.

Your Committee recommends, if lectures are given in future years, that the following subjects be considered: Wills—Estates—Costs—Torts—Taxation—Insurance—Bankruptcy—Conflict of Laws (between provinces),—and Domestic Relations, including divorce.

Your Committee recommends that Mr. L. E. Blackwell, K.C. be added as a member of your Special Committee.

Moved by Mr. Shaver, seconded by Mr. Beaton, that the Report be adopted.

Moved in amendment by Mr. Jamieson, seconded by Mr. Willmott, that the recommendation of the Special Committee as to dates of holding the special lectures be altered, and that the course of lectures be held on two consecutive week-ends, Thursday, Friday and Saturday, March 16th, 17th and 18th, and Friday and Saturday, March 24th and 25th, and that the hours of lectures and other details be referred to the Special Committee.

The amendment was carried.

THE REPORT, AS AMENDED, WAS ADOPTED.

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#### SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON LEGAL AID.

As Mr. Chitty, the Chairman, was engaged in presenting the candidates for Call to the Bar to the Court, the Secretary read a memorandum reporting progress of this Committee, and stating that the Committee had circularized the County and District Law Associations, the County Court Judges, the Magistrates and the Local Registrars for information on this subject, and that further information would be obtained from the Director of the Survey of the Legal Profession in Canada who had circularized the public and private welfare organizations. When this information is received, the Committee will report further to Convocation.

THE REPORT WAS RECEIVED.

## DINNER TO THIRD YEAR STUDENTS.

The holding of the annual dinner for the graduating year was considered by the Committee. There are 191 students in the Third Year.

Your Committee recommends that the dinner be given as usual, and that the matter be referred to the Chairman and Vice-Chairman to make all necessary arrangements and with power to act.

## ORAL EXAMINATIONS 1950.

### *Second and Third Years.*

The question of the date for holding the oral examinations for Second and Third Years was considered by the Committee. Last year the orals for the Third Year were held during the week of 28th March, and for the Second Year during the week of April 4th, 1949.

Your Committee approves of corresponding dates—Third Year, the week of March 27th, and Second Year the week of April 3rd, 1950, and otherwise refers the matter with power to act to the Chairman or Vice-Chairman, and the Dean.

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### EXAMINATION FOR MATRICULANT STUDENTS.

Under the former five year course students of the Matriculant Class were required during the two years when they were serving full time with their Solicitors, to write examinations on prescribed texts. On 20th October 1949, Convocation adopted the Committee's recommendation that no such examinations be required of Matriculant students in the new course during their First, Second and Fifth Years.

The Dean recommends that the practice of requiring students of the Matriculant Class to study set books during their First and Second Years and to pass an examination therein, be revived.

Your Committee approves of the Dean's recommendation to apply to all Matriculant students, effective September 1st, 1950, the choice of texts and other details to be referred to the Dean and the Secretary.

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### MARKING OF EXAMINATION PAPERS AND PUBLICATION OF RESULTS.

The Dean submits a memorandum recommending certain changes in the marking of examination papers and publication of the results, as follows: That—

(a) The Pass standard in each subject in the Law School is such an adequate knowledge of this part of the law that if the



student knows the other subjects equally well, he is a fit person to be recommended to the Benchers of the Law Society for Call to the Bar and admission as a Solicitor, with full confidence that he is competent to advise his clients with adequate knowledge and judgment, and to conduct their legal business with proper skill and efficiency.

(b) Any numerical marks in each paper should be filed in the confidential records in the office and whenever required by the Legal Education Committee be communicated to it.

(c) That the examination results be published as follows:

- (1) As soon as may be, after the examinations written at Christmas, the results in each subject be posted on the notice board as a simple "Pass List" with the names arranged alphabetically.
- (2) A similar list be so published for each of the subjects of the examinations written in May.
- (3) After the marks of all the papers taken in that year are collated, a list of those who have obtained "Honours" taking into account the whole year's work shall be posted on the notice board, with the names arranged in order of merit.
- (4) (As long as D.V.A. aid continues) a list of those students who have been placed in the "First 25% of the Class," on the year's work, be posted with the names arranged in order of merit.

(d) There should be no list of those who have failed.

(e) The present provisions respecting re-reading of examination papers be repealed.

Your Committee approves and adopts the Dean's recommendations.

MONTHLY STATEMENT—January 1950.

The usual monthly statement was presented and approved.

## COMMON ROLL.

JOSEPH ABRAMSKY has discontinued his Law School course, and has been granted a refund of part of his admission fee.

Your Committee recommends that his name be removed from the Common Roll.

## RE FIRE SAFETY, OSGOODE HALL.

On February 2nd, A. D. DesRoches, of the Fire Marshal's Staff, made an interim report on his inspection of Osgoode Hall buildings, and made certain recommendations. With the approval of Messrs. McLaughlin and Shaver, two of the three members of the Sub-Committee on Insurance, Mr. Heeney has been instructed to obtain as soon as possible the following equipment, and otherwise to carry out the recommendations:

- (a) 5—5 gallon water pump tank extinguishers.
- (b) 4—15 lb. carbon dioxide gas extinguishers.
- (c) 2—flame-proof blankets.
- (d) CO<sub>2</sub> equipment presently installed to be weighed and date and weight recorded.
- (e) Pump tanks to be refilled, and pumps serviced.
- (f) Soda and acid extinguishers to be recharged with last recharge date marked.

Your Committee recommends that the action taken by the Sub-Committee on Insurance be approved and confirmed, and that the reports and recommendations of the Fire Marshal be referred to the Sub-Committee on Insurance for necessary action.

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STUDENTS' COFFEE SHOP.

At the last meeting of the Committee following a report by Messrs. Wilson and Beaton, to whom this matter had been referred, the Committee recommended that the matter stand for consideration in the autumn of 1950 if the coffee shop is still desired by the students.

Since that time further information has been brought to the attention of Messrs. Wilson and Beaton, and also of the Treasurer and Messrs. McLaughlin and Cassels. In view of the request by the student body for this service, the above members

of the Committee agreed that instructions should be given to Mr. Heeney to have the coffee shop installed.

Your Committee recommends that the matter be referred to Messrs. Wilson and Beaton with power to act.

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#### CONFERENCE OF THE GOVERNING BODIES OF THE LEGAL PROFESSION IN CANADA.

At the Mid-Winter Meeting of the Executive of the Conference it was decided to request a grant for 1950 for the work of the Conference, *i.e.* a grant of \$200.00 from the Canadian Bar Association, \$100.00 from the Law Society of Upper Canada, \$25.00 from the Law Society of Prince Edward Island, and \$50.00 from each of the other provincial Societies and the Board of Notaries of Quebec.

Your Committee recommends that a grant of \$100.00 be made to the Conference for the year 1950.

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#### ARREARS OF ANNUAL FEES.

The Secretary submits a list of those members in arrears showing seventy-eight (78) in arrears for Barristers and Solicitors fees, of whom fourteen (14) are in arrears for more than one year; and forty-nine (49) in arrears for Bar Fee only, of whom eight (8) are in arrears for more than one year.

Consideration of the serving of a Notice of Suspension on those members in arrears for more than one year is before the Committee for consideration.

Your Committee recommends that a letter be written to all members in arrears for fees for a period of more than one year, informing them that unless their arrears are paid forthwith, a notice will be served on them notifying them that a resolution as to their suspension from practice will be considered at the March meeting of Convocation.

Mr. McLaughlin moved the adoption of the Report.

Mr. Wilson reported to Convocation that since the meeting of the Finance Committee on the 14th instant, a further suggestion

with reference to the Students' Coffee Shop had been made and had been approved by Mr. Heeney and Miss Lennox. He suggested that the Finance Committee Report be amended to the effect that this matter be referred to Messrs. Wilson and Beaton with power to act. The Report so amended was adopted.

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#### FIRE SAFETY, OSGOOD HALL.

Mr. Shaver referred to this matter, which was covered in the Report of the Finance Committee, and stated that the Law Society had carried out the recommendations of the Fire Marshal in his 1943 Report and his recommendations in the temporary Report of February 1950; but pointed out that the Department of Public Works had not carried out all the recommendations of the Fire Marshal of 1943. He suggested that a letter be written to the Minister of Public Works referring to those matters of fire safety which had not been implemented, and requesting action, and that a copy of the letter be sent to the Premier of Ontario.

Moved by Mr. Shaver, seconded by Mr. McLaughlin, that the letter as suggested be written to the Minister of Public Works.

Following the adoption by Convocation of its Report of January 16, 1950, and of an amendment as to the times of holding the special course of lectures, your Committee found it advisable to make certain changes in the plans as reported to Convocation.

Your Committee has now arranged and made announcement of a course of lectures as follows:

Notices have been and will be printed in Osgoode Hall news, the Globe and Mail, announcing the course of lectures and referring members of the profession to details in the Ontario Weekly Notes.

A notice giving the schedule of lectures and names of lecturers, etc., will appear in Ontario Weekly Notes of February 17th and several subsequent numbers.

A notice with the above information was sent to all Benchers, and to the lecturers of the special course.

Letters have been sent to all County and District Law Associations and the other legal organizations in Ontario, outlining the course and asking that it be brought to the attention of their members.

# SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON LEGISLATION.

Mr. Walsh presented the Report of the Special Committee on Legislation:

## BANKRUPTCY ACT.

On January 19th the Secretary reported that by direction of the Chairman, Mr. Lee A. Kelley, K.C., of Ottawa, had been instructed to take up the matter of increased tariff with the Chairman of the House of Commons Committee and Mr. Thomas D. MacDonald, K.C., the new Superintendent of Bankruptcy.

The Committee recommended that the action of the Chairman and of Counsel herein be approved and confirmed, and that Counsel be requested to keep the matter in mind and to make such further recommendations to the Superintendent as may be necessary.

Counsel was so instructed, and on February 9th wrote the Secretary as follows:

"I had a call to-day from Mr. MacDonald, and he states he is now in a position to proceed with the revision of the tariff under the Bankruptcy Act.

"I do not know whether your Committee has given this matter any consideration, but Mr. MacDonald would like to have some sort of brief from the Committee dealing with each particular item with suggestions and recommendations. Upon being advised by you, I would be pleased to either attend with Mr. MacDonald or merely submit the brief to him."

Mr. Kelley informed Mr. MacDonald that the matter would be placed before the Committee at its next meeting.

Your Committee recommends that the Chairman write Mr. Kelley informing him that members of the Special Committee on Legislation and individual members of the profession who had been consulted, suggested increases on individual items of the general tariff as between 25% and 50%, and that a substantial increase be made in counsel fees.

THE REPORT WAS ADOPTED.

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Moved by Mr. Walsh, seconded by Mr. W. G. Kerr, and carried, THAT having regard to the greatly increased cost to solicitors of office and other expenses, and to the fact that there has



been no increase in counsel and solicitor fees under the Bankruptcy Act since it was passed nearly thirty years ago, Convocation recommends to the Superintendent of Bankruptcy that a substantial increase be made in the tariff of fees to counsel and solicitors under the Act, and that the Chairman of the Special Committee on Legislation and the Secretary be authorized to take the necessary action accordingly.

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### CORRESPONDENCE.

The Treasurer read a letter from the Secretary of the Thunder Bay Law Association setting out a resolution with reference to a proposed amendment to the system of election of Benchers. In consideration of the election on January 19, 1950 of Mr. Henry S. Hamilton, K.C. of Sault Ste Marie, it was ordered that no action be taken in this matter, with the exception that the Secretary make an appropriate reply to the Association.

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The Treasurer read a letter from Mr. Peter White on behalf of his sisters and himself, thanking the Benchers for the copy of the Memorial to his father, the late Peter White, K.C.

Ordered that the letter be received and filed.

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The Treasurer referred to a letter from the Honourable J. C. McRuer, Chief Justice of the High Court, suggesting that consideration be given to the collection of records and the preparation of historical matter relating to the Law Society and the Ontario Courts. This letter was before Convocation on January 19, 1950 and the Treasurer had asked that the matter stand for further consideration.

The Treasurer reported that he had discussed this suggestion with many members of the Bar, and he referred to an address on "Reminiscences of the Legal Profession" by D. L. McCarthy, K.C. to the County of York Law Association at its Annual Meeting, January 20, 1950.

Mr. McCarthy stated that he was making a copy of his notes for the address with some additions from his own recollections and those of other members of the Bar, and that at a later date he would present a copy of his notes to Convocation.

It was suggested that a notice be published in O.W.N. asking for the assistance of the County Law Associations in this matter.

Moved by Mr. Walsh, seconded by Mr. Cassels, and carried, that a Special Committee on the history and records of the Law Society and the Ontario Courts be appointed, consisting of Messrs. McCarthy (Chairman), Denison and Geary.

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#### UNIFORM STANDARDS FOR ADMISSION OF BARRISTERS AND STUDENTS FROM A COMMON LAW PROVINCE TO ANOTHER.

Mr. Jamieson stated that at the Mid-Winter Meeting of the Executive of the Conference of Governing Bodies, Mr. Vincent C. MacDonald, K.C. (now the Honourable Mr. Justice MacDonald) had presented a Report on this matter with draft uniform standards, and that the Report and the draft standards had been received by the Executive for submission to the Annual Meeting of the Conference in Washington, D.C. in September 1950. He stated that a copy of the Report and of the proposed uniform standards would be sent to each governing body and would be before Convocation at the March meeting.

Moved by Mr. Walsh, seconded by Mr. Jamieson, and carried, that the Treasurer appoint a Special Committee on Uniform Standards for Admission of Barristers and Students from one Common Law Province to another, to consider the matter and report back.

The Treasurer appointed a Special Committee herein consisting of Messrs. Jamieson (Chairman), Denison, Beaton and Cassels.

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#### CANADIAN BAR ASSOCIATION.

Mr. Jamieson, Vice-President for Ontario of the Canadian Bar Association, referred to the Mid-Winter Meeting of the Ontario Section to be held at the Royal York Hotel on March 10th and 11th next, and expressed the hope that as many of the Benchers as possible would attend the meetings and other functions of the Association.

Your Committee recommends that the Secretary be instructed to inform all applicants for Special Call to the Bar and Certificate of Fitness, that they will be subject to a thorough examination—either written or oral, or both, on the Statute Law of Ontario and the Practice of its courts, and that they must pass such examination to the satisfaction of the Dean before they will be Called.

## SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON LEGISLATION—Mr. Walsh.

## RE BANKRUPTCY ACT 1949—Tariff.

At its meeting in February your Committee was informed of the action taken to date in making representations for an increase in the tariff under the Bankruptcy Act. Your Committee recommended that the Chairman write Mr. Kelley informing him that members of the Special Committee on Legislation and individual members of the profession who had been consulted, suggested increases on individual items of the general tariff of between 25% and 50%, and that a substantial increase be made in counsel fee. Following the adoption of your Committee's Report, Convocation passed a resolution in support thereof.

Pursuant to the above report and resolution, the Secretary, with the approval of the Chairman, wrote Mr. Lee A. Kelley, K.C. at length setting forth the suggestions of the Committee and of individual members of the profession who had been consulted.

The Secretary also informed, by long distance telephone and by letter, the Secretary of the Bar of the Province of Quebec and the Secretary of the Bar of Montreal of the action being taken. They both agreed that their bodies would be interested and would make representations to similar effect to the Superintendent of Bankruptcy. While Mr. Thomas D. MacDonald, Superintendent of Bankruptcy, has been appointed the new chief Combines Commissioner, Mr. Kelley has informed the Secretary that Mr. MacDonald is going to stay on to see the Rules and Tariff completed.

Your Committee recommends approval of the action taken herein.

## RE BILL No. 68—An Act to Amend the Surrogate Courts Act.

Section 8 of the amending Bill reads as follows:

"8. Subsection 9 of section 69 of THE SURROGATE COURTS ACT is amended by adding at the end thereof the words 'who, if he appears upon the taking of such accounts, shall have the same rights as any other person having an interest in the estate', so that the subsection shall read as follows:

“(9) Where by the terms of a will or other instrument in writing under which such an executor, administrator or trustee acts, real or personal property or any right or interest therein, or proceeds therefrom have hertofore been given, or are hereafter to be vested in any person, executor, administrator or trustee for any religious, educational, charitable or other purpose, or are to be applied by him to or for any such purpose, notice of taking the accounts shall be served upon the Public Trustee who, if he appears upon the taking of such accounts, shall have the same rights as any other person having an interest in the estate.”

Immediately on the printing of the Bill this section was called to the attention of the Secretary who in turn referred it to the Chairman. After some negotiation the Attorney-General was waited on at 10 a.m. on March 15th by Mr. G. T. Walsh, K.C., the Chairman, Hamilton Cassels, K.C., J. E. Corcoran, K. C., Fred Cawthorne, K.C., S. E. Wedd, K.C., and A. T. Whitehead, K.C., who made strong representations that the proposed amendment be deleted.

Your Committee recommends that the action taken herein be approved.

## SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON CONTINUING EDUCATION OF THE BAR.

In the absence of Mr. Pickup (the Chairman), Mr. Shaver, a Vice-Chairman, presented the Report:

The special course of lectures on Company Law as outlined to Convocation in your Committee's report of February 15th has been announced through the Ontario Weekly Notes, Osgoode Hall News in the Globe and Mail, and special letters to the County Law Associations and the Benchers.

Your Committee has decided on the following details:

That the number enrolled be limited to 350, and due notice has been given to this effect;

That as some third year students have asked if they might attend, your Committee recommends that if the registration has not reached 350 by Thursday morning, March 16th, the first 10 students of the third year to apply be allowed to attend the lectures without charge;

The lectures will be held in the double classroom on the ground floor of the Law School. This room has been cleaned and the necessary seats added.

The number registered as of this date is 347, of whom 74 are from outside Toronto. Your Committee feels that the registration from outside Toronto is most encouraging.

Your Committee recommends that the six special lecturers be invited to luncheon with the Treasurer and Benchers next Convocation day, Thursday April 20th.

Your Committee has made arrangements with Richard DeBoo Limited to print the lectures for distribution to the profession in general. The Society has made special arrangements for purchase of volumes for distribution to those registered for the course, to the County Law Associations, to the Great Library and the Students' Library at Osgoode Hall, to the Special Lecturers and members of the Special Committee. The price to others to be \$7.50.

## MEMORIAL TO THE LATE CHARLES LAWRENCE DUNBAR, K.C.

Messrs. W. P. Clement, K.C., and A. G. Davis, K.C., were appointed a Committee to prepare a memorial to the late Charles Lawrence Dunbar, K.C.

OSGOODE HALL LEGAL AND LITERARY SOCIETY.

*Honour Awards—Keys.*

At its meetings in January and March the Committee considered a letter from the President of the Osgoode Hall Legal and Literary Society outlining a proposed scheme of merit awards to students of the final year who by their efforts in any student functions have contributed to the welfare of the school. The system of selection consists of a Nominating Committee composed of the first and second year members of the Executive of the Legal and Literary Society making awards to a maximum number of ten from among candidates nominated by the executive of the three political clubs, the Editorial Board of *Obiter Dicta*, the Debate Committee and by the Nominating Committee itself. The Literary Society suggests that these awards might be presented by the Legal Education Committee at the June Call to the Bar.

Mr. R. A. Davies, the past President of the Legal and Literary Society, attended before your Committee and outlined the proposals of his Executive.

Your Committee recommends that the Honour Awards be presented in Convocation Hall at a Special Meeting of the Legal and Literary Society to be held immediately before the Call to the Bar at June Convocation and that the Treasurer or any member of Convocation or of the Bench or Bar may be invited on behalf of the Legal and Literary Society to make the presentation.

RE WALLACE NESBITT PRIZE ESSAY COMPETITION.

The President of the Osgoode Hall Legal and Literary Society has suggested that your Committee might consider that the prizes for the Wallace Nesbitt Essay Competition be awarded at the Special Call ceremonies in June.

Your Committee recommends that when the awards are made by the Trustees, the prizes be presented at the Call to the Bar in June.

SCHOLARSHIPS AND BURSARIES.

RE FIRE SAFETY—OSGOODE HALL.

#### *Accessibility of fire fighting equipment:*

On March 24th, 1950, the Fire Marshal wrote the Society enclosing a report of March 21st by A. D. Des Roches, Fire Prevention Officer, with reference to the accessibility to Osgoode Hall of fire trucks and other equipment. The report made certain suggestions and recommendations with reference to the widening of the gates into Osgoode Hall grounds, suggesting



that the gates be widened from 12 feet to 16 feet. The matter was immediately referred to the Sub-Committee on Insurance, Messrs. McLaughlin, Pickup and Shaver, and to Mr. Heeney for suggestions and estimates of costs. The Fire Marshal was informed that the west gate on Osgoode Street was under the control and jurisdiction of the Department of Public Works.

*Carbon dioxide installations:*

On April 12th the Fire Marshal wrote the Society enclosing a further interim report dated March 24th of A. D. Des Roches, Fire Prevention Officer, with certain suggestions as to the installation of automatic carbon dioxide equipment in the Society's libraries. With this letter the Fire Marshal sent original submissions from two commercial firms for the installations referred to.

Your Committee recommends that this matter be referred to the Sub-Committee on Insurance.

ELECTRICAL INSTALLATIONS.

The Hydro-Electric Power Commission of Ontario has made an inspection of the entire Osgoode Hall Building, and on April 6th reported to the Government caretaker with certain recommendations. Nine items refer to installations in the Law Society buildings. With the approval of Mr. Shaver, the only member of the Sub-Committee on Insurance available, Mr. Heeney has been authorized to put this work in hand at once so that the H.E.P.C. may be informed that their recommendations have been carried out.

Your Committee approves and confirms the action taken herein.

At the meeting of Convocation on February 16th it was resolved that a letter be written to the Minister of Public Works referring to those matters of fire safety which have not been implemented by the Department, and requesting action, and that a copy of the letter be sent to the Premier of Ontario. On April 11th this letter was sent to the Minister of Public Works, and copies with covering letters were sent to the Premier and the Attorney-General.

## RE PORTRAITS.

The portrait of the Honourable Archibald McLean by Berthon, which was sent to the laboratory of the National Gallery at Ottawa in January last, has now been returned, having been re-lined, conditioned and cleaned. Mr. Harbour reports that it is now in good condition. Mr. Harbour reports that this portrait is painted on a material made from French linen.

Mr. Harbour will be at Osgoode Hall for about two weeks beginning this date, and hopes to complete the work on approximately one-half of the twelve portraits remaining to be cleaned and conditioned.

It was resolved that upon the facts ascertained and appearing by the said Report and the evidence and other papers referred to and submitted to Convocation therewith, Convocation finds the said Arthur Charles Thompson guilty of professional misconduct, and of conduct unbecoming a Barrister and Solicitor in respect of the charges dealt with by the said Report.

That the said Arthur Charles Thompson be disbarred.

That the said Arthur Charles Thompson is unworthy to practise as a solicitor.

JOHN FREDERICK WOODS.

In the absence of the Chairman, Mr. Common, the Acting Vice-Chairman presented the second Report of the Discipline Committee dated the 13th April, 1950.

Mr. Common read a letter dated April 19th, 1950, from A. A. Macdonald, K.C., counsel for the solicitor.

Moved by Mr. Common, seconded by Mr. Beaton, that the second Report of the Discipline Committee be received.

That the said John Frederick Woods be disbarred.

That the said John Frederick Woods is unworthy to practise as a Solicitor.

## ANNUAL GRANTS.

Your Committee reports specially that the Parry Sound Law Association, having failed to file its annual returns for the year 1947 within three months from the 15th day of January, 1948, and for the year 1948 within three months from the 15th day of January, 1949, has now filed its annual returns for those years and has complied in all other respects with the requirements of the Rules adopted from time to time by Convocation in relation to County Libraries.

Your Committee reports to the Finance Committee that the Parry Sound Law Association and the Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry Law Association have filed their annual returns for the year 1949 in accordance with Rule 62 and have complied in all other respects with the requirements of the said Rules.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON LEGISLATION.

In the absence of the Chairman, Mr. Jamieson presented the Report.

RE BILL No. 68—*An Act to Amend the Surrogate Courts Act.*

Section 8 of this Bill read:

“8. Subsection 9 of section 69 of THE SURROGATE COURTS ACT is amended by adding at the end thereof the words ‘who, if he appears upon the taking of such accounts, shall have the same rights as any other person having an interest in the estate’, so that the subsection shall read as follows:

(9) Where by the terms of a will or other instrument in writing under which such an executor, administrator or trustee acts, real or personal property or any right or interest therein, or proceeds therefrom have heretofore been given, or are hereafter to be vested in any person, executor, administrator or trustee for any religious, educational, charitable or other purpose, or are to be applied by him to or for any such purpose, notice of taking the accounts shall be served upon the Public Trustee who, if he appears upon the taking of such accounts, shall have the same rights as any other person having an interest in the estate.”

Immediately on the printing of the Bill, this section was called to the attention of the Secretary who in turn referred it to the Chairman. After some negotiations the Attorney-General was waited on at 10 a.m. on March 15th by the Chairman, and Messrs. Hamilton Cassels, K.C., J. E. Corcoran, K.C., Fred Cawthorne, K.C., S. E. Wedd, K.C., and A. T. Whitehead, K.C., who made representations to the effect that the section should be deleted from the Act.

On second reading the section was deleted.

Your Committee approves and confirms the action taken by the Chairman and the other members of the Bar, and notes with approval that the section was deleted from the Bill.

## MOTION.

Having given due notice, Mr. Jamieson moved, seconded by Mr. Common, that in view of the fact that the Annual Meeting of the Canadian Bar Association is being held in Washington, D.C., during the week of September 18th, 1950, and that many benchers will be desirous of attending such meeting:

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SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON MEMORIAL TO THE LATE  
CHARLES LAWRENCE DUNBAR, K.C.

Mr. Clement presented the Report of the Special Committee appointed to prepare a Memorial to the late Charles Lawrence Dunbar, K.C., and it was ordered that it be recorded in the Minutes of Convocation and copies sent to the family:

MEMORIAL  
TO  
THE LATE CHARLES LAWRENCE DUNBAR.

On March the 3rd, 1950, the death occurred of Charles Lawrence Dunbar, a Barrister, a Solicitor, and a life Bencher of the Law Society of Upper Canada.

Born at Guelph, Ontario, on April 5th, 1870, he was the son of Alexander Dunbar, K.C., and Catherine McMillan. He received his early education in the Public and High schools of Guelph and also received tuition in England in the years 1885 to 1888.

On his return from England he enrolled as a student at law of the matriculant class in Michaelmas Term 1888. He read law with the late Colonel A. H. Macdonald, K.C., of Guelph, and was Called to the Bar in Michaelmas Term 1893. He received his commission as a King's Counsel in 1921.

Mr. Dunbar was elected a Bencher of the Law Society in 1931 and at each of the three succeeding quinquennial elections, by virtue of which he became a life Bencher in 1946. While a Bencher he took an active part in the work of Convocation. He served as chairman of the Discipline Committee from February 1939 to May 1941, and as chairman of the Finance Committee from May 1941 to 1944. There have been probably few Benchers outside the City of Toronto who have given so unsparingly of their services. While sitting as chairman of the Discipline Committee, although constantly maintaining a high standard of ethical conduct, he was not unsympathetic with those who had strayed from the narrow path, particularly the younger members.

His practice of the law was carried on entirely at his native city of Guelph where he was held in the highest esteem by his confreres in the law and by the general public. His capabilities were recognized in the commercial world, as evidenced by his election as President of Page-Hersey Tubes Limited, an office which he held from 1935 to 1942.

Taking an active interest in civic affairs he served the City of Guelph as alderman in the years 1899 and 1900, as secretary of the local Patriotic Fund in World War I, and in many other community welfare projects; in fact it is said of him that he never turned a deaf ear to any worthy cause. In the year 1934 more than one hundred of Guelph's prominent citizens met to present him with a silver tureen, suitably inscribed, in recognition of his unselfish contribution to philanthropic projects.

A wide circle of personal friends cherish happy memories of the warmth of his hospitality, his Guelph home being a place where the latch string always hung outside. Without a great deal of time to devote to recreation, he enjoyed golfing and fishing in his leisure moments, and was a member, and at times President, of both the Guelph Golf and Country Club and the Caledon Mountain Trout Club.

In 1896 he married Maud Oxnard of Guelph, who predeceased him in 1937. He subsequently married Evelyn J. Knowles, who survives him. Also surviving are his daughter, now Mrs. Kathleen Stuart Milner, and his son, Angus Charles Dunbar, K.C., who is continuing the law practice in which he was associated with his father since 1920.

In the passing of Charles Lawrence Dunbar, the Law Society of Upper Canada has lost a member who worthily upheld the dignity and honour of the legal profession.

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## SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON CONTINUING EDUCATION OF THE BAR.

In the absence of Mr. Pickup, the Chairman, Mr. Shaver, a Vice-Chairman, presented the Report:

The total number of members of the Bar registered for this course was 355 including 5 members from out of town who asked to be registered after the limit of 350 was reached. Ten students of the Third Year were permitted to attend the lectures without fee. Of the 355 registered, 81 or more than 22 per cent. were from outside the Toronto metropolitan area. They represented 31 centres throughout the Province, and came from as far west as Port Arthur, as far north as New Liskeard and North Bay, and as far east as Ottawa and Brockville.

Your Committee has made arrangements with Richard De-Boo Limited to print the lectures which will be sold to the profession and the public at \$7.50 per copy. Arrangements have been made for the purchase by the Society from Richard DeBoo Limited of 425 copies.

The copies for the Lecturers and members of the Committee will be specially bound without extra cost. Copies for the County Law Associations will be shipped direct by Richard De-Boo Limited. The County Associations have been notified of this arrangement.

Your Committee is of the opinion that this course of special lectures on Company Law was highly successful and that the registration, particularly by members from outside Toronto, was



gratifying and most encouraging. The course obtained very favourable publicity particularly in the daily and weekly press outside Toronto.

Your Committee recommends to Convocation consideration of the giving of further special courses of lectures each autumn or winter.

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ONTARIO SECTION, CANADIAN BAR ASSOCIATION.

In the absence of the Chairman, Mr. Jamieson presented the Report of the Special Committee on a Luncheon to the Ontario Section of the Canadian Bar Association.

The Special Committee on a Luncheon to the Ontario Section of the Canadian Bar Association begs leave to report as follows:

At the meeting of Convocation in October 1949 it was resolved that the Law Society give a buffet luncheon to the registered members of the Ontario Section of the Canadian Bar Association at the Mid-winter meeting in March 1950. The matter was referred to a Special Committee composed of Messrs. Carson (Chairman), Jamieson and McLaughlin.

Your Committee in cooperation with the Officers of the Ontario Section of the Canadian Bar Association decided to give a luncheon at the Royal York Hotel on Saturday, March 11th, 1950, at 1 p.m. The guests were received by the Treasurer, the Dean, and Messrs. Carson and McLaughlin. Some 430 members of the Association attended the luncheon.

THE REPORT WAS ADOPTED.

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AMENDMENT, LAW SOCIETY ACT, SECTION 5(b).

The Treasurer reported that he and the Chairman of Standing Committees had met on Thursday, March 30th, 1950, to consider a proposed amendment to section 5(b) of The Law Society Act. They recommended to Convocation that section 5(b) be amended by adding the words:

“and every person who has held that office”

so that section 5(b) will read:

"Section 5(b). The Attorney-General for Ontario and every person who has held that office."

The Treasurer reported that as a result of a request to the Honourable the Attorney-General, the amendment was passed in the Statute Law Amendment Act, 1950.

ORDERED that the action taken by the Treasurer and Chairmen of Standing Committees be approved and confirmed.

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#### SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON HISTORY, ETC.

Mr. McCarthy reported progress in collecting matters of interest and expressed his appreciation of the assistance of the Chief Justice of Ontario.

ORDERED that Mr. McCarthy be authorized to consult sources other than legal, and to obtain stenographic help for the taking of information at the expense of the Society.

### SOLICITOR SUSPENDED FOR NON-PAYMENT.

*John Douglas Peck* was suspended from practice for one year from March 16, 1950. He has now paid his arrears in full and asks that he be reinstated.

Your Committee recommends that the period of suspension of the above solicitor be terminated forthwith, and that he be reinstated as a barrister and solicitor in good standing.

### OSGOODE HALL LEGAL AND LITERARY SOCIETY—Grant, 1950-1951.

At its meeting on April 19, 1950 the Committee had before it a letter from the President with reference to the grant for the coming academic year. The matter was referred for consideration and report to a sub-committee consisting of Messrs. Cassels, Beaton and McLaughlin.

The Committee met on May 8th when Mr. Edward McNeely and Mr. Brian W. Morison, President and Treasurer respectively of the Legal and Literary Society, were present and explained in detail the proposals of the Society for financing for the coming year and for the future. Their proposal was that a grant be made on the basis of \$6.00 per student per annum.

The Sub-Committee recommended to the Finance and Legal Education Committees that the proposal be approved, and that the grant be made as requested payable in advance.

Your Committee recommends that the grant to the Legal and Literary Society be made on the basis of \$6.00 per student per annum, provided that the total grant does not exceed the sum of \$3,000.00; and recommends that an initial payment of \$1,000.00 be made on account forthwith.

## RE STATUTES, DOMINION 1949.

The fee charged members of the Society for Dominion Statutes 1949, Volume 1, and Ontario Statutes 1949, was \$6.00. The Dominion Statutes 1949, First Session, were distributed to the profession about September 1949. The second volume, covering the Statutes of the Second Session, September to December 1949, has now been distributed to those members of the profession on the statute list for 1950.

Your Committee recommends that those members of the Society who received the second volume, covering statutes of the Second Session 1949, be billed for the sum of \$3.75 each, being the regular charge of \$5.00 per volume less discount of 25 per cent.

## RE EXAMINATION FEES.

In September 1935 the examination fee was reduced from \$10.00 to \$5.00. The receipts from examination fees for the year 1948-49 were \$8,350.00, and the disbursements in connection with examinations were \$12,440.50.

Your Committee recommends that the fee on each examination be restored to \$10.00, and that the relevant Rule be amended to this effect.

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SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON LEGISLATION—Mr. Walsh.  
RE BANKRUPTCY ACT—Tariff.

As reported to Convocation in March last the Society on the recommendation of your Special Committee, has through its counsel herein and in association with the Bar of the Province of Quebec and the Bar of Montreal, made representations to the Registrar in Bankruptcy for a substantial increase in the tariff of costs to be included in the regulations under the new Bankruptcy Act. On May 15th Mr. A. J. MacLeod, the new Superintendent, wrote the Society asking for specific information on certain matters in connection with the tariff.

Your Committee recommends that the Chairman and Secretary write Mr. MacLeod, the Superintendent, restating the views of the Society with reference to an increase in the tariff of costs; and that copies of this letter and other relevant material be sent to Messrs. Pickup and MacTavish with the request that they wait upon the Minister of Justice and acquaint him with the Society's views.

RE INCOME TAX APPEAL BOARD.

*Proposed Amendment to Section 82(1).*

In January 1950 your Committee reported on representations made to the proper Ministers requesting amendment to the



Income Tax Act by deleting from section 82(1) the words "or an agent", and seeking the introduction of legislation for amendment of the Act at the earliest possible date. This section refers to appearance before the Income Tax Appeal Board. The various communications were referred to the Minister of Finance who informed the Society in part:

"I gave careful study to your suggestion that the words 'or an agent' should be deleted from this section, but I came to the conclusion that I could not recommend such a change to Parliament at this time."

Your Committee recommended that the matter be referred to Mr. MacTavish with the request that he interview the Minister of Finance and make further representations with reference to the proposed amendment of section 82(1); and that he be authorized, if he so desires, to consult with and retain counsel.

Mr. MacTavish reported to your Committee that he had been in touch with the Minister of Finance regarding this matter. Further consideration is being given by the Minister having regard to certain legislation that is being introduced.

Your Committee recommends that Mr. MacTavish be thanked for the valuable assistance that he has given herein.

Newfoundland an inkwell in connection with the celebration on June 24, 1950 of "Newfoundland Day".

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#### SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON HISTORY ETC.

Mr. McCarthy reported progress in collecting material, and asked for the assistance of all Benchers, particularly those from outside Toronto.

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#### SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON PRESENTATION FROM THE INNS OF COURT.

At the request of the Treasurer, Mr. McCarthy presented the Report of the Special Committee:

To the Benchers of the Law Society of Upper Canada  
in Convocation assembled:

The Special Committee on Presentation from the Inns of Court begs leave to report as follows:

On November 18, 1948, Mr. McCarthy informed Convocation of the presentation of certain relics from the British House of Commons to the Capitol at Washington, D.C., and to all the State capitals, and of a suggestion that relics from the Inns of Court (Inner Temple) be presented to the American Bar Association and other legal bodies. He referred to an Article in the Times (London) of October 14, 1948, and read a letter dated November 5, 1948 from Lord Schuster which stated in part as follows:

"I am extremely glad that you wrote to me on the subject for it gives me the opportunity of saying that we should be delighted to give to any one or more of your provincial Law Societies or to the Canadian Bar Association any relics from the ruins of the Inner Temple which they would like to have."

Convocation recorded its approval of the suggestion of asking for such relics, and ordered that the matter be referred with power to act to a Special Committee consisting of Messrs. Pickup (Convener), Cartwright, Carson and McCarthy.

On January 20, 1949 Mr. Pickup, the Chairman, reported to Convocation that the Special Committee had decided to suggest that a stone from the ruined buildings of the Inner Temple be presented to the Society; the stone to be about 6 inches to 8 inches high, and about 1 foot in length, and left in its rough and damaged state. The Committee had also suggested that Lord Schuster prepare a suitable statement about the stone and its history.

In September 1949 Mr. Pickup informed Convocation that the stone from the ruins of the Inner Temple and its history prepared by Lord Schuster had been received; and that the Special Committee had decided on a suitable wooden showcase for the exhibition of the stone which would have a brass plate with a suitable inscription, and that a memorandum of the history of the stone and photographs of Crown Office Row before and after the bombing would be framed and shown with the case.

Delays in completing the work of the Committee have been due to various reasons, one of which was that the form of the showcase had to be changed and strengthened.

Your Committee now recommends that the stone be accepted on behalf of the Society, and exhibited in the case in the Great Library, or other suitable site, and that the Special Committee be discharged.

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CONVOCATION THEN ROSE.

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Following the meeting of Convocation the Treasurer and Benchers met in the Great Library in front of the First War Memorial. There were present the newly elected Treasurer, C. F. H. Carson, K.C., and all living ex-treasurers, the Hon. R.S. Robertson, LL.D., Chief Justice of Ontario, D. L. McCarthy, K.C., LL.D., J. Shirley Denison, K.C., and G. W. Mason, K.C., LL.D.

The stone from the ruins of Crown Office Row of the Inner Temple in the cabinet specially prepared for it, and with a brass plate inscribed as follows:

"This stone was presented by the Inner Temple to The Law Society of Upper Canada in 1949."

was placed in front of the War Memorial. Mr. D. L. McCarthy, K.C., on behalf of the Treasurer and Benchers of the Inner Temple, presented the stone to The Law Society of Upper Canada in the following words:

"Mister Treasurer and Fellow-Benchers:

"I had hoped that I would be successful in inducing Mr. Leonard Brockington, an Honorary Bencher of the Inner Temple, to be present this morning and make this presentation, but in speaking to him yesterday over the long distance he told me he had to leave by air for England immediately. He asked me to express his deep regrets at being unable to be present with us this morning.

"The duty and pleasure therefore of making this presentation falls upon me, being the one responsible for the suggestion that it would be appropriate if our Law Society were furnished with some splinters of stone from the Inner Temple or the Temple Church as the result of the terrible punishment to which they were subjected on those dreadful nights of December, 1940, and the most awful night of all, May 10th-11th, 1941, when the Inner Temple was entirely destroyed, together with the Temple Church and many of the adjacent buildings.

"By good fortune I happened to notice in the 'London Times' an article headed 'House of Commons Relics Gifts to State Capitals in United States', and it immediately occurred to me that it would be very appropriate if Inns of Court relics could be made the subject of gifts to the provincial Law Societies and Universities in this country. Without waiting to consult my fellow-members of Convocation I immediately took the matter up with the Right Honourable Lord Schuster, the then Treasurer of the Inner Temple. Thanks to his willing co-operation I was able to arrange that a gift of stone or stones from the ruined buildings of that Temple should be sent to our Society to further cement the good feeling which has always existed between the Law



Society of Upper Canada and the Inns of Court, and also as evidence of our feeling of distress at the irreparable loss they have suffered at the hands of the invading enemy. In due course the stone arrived which, as we now know, was taken from the house in Crown Office Row where Charles Lamb was born, described in a letter from Lord Schuster as follows:

“The stone is taken from the house in Crown Office Row where Charles Lamb was born in 1775. The house was built by Benjamin Timbrell under the orders of the Masters of the Bench of the Inner Temple in 1737 (before Canada became part of this Empire), and it stood next to our modern Hall which was erected in 1868 on the site of the old Hall formerly occupied by the Knights Templars. Crown Office Row is in the very middle of the Temple and I enclose a little book, written by the late Lord Justice MacKinnon, which not only gives photographs of the building before and after the destruction but also describes it in the text on pages 12 and 13. There is a plan of the Temple at the end of the book. As you will read, the house was destroyed in 1940.’

“An appropriate receptacle has now been found in which it is being placed today, occupying as it does the most distinguished position in our Great Library, beneath the memorial statue to the members of our profession who perished in the first Great War.

“Lord Schuster was also kind enough to send me several copies of the booklet edited by Sir Frank MacKinnon, entitled ‘The Ravages of War in the Inner Temple’. These books are available in our Library, and in addition I have distributed many copies to the members of our profession. Opposite page 12 you will find the exact place from which this stone was taken, and which appears in the photograph opposite this page. This book tells of the terrible destruction suffered by the great Inns of Court and the frantic efforts which were made by every member of those Inns to save their treasured property from the ravages of the destroyer.

“Mister Treasurer and Fellow-Benchers, without further words, and acting on behalf of and at the request of the Treasurer and Benchers of the Inner Temple, I now beg to present this stone to the Law Society of Upper Canada, which I hope will long serve as a lasting link between the great Inn and this Society.”

Mr. C. F. H. Carson, K.C., Treasurer of The Law Society of Upper Canada, accepted the stone with the following remarks:

"It is a great pleasure for me to receive this stone on behalf of the Law Society of Upper Canada. I think it is fitting that we should preserve this stone in a place of prominence in Osgoode Hall. To that end it has been placed in a suitably designed cabinet in our Great Library where we are now gathered and where it can readily be seen at all times by the members of our Society.

"With the passing of the years following the first World War our memories of the ordeal through which the world had passed grew dim. We became less vigilant than we should have been in protecting the freedom which the British nations and their Allies had come so perilously close to losing. The second World War might well have been avoided had we worked as hard to safeguard our freedom during the years of peace as we had during the years of the war.

"Once again as the years pass we may be inclined to forget what happened during the awful years from 1939 to 1945. It may become increasingly difficult for us to realize that for many months following the fall of France the fate of the British Nations and particularly the fate of Great Britain hung in the balance. We may tend to forget how tremendous was the destruction wrought by our enemies on the cities and towns of Great Britain. We may tend to forget the sacrifices which our friends of the English Bar made those dreary, discouraging years, and the hardships they endured as one after another of their historic and treasured buildings were blasted by bombs and consumed by fires.

"Our friends at the English Bar are not likely to forget those terrible years. The vacant spaces in the Temple grounds are there to remind them. The work of repairing the damage, of restoring their libraries and of reconstructing their buildings will tax their resources for many years to come and this work will also serve to keep their memories fresh.

"In Canada we have no bombed buildings to remind us of the war's destruction. Our cities and town were safe from attack. We did not experience many of the real hardships of war and were able to carry on our work under comparatively normal conditions.

What inconveniences we did suffer were quickly eliminated when the war ended.

"It is fitting, therefore, that we should have here in Osgoode Hall some evidence of war's destruction—something to remind us of the sacrifices of our friends in Great Britain and of our own good fortune in being spared the hardships they suffered—something to remind us of the need for constant vigilance lest yet a third and much more terrible war be permitted to engulf the world.

"In the years to come this stone will serve to remind us of these things. By reason of its particular associations it should remind us of other things for which we are also indebted.

"This stone formed part of the doorway of the chambers in which Charles Lamb was born. Charles Lamb was one of the many English men of Letters who by their works bequeathed upon us the great legacy of English Literature. As the spokesmen of others it is of particular importance for us of the legal profession to be able to express ourselves both orally and in writing with grace and clarity. In attempting to develop the ability to do that: whether consciously or not, we owe much to the assistance we receive from the writings of the masters of the English language.

"This stone should also remind us of the great debt we owe to the members of the English Inns of Court who through the centuries have been so intimately associated with the development of law and justice in the sense that we enjoy them in Canada today. It was the members of those Inns who moulded the common law which has become the solid foundation of our own law and who established the traditions of courtesy and integrity which guide us in the practice of our profession. It is our duty to maintain in Canada the high standards set for us in England. The presence of this stone in our Great Library in Osgoode Hall should make us constantly aware of that duty.

"On behalf of the Law Society of Upper Canada, I wish to thank the Benchers of the Inner Temple who have sent this stone to us and to assure them that we shall preserve it faithfully as a symbol of the high regard and feeling of indebtedness which we of the Law Society of Upper Canada have for the English Bar."

SOLICITOR SUSPENDED FOR NON-PAYMENT.

Lee Rosswell Graham was suspended from practice for one year from March 16, 1950. He has now paid his arrears for fees for the year 1948-49, filed a Declaration that he has not practised since December 1, 1949 to June 10th, and paid his fees for the current year. and asks that he be reinstated.

Your Committee recommends that the period of suspension of the above solicitor be terminated forthwith, and that he be reinstated as a barrister and solicitor in good standing.

PRESENTATION TO THE LAW SOCIETY OF NEWFOUNDLAND.

At the meeting of Convocation on May 18th, the Treasurer read a letter from M. A. Seymour, K.C. with reference to the celebration of "Newfoundland Day" on June 24th. It was moved by Mr. Seymour, seconded by Mr. Chitty, and unanimously carried, that the Law Society of Upper Canada, as a token of its friendship and goodwill, present to the Law Society of Newfoundland an inkwell in connection with the celebration on June 24, 1950 of Newfoundland Day. ## LAW SCHOOL STAFF.

*Full-time Lecturers.*

At the meeting of May 17th, 1950, the Legal Education Committee recommended that this matter be referred to a Special Committee composed of the new Treasurer, the Chairman of the Legal Education Committee, the Chairman of the Finance

Committee, Mr. Hamilton Cassels and Mr. P. D. Wilson, with power to act in consultation with the Dean and Secretary.

After personal interviews with 5 applicants, the Sub-Committee appointed as members of the full-time staff, Mr. H. A. B. Leal, B.A., and Mr. D. B. Spence, M.A., LL.M., both appointments to date from June 1st, 1950.

Your Committee notes with approval the action taken herein.

#### RE CURRICULUM.

The Dean submits a draft curriculum for next year.

Your Committee approves of the curriculum submitted by the Dean with certain amendments and recommends that the appointment of a part-time lecturer in Labour Law, Third Year, be referred to the Chairman and the Secretary, and the appointment of a part-time lecturer in Taxation, Third Year, be referred to the Treasurer and Secretary, in both cases in consultation with the Dean.

#### RE WALLACE NESBITT TRUST.

The Dean submits the following memorandum:

"The annual income of this fund appears to be about \$580.00. The expressed general intention is 'for the improvement of legal education in Ontario'. Three specific objects are mentioned—special lectures from time to time; scholarships for post-graduate work; and prizes for competition in moot courts and debates or to assist in any other phases of law student life and activities.

"But it is expressly provided that the enumeration of these specific objects is 'without in any way qualifying the . . . trust or restricting the income of the fund'.

"For some time the income has, by resolution of Convocation, been used to provide prizes for essay competitions—one of such competitions being for students; the other for barristers of not more than two years' standing.

"The number of essays submitted each year has been small. Perhaps, with two full-time years it will increase. But even if all six prizes are awarded the amount will only total \$530.00.



"There is an accumulated balance of income in the fund of approximately \$7,500.00.

"I suggest that this might be used to provide bursaries for poor but deserving students, taking particularly into account those who for some physical or other reason are not able to earn money in the vacations. Each bursary should be \$200—the amount of the tuition fee—awarded to students after their First Year examinations, and renewable. In suitable cases a final award might be made to pay for their Call Fee."

Your Committee recommends approval of the Dean's memorandum herein, and recommends the establishment for students of the Second and Third Years of not more than five bursaries of \$200.00 each for the academic year 1950-51.

#### OSGOODE HALL C.O.T.C. TRUST FUND.

The Dean submits the following memorandum:

"The accumulated funds in this account appear to be approximately \$6,500. Their use seems to be restricted by the terms of Appendix F to a minute of the Treasury Board approved by His Excellency the Governor General in Council on the 2nd November 1949.

#### *Recommendations—*

- (a) That expenditure of an amount not exceeding \$1,390.07 for painting a portrait of Lieutenant Colonel H. W. A. Foster, D.S.O., M.C., K.C., be approved, ratified and confirmed; and
- (b) That the balance be paid to the Law Society of Upper Canada, in trust, the income and capital to be used for the establishment of a prize, bursary or scholarship to be known as the "Osgoode Hall C.O.T.C. World War Memorial Prize", the Benchers of the Society to have

full authority to fix the terms on which awards shall be made and to alter them from time to time as conditions warrant and in their absolute discretion; that as far as practicable the awards be made to those members of the Society who served on active service or to their sons or daughters and that within this class, preference be given to those who at the time of the awards are actively identified with any unit of the armed forces of Canada; and that the Benchers be authorized to have prepared and paid for from the fund a short history of the Osgoode Hall Contingent C.O.T.C. should they in their absolute discretion at any time see fit so to do.'

"I suggest that the fund remain invested, yielding approximately \$180.00 a year, and the income used to provide bursaries for poor but deserving students who are within the category named."

Your Committee recommends adoption of the terms of Appendix "F" to a minute of the Treasury Board approved by His Excellency the Governor-General in Council on the 2nd November 1949, as the terms of the C.O.T.C. Trust Fund; recommends approval of the Dean's memorandum herein, and the establishment for the students of the Second and Third Years of a bursary of \$180.00 (or up to \$200.00 if the income warrants) for the academic year 1950-51.

Your Committee further recommends that the Treasurer appoint a small Committee to make selections with reference to the Wallace Nesbitt Trust Fund and the Osgoode Hall C.O.T.C. Trust Fund.

PRACTICE GROUPS, 1950-51.

*First and Second Years.*

The Treasurer, the Chairman of this Committee, the Dean and the Secretary have discussed with Mr. Arthur Kelly, K.C. and Mr. Sydney L. Robins, plans for Practice Groups for the First and Second Years of the new course. It is suggested that the Instructors for the First Year Practice Groups be chosen from the top students of the Third Year and that the present Group Instructors with any necessary or desirable changes be used as Instructors for Second Year Groups. Mr. Kelly and Mr.

Robins will submit a memorandum as to their recommendations on syllabus, instructors and other details which will be presented to the Committee at a later date.

Your Committee approves of the action taken to date and recommends that it be granted power to act in this matter.

#### CHANGE OF NAME.

*Francis Elliott Wigle*, Barrister of Windsor, asks to have the spelling of his name changed on the Rolls of the Society to "Francis Elliott Wigle", which he states is the proper spelling.

Your Committee recommends that the petition be granted.

*Victor Louis Paskaloff*—3rd year—asks to have the spelling of his name changed on the Rolls of the Society to "Victor Louis Paskaleff" which he states is the proper spelling.

Your Committee recommends that the petition be granted.

*Janet Miriam Lang*—3rd year—asks to have her name changed on the Rolls and Records of the Society to "Janet Lang Boland" as she was married on 1st October 1949 to J. B. Boland. She submits a certificate of her marriage.

Your Committee recommends that the petition be granted.

#### SPECIAL PETITIONS.

Your Committee considered petitions for special relief and made recommendations thereon.

#### BEAVER CLUB SCHOLARSHIP.

At its meeting on 17th May, the Committee recommended that a Beaver Club Scholar be treated on the same basis as a Rhodes Scholar but that each case be treated individually. A letter is submitted from K. G. R. Gwynne-Timothy stating that he is a Beaver Club Scholar attending Cambridge University, and asking that on complying with the provisions of Rule 135 he be Called to the Bar of Ontario.

Your Committee recommends that in the special circumstances and pursuant to section 43 (a) and (b) of the Law Society Act the applicant be granted the privilege of Call to the Bar and admission as a Solicitor on conditions similar to those required of Ontario Rhodes Scholars by Rule 135.

LAW SCHOOL STAFF.

*Part-time Lecturers.*

On the recommendation of the Dean the Committee approves of the re-appointment for one year from June 1st, 1950, of the following part-time lecturers:

H. W. A. Foster, K.C., G. A. Martin, K.C., Sidney L. Robins, W. G. C. Howland, John Johnston, J. R. M. Wilson, and the appointment for one year from June 1st, 1950, of B. J. McKinnon as a part-time lecturer.

THE REPORT WAS ADOPTED.

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CALL TO THE BAR.

LIBRARY HOURS.

Your Committee recommends that the Great Library be open in the evenings and on Saturday afternoons from and after the 19th of September, 1950 and that the Chief Librarian be authorized to appoint temporary night librarians to act until the appointments for the year 1950-51 are made.

TEXT BOOKS.

Your Committee reports that, since the beginning of the fiscal year, apart from reports, statutes, digests and legal periodicals, 79 volumes of text books have been purchased for the Great Library and 71 volumes for the Phillips-Stewart Library.

THE REPORT WAS ADOPTED.



## UNAUTHORIZED PRACTICE COMMITTEE.

In the absence of the Chairman, Mr. Wilson presented the Report:

## ACCOUNTANTS—LAW SOCIETY AND DUNN.

The appeal on behalf of the Law Society to the Court of Appeal, Supreme Court of Ontario, was argued on April 24th and 25th, and judgment was reserved. On June 2nd Reasons for Judgment were delivered dismissing the appeal. Copy of the Reasons for Judgment, a news item from the Globe & Mail of June 3, 1950 with reference to the possible need of further legislation, and a letter from counsel, were considered by your Committee on June 15th.

Your Committee recommends that the question of an appeal to the Supreme Court of Canada be referred to the Chairman and the Treasurer with power to act, in consultation with counsel, with a recommendation of your Committee that an appeal be taken if there is such right and if counsel so advises.

UNAUTHORIZED PRACTICE—*Conveyancers*.

Your Committee considered three other matters of unauthorized practice in Mitchell, Ottawa and Toronto, and directed that further investigations be made.

THE REPORT WAS ADOPTED.

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## COUNTY LIBRARIES COMMITTEE—Mr. Marshall.

## ANNUAL GRANTS.

Your Committee reports specially that the following county law associations, having failed to file their annual returns within three months from the 15th day of January 1950, have now filed their annual returns for the year 1949 and otherwise complied with the rules adopted from time to time relating to county law libraries, and recommends that grants be made to them of the amount shown below, to which they would have been entitled if their returns had been filed within the time limited under Rule 62:

The Chief Librarian has presented the Annual Schedule of County Library Information based on annual returns for 1949. Your Committee recommends that copies be sent to the County Law Associations.

THE REPORT WAS ADOPTED.

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#### SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON CONTINUING EDUCATION OF THE BAR—Mr. Pickup.

The lectures have been printed by Richard DeBoo Limited, and are now on sale to members of the profession and public generally. The 425 copies ordered by the Society have been distributed to those registered for the course, the special lecturers, County Law Associations, Osgoode Hall libraries, and members of the Special Committee; 1750 volumes were printed and the issue will soon be sold out. Richard DeBoo states that apart from members of the profession, copies are being sold to accountants, corporations, financial houses and institutional libraries, and there is a small sale outside of Ontario.

Following the completion of the course fourteen of those registered for the course wrote the Secretary. Six of these solicitors practise in Toronto and eight outside. The following is a summary of their remarks: There was unanimous approval of the special lectures given this year, and of a settled policy of continuing education of the Bar. There was general approval of the arrangements, that is of the place and time of holding the lectures. Several stated that they thought Osgoode Hall the proper place for these courses, although the Society might try short courses in some outside centres. One solicitor in this connection stated that a sort of annual reunion at Osgoode Hall had much to commend it. February or March appears to be the best time for holding these lectures, and one solicitor stated that he thought October or November would not be so popular. The

following subjects were suggested for consideration for future courses:

- Municipal Act and Assessment Act.
- Evidence and Practice.
- Succession Duty.
- Wills and Trusts.
- Company Law (More advanced problems).
- Labour Law.
- Any subjects in the field of Commercial Law.
- Any subjects that recur in the average practitioner's office.

The emphasis of these letters appears to be on Wills and Trusts, and Succession Duties. One solicitor suggests that all future lectures be on a post-graduate level.

Your Special Committee recommends that it be discharged, but with power prior to the appointment of a new committee to make such recognition by way of honoraria to the staff of the Secretary for special work done to assist this Committee in connection with the course of lectures which have been held, as the Committee may think proper.

Your Special Committee further recommends the appointment by the Treasurer of a new Committee to consider plans for next year.

#### THE REPORT WAS ADOPTED.

The Treasurer re-appointed the following Special Committee on Continuing Education of the Bar: Messrs. Pickup (Chairman), Beaton, Blackwell, Davis, Jamieson and Shaver.

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#### SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON LEGISLATION.

In the absence of the Chairman, Mr. Jamieson presented the Report:

#### RE BANKRUPTCY ACT—TARIFF.

As reported to Convocation in March last, the Society, on the recommendation of your Special Committee, has through its counsel herein and in association with the Bar of the Province of Quebec and the Bar of Montreal, made representations to the Registrar in Bankruptcy for a substantial increase in the tariff

of costs to be included in the regulations under the new Bankruptcy Act. On May 15th Mr. A. J. MacLeod, the new Superintendent, wrote the Society asking for specific information on certain matters in connection with the tariff.

Pursuant to the recommendations of your Committee on May 18th, the Chairman and Secretary wrote Mr. MacLeod re-stating the views of the Society with reference to an increase in the tariff of costs. Copies of these letters and other relevant material were sent to Messrs. Pickup and MacTavish and to Mr. Lee A. Kelley, K.C., counsel for the Society herein, with the request that they wait upon the Minister of Justice and acquaint him with the Society's views. An appointment could not be arranged with the Minister of Justice, but Mr. MacTavish and Mr. Kelley had a long and detailed interview with the Superintendent. Mr. MacTavish and Mr. Kelley later reported on increases on a large number of items, and on an addition at the end of the tariff of the following omnibus clause—

“The Taxing Officer may in his discretion allow fair and reasonable fees and allowances for necessary and proper services rendered by solicitors and counsel for which no fee or allowance is provided by the tariff.”

It is understood that the tariff as fixed by these changes is not to be regarded as final, but may be reviewed at a later date in the light of experience under the administration of the new Bankruptcy Act.

Your Committee notes with approval the increases in this tariff, and records its appreciation of the consideration and courtesy extended by Mr. MacLeod, the Superintendent, and its thanks to Mr. Lee A. Kelley, K.C., counsel herein, to Mr. MacTavish, and other members of the Bar who assisted your Committee.

THE REPORT WAS ADOPTED.

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#### SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON HISTORY, Etc.

Mr. McCarthy read to Convocation his letter of June 7, 1950 reporting that his Committee was having little success in gathering information, particularly from the profession outside of Toronto, and reported on the further efforts of his Committee.



*Ordered* that the Committee be continued, and the Benchers were urged to request the County Law Associations to assist in this matter.

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SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON LEGAL AID FOR NEEDY  
PERSONS—Mr. Chitty.

So far the activities of your Committee have been directed to obtaining evidence upon which to base a scheme for legal aid. It has made its own canvass of the County Law Associations, but was not satisfied with the results. Learning that the Survey of the Legal Profession in Canada was making an independent canvass of local welfare organizations, the Committee has arranged with the Director of the Survey for a report from him of the results of its canvass. That report has not been received. As soon as it has been received, your Committee ought to be in a position to formulate a scheme and report progress and be permitted to continue its work.

THE REPORT WAS ADOPTED.

The Treasurer read a letter dated June 13, 1950 from Mr. W. Gibson Gray for the Ontario Section of the Canadian Bar Association's Committee on Administration of Civil Justice, pointing out the delay in this matter.

Mr. Chitty stated that his Committee would proceed with this work forthwith, and that he would bring in a final Report in September next, or October at the latest.

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Convocation adjourned at 12:50 p.m.

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Convocation resumed at 1:50 p.m., a quorum being present.

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CORRESPONDENCE.

The Treasurer read the following correspondence:

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## SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON UNIFORM STANDARDS FOR ADMISSION OF BARRISTERS AND STUDENTS FROM ONE COMMON LAW PROVINCE TO ANOTHER—Mr. Jamieson

The Special Committee of the Benchers of the Law Society of Upper Canada on Uniform Standards of Admission, begs leave to make the following interim report:

1. Your Committee has met and has considered the report of the Special Committee of the Conference of the Governing

Bodies of the Legal Profession in Canada on Uniform Standards of Admission of barristers and students from one common law province to another, and notes that such report will come before the annual meeting of the Conference to be held in Washington in September 1950 for consideration.

2. Your Committee has carefully considered the information and material made available to it both by the chairman of the special committee of the Conference and by the Ontario representative on such special committee, and it would appear that the matter was considered having regard to and in the light of the five-year matriculant course and the three-year graduate course at Osgoode Hall which was in effect up until last year and that the matter under review has not been considered in the light of the present six-year matriculant course and four-year graduate course at Osgoode Hall, and your committee is of opinion that the whole matter under review should be reconsidered in the light of the new course at Osgoode Hall.

3. Your Committee therefore recommends that the representative of the Law Society of Upper Canada to the Conference of the Governing Bodies of the Legal Profession in Canada be instructed to request the annual meeting of the Conference at Washington in September 1950 to postpone until the annual meeting in 1951 further consideration of the report of the special Committee of the Conference on Uniform Standards so that the matter under review can be considered in the light of the present course at Osgoode Hall and so that your committee will have an opportunity to make such further inquiries and obtain such additional information as it may deem advisable before further reporting to Convocation upon the report referred to it.

Mathews, K.C.*, has been appointed lecturer in Labour Law for one year from June 1, 1950.

*Approved.***D.V.A.—Extension Beyond Entitlement.**

The Dean suggests that students of the Osgoode Hall Law School who obtain an average of 66 per cent or better on their year's work, be treated in the same way as university students

who do so, and should be regarded as entitled to receive extension beyond entitlement, and that such extension should be allowed if either they are in the first 25 per cent. of the year or they obtain an average of 66 per cent. or over.

Veteran students are entitled to extension beyond entitlement if on the final examinations of any year they are in the top quarter of the class or obtain at least second class honours (66-74 per cent.).

The Osgoode Hall Law School awards only Honours (75 per cent. or better), Pass, Class I (65-74 per cent.), and Pass, Class II (50-64 per cent.).

In consideration of the fact that Pass, Class I standing substantially approximates second class honours in other educational institutions, YOUR COMMITTEE THEREFORE RECOMMENDS to the Department of Veterans Affairs for consideration the granting of extension beyond entitlement to Osgoode Hall Law students who are in the top quarter of their class, or obtain Pass, Class I standing.

## DEPARTMENT OF VETERANS AFFAIRS.

*Extension beyond entitlement.*

At its meeting on 19th July 1950 the Committee considered the following matter:

"Veteran students are entitled to extension beyond entitlement if on the final examinations of any year they are in the top quarter of the class or obtain at least second class honours (66-74 per cent.).

"The Osgoode Hall Law School awards only Honours (75 per cent. or better), Pass Class I (65-74 per cent.), and Pass Class II (50-65 per cent.).

"In consideration of the fact that Pass Class I standing substantially approximates second class honours in other educational institutions, your Committee therefore recommends to the Department of Veterans Affairs for consideration the granting of extension beyond entitlement to Osgoode Hall Law School students who are in the top quarter of their class, or obtain Pass Class I standing."

A copy of this recommendation was sent to A R. Whitten, District Supervisor of Training Services, on 21st July 1950.

A letter from Richard H. Rohmer, second year student, with reference to this matter is submitted.

Your Committee recommends that this matter stand for further consideration and that in the meantime it be referred to Mr. MacTavish to take up with the Minister, The Honourable Hugues Lapointe (Minister of Veterans Affairs).

## THREE YEAR COURSE—Service under Articles.

*George Edmonds*—2nd year student—submits a petition on behalf of those students now attending Second Year and who were allowed to repeat their First Year under the old three year course.

Your Committee recommends that the students in this class be informed that their attendance in the Second Year of the full-time course will be accepted in lieu of service under articles; and further recommends that as these students themselves petitioned for the special relief which has now been granted to them, they must attend as students of a full-time Law School.

## STATUTES.

Earlier this year the Society was caused some inconvenience owing to the fact that in 1949 there was a special session of the Dominion Parliament and a second volume of Statutes was distributed without notice to the Society to those solicitors on the 1950 Statute list. This meant a letter to 1,470 solicitors on the list requesting them to remit \$3.75 each. After two letters 111 solicitors have not yet paid.

On September 6th the Secretary wrote the Department of Public Printing asking if there might be a volume of Statutes, 1950, Second Session, and the Department answered that the Statutes of the Special Session 1950 would be printed as usual.

Your Committee recommends that, with reference to the Dominion Statutes 1950, Second Session, a notice be published in the Ontario Weekly Notes informing all members of the Society who wish to obtain this volume to apply direct to the King's Printer, Ottawa.



## CHARGE FOR ANNUAL STATUTES, 1951, ONTARIO AND DOMINION.

Your Committee recommends that Volume I only of the Dominion Statutes 1951, be included in the Statutes subscribed for through the Society, and that the price for the Ontario Statutes and Volume I of the Dominion Statutes 1951 be fixed at \$6.00.

## LUNCHEON ROOM.

The Misses Lennox presented a statement of operations for the period, September 1, 1949 to August 31, 1950, showing a net profit of \$2,000.00 During the year 31,353 meals were served, of which 3,190 were special dinners. The coffee shop, the operation of which is included in the statement, served 8,340 orders.

It was resolved that upon the facts ascertained and appearing by the said Report and the evidence and other papers referred to and submitted to Convocation therewith, Convocation finds the said NORMAN LICKERS guilty of professional misconduct, and of conduct unbecoming a Barrister and Solicitor in respect of the charges dealt with by the said Report.

That the said NORMAN LICKERS be disbarred.

That the said NORMAN LICKERS is unworthy to practise as a solicitor.

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#### LIBRARY COMMITTEE.

At the request of the Chairman, Mr. Wilson presented the Report.

## ACCOUNTANTS.

At the June meeting of the Committee it was reported that the appeal on behalf of the Law Society was dismissed. It was recommended that the question of the appeal to the Supreme Court of Canada be referred to the Chairman and the Treasurer with power to act in consultation with counsel, with a recommendation of your Committee that an appeal be taken if there is such right and if counsel so advises.

On June 24, 1950 Mr. J. L. McLennan, K.C., and Mr. G. A. Martin, K.C., wrote the Secretary, concluding their letter as follows:

"However, in the light of the above authorities we have reluctantly come to the conclusion that the Supreme Court of Canada has no jurisdiction to entertain an appeal from the judgment of the Ontario Court of Appeal in this matter."

Under these circumstances the Chairman and Treasurer directed that no further action be taken.

Your Committee recommends that the action taken herein be approved and confirmed.

*Rex v. Dunn*—Mr. Dunn was convicted before a Magistrate and has appealed. The appeal has been adjourned from time to time, and counsel now asks instructions.

Your Committee recommends that counsel be instructed to consent to the allowance of the appeal.

McCarthy, K.C., pointing out that his Special Committee has received no encouragement, either as a result of the notices published in the Ontario Weekly Notes, or of the letters which he had written to individual members of the Society; and requesting that his Special Committee be discharged.

Moved by Mr. McLaughlin, seconded by Mr. Rigney, that the Special Committee on History be discharged with regret; and that Convocation express to Mr. McCarthy and the members of his Committee its sincere thanks and appreciation for their efforts in this behalf.

## ANNUAL REPORT.

Your Committee presents the annual report on library operations covering the period from the 1st September 1949 to the 31st August 1950:

During the year, 862 volumes were added to the library, this being 284 less than the number added in the previous year. Included in the 862 volumes are 75 text-books or supplements to earlier ones. In the previous year the Committee made the following large purchases: The Fifth Decennial Digest of American reports, the U.S. Aviation Cases, the Air Law Review, and back numbers of the Conveyancer and Property Lawyer. In this year the only large purchase was of the first fifteen volumes of the new edition of Halsbury's statutes. Some 507 volumes were repaired, at a cost of \$1,497.36, as compared with 682 volumes at \$1,969.93 in the previous year. It is expected that a larger number of volumes will need to be repaired in the present year.

The Great Library was very much used in the evenings and on Saturday afternoons, the attendance book showing 627 attendances by members of the profession and 1,742 by students. The students' library also was open in the evenings from the 24th October to the 20th December 1949 and from the 1st February to the 18th May 1950. The Committee increased the number of student librarians to 10, so that there was always a librarian in charge of each library.

Over three hundred volumes of Canadian statutes and reports were given to the Gray's Inn Library to replace books lost during the war.

The American Room, the West Room and the corridor between them were redecorated during Long Vacation. This redecoration has been almost completed and the Committee is confident that it will be completed in the near future.

#### ASSISTANCE TO EXAMINERS in Reading of Examination Papers.

#### SERVICE UNDER ARTICLES.

On 1st November 1950, G. W. Edmonds, Secretary of the Osgoode Legal and Literary Society, sent a circular letter to all solicitors to whom the present Third Year students are articulated, calling attention to the Objects of Office Training as set out on pages 17 and 18 of the Handbook. #### MEMORANDA FROM THE DEAN.

Memoranda from the Dean are submitted making suggestions:

##### 1. *re Admission to the Law School.*

The Dean suggests — in accordance with the practice of universities and other law schools — that it be published in the Handbook that the date for registration of students for the attendance at the Law School for the academic year should be “on or before the first day of the law school term”.

He also suggests that the Secretary's office be given discretion to admit students who register within two weeks thereafter, on giving any reasonable excuse for the delay.

He further suggests that after two weeks students should not be admitted without the consent of himself, as Dean, or of the Legal Education Committee.

Your Committee recommends that the Dean's suggestion be adopted.

2. *re Marks.*

The Dean suggests that Pass Class I should be 66-74% instead of — as at present — 65-74%. This will be much more convenient, especially for D.V.A. purposes, as making the classification identical with what is "Second class Honours" in most universities.

Your Committee recommends that the Dean's suggestion be adopted.

3. *re Special Petitions.*

The Dean suggests that it be a standing order of the Legal Education Committee that all special petitions for consideration at any meeting of the Committee must be handed in at the Secretary's office at least two clear days before the meeting so that the matter may be put on the agenda and ample time may be given to the Secretary and the Dean for making a memorandum of the facts for the Committee. A notice that such petitions should be handed in could be put on the notice board so that all students will have knowledge of the deadline.

Your Committee recommends that the Dean's suggestion be adopted.

## RE BURSARIES.

*Wallace Nesbitt Trust Fund.**Osgoode Hall COTC World War Memorial Prize.*

The Report of the Sub-committee on the award of these Bursaries for 1950-51 is before the Committee for approval.

## SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON LEGAL AID FOR NEEDY PERSONS.

Mr. Chitty presented the Report of the Special Committee which was considered clause by clause.

On January 15th 1948, Convocation adopted a report of the Special Committee recommending that a scheme of the nature of that propounded by the Rushcliffe Report ought to be instituted in Ontario; that primarily the responsibility for the organization of such a scheme rests with the Law Society; and that the then Committee be enlarged and made a Committee to report to Convocation upon such a scheme.

The Committee after full consideration propounds the following scheme and recommends that it be put into effect as soon as possible.

(1) In each County or District City or Town there be set up one or more clinics to be held at some convenient place on regular dates and at convenient hours.

Each clinic shall consist of two or more persons, at least one of whom shall be a solicitor. The local Association will be requested to canvass its membership and the local welfare organizations and obtain a list of volunteers who will take turns in conducting the clinic. A list of students available will also be prepared and if students are available they will be assigned to the clinic for definite periods.

The function of the clinic will be—

- (a) to ascertain the nature of the work required to be done by the applicant for legal aid;
- (b) to dispose of those applications—
  - (i) having no merit
  - (ii) requiring only advice that can be given on the spot.
- (c) to report to the local director all cases requiring further services of a solicitor;
- (d) to ascertain the extent of the ability of the applicant to pay for the services of a solicitor, cataloguing the applicants as follows:
  - (i) unable to pay anything
  - (ii) able to pay disbursements only

(iii) able to pay some compensation for services rendered.

(2) The Director shall appoint for each County or District, a local director whose functions shall be:

- (a) to organize the clinic and see that those assigned to its conduct attend thereat;
- (b) to receive the reports from the clinic;
- (c) to keep a list of solicitors, hereinafter called the panel, and assign to members of the panel cases reported from the clinic as requiring further work;
- (d) to notify the applicant of the name of the solicitor to whom his case has been assigned.

(3) In each County or District the law association will be requested to canvass its membership and ask for volunteers to take cases reported to the local director from the clinic as requiring further work. These volunteers should be requested to state:

- (a) the type of case or work they are prepared to take;
  - (b) the number of cases they are prepared to take in a year.
- This will be the panel and the local director will assign each case to a member of the panel according to the information given in (a) and (b) above.

Once a case has been assigned to a member of the panel he will be in complete charge, but will as required by the local director report from time to time progress with the case or work.

(4) Each County or District law association will be requested to set up an advisory committee of not less than three to assist the local director.

(5) There will be a director appointed by the Benchers of the Law Society to supervise the scheme generally. His function will be to see that the clinics and panels are set up and that the local directors are appointed and the system in each County or District functions properly. He will advise and work with the local directors and their advisory council in deciding such matters as the frequency and hours of the clinics. He will make such regulations, subject to the approval of Convocation, as he may consider necessary for the proper carrying out of the scheme.

## (6) Salaries and fees:

- (a) the salary of the director will be paid by the Law Society
- (b) all other work in setting up and carrying out the scheme will be voluntary;
- (c) (i) if an applicant is catalogued as unable to pay anything, the Law Society may reimburse the member of the panel doing the work for his disbursements.
- (ii) if the applicant can pay some compensation for services rendered, the panel member may accept it.
- (iii) if a judgment is recovered with costs and realized upon, the panel member may tax and charge a solicitor and client bill.

It is suggested that in the larger urban centres the Director, local director and advisory committee be given a fairly wide discretion to adapt the scheme to particular local needs.

All County or District Judges, Magistrates and welfare organizations and service clubs should be notified of the dates and hours of the holding of the clinics.

## PROCEDURE IN CRIMINAL MATTERS.

(a) In preparing the panel in civil matters members of the Law Associations should be asked also to state if they would be willing to take criminal cases, and a panel of those volunteering should thus be prepared.

(b) The Attorney-General should be approached with a view to arrangements being made for—

- (i) notifying every needy person charged with any indictable offence punishable with imprisonment, upon remand or arraignment, that he may have a lawyer assigned to him;
- (ii) notifying the local director of any request for legal aid by any person so charged.

## GENERALLY.

The Attorney-General should be requested to give instructions to all persons under his direction to facilitate the scheme.

Moved by Mr. Chitty, seconded by Mr. Jamieson, that the Report be adopted.



Moved in amendment by Mr. Walsh, seconded by Mr. Evans, that the Report be not now adopted, but that copies of the Report be sent forthwith to all County and District Law Associations for their consideration so that the Special Committee may obtain and consider the views of the Associations; and that the Report be placed on the agenda for the meeting in March 1951.

The amendment was lost.

It was resolved that upon the facts ascertained and appearing by the said Report and the evidence and other papers referred to and submitted to Convocation therewith, Convocation finds the said *Adrian C. Letourneau* guilty of professional misconduct, and of conduct unbecoming a Barrister and Solicitor in respect of the charge dealt with by the said Report.

That the said *Adrian C. Letourneau* be disbarred.

That the said *Adrian C. Letourneau* is unworthy to practise as a solicitor.

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#### LIBRARY COMMITTEE—Mr. Shaver.

##### GRAY'S INN LIBRARY.

When certain of the statutes of Ontario and of the Statutes of Canada were donated to Gray's Inn Library by the Osgoode Hall Library in May of this year, Ontario statutes from 1914 to 1921 inclusive, Statutes of Canada from 1909 to 1918 inclusive, and the Revised Statutes of Canada, 1906, were omitted because it was expected that they would be otherwise donated. This expectation has not been realized and your Committee has authorized the Chief Librarian to forward to the Gray's Inn Library the statutes enumerated.

##### AMERICAN ASSOCIATION OF LAW LIBRARIES.

Your Committee reports that Mr. Johnston, the Chief Librarian, is the President-elect of the American Association of Law Libraries, the mid-winter Executive committee meeting of which Association is to be held in December 1950 and the next annual meeting in Boston in June 1951.

The Society may enter into and carry out its obligations under the Scheme of Legal Aid for Needy Persons approved by Convocation at its Meeting on November 16th, 1950 (a copy whereof is recorded in the Minutes of said Meeting), with such amendments as may be made therein from time to time with the approval of Convocation, and may provide for the payment from time to time of the expenditures required to be made by the Society under the Scheme. The Committee on Legal Aid shall have the general supervision of the Scheme and, subject to the approval of Convocation, may make such regulations and appoint such officials as the Committee may deem necessary or desirable for carrying out the purposes of the Scheme."

*Carried.*

Moved by Mr. Jamieson, seconded by Mr. Walsh,

That Rule 22 be suspended;

That Rule 28(1) be amended by inserting immediately after the words "Public Relations Committee" the words " and the Legal Aid Committee" so that the section will read:

"The Standing Committees shall each consist of not less than fourteen members, except the Public Relations Committee and the Legal Aid Committee, which shall consist of not less than five members."

Your Committee recommends that the request be granted.



## DEPARTMENT OF VETERANS AFFAIRS.

*Allowances—new 4 year course.*

The question of payment to students during the Third year of the new four year course was before the Committee in September and October 1949 and the Committee recommended that the matter be referred to the Chairman with power to act and that he be authorized if he considered it necessary to attend on the Minister at Ottawa with the President of the Osgoode Hall Legal and Literary Society at the expense of the Law Society.

In August 1949 the Toronto Office of the D.V.A. issued the following directive to its counselling staff:

“Toronto 1, August 11th 1949.

“To: Counselling Staff.

Subject: *New Osgoode Hall Course.*

File No. 66-9-5.

The new Osgoode Hall course which commences this fall consists of four years of work of which the first two are entirely academic, the third is entirely training on the job, and the fourth is a combination of both types of training.

Some time ago, I requested Head Office to inform us of the policy to be followed concerning extension beyond entitlement in this course. No formal directive has yet been issued but the matter was discussed with Mr. H. W. Jamieson during his visit to the district this week, and I was informed that it was expected that the following policy would apply:

1. If the Veteran has sufficient service entitlement to cover the full four years of the course, appropriate allowances will be paid throughout.

2. If the Veteran has sufficient entitlement to carry him through the first three years of the course but not the entire fourth year, he may elect to be paid allowances, if required, for such period of the third year as remains after reserving sufficient entitlement to cover the fourth year of the course.

3. If he has sufficient service entitlement for the first two years plus a balance not sufficient to cover the fourth year, he

can earn extension beyond entitlement to complete the fourth year by obtaining top quarter standing in the second year examinations. It should be made clear that such extension will not cover any portion of the third year training on the job.

It is assumed that the regulations which give a pensioner unlimited entitlement, so long as he passes his examinations, will apply to the Osgoode Hall course and entitle the pensioner to payment of allowances if required during the T.O.J. period.

In December 1949 Mr. Cassels had a long interview with Mr. H. W. Jamieson of D.V.A. Headquarters staff and Mr. Whitten, District Supervisor of Training Services in Toronto. The above directive was discussed at length. As a result of this interview Mr. Cassels was strongly of the opinion that it would be inadvisable to press, at the present time, for a ruling in regard to the granting of allowances on the basis of examination standing during the period spent entirely in office work. The Chairman therefore recommends that this matter be taken up with the D.V.A. Toronto office in January 1951.

The above directive and the results of Mr. Cassels' interview with officials of the D.V.A. have been communicated to representatives of the student body and they agree with Mr. Cassels' recommendation.

The Committee recommended that this matter stand until January 1951.

Your Committee recommends that this matter be referred to Mr. Cassels and Mr. MacTavish for further consultation with the D.V.A.

ORAL EXAMINATIONS 1951.

*Second year—4 year course.*

At its meeting in April 1950, the Committee recommended "that next year's class be warned that all students must obtain a rating on the Second year Oral examination before proceeding

to the Third year." In previous years the Second year was serving in offices and was given an Oral examination by practising Solicitors. The present Second year students have not yet been articled but have attended Practice Groups in their First year and are now attending Groups in their Second year. Your Committee considered the question of whether Oral examinations should be given by each Group Instructor or whether a special Oral examination should be given. Your Committee had before it a letter from Mr. Sydney L. Robins, Supervisor of Practice Groups and approves of his suggestions.

Your Committee recommends that students of the Second year be examined by their Group Instructors and that if any Student fails to obtain a rating he be given a supplemental Oral examination by an independent examiner and that his period of service under articles will not begin until he has obtained a Rating.

#### SERVICE UNDER ARTICLES.

##### *Matriculant Students (new 6 year course).*

The Secretary reports that he has received certificates of service under articles of the students of the Matriculant Class (7) in the new six year course, for the past two months as required by the resolution of Convocation of 20th October 1949.

*Approved.*

#### CALL TO THE BAR.

##### *Graduate Students—4 year course.*

On 16th June, 1949 Convocation adopted the Committee's recommendation "that students of the Graduate Class be required to serve under articles from September 1st following the completion of their 2nd year in the Law School until Call to the Bar."

On 20th October 1949 Convocation adopted the Committee's recommendation "that when the Rules are amended, that in lieu of three years service as now required, there will be required service of twenty-four months."

As the students are now enquiring whether or not they will receive a June Call on graduation, the Secretary asks for clarification of the above resolutions.

Your Committee recommends that students of the Graduate Class in the new four year course, on completion of their Second year at the Law School, be required to enter into articles with a practising Solicitor anywhere in Ontario for the period of twenty-four months; that where necessary these Articles may be assigned to a Toronto Solicitor during the period of service required in Final year at the Osgoode Hall Law School.

Your Committee further recommends that to be eligible for a June Call to the Bar on graduation, students must begin their service immediately on completing their Second year at the Osgoode Hall Law School and file their Articles with the Secretary before the 15th of June in that year. Students not filing their articles before that date will be required to serve 24 months from the date of commencing their service and will be eligible for Call to the Bar at the next Convocation after the completion of such service.

Your Committee also recommends that on registering for his Final year at the Osgoode Hall Law School, each student must present a Certificate from his Solicitor showing that he has been actually serving full-time in the Solicitor's office for the period required during the Third year of his course, which period must have commenced before the 15th of September of the previous year.

#### SUMMER VACATION.

Your Committee recommends that during their period of service under articles, students be allowed summer holidays of not more than three weeks.

asked permission to hold its Annual Meeting and dinner in the Club Room and Convocation Hall on January 19th.

The Association also requested the use of the large classroom for Thursday, January 25th, at 4 p.m. for an address by Mr. Robinette on "Presentation of Argument". This address is arranged under the policy of continuing legal education as planned by the Legal Education Committee, Ontario Section, Canadian Bar Association.

Your Committee recommends that the request be granted.

## MISSING BOOKS.

Your Committee reports that 56 texts were missing from the shelves in January 1948, of which 32 are still missing, that 58 others were missing in June 1949, of which 32 are still missing, and that 29 more are now missing. Your Committee discussed at length various plans which might be adopted and recommends that the Chief Librarian take whatever steps he may consider advisable to prevent the disappearance of books in the future.

## BOOK-CASES.

Your Committee reports specially that the Peterborough Association, having failed to file its annual returns within three months from the 15th January, 1950, has now filed its Annual Returns for the year 1949 and otherwise complied with the Rules adopted from time to time relating to law libraries, and recommends that a grant be made to the Association of \$774.07, the amount to which it would have been entitled if its returns had been filed within the time limited under Rule 62.

#### COMMUNICATIONS WITH COUNTY LAW ASSOCIATIONS.

Inquiries have been received from certain of the county Associations with reference to communications from other Committees to them. Your Committee suggests that matters relating to functioning of the libraries of County Law Associations should be taken up with them through this Committee.

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#### LEGAL AID COMMITTEE.

In the absence of the Chairman, Mr. Robinette, the Vice-Chairman, presented the Report.

At the meeting of Convocation on November 16, 1950, following the adoption of the Report of the Special Committee on Legal Aid for Needy Persons, Rule 27(1) was amended by providing for a Standing Committee on Legal Aid. It was further resolved that the Treasurer appoint a Standing Committee on Legal Aid, and on November 22, 1950, the Treasurer appointed the following Committee:

Messrs. Blackwell, Chitty, Common, Conant, Jamieson, Robinette, Springsteen and Willmott.

Your Committee held its first meeting on December 5, 1950, when the following members were present:

The Treasurer, and Messrs. Blackwell, Chitty, Common, Conant, Robinette, Springsteen and Willmott.

Mr. L. E. Blackwell, K.C., was elected Chairman, and Mr. J.J. Robinette, K.C., Vice-Chairman.

Your Committee considered a suggestion that the legal aid scheme be set up at this time only in some of the larger centres on an experimental basis, but your Committee recommends that the Report of the Special Committee be implemented as soon as possible.

Your Committee recommended that the Report of the Special Committee be published forthwith in Ontario Weekly Notes, and this has been done.

Your Committee appointed a sub-committee consisting of the Chairman, the Vice-Chairman and the Secretary to draft a set of regulations for the guidance of the County and District Law Associations in implementing the Report, such draft regulations to be submitted for consideration to your Committee and to Convocation.

Your Committee recommends that when copies of the Report of the Special Committee and of the Regulations as approved are sent with instructions to the County and District Law Associations, the members of your Committee be prepared to speak on the plan on a request from any such Association.

Since the announcement of the plans for legal aid in the daily and weekly press throughout the Province, various requests for legal aid have been received at the Law Society office. Your Committee is pleased to report that several firms and individual solicitors in Toronto, and several local Law Associations have offered assistance until the clinics and panels are set up. The requests for legal aid have been referred by the Secretary to these members of the profession.

## SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON CONTINUING EDUCATION— Mr. Pickup.

Your Committee met on Wednesday, January 17th, 1951, the following members being present:

Messrs. Pickup (Chairman), the Treasurer and Beaton, Davis and Jamieson.

At the meeting of Convocation on November 16, 1950, your Committee reported on the special course of lectures on Conveyancing and Real Property, and on Surrogate Court Practice, as arranged for the week-ends of March 1st, 2nd and 3rd, and March 8th, 9th and 10th. Since that time announcement of the special course has been given to members of the profession through the Ontario Weekly Notes, and through press releases to the daily and weekly press throughout Ontario. To date 186 have registered for the course, of whom 63, or 33% are from outside the Toronto metropolitan area. Many other members of the profession have ordered copies of the printed lectures.

In November, 1950, the Chairman of your Committee was informed by Mr. Edson Haines, Chairman of the Ontario Section on Legal Education, Canadian Bar Association, that the Section proposed to hold continuing legal education clinics at County or District towns throughout the Province, using as lecturers or clinic leaders members of the profession prominent in their particular fields. The co-operation and assistance of your Committee was requested in the publication of a notice without charge in Ontario Weekly Notes, and in the preparation and sending out of mimeographed material to the County and District Law Associations. Your Committee was pleased to be of assistance in these plans for continuing legal education to the profession in Ontario. The necessary announcements have been sent out, one trial clinic was held with success in Barrie, and others are planned for various points throughout the Province.

On January 25th Mr. J. J. Robinette, K.C. will address the members of the County of York Law Association in the large classroom in the Law School.

In 1950 Richard DeBoo Limited printed 1750 volumes of the Special Lectures on Company Law. In the autumn of 1950 Mr.

Donald B. Spence, Lecturer in Company Law, recommended this volume to the students of the Second Year for special reading. When informed of this Mr. DeBoo made copies available to these students at a special price. Every student in the Year purchased a volume, at this price.

Your Committee recommends that the Secretary be authorized to make arrangements similar to those of last year with Richard DeBoo Limited for the printing of the special lectures of this year.

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#### SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON LEGISLATION—Mr. Walsh.

Your Committee met on Thursday, the 18th day of January 1951, the following members being present: Messrs. Walsh (Chairman), Chitty, Hays and Marshall; and the following members present at the Unauthorized Practice Committee—Messrs. Beaton, Brooks, Clement, Davis, Evans, Jamieson, W. G. Kerr, McKay, Seymour, Weir, Willmott and Wilson.

#### DESERTED WIVES AND CHILDREN'S MAINTENANCE ACT.

The Sault Ste. Marie Law Association suggested for consideration certain matters in connection with this Act. At the meeting of your Committee on November 16th, 1950, Mr. D. K. MacTavish was asked to confer with the Canadian Welfare Council, and the Secretary with the Commissioners on Uniformity of Legislation. Mr. MacTavish's report read in part as follows:

"I am informed that the Canadian Welfare Council did in fact submit representations to the Government or to the Attorney-General of each province which led to amendments to The Deserted Wives' and Children's Maintenance Act providing for reciprocal agreements with respect to enforcement of maintenance orders. I understand that several, if not all the provinces passed legislation along this line but not many reciprocal agreements have been worked out, and possibly the only one in existence is one between the Province of Ontario and the Province of Nova Scotia."



Mr. MacTavish also submitted a summary of relevant Dominion and Provincial Legislation in this matter prepared by the Canadian Welfare Council, but it contains legislation only to November 1941.

The Secretary discussed this matter with Mr. L. R. MacTavish, K.C., Legislative Counsel, and Secretary of the Commissioners on Uniformity of Legislation, and he referred to an amendment of the Act, 1948, Chapter 26.

DEPENDANTS RELIEF ACT.

DESERTED WIVES AND CHILDREN'S MAINTENANCE ACT.

At the meeting of your Committee on November 16th the Chairman read a letter from Mr. W. P. Clement, K.C. with reference to certain matters arising out of the administration of these Acts. The Secretary was asked to consult with the Canadian Bar Association, Ontario Section, on the Administration of Civil Justice. Mr. J. R. Maclaren, K.C., Chairman of the Section, in a letter of December 5, 1950, stated in part as follows:

"If it is the desire of your Legislation Committee that our Committee should give the matter consideration, I shall be pleased to bring the matter to their attention at our next meeting."

The Secretary also discussed these matters with Mr. L. R. MacTavish, K.C., Legislative Counsel, who suggested that there was not at this stage much point in referring these matters to him, but if and when the Committee decides to make representations it should be done to the Attorney-General, and he suggested that with any resolution forwarded to the Attorney-General there should be a brief setting out actual cases and the reasons behind the resolution.

Your Committee therefore recommends that the question of possible amendment and improvement of these two Acts be referred for consideration and report to the Ontario Section of the Administration of Civil Justice, Canadian Bar Association, and that the Section be requested to notify the Secretary of this Society of any action or recommendation that may be made.

## SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON WAR MEMORIAL—Mr. Beaton.

When your Committee reported to Convocation on January 19, 1950, it was proposed that the life-size figure of a young woman holding aloft in her arms a young child, would be 7 feet high, and mounted on a granite base so that the height of the memorial would be approximately 12 feet. Mr. Horne, the sculptor, and Mr. Marani, the architect, after making tests with figure and base of the actual sizes proposed, decided to alter the proportion of the base. The base will now be 2 feet 1½ inches high, 4 feet 6¾ inches at the base, and 3 feet 7¼ inches at the top. Originally the artist and architect had recommended Swedish green granite for the base, but this is unobtainable. It is fortunate that arrangements for the base were not made earlier as it will now be made of a Canadian stone recently discovered. It is a beautiful green granite called Scottstown, and quarried in Quebec.

On the front (south) side of the base there will be a cross, and on the left-hand side "1939" and on the right "1945", and the names of the fifty members of the Society who fell in the last war will appear on the other three sides.

Around the border of the top of the base will be the following words: "For your tomorrow we gave our today                      The Law Society of Upper Canada".

The 3 foot model of the figure has been sent to New York where a life-size plaster cast is being made. From this model the green bronze figure will be cast. Mr. Horne and Mr. Marani will be in New York to supervise this work.

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#### UNAUTHORIZED PRACTICE COMMITTEE—Mr. Walsh.

Your Committee met on the 15th day of February, 1951, the following members being present:

Messrs. Walsh (Chairman), the Treasurer, Beaton, Brooks, Chitty, Clement, Davis, Evans, Hamilton, Hays, Jamieson, F. D. Kerr, Marshall, McKay, MacTavish, Parkinson, Seymour, Springsteen, Weir and Willmott.

Your Committee considered certain matters of unauthorized practice that had been brought to its attention, and in one case referred the matter to counsel for investigation and report.

#### TRUST COMPANIES—Advertising.

The attention of your Committee was drawn to the forms of advertising used by some of the Trust Companies, and after careful consideration your Committee in March 1950 approved in principle of considering this subject as a matter of public relations, and suggested consideration of a campaign of public information. The matter was referred to a sub-committee consisting of Mr. Walsh, (Chairman), the Treasurer, and Messrs. Brooks, Hays, Marshall and Weir.

The matter has been before the sub-committee at every meeting since that date, and all members of your Committee were invited to attend all such meetings.

After considerable discussion it was decided in November 1950 to send a letter and folder with sample information releases to all County and District Law Associations, asking for their views and comments, and whether if necessary the Associations or their members would be willing to contribute to the cost.

By February 15, 1951 twenty-eight Law Associations had replied. All but one approve in principle of the policy. Many of

the Associations replying would contribute to the cost on an equitable basis. Several Associations did not approve of the publications in the form submitted, and in other cases approval of the policy was conditional on equitable distribution of the information and of the cost, and on further information. There was, however, almost unanimous approval of the principle.

The sub-committee recommended approval of the principle of public information, and that the carrying out of the principle and the details be referred to the Public Relations Committee.

Your Committee approves of the recommendation of the sub-committee, and in turn recommends the approval of Convocation.

Mr. Walsh outlined in detail the action taken by the sub-committee on Trust Companies with reference to public information, and read a summary of the replies from twenty-eight County Law Associations.

Moved by Mr. Walsh, seconded by Mr. Jamieson, that the Report be adopted.

*Carried.*

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#### PUBLIC RELATIONS COMMITTEE—Mr. Jamieson.

Your Committee met on Wednesday, the 14th day of February 1951, the following members being present:

Messrs. Jamieson (Chairman), Beaton, Cassels and Chitty.

Some months ago the Unauthorized Practice Committee appointed a sub-committee to consider the problems in connection with trust companies, and in particular with the advertising of some trust companies. In November last the sub-committee recommended that the Secretary send a letter and folder with sample information releases to all County and District Law Associations asking for their views and comments, and whether if necessary the Associations or their members would be willing to contribute to the cost. To this date twenty-eight Associations have replied, and the information from these replies has been made available to your Committee as well as to the sub-committee. Your Committee is most appreciative of this work done by the sub-committee, and wishes to thank it for the valu-

able information obtained. Your Committee is, however, of the opinion that any general campaign of public information should be under the control and administration of the Public Relations Committee.

Your Committee is further of the opinion that the approach to any such campaign should be from the educational point of view, to the end that the public may be informed of the services that members of the profession are qualified to render and that public information directed to creating or increasing professional business for lawyers should be avoided.

The replies from the twenty-eight County and District Law Associations indicate almost unanimous approval of the principle of public information; the majority are ready to contribute, and a large number are of the opinion that the administration of the campaign should be in the control of the Law Society. The Federation of Ontario Law Associations, at its annual meeting, approved the principle and suggested a fee of \$5.00 per member be added to the annual fees of the Society.

Your Committee recommends that Convocation approve in principle of a program of public information to be carried out under the direction of your Committee; that your Committee be authorized to expend a sum not exceeding \$10,000.00, to employ the services of the Society's Public Relations Consultant, and to permit County Law Associations as such to provide local public information upon the material to be used being first submitted to and approved by your Committee.

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#### LEGAL AID COMMITTEE—Mr. Blackwell.

Your Committee met on the 14th day of February 1951, and the following members were present:

Messrs. Blackwell (Chairman), Robinette (Vice-Chairman), Chitty, Conant and Jamieson.

Your Committee had before it for consideration a draft of the proposed regulations to govern the Legal Aid Plan of the Law Society of Upper Canada, as prepared by the Subcommittee consisting of the Chairman, the Vice-Chairman, and the Secretary, and made some revision.

Your Committee recommends that the regulations as approved by your Committee, a copy of which is attached hereto as part of this Report, be approved by Convocation.



Your Committee recommends that it be authorized to make representations to the Government of the Province of Ontario that in cases of eligibility under the Ontario Legal Aid Plan, fees and costs be remitted.

Since the Plan was announced in November last, requests for legal aid have been referred by the Secretary to members of the profession who volunteered for this work. Your Committee has approved the payment of some costs incurred therein.

*Regulations governing The Legal Aid Plan of The Law Society of Upper Canada as passed by The Legal Aid Committee and approved by Convocation.*

1. The plan shall be known as THE ONTARIO LEGAL AID PLAN.
2. The plan shall be administered by—

- (a) A *Provincial Director* who shall be the Secretary of the Law Society of Upper Canada, or such other person as may be appointed by Convocation;
- (b) A *County Director* to be appointed in each County by the Provincial Director after consultation with the County Association.

(In these Regulations the word "County" shall include "District".)

- (c) A *Local Director*, or Local Directors as may be necessary throughout the County, to be appointed by the County Director after consultation with the County Advisory Committee.
- (d) A *County Advisory Committee* of not less than three members to be appointed by each County Law Association from its own members, to assist and advise the County Director.
- (e) *Legal Aid Clinics* to be established in such centres as may be considered desirable by the County Director after consultation with the County Advisory Committee.

3. The following persons shall be eligible for legal aid—

- (a) Any person certified by a public or private welfare authority or society as coming within the terms of paragraph (b) hereof.
- (b) Any person having annual earnings or other means of subsistence of less than \$900.00, together with additional amount of \$200.00 for each dependent, and having insufficient disposable capital to pay for legal services.
- (c) Where, although not qualified under (a) and (b) above, in the opinion of the Provincial Director on recommendation of the County Director the applicant, if required to pay for legal services, would impair his ability to furnish himself and his family with the essentials necessary to keep them decently fed, clothed, sheltered and living together as a family.

Where a matter is urgent for the preservation of the legal rights of an applicant, legal aid may be extended on the recommendation of the County Director, but shall be referred to the Provincial Director as above, and may be terminated.

4. The *functions of the Legal Aid Clinics*, or where no clinic is established, of the County Director or of a Local Director, shall be:

- (a) To determine the eligibility of the applicant for free legal aid.
- (b) To ascertain the nature of the work required to be done by the applicant for legal aid;
- (c) To dispose of those applications—
  - (i) having no merit,
  - (ii) requiring only advice that can be given on the spot.
- (d) To ascertain the extent of the ability of the applicant to pay for the services of a solicitor, cataloguing the applicants as follows:

- (i) unable to pay anything.
- (ii) able to pay some compensation for services rendered.
- (e) To report to the Local Director all cases requiring further services of a solicitor.

5. Upon receiving a report from a Legal Aid Clinic, or upon discharging the functions thereof, the County or Local Director shall:

- (a) (1) Where eligibility exists, assign the case to a panel lawyer and notify the applicant of the name of the solicitor.
- (2) Where the applicant is able to pay some fee—
  - (i) ascertain if the applicant knows a solicitor in whom he has confidence, and if so direct him to the solicitor and inform the solicitor of the circumstances;
  - (ii) if the applicant does not know a solicitor, refer him to any solicitor on the panel with a report on the case; and in such case any fee paid or costs recovered shall belong to the solicitor.
- (b) Report briefly to the Provincial Director on each application for legal aid, and the disposition thereof.

6. Legal aid SHALL NOT INCLUDE the following matters:

- (1) Proceedings wholly or partly in respect of
  - (a) defamation.
  - (b) breach of promise of marriage.
  - (c) the loss of the service of a woman or girl in consequence of her rape or seduction.
  - (d) alienation of affections.
  - (e) criminal conversation.
- (2) Relator actions.

(3) Proceedings for the recovery of a penalty where the proceedings may be taken by any person and the whole or part of the penalty is payable to the person taking the proceedings.

(4) Proceedings relating to any election.

(5) Proceedings subsequent to judgment for recovery of a liquidated sum.

(6) Proceedings in Bankruptcy subsequent to a Receiving Order or an authorized assignment.

(7) Criminal matters other than indictable offences punishable with imprisonment.

(8) Appeals, except where in the opinion of the Provincial Director, on the report of a County Director, there appears to have been a miscarriage of justice.

(9) Such other matters as in the opinion of the Provincial Director, on the recommendation of a County Director, should be excluded having regard to the nature of the matter.

#### 7. LEGAL AID FUND.

There shall be established a fund known as the *Legal Aid Fund* to which there shall be deposited—

- (a) Such appropriations as may be made by Convocation from time to time
- (b) Any compensation received by a solicitor or any costs recovered in a successful action under the Plan, subject to Section 5(a) (2) (ii) above.
- (c) Any remissions of costs or fees by any public authority; and from which there may be advanced to a solicitor necessary disbursements if the Provincial Director is of the opinion after consultation with the County Director that the matter for which disbursements are required comes within the Plan, and that it is reasonable under the circumstances of the case to advance the amount required.

February 14th, 1951.

Moved by Mr. Blackwell, seconded by Mr. Chitty, that the Report, including the draft regulations attached thereto as part of the Report, be adopted, and that where the regulations as adopted depart from the policy as set out in the Report of the Special Committee adopted by Convocation, the regulations shall prevail.

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SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON CONTINUING EDUCATION—  
Mr. Pickup.

In its Report dated January 17th your Special Committee recommended that the Secretary be authorized to make arrangements similar to those of last year with Richard De Boo Limited for the printing of special lectures this year.

Arrangements satisfactory to your Committee have now been made with Richard De Boo Limited. Owing to an increase of approximately 25 per cent. in printing costs since last year, the cost of the book to the Society has increased to some extent, and the price to the profession has increased from \$7.50 to \$9.00. The volume may be slightly larger than last year as there are twelve lectures in comparison to ten lectures last year.

The number of volumes, 400 to 425, supplied to the Society is made up of those to be given to the members registered for the course, to the special lecturers, to members of the Special Committee, the libraries at Osgoode Hall, and the County Law Associations. The latter will pay for their own volumes, but receive them at the advantageous price.

The volume will be uniform with that of last year so that eventually there will be a uniform set of special lectures.

In addition to the above terms, Mr. Richard De Boo has agreed that the volumes for the lecturers and for the members of the Committee will be specially bound as they were last year, and at no extra cost. He has also generously offered to supply to the Secretary at no cost sufficient volumes to send a complimentary copy to the Secretary of each of the other Law Societies in Canada and of the Law Society in England.

Each of the special lecturers will be introduced at his first lecture by the Chairman or a member of the Special Committee. To date 282 have registered for the course, and of this number

96 or 27 per cent. are from outside the Toronto metropolitan area.

### *Bachelor of Science in Agriculture.*

Porter, Registrar of Ontario Agricultural College, asking that graduates of that College be admitted to the Osgoode Hall Law School on the same basis as graduates of other faculties of the University of Toronto. The matter was referred to the Dean for report. A memorandum is submitted from the Dean recommending that this degree be accepted for admission in the Graduate Class.

Your Committee recommends that the Dean's report be approved and that the degree of Bachelor of Science in Agriculture be accepted under Rule 86A.

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#### PUBLIC RELATIONS COMMITTEE—Mr. Jamieson.

Your Committee met on Wednesday, the 14th day of March 1951, the following members being present: Mr. Jamieson (Chairman), the Treasurer, and Messrs. Beaton, Cassels, Chitty and Walsh.

Following the adoption by Convocation of your Committee's Report of February 14th the Society's public relations consultant, McKim Advertising Limited, was informed that Convocation had approved in principle of a programme of public information to be carried out under the direction of your Committee, and that your Committee was authorized to expend a sum not exceeding \$10,000.00.

McKim Advertising Limited presented a brief with certain suggestions as to newspaper coverage, the layout and copy for the paid space, and other details. The plan in brief is for coverage of ten insertions over a year in the three Toronto daily papers, one Hamilton, one London and one Windsor daily, and two Ottawa dailies. With the suggestion McKim Advertising Limited submit a survey of the province showing how these papers cover the area.

Your Committee approves the general form of layout submitted.

Your Committee approves of the plan as suggested over a period of one year of publication with ten insertions, the details to be arranged by McKim Advertising Limited.

Your Committee further recommends that publication in three Northern Ontario centres be included in the plan, and any necessary adjustments be made to keep the cost within the authorized \$10,000.00.

THE REPORT WAS ADOPTED.

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### LEGAL AID COMMITTEE.

In the absence of the Chairman and Vice-Chairman, the Secretary reported that the Sub-Committee on Regulations, consisting of the Chairman, the Vice-Chairman and the Secretary, had met on Friday, March 9th, and recommends that the following sub-section be added to the Regulations as 2(f):

"2. (f) The Provincial Director may settle any forms necessary for the proper administration of the plan, including a form to be signed by all applicants for legal aid."

The Secretary reminded Convocation that when the Regulations were presented to Convocation on February 15, 1951 it was pointed out that costs awarded to a litigant being in the nature of indemnity, might not be collectible under the plan. The sub-committee therefore recommends to Convocation that it be authorized to apply to the Ontario Legislature for enabling legislation.

Moved by Mr. Chitty, seconded by Mr. Jamieson, that the addition of regulation 2(f) be approved, and that the sub-committee be authorized to apply to the Ontario Legislature for the necessary enabling legislation.

*Carried.*

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### SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON LEGISLATION.

Mr. Walsh reported orally on several matters that had been brought to the attention of the Committee, suggesting amendments to various Ontario Acts. He reported that these matters were receiving attention or had been referred to the Ontario Section on the Administration of Civil Justice of the Canadian Bar Association.

## PUBLICATION OF EXAMINATION RESULTS.

When the present system of publishing the examination results was adopted in February 1950, it was suggested in Committee that it be tried for a year and if not satisfactory it could be re-considered. There have been some complaints with reference to the present system.

The question of adopting a grade system is before the Committee, that is, instead of giving actual marks, a grade be given in each subject:

A	—	75	to	100

D	—	below		50

This matter was before the Committee at its meeting in March and directed to stand until this meeting.

Your Committee recommends the adoption of the above grade system.

#### DEPARTMENT OF VETERANS AFFAIRS.

##### *Allowances—new 4 year course.*

At its meeting on the 17th January 1951, the Committee referred this matter to Mr. Cassels and Mr. MacTavish for further consultation with the D.V.A. A letter is submitted from Mr. Cassels reporting on consultations with the D.V.A. and enclosing a copy of a letter dated March 29th, 1951 from the Superintendent of Training Services to the District Administrator, with the following proposal:

“If it is established that in no circumstances may a student-at-law be Called to the Bar with less than twenty-four months’ prescribed articleship we propose to proceed as follows:

- (a) *Where a student veteran has ample remaining qualifying service*—to authorize appropriate assistance for the sixteen months between the end of the second year and the commencement of the final year at Osgoode Hall in September 1952.
- (b) *Where a veteran lacks sufficient qualifying service*—to authorize assistance from September 1951, for not more than twelve months required to qualify for admission to the final year Osgoode Hall, September 1952. Such person may either—
  - (i) elect to do his four months, namely, June to September 1951, at his own expense, OR
  - (ii) alternately, commence his articleship in September, as specified in the Handbook, and perform his final

four months of articleship after completion of the final year at Osgoode Hall in May 1953. If he attains top quarter standing in that final year he would be eligible for appropriate allowances, which surely would be negligible as by this time he he will have graduated with high standing from Osgoode Hall.

Incidentally, the Handbook refers to three weeks' holidays. It should be made clear to all concerned that allowances are not payable for such holiday periods.

We assume that the Osgoode Hall authorities will exercise supervision of the training being received in articleship and make arrangements for certifying full attendance during each month concerned. In such cases all payments would be made through your district office."

Your Committee approves of the proposal of the Department of Veterans Affairs and recommends the drafting of a form of Certificate of Service to be given by Solicitors, and that the Veteran students concerned be required to file such Certificates with the Secretary every month as required by the D.V.A.

#### LAW SCHOOL STAFF.

The Treasurer read a letter from Dr. Falconbridge stating that he wishes to retire from the full-time staff and wishes to lecture as a part-time lecturer on the subject of Conflict of Laws.

Your Committee recommends the acceptance of Dr. Falconbridge's retirement as a full-time member of the Law School staff as of 30th June 1951, and his appointment as a part-time lecturer in the subject of Conflict of Laws, on the terms of his Retiring allowance adopted by Convocation on 19th October 1950.

Your Committee further recommends that the appointment of another full-time lecturer be referred to a Special Committee to be named by the Treasurer, and with power to act.

WALLACE NESBITT BARRISTERS' ESSAY COMPETITION.

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#### LEGAL AID COMMITTEE.

In the absence of the Chairman Mr. Jamieson presented the Report of the Legal Aid Committee.

At its meeting on March 15th, 1951, Convocation authorized your Committee to apply to the Ontario Legislature for certain necessary and enabling legislation in connection with the legal aid fund.

Your Committee is pleased to report that the Honourable Dana H. Porter, K.C., Attorney-General of Ontario, introduced the following Bill No. 136 in the Legislature.

#### BILL

An Act to amend The Law Society Act.

HIS MAJESTY, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Ontario, enacts as follows:

Rev. Stat. c. 200, amended. 1. The Law Society Act is amended by adding thereto the following section:



51a.—(1) The benchers may establish a plan to provide legal aid to persons in need thereof, to be called “The Ontario Legal Aid Plan” and for such purpose may make such regulations as are deemed appropriate.

(2) In order to assist in the operation of the Plan the benchers may create a fund, to be called “The Legal Aid Fund”, which shall be made up of such moneys as the regulations may provide for, including moneys recovered as costs and such moneys as the Society may provide from its general funds.

Legal Aid Fund.

(3) A person who is assisted under the Plan shall have the right to recover and collect lawful costs in actions and proceedings in the same manner as if he had been able to pay the costs of his solicitor and counsel, and where he has not paid anything for such assistance any moneys so received and collected as costs shall vest in the Society and be paid into the Fund.

Costs.

(4) Where moneys have been paid out of the Fund to a solicitor for the purpose of enabling him to make necessary disbursements in connection with services performed by him under the Plan and have been expended by him in the payment of Crown fees or charges and such moneys are not recoverable in any other manner, the Treasurer of Ontario may, on the certificate of the treasurer and secretary of the Society, remit such fees and charges to the Society.

Remission of Crown Fees.

2. This Act may be cited as The Law Society Short Title Amendment Act, 1951.

The Bill had its third reading on March 30th, 1951, and comes into effect May 5th, 1951.

## SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON LEGISLATION.

## THE HIGHWAY TRAFFIC ACT.

The attention of your Committee was drawn to Bill No. 152, an Act to Amend the Highway Traffic Act, Section 10.

10. The Highway Traffic Act is amended by adding thereto the following section:

108a—(1) No moneys shall be paid out of the Fund under or in respect of an order or judgment until the bill or bills of costs of the barrister or solicitor acting or who acted for the applicant in the application or action which resulted in the order or judgment, as taxed on a solicitor and client basis, is filed with the Minister.

(2) No amount shall be charged or received either directly or indirectly for legal services in connection with any application or action referred to in sub-section 1 other than the amounts as taxed on a solicitor and client basis in the bill or bills of costs.

Your Committee recommends that this matter be referred to the Chairman with power to act.

THE REPORT WAS ADOPTED.

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### CANADIAN BAR ASSOCIATION.

#### CANADIAN BAR ASSOCIATION.

The Treasurer read the following Resolution presented to and adopted at the Mid-Winter meeting of the Ontario Section of the Canadian Bar Association, 1951:

*"re Facilities for the Administration of Criminal Justice.*

"WHEREAS statements of the Attorney General indicate the possibility of an investigation into the administration of criminal justice in Ontario;

AND WHEREAS in the opinion of the Ontario Members of the Canadian Bar Association criminal law and procedure under the prevailing system are basically sound;

AND WHEREAS the full benefit of our criminal law and procedure is limited by reason of certain deficiencies in the facilities in the administration of criminal justice, particularly in the lower courts;

"IT IS RESOLVED THAT IN ANY INVESTIGATION into the administration of criminal justice in the Province of Ontario particular attention be directed to:

- (a) The lack of proper court-room facilities in many municipalities;
- (b) The lack of adequate time for the judicial officer properly to hear and determine cases;
- (c) The absence of any system of bringing to the attention of persons charged their rights and the desirability of having proper legal aid."

Moved by Mr. Chitty, seconded by Mr. Jamieson, that the Treasurer appoint a Special Committee to consider the Resolution; to confer with the Committee of the Canadian Bar Association; and with power to act.

## EXAMINATION FOR MATRICULANT STUDENTS.

Under the former five year course, students of the Matriculant Class were required during the two years when they were serving full-time with their Solicitors, to write examinations on prescribed texts. On 20th October 1949, Convocation adopted the Committee's recommendation that no such examinations be required of Matriculant students in the new course during their First, Second and Fifth years. In February 1950 the Dean recommended that the practice of requiring students of the Matriculant Class to study set books during their First and Second years and to pass an examination therein, be revived. The Committee approved of the Dean's recommendation, to apply to all Matriculant students, effective September 1st 1950, the choice of texts and other details to be referred to the Dean and the Secretary.

During the session 1950-51 the Dean prescribed for reading and examination of Matriculant students in their First and Second years, Trevelyan's History of England, and the examination was held on 20th April 1951. The results of the examination are submitted herewith, showing that all 7 Matriculant students have passed.

On the original examination the examiners were doubtful about giving a Rating to 13 students and on reviewing all the reports on these students, Mr. Williston (the supervisor) arranged for the re-examination of the 13 students. On the re-examination 11 of the 13 were given a rating.

Your Committee recommends that those students who obtained NO RATING be required to continue serving under articles and take a further Oral in September. Your Committee further recommends that in future the Benchers be notified that they may attend the Oral examinations if they so desire.

#### SERVICE UNDER ARTICLES—4 *year course.*

At its meeting in January 1951 Convocation adopted the Committee's recommendation—"that students of the Graduate Class in the new four year course, on completion of their Second year at the Law School, be required to enter into Articles. . . "

The Secretary asks clarification of the phrase "on completion". Does it mean on completion of attendance at lectures and writing Easter examinations, or on the successful completion of examinations? In order to receive a June Call on graduation Second year students must file their articles and begin service thereunder before 15th June, and the results of the Easter examinations are not available at that time. This would preclude any students who have supplementals from getting a June Call on graduation.

Your Committee recommends that the wording of the ruling be changed to read "that students of the Graduate Class in the new four year course, immediately after writing their Second year examinations at the Law School, be required to enter into Articles. . . ."

#### SUMMER EMPLOYMENT.

##### *Reserve Forces.*

A letter, addressed to the Dean, from the Honourable Brooke Claxton, Minister of National Defence, is before the Committee asking co-operation in permitting members of the reserve forces to proceed with their annual training. In November 1946, at the request of Lt.-Col. Wilson, O.C. University of Toronto Contingent C.O.T.C., the Committee approved of allowing the period spent by students-at-law for summer training with the C.O.T.C. as proper service in lieu of service under articles. Since that time leave has been granted to any students applying for the purpose of attending summer training camps.



Your Committee recommends that the period spent with active or reserve forces be accepted as proper service by students-at-law in lieu of service under articles.

#### SPECIAL PETITIONS.

Your Committee considered petitions for special relief and made recommendations thereon.

#### DEAN'S MEMORANDA.

A memorandum from the Dean is submitted for consideration.

#### *Changes in Curriculum in 1950-51*

The Dean reports that, in order to make more teaching hours in the Final year the subject of Evidence was in 1950-51 taught in the Second year and Family Law in the First year. This was in accordance with the approval of Convocation last year but entailed some temporary duplication of those courses in the present transitional year.

#### THIRD YEAR STUDENTS IN 1951-1952.

There will be about 50 or 60 students taking their Final Law School year in 1951-52. These are those who failed in their First year in 1948-49 and who were allowed to repeat in 1949-50 under the old three year scheme.

The remainder of those passing their Second Year Examinations this June will be engaged in full-time service under articles in their principals' offices.

But they are Students of the Law Society and the Dean suggests that they should be encouraged to take the fullest advantages of the extra-curricular activities of the Law School and to take on active participation in the functions of the Legal and Literary Society. The Dean further suggests that they should be eligible for the Wallace Nesbitt Students' Essay Competition and for the Wallace Nesbitt and C.O.T.C. Bursaries.

#### PROPOSED CURRICULUM FOR 1951-1952.

The Dean submits the proposed curriculum for the year 1951-52 and an outline of the suggested topics of lectures in Legal Ethics and other lectures.

## LAW SCHOOL EXAMINATIONS.

*Failures—new four year course.*

Under the new 4 year course where a student of the second year has failed at the supplemental examinations in not more than one subject, your Committee recommends that he be permitted to proceed with his Third year (full-time service under Articles) but that he be not permitted to enroll for his Fourth year until he has passed a supplemental examination in the subject in which he has failed.

THE REPORT WAS ADOPTED.

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## FINANCE COMMITTEE—Mr. McLaughlin.

Your Committee met on Tuesday, May 15th, 1951, the following members being present: Messrs. McLaughlin (chairman), the Treasurer, and Beaton, Common, Pickup, Robinette, Walsh and Wilson.

The usual monthly statement was presented and approved.

## COMMON ROLL.

*C. G. Lucas* has discontinued his Law School course and been granted a refund of part of his admission fee.

Your Committee recommends that his name be removed from the Common Roll.

Your Committee met on the 15th day of May, 1951; the following members were present: Messrs. Beaton, Common, Robinette and Wilson.

Your Committee authorized payment of the accounts submitted and the purchase of certain new books.

### O'CONNOR'S REPORT.

Your Committee recommends that there be inserted in the Ontario Weekly Notes an appeal for any copies of the O'Connor Report on the British North America Act, published in 1939, which members of the profession may be willing to donate or sell to the Society. Extra copies of this volume are very much needed in the library and it has long been out of print.

With the letter the Director sent a copy of the Report of the Special Committee adopted by Convocation, a copy of the regulations as approved by Convocation, a copy of the Law Society Amendment Act 1951, a form of application to be signed by all applicants for legal aid, and material for a press release in County and District newspapers.

He stated that in the near future the Director will write to local Benchers, County Court Judges, Crown Attorneys and Magistrates, asking for their co-operation and assistance in the

organization and administration of the Plan. For the Committee Mr. Robinette said that in view of the very extensive and favourable comment by the press, not only in Ontario but across Canada, it is hoped that the Plan will be put into operation at the earliest possible moment. The total number registered for the Special Course of lectures on Conveyancing and Real Estate and the Surrogate Court Practice was 326. Of this number, 110, or more than 33%, were from outside the Toronto metropolitan area and came from all parts of the Province.

Pursuant to authority recommended by your Committee and granted by Convocation on January 18th 1951, arrangements were made with Richard DeBoo Limited to print the lectures, which will be sold to the profession and public at \$9.25 per volume. Copies will be furnished to the Society at a special price and 402 copies have been ordered. This number is made up as follows:

Through the courtesy of Richard DeBoo Limited, copies have been made available to all students of the Law School at the special price, provided the copy is purchased for the use of the student himself. A large proportion of the student body has already taken advantage of this generous offer.

Your Committee is again of the opinion that this special course of lectures was highly successful and of great value to the profession and that the registration, particularly by members

outside Toronto, was even more gratifying than that of last year.

Your Committee, on behalf of the Treasurer and Benchers and of the Bar generally, wishes to record its thanks to His Honour Judge Macdonell and to the members of the Bar who at some personal inconvenience gave so generously of their time and experience in the preparation and delivery of these lectures. Your Committee feels that they have made another notable contribution to the continuing education of the Bar in this province.

Your Committee also desires to express to the Secretary and his staff its appreciation of the efficient and successful carrying into effect of the decisions of the Committee. As usual the work has been done by the Secretary and his staff.

## ANNUAL FEES OF BARRISTERS AND SOLICITORS.

*Report of Sub-Committee.*

At the meeting of the Finance Committee on May 15, 1951 this matter was referred to a sub-committee to be appointed by the Chairman. The Sub-Committee composed of the Treasurer and Messrs. McLaughlin, Beaton, Judson, Pickup and Wilson, met on June 12th when all members were present.

The sub-committee had before it for consideration the following information:

At this date the annual fees of this Society are lower than they were at the time of the founding of the Society when on July 17th, 1797 they were fixed at £5 per annum. In 1831 and again in 1833 the fees were reduced and by 1859 they had been raised to approximately £2.2.6. By 1875 the

annual fees were: Bar fee \$2 and annual certificate to practise in all or any three courts \$15.50. In 1887 they were \$2 and \$15 respectively. Since then there has been no change in the fees payable except that in 1917 the Bar fee was increased from \$2 to \$5.

The annual financial statement of August 31, 1950, showed a surplus of \$14,441.52; the estimates for the year 1950-51 prepared in October 1950 showed a probable deficit of \$13,216.60 and a revised estimate of June 1951 shows a probable deficit for this year of \$15,475.60.

The Society's costs of operation have followed the trend of the times and have increased enormously. Draft estimates for the year 1951-52 prepared on information available at this time, show a probable deficit of approximately \$70,000. Of this figure \$31,000 is due to a decrease in Law School fees owing to the fact that there will be a Third Year of about 65 students as compared with 208 in the present Third Year. Under the new 4 year course there would have been no Third Year for this one year and the number 65 is made up of students, mostly veterans, who were allowed to repeat one year in the old three year course. This is an unusual situation and ordinarily will not occur again, and now that the veteran students have largely been accounted for it is probable that the number of students in future will be smaller.

In the annual statement of August 1950 and in the estimates for the year 1951-52 expenditures of only three committees—Library, County Libraries and Reporting—exceed the amounts paid in annual fees by Barristers and Solicitors by approximately \$26,000 and \$32,000 respectively.

In 5 other Provinces the annual fees are higher than in Ontario.

The Committee considered the position of the Society with respect to its reserves. These at the end of December, 1914, amounted to approximately \$187,000.00. They dropped somewhat during the First War period to a low of \$143,233.78, after which they increased slowly but steadily to the year 1937 when they reached a high of \$548,977.63. In the year 1938, and the



succeeding year, \$293,000.00, approximately, was expended on the new building, reducing the reserves at the end of the year 1939 to \$336,894.97. The reserves dropped nearly \$100,000.00 during the Second War period to a point where at the end of 1945 they amounted to \$239,829.24, since which time they have increased to the point where at the end of August, 1950, they amounted to \$494,319.30. On the basis of the present value of the Canadian dollar, when compared with the 1939 dollar, it would appear that current reserves compared with the reserve at the end of the 1939 fiscal year, are only worth about half their face value and cannot do as much for the Society as the reserves remaining after the new building had been paid for.

The sub-committee also considered the several uncertainties with respect to the future, including the uncertainty with reference to the revenue from the Law School by reason of a reduced number of students when compared with the very large enrolment of the post-war years. It also considered that at some time it may be necessary to make substantial alterations or additions to the Law School, similar to what was done in the late 1930s, and for which provision had been made in prior years, and were of the opinion that the reserves of the Society were not excessive and should increase rather than decrease.

The sub-committee also considered the revenue received from admission and call fees which have to a large extent met the current general expenses of the Society. The disposition of these moneys for general purposes exclusive of the Law School has sometimes been criticised. Quite apart from the proper principle to follow with regard to these moneys and having regard for the very great increase in general expenses and that all costs of living have increased, the Committee could see no alternative to an increase in the annual fees.

The sub-committee recommends unanimously that the Annual fees paid by Barristers and Solicitors be increased from \$5 and \$15 to \$10 and \$30 respectively. The increase in fees now recommended will, according to the present draft estimates, do nothing more than enable the Society to break about even for the year 1951-52.

Your Committee approves and adopts the recommendation of the sub-committee with reference to the increase in Annual Fees for Barristers and Solicitors, and recommends that the relevant Rules of the Society be amended accordingly.

#### LOWER CLASS ROOM.

In March 1951 the Committee approved of Mr. Heeney's memorandum of November 6, 1950 as amended by his memorandum of March 8, 1951. The matter of redecorating and brightening this class room was referred with power to act to the Chairman and Secretary in consultation with the Treasurer and Mr. Beaton. The final plans have now been approved, and this work will be done during long vacation.

Your Committee notes this information, and approves the action taken.

#### MEN'S COMMON ROOM.

In March 1951 the Committee considered the matter of redecorating and refurnishing the two men's common rooms in the new east wing. The matter was referred with power to act to the Chairman and Secretary in consultation with the Treasurer and Mr. Beaton. The plans as submitted by the T. Eaton Co. Limited have now been approved and the work will be proceeded with forthwith.

Your Committee notes this information and approves the action taken.

THE REPORT WAS ADOPTED.

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#### AMENDMENT OF RULES.

Moved by Mr. McLaughlin, seconded by Mr. Beaton, that Rule 22 be suspended;

THAT Rule 146 be amended by striking out the word "five" in the third line thereof, and substituting therefor the word "ten";

THAT Rule 147 be amended by striking out the words "fifteen" and "five" in the second line thereof, and substituting therefor the words "thirty" and "ten" respectively; and by striking out

the word "fifteen" in the last line thereof and substituting therefor the word "thirty";

THAT Rule 150 be amended by striking out the figures "5" and "15" in the last two items thereof, and substituting therefor the figures "10" and "30".

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## DISCIPLINE COMMITTEE.

Moved by Mr. Pickup, seconded by Mr. Beaton, that the Report be adopted.

The Solicitor did not appear nor was he represented by Counsel.

The Report of the Discipline Committee in the matter of FRANK HENRY MACLATCHY, Barrister, a member of this Society and a Solicitor of the Supreme Court of Ontario, was adopted.

It was resolved that upon the facts ascertained and appearing by the said Report and the evidence and other papers referred to and submitted to Convocation therewith, Convocation finds the said FRANK HENRY MACLATCHY guilty of professional misconduct and of conduct unbecoming a Barrister and Solicitor in respect of the charges dealt with by the said Report.

3.—THAT the said FRANK HENRY MACLATCHY be disbarred.

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SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON UNIFORM STANDARDS FOR  
ADMISSION OF BARRISTERS AND STUDENTS FROM  
ONE COMMON LAW PROVINCE TO ANOTHER.

Mr. Jamieson, Chairman of the Special Committee, reported orally to the following effect:

A Special Committee of the Conference of Governing Bodies of the Legal Profession in Canada on Uniform Standards for Admission of Barristers and Students from one Common Law Province to Another, presented a report to the Mid-Winter Meeting of the Executive of the Conference held at Saint John, New Brunswick on the 9th February 1950. The Executive of the Conference received the report of the Special Committee, and referred it to the Annual Meeting of the Conference for consideration, and if deemed advisable for recommendation to the Governing Bodies for adoption.

On February 16, 1950 this information was reported to Convocation, and a Special Committee of the Benchers was appointed to consider the report referred to and report back to Convocation.

On June 29, 1950 your Special Committee reported to Convocation pointing out that the Report of the Special Committee of the Conference was drafted with reference to the former three year course at Osgoode Hall Law School.

Your Committee therefore recommended that the representative of the Law Society of Upper Canada to the Conference of Governing Bodies of the Legal Profession in Canada, be instructed to request the Annual Meeting of the Conference at Washington in September 1950 to postpone until the Annual Meeting in 1951 further consideration of the Report of the Special Committee of the Conference on Uniform Standards so that the matter under review could be considered in the light of the present four year course at Osgoode Hall.

At the Annual Meeting of the Conference of Governing Bodies at Washington, D.C., on September 21, 1950 the request of this Society was granted. The Report of the Special Committee of the Conference on Uniform Standards is on the agenda for discussion at the Annual Meeting of the Conference to be held in Toronto September 10, 1951.

Mr. Jamieson, as the representative of the Society on the Executive of the Conference, asked for the direction of Convocation.

Moved by Mr. McCulloch, seconded by Mr. Willmott, that a special Convocation for the consideration of this matter be held on Thursday, September 6th, 1951 at 11 a.m.

Mr. Walsh also reminded Convocation that recently a letter had been received from the Oxford Law Association with reference to an increase in Surrogate Court fees.

## RE UNIFORM STANDARDS OF ADMISSION OF BARRISTERS AND STUDENTS FROM ONE COMMON LAW PROVINCE TO ANOTHER.

Mr. Jamieson, Chairman of the Special Committee on Uniform Standards, outlined to Convocation the general history of this matter and read the Report of the Special Committee of the Conference of Governing Bodies of the Legal Profession in Canada, as presented to a meeting of the Executive of the Conference in February 1950, and which will be under consideration at the Annual Meeting of the Conference on September 10, 1951.

Moved by Mr. Jamieson, seconded by Mr. Willmott, that Convocation approve in principle of the proposed uniform standards as to reciprocal arrangements for transfer of barristers from one Common Law province to another, as set out in paragraph 1 of the Report of the Special Committee of the Conference of Governing Bodies dated February 1950.

Moved in amendment by Mr. Weir, seconded by Mr. Beaton, that Convocation approve of the proposals for transfer referred to above, with the exception that paragraph 1(e) be amended to the effect that an applicant from another province pay a fee on special call equal to the fees paid by a student in regular attendance at Osgoode Hall Law School, i.e. \$922.00; and that paragraph 1 be amended to provide that the applicant must have practised in the province of call for one year after his Call, or that he must serve under articles in Ontario for a period of one year.

Moved in amendment to the amendment by Mr. Walsh, seconded by Mr. Maclaren, that Convocation does not approve of the Report of the Special Committee of the Conference of Governing Bodies, but recommends that the Treasurer appoint a large and representative special committee to consider the proposals and suggest what arrangements might be made to improve the situation and report back.

The amendment to the amendment was carried.

Moved by Mr. Chitty, seconded by Mr. Maclaren, that the Society's representative to the Conference of Governing Bodies be instructed to report to the Annual Meeting of the Conference that Convocation has expressed itself generally in favour of some form of uniform standards of admission from one common law province to another, but it is not prepared to accept the Report of the Committee of the Conference of Governing Bodies, and has appointed a Committee to study the matter and report to Convocation.

H. W. A. Foster, K.C., Executor, and the Public Trustee, have informed the Secretary that the Will contains the following bequest:

“My trustee shall after my sister’s death, pay to or deliver to the Law Society of Upper Canada the residue of my estate, the same to be applied from time to time by the Treasurer and Benchers, and both as to capital and income as they may see fit, for the relief of impoverished or indigent members of the Law Society and of their wives, widows and children, including among such wives, widows and children those of any member of the Law Society who may have been disbarred or suspended.”

The Executor informed the Secretary that it is his opinion that the Law Society will eventually receive something in excess of \$100,000.00.

Your Committee notes with sincere appreciation the generous gift of the late Treasurer whose great interest in and contribution to the work of the Society is so well known; and recommends that a suitable acknowledgment be sent to Mr. Foster, the Executor.

#### OSGOODE HALL LEGAL & LITERARY SOCIETY, Grant 1951-52.

Your Committee recommends that the Grant for 1951-52 to the Osgoode Hall Legal & Literary Society be on the same basis as last year and approves of the initial payment; and recommends that further payments be made on approval of the Chairman of the Finance or Legal Education Committee.

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SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON MEMORIAL TO THE LATE  
JOHN SHIRLEY DENISON, K.C.

Mr. Mason presented the Report of the Special Committee appointed to prepare a Memorial to the late John Shirley Denison, K.C., and it was ordered that it be recorded in the Minutes of Convocation and a copy sent to Miss Emily Denison, the sister of the late Treasurer.

MEMORIAL

to the late

JOHN SHIRLEY DENISON, K.C.

Convocation records with sincere regret the death, on the 28th of June 1951, at Toronto, of Mr. John Shirley Denison, K.C., a former Treasurer of The Law Society of Upper Canada.

Mr. Denison was born at Montreal, Quebec, on the 2nd of July 1870; son of George Shirley Denison and Julia Isabella (Jordan) Denison. He received his early education at Upper Canada College, Toronto. He was admitted as a student-at-law in the Matriculant Class in the Hilary Term in 1887, and was Called to the Bar in the Hilary Term in 1892, and was sworn in as a Solicitor on September 2nd 1892. He read law with the Moss firm, and worked especially with N. W. Hoyles, K.C., who later became Principal of The Osgoode Hall Law School. After



graduation, he was for some time with the firm of Foy & Kelly, Mr. Foy later became the Attorney-General for Ontario, and Mr. Kelly, one of our distinguished Judges. Mr. Denison later formed a partnership with the late Angus MacMurchy, K.C., under the name of MacMurchy & Denison, and practised for many years under that firm name. He was co-author with Mr. MacMurchy of the book "Railway Law of Canada".

On the 5th of September 1900, he married Maude, daughter of James B. Fairbairn, who predeceased him, leaving no children.

Mr. Denison became a part-time Lecturer on the staff of The Osgoode Hall Law School in 1910, and continued to lecture on the subject of Real Property until the year 1925, and was an acknowledged authority on that subject, and was widely consulted by Solicitors.

He was created a King's Counsel in 1910, and in 1913 he and Harold W. A. Foster became associated in the firm of Denison & Foster, but during the absence of Mr. Foster on active service in the First World War an association was formed with the late E. B. Ryckman, K.C. After Mr. Ryckman's death, the association with Mr. Foster continued with some changes in the firm name from time to time.

Mr. Denison gave long and useful service to The Law Society of Upper Canada, becoming a Bencher in May 1931, and being re-elected in 1936, 1941 and 1946, and a Life Bencher in April 1946. He was Chairman of the Legal Education Committee from November 1936 to the 18th of May 1944, when he became Treasurer of The Law Society, serving in that capacity from 1944-1947.

He won the respect and esteem of his fellow-Benchers, his clients, his associates and the large number of students-at-law who sat under him during the many years he lectured at the Law School.

Mr. Denison enjoyed a high and enviable reputation as a Counsel, and was actively engaged in the practice of his profession until a few days before his death, and in the current volume of the Ontario Reports his name appears as Counsel in two important judgments.

Mr. Denison was a Trustee of The Toronto General Burying Grounds, a Trustee and Member of the Council of Wycliffe College, and a former Church Warden of St. Paul's Anglican Church, Toronto.

His recreation was golf. He was an active Member for many years of The Toronto Golf Club, Toronto Hunt Club, The Toronto Club and The National Club.

His devotion to his profession and The Law Society of Upper Canada is evidenced by the fact that under the terms of his Will the residue of his estate, on the death of a surviving sister, passes to The Law Society for the relief of indigent Barristers and Solicitors and their families, and this to include the families of those persons who may have been struck off our Rolls.

By his death, the profession lost a valued and esteemed Member and one who typified its highest traditions.

### SURROGATE COURT TARIFF.

Convocation referred to your Committee a letter from the Oxford Law Association with reference to an increase in Surrogate Court fees. In June 1951 Mr. Harvey McCulloch, K.C. forwarded to the Secretary a letter of June 20th from Messrs. Davis & Waller, Solicitors of Hamilton, with reference to the same subject.

The Chairman reported to your Committee that this matter had already been before the Rules Committee, but that no action had been taken.

In consideration of the fact that the allowance to solicitors in Surrogate Court matters has not been increased since 1938, and that the costs of living and the cost of carrying on business has almost doubled since that date,

Your Committee recommends to Convocation that representation be made for an increase in Surrogate Court fees, and that the Chairman be authorized to place these representations before the Rules Committee.

## CORRESPONDENCE.

*Presentation*—The Treasurer read a letter from Mr. W. Rankine Nesbitt, Barrister, informing the Treasurer of his presentation of a port decanter, at one time the property of his father, the Honourable Wallace Nesbitt, K.C., sometime Treasurer of this Society.
